

The Office of the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools will support all districts and schools within Fresno County by:

- Supporting LEAs in the development of their LCAP and/or any additional required Annual Review plans through offering professional learning workshops and individual LEAs visits throughout the year.
- Providing the following no cost workshops and network meetings: LCAP and related plan development, State and Federal Programs Network, Counselor's Network, Assessment Network, CALPADS Network, Curriculum Network, CSI Collaborative, District Technology Leads Network, English Learner Network, Alternative Schools Network, and Illuminate Users Group.
- Providing data support, when requested, regarding the Dashboard and Dataquest data.
- Providing up to date communication (via email, our website, shared drives, and meetings) regarding the LCAP and related templates, LCFF requirements, Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), the State and Federal Accountability Systems and how they all interrelate as part of a continuous improvement cycle.
- Being available for consultation by phone, email, virtual platforms, and in person.

The Office of the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools will support districts identified for technical assistance by:

- Providing technical assistance through the Differentiated Assistance team which is comprised of members from the following departments: Differentiated Assistance, LCAP and Compliance, Assessments and Accountability, Curriculum and Instruction, Special Education, Student Intervention and Prevention, Pupil Personnel Services, Foster & Homeless Youth Education Services Program, and the Deputy Superintendent of Educational Services that includes:
 - A data deep dive and analysis of the problem
 - A Root Cause analysis
 - Designing a Theory of Action that will improve services to the student group(s) which provided eligibility for Differentiated Assistance
 - Testing improvement ideas through PDSA cycles and implementing Action Plans

Community Relations UNIFORM COMPLAINT PROCEDURES

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize the need to comply with state and federal laws and regulations governing educational programs. The County Superintendent and County Board have the primary responsibility to ensure compliance with applicable state and federal laws and regulations governing the educational programs and activities of the County Superintendent and/or County Board. To resolve complaints that require a formal procedure, the County Superintendent and County Board adopt the uniform system of complaint processes specified in 5 CCR 4600-4670. The County Superintendent shall further articulate this procedure in Administrative Regulation 1312.3 – Uniform Complaint Procedures (UCP). The County Board hereby adopts as its own procedure County Superintendent Administrative Regulation 1312.3 – Uniform Complaint Administrative Regulation 1312.3 – Uniform County Superintendent Administrative Regulation 1312.3 –

Complaints Subject to the UCP

The UCP shall be used to investigate and resolve the following complaints:

- 1. Any complaint alleging violation of applicable state or federal law or regulations governing the following programs and activities, to the extent such programs/activities are applicable to the County Superintendent and/or County Board:
 - Adult Education.
 - After School Education and Safety.
 - Agricultural Vocational Education.
 - American Indian Education Centers and Early Childhood Education Program Assessments.
 - Bilingual Education.
 - California Peer Assistance and Review Programs for Teachers.
 - Career Technical and Technical Education; Career Technical; Technical Training.
 - Career Technical Education.
 - Child Care and Development.
 - Child Nutrition.
 - Compensatory Education.
 - Consolidated Categorical Aid.
 - Economic Impact Aid.
 - English Learner Programs.
 - Every Student Succeeds Act/No Child Left Behind (Titles I VII).
 - Migrant Education.
 - Regional Occupational Centers and Programs.
 - School Safety Plans.
 - State Preschool Programs.
 - Tobacco-Use Prevention Education.
 - Any other program implemented by the County Superintendent and/or County Board which is listed in Education Code section 64000(a) or California Code of Regulations, Title 5, section 4610.
- 2. Any complaint alleging the occurrence of unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying) against any student,

employee, or other person participating in County Superintendent or County Board programs and activities, including, but not limited to, those programs or activities funded directly by or that receive or benefit from any state financial assistance, based on the person's actual or perceived characteristics of race or ethnicity, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, immigration status, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital status, pregnancy, parental status, physical or mental disability, medical condition, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, or genetic information, or any other characteristic identified in Education Code 200 or 220, Government Code 11135, or Penal Code 422.55, or based on his/her association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics. (5 CCR 4610.)

- 3. Any complaint alleging noncompliance with the requirement to provide reasonable accommodation to a lactating student on school campus to express breast milk, breastfeed an infant child, or address other breastfeeding-related needs of the student. (Education Code 222.)
- 4. Any complaint alleging noncompliance with requirements to provide a pregnant or parenting student the accommodations specified in Education Code 46015, including those related to the provision of parental leave, right of return to the school of previous enrollment or to an alternative education program, if desired, and possible enrollment in school for a fifth year of instruction to enable the student to complete state and County Superintendent/County Board-imposed graduation requirements (Education Code 46015)
- 5. Any complaint alleging noncompliance with the prohibition against requiring students to pay fees, deposits, or other charges for participation in educational activities. (5 CCR 4610.)
- 6. Any complaint alleging noncompliance with legal requirements related to the implementation of the local control and accountability plan. (Education Code 52075.)
- 7. Any complaint alleging noncompliance with requirements related to the development of a school plan for student achievement or the establishment of a school site council, to the extent those provisions are applicable to the County Superintendent and County Board for the consolidated application for specified federal and/or state categorical funding. (Education Code 64000-64001, 65000-65001)
- 8. Any complaint, by or on behalf of any student who is a foster youth, alleging noncompliance with any legal requirement applicable to the student regarding placement decisions, the responsibilities of the educational liaison to the student, the award of credit for coursework satisfactorily completed in another school or district, school transfer, or the grant of an exemption from County Superintendent/County Board-imposed graduation requirements. (Education Code 48853, 48853.5, 49069.5, 51225.1, 51225.2.)
- 9. Any complaint, by or on behalf of a homeless student as defined in 42 USC 11434a, a former juvenile court school student, a child of a military family as

defined in Education Code 49701, a migrant student as defined in Education Code 54441, or an immigrant student participating in a newcomer program as defined in Education Code 51225.2, who transfers into a County Superintendent/County Board school after his/her second year of high school, alleging noncompliance with any requirement applicable to the student regarding the award of credit for coursework satisfactorily completed in another school or district or the grant of an exemption from County Superintendent/County Boardimposed graduation requirements. (Education Code 51225.1, 51225.2.)

- 10. Any complaint alleging noncompliance with the requirements that prohibit the assignment of a student in grades 9-12 to a course without educational content for more than one week in any semester or to a course the student has previously satisfactorily completed, without meeting specified conditions. (Education Code 51228.1, 51228.2, 51228.3.)
- 11. Any complaint alleging noncompliance with the physical education instructional minutes requirement for students in elementary school (Education Code 51210, 51223.)
- 12. Any complaint alleging retaliation against a complainant or other participant in the complaint process or anyone who has acted to uncover or report a violation subject to this policy.

The County Superintendent or designee shall investigate complaints listed herein and shall seek to resolve those complaints in accordance with the UCP set forth in Administrative Regulation 1312.3. (5 CCR 4620.)

The County Superintendent shall protect all complainants from retaliation. In investigating complaints, the confidentiality of the parties involved shall be protected as required by law. For any complaint alleging retaliation or unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying), the County Superintendent or designee shall keep the identity of the complainant, and/or the subject of the complaint if he/she is different from the complainant, confidential when appropriate and as long as the integrity of the complaint process is maintained.

When an allegation that is not subject to the UCP is included in a UCP complaint, the County Superintendent or designee shall refer the non-UCP allegation to the appropriate staff or agency and shall investigate and, if appropriate, resolve the UCP-related allegation(s) through the UCP.

The County Superintendent or designee shall provide training to staff to ensure awareness and knowledge of current law and related requirements, including the steps and timelines specified in this policy and the accompanying administrative regulation.

The County Superintendent or designee shall maintain a record of each complaint and subsequent related actions, including steps taken during the investigation and all information required for compliance with 5 CCR 4631 and 4633.

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Non-UCP Complaints

The following complaints shall not be subject to the UCP but shall be referred to the specified agency (5 CCR 4611):

- 1. Any complaint alleging child abuse or neglect shall be referred to the County Department of Social Services, the County Protective Services Division, and the appropriate law enforcement agency.
- 2. Any complaint alleging health and safety violations by a child development program shall, for licensed facilities, be referred to Department of Social Services and shall, for licensing-exempt facilities, be referred to the appropriate Child Development regional administrator.
- 3. Any complaint alleging fraud shall be referred to the Legal, Audits and Compliance Branch of the California Department of Education.

Any complaint alleging employment discrimination or harassment shall be investigated and resolved in accordance with the procedures specified in applicable County Superintendent policy and/or administrative regulation.

Any complaint related to sufficiency of textbooks or instructional materials, emergency or urgent facilities conditions that pose a threat to the health or safety of students or staff, or teacher vacancies and misassignments shall be investigated and resolved in accordance with the procedures in County Superintendent Administrative Regulation 1312.4 - Williams Uniform Complaint Procedures. (Education Code 35186.)

This policy and related administrative regulations are intended to comply with California Code of Regulations, Title 5, section 4600 *et. seq.*, and are not intended to extend beyond such requirements.

Instruction CONCEPTS AND ROLES

The County Superintendent and County Board desire to provide a comprehensive, research-based curriculum that motivates every student to succeed. The County Superintendent's educational program shall provide students with opportunities to attain the skills, knowledge, and abilities they need to be successful in school and develop to their full potential.

Strategies for improving the educational program shall take into consideration the needs of individual students and subpopulations of students. Students who are failing or at risk of failing to meet academic standards shall be provided with alternative programs and/or supplemental assistance designed to raise achievement.

Inasmuch as parents/guardians are critical partners in their children's education, parents/guardians shall be provided with opportunities to be meaningfully involved both in support of their children's education program at school and with learning at home.

The County Superintendent and County Board shall:

- 1. Establish standards of student achievement for core subjects at each grade level that are aligned with the County Superintendent's vision for student learning, the specific needs and strengths of the students, the expectations of parents/guardians, the community, and available resources;
- 2. Establish graduation requirements;
- 3. Ensure that a process is in place, involving teachers, administrators, students, and parents/guardians, for the development and review of the County Superintendent's curriculum;
- 4. Adopt the County Superintendent's curriculum and courses of study to be offered;
- 5. Adopt textbooks and other instructional materials;
- 6. Support the professional staff's implementation of the curriculum by providing consistent policy direction, allocating resources based on educational program priorities, ensuring that collective bargaining agreements do not constrain the County Superintendent's ability to achieve curricular goals, recognizing staff accomplishments, and including reasonable annual goals related to student learning;
- 7. Provide a continuing program of professional development to keep instructional staff and administrators updated about current issues and research pertaining to curriculum, instructional strategies, and student assessment;

- 8. Review and evaluate the educational program on the bases of state and federal accountability measures, disaggregated student achievement data, and other indicators and ensure that evaluation results are used to improve programs, curriculum, and/or instructional practices as necessary to enhance student achievement; and
- 9. Communicate clear information about County Superintendent instructional goals, programs, and progress in student achievement to the community and media

The County Superintendent or designee shall:

- 1. Review research related to curriculum issues;
- 2. Select and/or develop curricula for recommendation to the County Board in accordance with the County Superintendent's curriculum development and review process;
- 3. Ensure the articulation of the curriculum between grade levels and with postsecondary education and the workplace;
- 4. Determine the general methods of instruction to be used;
- 5. Assign instructors and schedule classes for all curricular offerings;
- 6. Recommend instructional materials to the County Board and direct the purchase of approved materials and equipment; and
- 7. Evaluate and report to the County Board on student achievement as demonstrated through testing and other types of appraisal, and recommend necessary changes in curriculum, programs, and instruction as indicated by student performance data.

Comparability in Instruction

The County Superintendent shall provide comparable educational opportunities for all students. Instruction in the core curriculum shall be in no way diminished when students receive supplementary services funded by special governmental programs. Services funded by any categorical program shall supplement, not supplant, the County Superintendent-provided core curriculum and any services which may be provided by other categorical programs.

Instruction ACADEMIC STANDARDS

The County Superintendent and County Board shall adopt high standards for student achievement which challenge all students to reach their full potential and specify what students are expected to know and to be able to do at each grade level and in each area of study. These standards shall reflect the knowledge and skills needed for students to be adequately prepared for postsecondary education, employment, and responsible citizenship.

In developing these recommended standards, the County Superintendent or designee shall use a process that involves teachers, school site and administrators, students, parents/guardians, representatives from business/industry and postsecondary institutions, and/or community members. County Superintendent or designee shall ensure the proper articulation of standards between grade levels and the alignment of the standards with the County Superintendent's vision and goals, graduation requirements, college entrance requirements, and other desired student outcomes. County Superintendent or designee also shall ensure that the standards are easily understandable and measurable.

County Superintendent and County Board content standards for English language arts, English language development, mathematics, science, health education, history-social science, physical education, visual and performing arts, world languages, career technical education, and preschool education shall meet or exceed statewide model content standards adopted by the State Board of Education or the State Superintendent of Public Instruction as applicable.

County Superintendent and County Board curriculum, instruction, student assessments, and evaluations of the instructional program shall be aligned with County Superintendent and County Board content standards. In accordance with Education Code 44662, standards of expected student achievement also shall be used in evaluating teacher performance.

Teachers and school administrators shall receive ongoing professional development to inform them of changes in the standards and to build their capacity to implement effective standards-based instructional methodologies.

The County Superintendent or designee shall annually communicate the applicable standards to students and their parents/guardians to inform them of the expectations for student learning at their grade level.

Staff shall continually assess students' progress toward meeting the standards, report each student's progress to the student and his/her parents/guardians, and offer remedial assistance in accordance with County Superintendent and County Board policy and administrative regulations.

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that County Superintendent and County Board standards are regularly reviewed and updated as necessary. At a minimum, County Superintendent and County Board standards shall be reviewed whenever applicable statewide standards are revised and in response to changing student needs.

Instruction PARENT INVOLVEMENT

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that parents/guardians are their children's first and most influential teachers and that sustained parent/guardian involvement in the education of their children contributes greatly to student achievement and a positive school environment. The County Superintendent or designee shall work with parents/guardians and family members to jointly develop and agree upon strategies to meaningfully involve parents/guardians and family members in school activities at all grade levels; advisory, decision-making, and advocacy roles; and activities to support learning at home.

Parents/guardians shall be notified of their rights to be informed about and to participate in their children's education and of the opportunities available to them to do so.

The County Superintendent's local control and accountability plan (LCAP) shall include goals and strategies for parent/guardian involvement and family engagement, including efforts to seek parent/guardian input in program and school site decision making and to promote parent/guardian participation in programs for English learners, foster youth, students eligible for free and reduced-price meals, and students with disabilities. (Education Code 42238.02, 52060)

The County Superintendent or designee shall regularly evaluate and report on the effectiveness of parent/guardian and family engagement efforts, including, but not limited to, input from parents/guardians, family members, and school staff on the adequacy of involvement opportunities and on barriers that may inhibit participation.

Title I Schools

The County Superintendent or designee shall involve parents/guardians and family members in establishing expectations and objectives for meaningful parent/guardian and family engagement in schools supported by Title I funding, developing strategies that describe how the County Superintendent will carry out each activity listed in 20 USC 6318, as contained in the accompanying administrative regulation, and implementing and evaluating such programs, activities, and procedures. As appropriate, the County Superintendent or designee shall conduct outreach to all parents/guardians and family members. (Education Code 11503; 20 USC 6318)

When the County Superintendent's Title I, Part A allocation exceeds the amount specified in 20 USC 6318, the County Superintendent shall reserve at least one percent of the funding to implement parent/guardian and family engagement activities and shall distribute at least 90 percent of those reserved funds to eligible schools, with priority given to high-need schools as defined in 20 USC 6631. The County Superintendent or designee shall involve parents/guardians and family members of participating students in decisions regarding how the Title I funds will be allotted for parent/guardian and family engagement activities. (20 USC 6318)

Expenditures of such funds shall be consistent with the activities specified in this policy and shall include at least one of the following: (20 USC 6318)

- 1. Support for schools and nonprofit organizations in providing professional development for program and school staff regarding parent/guardian and family engagement strategies, which may be provided jointly to teachers, principals, other school leaders, specialized instructional support personnel, paraprofessionals, early childhood educators, and parents/guardians and family members
- 2. Support for programs that reach parents/guardians and family members at home, in the community, and at school
- 3. Dissemination of information on best practices focused on parent/guardian and family engagement, especially best practices for increasing the engagement of economically disadvantaged parents/guardians and family members
- 4. Collaboration, or the provision of sub-grants to schools to enable collaboration, with community-based or other organizations or employers with a record of success in improving and increasing parent/guardian and family engagement
- 5. Any other activities and strategies that the County Superintendent determines are appropriate and consistent with this policy

If the County Superintendent also receives funds under federal Title IV, Part E, to coordinate and enhance family engagement programs, the County Superintendent or designee shall inform parents/guardians and organizations of the existence of Title IV. (20 USC 6318)

The County Superintendent's and County Board's policy and administrative regulation containing parent/guardian and family engagement strategies shall be incorporated into the County Superintendent's LCAP in accordance with 20 USC 6312. (20 USC 6318)

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each school receiving Title I funds develops a school-level parent/guardian and family engagement policy in accordance with 20 USC 6318.

County Superintendent and school-level parent/guardian and family engagement policies and administrative regulations shall be distributed to parents/guardians of students participating in Title I programs and shall be available to the local community. Parents/guardians shall be notified of the policy in an understandable and uniform format and, to the extent practicable, provided in a language the parents/guardians can understand. (20 USC 6318)

Non-Title I Schools

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop and implement strategies applicable to each school that does not receive federal Title I funds to encourage the involvement and support of parents/guardians in the education of their children, including, but not limited to,

Instruction SCHOOL CALENDAR

For each school, the County Superintendent and County Board shall adopt a school calendar that meets the requirements of law as well as the needs of the community, students, and the work year as negotiated with employee organization(s). As appropriate, the County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the proposed calendar is aligned with assessment and accountability schedules in order to support the County Superintendent's goals for student achievement.

Each school calendar shall show the beginning and ending school dates, legal and local holidays, staff development days, orientation days, minimum days, vacation periods, and other pertinent dates.

The County Superintendent shall offer a minimum of 175 days of instruction per school year, until it equals or exceeds the local control funding formula target established for it pursuant to Education Code 42238.02, at which time the County Superintendent shall offer 180 days or more of instruction per school year. (Education Code 41420, 46208)

Notification of the schedule of minimum days and student-free staff development days shall be sent to all parents/guardians at the beginning of the school year. If any minimum days or student-free staff development days are added to the schedule, the County Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians of the affected students as soon as possible and at least one month before the scheduled minimum day. (Education Code 48980)

If a school will be used as a polling place on an election day, the County Board shall determine whether to continue school in session, designate the day for staff training and development, or close the school to students and non-classified staff. (Elections Code 12283)

Instruction SCHOOL DAY

The County Board and County Superintendent shall fix the length of the school day subject to the provisions of law. (Education Code 46100)

The length of the school day shall apply equally to students with disabilities unless otherwise specified in the student's individualized education program or Section 504 plan.

In establishing the daily instructional schedule for each secondary school, the County Superintendent or designee shall give consideration to course requirements and curricular demands, availability of school facilities, and applicable legal requirements.

The County Superintendent encourages flexibility in scheduling so as to provide longer time blocks or class periods when appropriate and desirable to support student learning, provide more intensive study of core academic subjects or extended exploration of complex topics, and reduce transition time between classes.

Prior to implementing a block schedule program in which secondary students attend class for fewer school days, the County Superintendent shall consult with the certificated and classified employees of the school in a good faith effort to reach agreement and shall also consult with parents/guardians of the students who would be affected by the change and the community at large. Such consultation shall include at least one public hearing for which the County Superintendent has given adequate notice to the employees and to the parents/guardians of affected students. (Education Code 46162)

Instruction CEREMONIES AND OBSERVANCES

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize the importance of having students observe holidays, celebrate events of cultural or historical significance, and acknowledge the contributions of outstanding individuals in society. On days designated by the County Superintendent, staff shall provide students with appropriate commemorative exercises so that they may acquire the knowledge, skills, and principles essential for informed, responsible citizenship in a democratic society.

County Superintendent/County Board schools shall be closed on the holidays specified in Education Code 37220 and on any other day designated as a holiday by the County Superintendent. The County Superintendent may revise the date upon which schools close in observance of any holiday except Veterans Day, which shall be celebrated on its actual date. (Education Code 37220)

In addition, the County Superintendent may authorize the display of symbolic flags or banners in support of specific awareness months.

Instruction RESPONSE TO INSTRUCTION AND INTERVENTION

The County Superintendent and County Board desire to provide a high-quality, data-driven educational program to meet the learning and behavioral needs of each student and to help reduce disparities in achievement among subgroups of students. Students who are not making academic progress pursuant to County Superintendent measures of performance shall receive intensive instruction and intervention supports designed to meet their individual learning needs.

The County Superintendent or designee shall convene a team of certificated personnel, other staff, and parents/guardians, as appropriate, to assist in designing the County Superintendent's Response to Instruction and Intervention (RtI2) system, based on an examination of indicators of student achievement.

The County Superintendent's Rtl2 system shall include instructional strategies and interventions with demonstrated effectiveness and shall be aligned with the County school curriculum and assessments.

The County Superintendent's RtI2 system shall include research-based, standards-based, culturally relevant instruction for students in the education program; universal screening and continuous classroom monitoring to determine students' needs and to identify those students who are not making progress; criteria for determining the types and levels of interventions to be provided; and subsequent monitoring of student progress to determine the effectiveness of the intervention and to make changes as needed.

When data from the Rtl2 system indicate that a student may have a specific learning disability, the student may be referred for evaluation for special education or other services.

The County Superintendent shall provide staff development to teachers regarding the use of assessments, data analysis, and research-based instructional practices and strategies. In addition, the County Superintendent's RtI2 system shall emphasize a collaborative approach of professional learning communities among teachers within and across grade spans.

Staff shall ensure that parents/guardians are involved at all stages of the instructional and intervention process. Parents/guardians shall be kept informed of their child's progress and provided information regarding the services that will be provided, the strategies being used to increase the student's rate of learning, and information about the performance data that will be collected.

Instruction CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT AND EVALUATION

The County Superintendent and County Board desire to provide a research-based, sequential curriculum which promotes high levels of student achievement and emphasizes the development of basic skills, problem solving, and decision making. Upon recommendation of the County Superintendent or designee, the County Board shall adopt a written curriculum which describes, for each subject area and grade level, the content objectives which are to be taught in all County Superintendent-operated schools.

The curriculum shall be aligned with the vision and goals for student learning of County Superintendent/County Board, County Superintendent and County Board policies, academic content standards, state curriculum frameworks, state and local assessments, graduation requirements, school and County Superintendent improvement plans, and, when necessary, related legal requirements.

The County Superintendent or designee shall establish a process for curriculum development, selection, and/or adaptation which utilizes the professional expertise of teachers, principals, and program administrators representing various grade levels, disciplines, special programs, and categories of students as appropriate. The process also may provide opportunities for input from students, parents/guardians, representatives of local businesses and postsecondary institutions, and other community members.

The selection and evaluation of instructional materials shall be coordinated with the curriculum development and evaluation process.

When presenting a recommended curriculum for adoption, the County Superintendent or designee shall provide research, data, or other evidence demonstrating the proven effectiveness of the proposed curriculum. He/she also shall present information about the resources that would be necessary to successfully implement the curriculum and describe any modifications or supplementary services that are needed to make the curriculum accessible to all students.

The County Superintendent and County Board shall establish a review cycle for regularly evaluating the curriculum in order to ensure continued alignment with state and local goals for student achievement. At a minimum, these reviews shall be conducted whenever the State Board of Education adopts new or revised content standards or the curriculum framework for a particular subject or when new law requires a change or addition to the curriculum.

In addition, the County Superintendent and County Board may require a review of the curriculum in one or more subject areas as needed in response to student assessment results; feedback from teachers, administrators, or parent/guardians; new research on program effectiveness; or changing student needs.

Instruction RECOGNITION OF RELIGIOUS BELIEFS AND CUSTOMS

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that students' education would be incomplete without an understanding of the role of religion in society. As appropriate for a particular course, teachers may objectively discuss the influences of various religions, using religious works and symbols to illustrate their relationship with culture, literature or the arts. The County Superintendent and County Board expect that such instruction will identify principles common to all religions and foster respect for the diversity of religions and customs in the world.

In order to respect each student's individual right to freedom of religious practice, religious indoctrination is clearly forbidden in the public schools. Instruction about religion shall not promote or denigrate the beliefs or customs of any particular religion or sect, nor should a preference be shown for one religious viewpoint over another. County Superintendent staff members shall be highly sensitive to their obligation not to interfere with the religious development of any student in whatever tradition the student embraces.

County Superintendent staff shall not endorse, encourage or solicit religious or anti-religious expression or activities among students during class time. As part of their official duties, staff shall not lead students in prayer or other religious activities. However, staff shall not prohibit or discourage any student from praying or otherwise expressing his/her religious belief as long as this does not disrupt the classroom.

Students may express their beliefs about religion in their homework, artwork and other class work if the expression is germane to the assignment. Such work shall be judged by ordinary academic standards.

While teaching about religious holidays is a permissible part of the educational program, celebrating religious holidays is not allowed in the public schools. School-sponsored programs shall not be, nor have the effect of being, religiously oriented or a religious celebration. School and classroom decorations may express seasonal themes that are not religious in nature.

Music, art, literature or drama programs having religious themes are permitted as part of the curriculum for school-sponsored activities and programs if presented in an objective manner and as a traditional part of the cultural and religious heritage. The use of religious symbols that are part of a religious holiday is permitted as a teaching aid or resource provided that such symbols are displayed as an example of cultural and religious heritage of the holiday and are temporary in nature.

Instruction SEXUAL HEALTH AND HIV/AIDS PREVENTION INSTRUCTION

The County Superintendent and County Board desire to provide a well-planned, integrated sequence of medically accurate and inclusive instruction on comprehensive sexual health and human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) prevention. The educational program shall address the goals of the California Healthy Youth Act pursuant to Education Code 51930-51939, including providing students with the knowledge and skills necessary to protect them from risks presented by sexually transmitted infections, unintended pregnancy, sexual harassment, sexual assault, sexual abuse, and human trafficking and to have healthy, positive, and safe relationships and behaviors. The educational program shall also promote students' understanding of sexuality as a normal part of human development and their development of healthy attitudes and behaviors concerning adolescent growth and development, body image, gender, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, relationships, marriage, and family.

The instruction shall respect the rights of parents/guardians to supervise their children's education on these subjects and to impart values regarding human sexuality to their children.

Comprehensive sexual health education and HIV prevention education shall be offered to all students in grades 7-12 at least once in junior high or middle school and at least once in high school. (Education Code 51934)

The comprehensive sexual health education program shall include information on the affirmative consent standard. Affirmative consent is defined as affirmative, conscious, and voluntary agreement to engage in sexual activity. Teachers delivering such instruction shall consult information related to sexual harassment and violence in the state health curriculum framework. (Education Code 51225.36, 67386)

The County Superintendent or designee shall identify appropriate methods for informing the school community about subjects related to the comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education. The County Superintendent or designee shall use such identified methods to inform parents/guardians of students in grades 6-12 about human trafficking prevention resources, as required pursuant to Education Code 49381.

Parent/Guardian Consent

At the beginning of each school year or at the time of a student's enrollment, parents/guardians shall be notified, in the manner specified in the administrative regulation, that they may request in writing that their child be excused from participating in comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education. Students so excused by their parents/guardians shall be given an alternative educational activity. (Education Code 51240, 51938, 51939)

A student shall not be subject to disciplinary action, academic penalty, or other sanction if the student's parent/guardian declines to permit the student to receive the instruction. (Education Code 51939)

Instruction CIVIC EDUCATION

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that involvement in civic and political institutions is essential to a democratic government and desires to provide a comprehensive civic education program to help students acquire the knowledge, skills, and principles essential for informed, engaged, and responsible citizenship.

The County Board shall approve, upon the recommendation of the County Superintendent or designee, academic standards and curriculum in civics and government that are aligned with state academic standards and curriculum frameworks.

The County Superintendent or designee shall determine specific courses within the K-12 curriculum in which civic education and government may be explicitly and systematically taught. He/she shall also encourage the integration of civic education into other subjects as appropriate.

The County Superintendent's civic education program shall provide students with an understanding of the rights and responsibilities of citizens in American democracy and the workings of federal, state, and local governments. As appropriate, instruction should include an examination of fundamental American documents, including, but not limited to, the Declaration of Independence, the United States Constitution, the Federalist Papers, and other significant writings and speeches. Instruction should also promote a student's understanding of shared democratic principles and values, such as personal responsibility, justice, equality, respect for others, civic-mindedness, and patriotism, and enable students to make their own commitment to these civic values.

Service learning, extracurricular and cocurricular activities, class and school elections, simulations of government, student-led debates, voter education, and observation of local government processes may be used to reinforce classroom instruction by linking civic knowledge to practical experience and encouraging civic involvement.

Whenever civic education includes topics that may be controversial due to political beliefs or other influences, instruction shall be presented in a balanced manner that does not promote any particular viewpoint. Students shall not be discriminated against for expressing their ideas and opinions and shall be encouraged to respect different points of view.

Constitution/Citizenship Day

Each year on or near September 17, in commemoration of Constitution and Citizenship Day, the County Superintendent may hold an educational program for students in grades K-12 pertaining to the United States Constitution which shall include exercises and instruction in the purpose, meaning, and importance of the Constitution, including the Bill of Rights. (Education Code 37221; 36 USC 106 Note)

Student Voter Registration

To encourage students to participate in the elections process when they are of voting age, the County Superintendent or designee may provide high school students with voter registration information, including information regarding the state's online voter registration system.

The County Superintendent or designee may identify an employee at each high school whom the California Secretary of State may contact to facilitate the distribution of voter registration forms to eligible students. The County Superintendent or designee may provide the business address, phone number, and email address of each contact person to the Secretary of State. (Elections Code 2148)

The designated employee may determine the most effective means of distributing voter registration forms provided by the Secretary of State, which may include, but are not limited to, distributing the forms at the start of the school year with orientation materials, placing voter registration forms at central locations, including voter registration forms with graduation materials, and/or providing links and the web site address of the Secretary of State's online voter registration system on the County Superintendent's web site and in email notices sent to students.

The lead site administrator or designee may appoint one or more students enrolled at each high school to serve as voter outreach coordinators at that school. The voter outreach coordinator(s) may coordinate voter registration activities at the school to encourage eligible persons to register to vote. With the approval of the lead site administrator or designee, the voter outreach coordinator(s) may also coordinate election-related activities on campus, including voter registration drives, mock elections, debates, and other election-related student outreach activities. (Education Code 49041)

During the last two full weeks in April and September, in areas on each high school campus that are reasonably accessible to all students as designated by the lead site administrator or designee, the county elections official shall be allowed to register students and school personnel to vote. (Education Code 49040)

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that schools play a crucial role in educating students about the importance of the environment and in preparing them to be stewards of natural resources. The County Superintendent and County Board believe that students should value the environment, respect all life forms, understand the basic ecological principles which support the planet, and live an ecologically responsible life-style.

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop an environmental education program that is aligned with state academic standards and curriculum frameworks. The County Superintendent or designee shall determine how the environmental education program will be integrated into the County Superintendent/County Board science curriculum and other subjects and courses in which the concepts may be explicitly and systematically taught.

The goal of the environmental education program shall be to provide students with an understanding of the interactions and interdependence of human societies and natural systems, people's dependence and influence on natural systems, the ways that natural systems change and how people can benefit and influence that change, the fact that there are no boundaries to prevent matter from flowing between systems, and the fact that decisions affecting resources and natural systems are complex and involve many factors.

The environmental education program shall emphasize a coordination of instructional resources with active student participation in onsite resource conservation and management programs and the promotion of service learning partnerships.

Instruction VISUAL AND PERFORMING ARTS EDUCATION

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that visual and performing arts are essential to a well-rounded educational program and should be an integral part of the course of study offered to students at all grade levels. The County Superintendent/County Board arts education program shall be designed to foster students' artistic competencies, cultivate students' appreciation and understanding of the arts in ways that are enjoyable, fulfilling, and transferable to students' personal, academic, and professional endeavors, and support students to fully engage in lifelong arts learning.

The County Superintendent and County Board shall adopt academic standards for dance, media arts, music, theatre, and visual arts that lead to artistic literacy and promote access and equity in the arts. The standards shall describe the skills, knowledge, and abilities that students are expected to possess at each grade level and shall meet or exceed state standards.

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop a sequential curriculum for dance, media arts, music, theatre, and visual arts which is consistent with the state curriculum framework and includes the following artistic processes:

- 1. Creating: conceiving and developing new artistic ideas and work.
- 2. Performing/producing/presenting: realizing artistic ideas and work through interpretation and presentation.
- 3. Responding: understanding and evaluating how the arts convey meaning.
- 4. Connecting: relating artistic ideas and work with personal meaning and external content.

The County Superintendent and County Board shall adopt standards-based instructional materials for visual and performing arts which may incorporate a variety of media and technologies.

As appropriate, the County Superintendent or designee shall provide a standards-based professional development program designed to increase teachers' knowledge of and ability to teach the arts and to implement the arts education program.

The County Superintendent or designee shall encourage the integration of community arts resources into the educational program. Such resources may include opportunities for students to attend musical and theatrical performances, observe the works of accomplished artists, and work directly with artists-in-residence and volunteers. In addition, the County Superintendent or designee may collaborate with community organizations to share resources and seek grant opportunities.

The County Superintendent or designee shall regularly evaluate the implementation of the arts

education program at each grade level and assess its effectiveness in enabling students to meet academic standards.

Instruction PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND ACTIVITY

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize the positive benefits of physical activity on student health, well-being, and academic achievement. The County Superintendent shall provide all students the opportunity to be physically active on a regular basis through high-quality physical education instruction and may provide additional opportunities for physical activity throughout the school day. The County Superintendent/County Board physical education and activity programs shall support the County Superintendent/County Board coordinated student wellness program and encourage students' lifelong fitness.

Physical education classes shall be conducted in the coeducational, inclusive manner prescribed by law. The County Superintendent shall provide instruction in physical education that provides equal access and equal opportunities for participation for all students in grades 1-12 regardless of gender, gender expression, sexual orientation, and mental or physical disability. (Education Code 220, 221.5, 33352; 5 CCR 4900, 4930, 4931, 4940, 4960; 34 CFR 106.33, 106.34, 300.108)

The physical education program shall provide a developmentally appropriate sequence of instruction aligned with the state's model content standards and curriculum framework.

The physical education program shall engage students in age-appropriate moderate to vigorous physical activity, as defined in administrative regulation, including aerobic, muscle-strengthening, and bone-strengthening activities. The County Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies to monitor the amount of moderate to vigorous physical activity that takes place in the physical education instructional program.

For grades 9-12, the overall course of study shall include the effects of physical activity upon dynamic health, the mechanics of body movement, aquatics, gymnastics and tumbling, individual and dual sports, rhythms and dance, team sports, and combatives. (Education Code 33352; 5 CCR 10060)

The County Board shall approve the courses in grades 9-12 for which physical education credit may be granted.

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies to supplement physical education instruction with additional opportunities for students to be physically active before, during, and after the school day.

Students with disabilities shall be provided instruction in physical education in accordance with their individualized education program or Section 504 accommodation plan.

During air pollution episodes, extreme weather, or other inclement conditions, physical education staff shall make appropriate adjustments to the program or shall seek alternative indoor space to enable students to participate in active physical education.

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FRESNO COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS FRESNO COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION

Physical education instruction shall be delivered by appropriately credentialed teachers who may be assisted by instructional aides, paraprofessionals, and/or volunteers.

The County Superintendent shall provide physical education teachers with continuing professional development, including classroom management and instructional strategies designed to keep students engaged and active and to enhance the quality of physical education instruction and assessment.

Physical Fitness Testing

The County Superintendent or designee shall annually administer the physical fitness test designated by the State Board of Education (FITNESSGRAM) to students in grades 5, 7, and 9. (Education Code 60800; 5 CCR 1041)

Temporary Exemptions

The County Superintendent or designee may grant a student a temporary exemption from physical education under either of the following conditions: (Education Code 51241)

- 1. The student is ill or injured and a modified program to meet the student's needs cannot be provided.
- 2. The student is enrolled for one-half time or less.

Two-Year Exemptions

With the student's consent, the County Superintendent or designee may exempt a student from physical education courses for any two years during grades 10-12 provided that the student has satisfactorily met at least five of the six standards of the FITNESSGRAM in grade 9. (Education Code 51241)

Upon request by students and/or their parents/guardians, the County Superintendent or designee may administer the FITNESSGRAM to students in grades 10-12 who need to pass the test in order to qualify for a two-year exemption from physical education courses.

Students in grades 10-12 who have been granted a two-year exemption shall be offered a variety of elective physical education courses of not less than 400 minutes each 10 school days. (Education Code 33352, 51222)

Such students shall not be permitted to attend fewer total hours of courses and classes than they would have attended if enrolled in a physical education course. (Education Code 51241)

Permanent Exemptions

The County Superintendent or designee may grant a student a permanent exemption from physical education under any of the following conditions: (Education Code 51241)

- 1. The student is age 16 years or older and has been enrolled in grade 10 for one or more academic years. However, such a student shall not be permitted to attend fewer total hours of courses and classes than the student would have attended if enrolled in a physical education course.
- 2. The student is enrolled as a postgraduate student.
- 3. The student is enrolled in a juvenile home, ranch, camp, or forestry camp school with scheduled recreation and exercise.

Students who have been granted a permanent exemption shall be offered a variety of elective physical education courses of not less than 400 minutes each 10 school days. (Education Code 33352)

Other Exemptions

The County Superintendent or designee may grant a student an exemption from physical education under the following special circumstances:

- 1. When the student is in any of grades 10-12 and is excused for up to 24 clock hours in order to participate in automobile driver training. However, any such student shall attend a minimum of 7,000 minutes of physical education instruction during the school year. (Education Code 51222)
- 2. When the student is in any of grades 10-12, attends a regional occupational center or program, and, because of the travel time involved, would experience hardship to attend physical education courses. Any such student shall have a minimum school day of 180 minutes. (Education Code 52316)
- 3. When the student is in high school and is engaged in a regular school-sponsored interscholastic athletic program carried on wholly or partially after regular school hours. (Education Code 51242)

Program Evaluation

County Superintendent staff shall annually report to the County Superintendent each school's FITNESSGRAM results for each applicable grade level, the number of instructional minutes offered in physical education for each grade level, the number of two-year and permanent exemptions granted pursuant to Education Code 51241, and any other data agreed upon by the County Superintendent or designee and County Board to evaluate program quality and the effectiveness of the program in meeting goals for physical activity and student well-being.

Instruction COMPREHENSIVE HEALTH EDUCATION

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that health education should foster the knowledge, skills, and attitudes that students need in order to lead healthy lives and avoid high-risk behaviors. The County Superintendent/County Board health education program shall be part of a coordinated school health system which supports the well-being of students and is linked to the County Superintendent/County Board and community services and resources.

Goals for the County Superintendent/County Board health education program shall be designed to promote student wellness and shall include, but not be limited to, goals for nutrition education and physical activity.

The County Superintendent/County Board shall provide a planned, sequential, research-based, and developmentally appropriate health education curriculum for students in grades K-12 which is aligned with the state's content standards and curriculum framework. The County Superintendent or designee shall determine the grade levels and subject areas in which health-related topics will be addressed, in accordance with law, County Superintendent and County Board policy, and administrative regulation.

As appropriate, the County Superintendent or designee shall involve school administrators, teachers, school nurses, health professionals representing various fields of health care, parents/guardians, community-based organizations, and other community members in the development, implementation, and evaluation of the health education program. Health and safety professionals may be invited to provide related instruction in the classroom, school assemblies, and other instructional settings.

The County Superintendent or designee shall provide professional development as needed to ensure that health education teachers are knowledgeable about academic content standards and effective instructional methodologies.

Instruction READING/LANGUAGE ARTS INSTRUCTION

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that reading and other language arts constitute the basic foundation for learning in other areas of study. The County Superintendent and County Board desire to offer a comprehensive, balanced reading/language arts program that ensures all students have the skills necessary to read fluently and for meaning and develops students' appreciation for literature. The program shall integrate reading and oral and written language arts activities in order to build effective communication skills.

For each grade level, the County Superintendent and County Board shall adopt academic standards that meet or exceed Common Core State Standards in the following strands:

- 1. Reading: Foundational skills, text complexity and analysis, and the growth of comprehension
- 2. Writing: Text types, responding to reading, production and distribution of writings, and research
- 3. Speaking and listening: Oral language development, comprehension, flexible communication, and collaboration
- 4. Language: Conventions, effective use, knowledge of language, and vocabulary

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the reading/language arts program offers sufficient access to standards-aligned textbooks and other instructional materials. The program shall provide instructional materials of varying levels of difficulty, including fiction and nonfiction works, so that students are continually reading at an appropriate level. In addition, technology should be available to support all areas of literacy.

Teachers are expected to use a variety of instructional strategies to accommodate the needs of beginning readers and the varying 'abilities of more advanced readers. The program shall provide ongoing diagnosis of students' skills and, as needed, may provide supplementary instruction during the school day and/or outside the regular school session to assist students who are experiencing difficulty learning to read.

The County Superintendent or designee shall make available professional development opportunities that are designed to provide instructional staff with knowledge about how students develop language skills, the ability to analyze students' literacy levels, and mastery of a variety of instructional strategies and materials.

County Superintendent staff shall regularly provide County Superintendent and County Board with data from reading assessments and program evaluations to enable the County Superintendent and County Board to monitor program effectiveness.

Instruction MATHEMATICS INSTRUCTION

The County Superintendent and County Board desire to offer a rigorous mathematics program that progressively develops the knowledge and skills students will need to succeed in college and career. The County Superintendent/County Board mathematics program shall be designed to teach mathematical concepts in the context of real-world situations and to help students gain a strong conceptual understanding, a high degree of procedural skill and fluency, and ability to apply mathematics to solve problems.

The County Superintendent/County Board mathematics program shall address the following standards for mathematical practices which are the basis for mathematics instruction and learning:

- 1. Overarching habits of mind of a productive mathematical thinker: Making sense of problems and persevering in solving them; attending to precision
- 2. Reasoning and explaining: Reasoning abstractly and quantitatively; constructing viable arguments and critiquing the reasoning of others
- 3. Modeling and using tools: Modeling with mathematics; using appropriate tools strategically
- 4. Seeing structure and generalizing: Looking for and making use of structure; looking for and expressing regularity in repeated reasoning

In addition, the program shall be aligned with grade-level standards for mathematics contentation

For grades K-8, content shall address, at appropriate grade levels, counting and cardinality, operations and algebraic thinking, number and operations in base ten, fractions, measurement and data, geometry, ratios and proportional relationships, functions, expression and equations, the number system, and statistics and probability. Students shall learn the concepts and skills that prepare them for the rigor of higher mathematics.

For higher mathematics, the County Superintendent shall offer a pathway of courses through which students shall be taught concepts that address number and quantity, algebra, functions, modeling, geometry, and statistics and probability.

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that students are appropriately placed in mathematics courses and are not required to repeat a course that they have successfully completed in an earlier grade level. Placement decisions shall be based on consistent protocols and multiple academic measures.

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that certificated staff have opportunities to participate in professional development activities designed to increase their knowledge and skills in effective mathematics teaching practices.

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that students have access to sufficient instructional materials, including manipulatives and technology, to support a balanced, standards-aligned mathematics program.

County Superintendent staff shall provide the County Superintendent and County Board with data mathematics assessments and program evaluations to enable the County Superintendent and County Board to monitor program effectiveness.

Instruction SCIENCE INSTRUCTION

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that science education should focus on giving students an understanding of the biological and physical aspects of science, key scientific concepts, and methods of scientific inquiry and investigation. Students should become familiar with the natural world and the interrelationship of science, mathematics, technology, and engineering. As part of science instruction, students should learn how to apply scientific knowledge and reasoning.

Philosophical and religious theories that are based, at least in part, on faith and are not subject to scientific test and refutation shall not be discussed during science instruction.

The County Superintendent/County Board academic standards for science instruction shall meet or exceed the California Next Generation Science Standards (CA-NGSS). The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that curricula used in County Superintendent-operated schools are aligned with these standards and the state curriculum framework.

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that students have access to and are enrolled in a broad course of study including science courses.

The County Superintendent or designee shall provide certificated staff with opportunities to participate in professional development activities designed to enhance their knowledge of County Superintendent/County Board-adopted academic standards, instructional strategies for teaching science, and changes in scientific theories.

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop and implement appropriate safety measures for science laboratory classes, including, but not limited to, staff and student safety training, use of eye safety devices, hearing protection, first aid procedures, regular equipment maintenance, safe use of heat sources, safe use and disposal of hazardous chemicals, proper ventilation, prevention of exposure to bloodborne pathogens from sharp instruments, fire prevention and control, an emergency response plan, and evacuation procedures. Parents/guardians shall be informed of the types of science laboratory activities that will be conducted and encouraged to sign consent forms for their child's participation.

Instruction HISTORY-SOCIAL SCIENCE INSTRUCTION

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that the study of history and other social sciences is essential to prepare students to engage in responsible citizenship, comprehend complex global interrelationships, and understand the vital connections among the past, present, and future. The County Superintendent/County Board history-social science education program shall include, at appropriate grade levels, instruction in American and world history, geography, economics, political science, anthropology, psychology, and sociology.

The County Superintendent or designee shall adopt academic standards for history-social science which meet or exceed state content standards and describe the knowledge and skills students are expected to possess at each grade level.

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop and submit to the County Board for curriculum aligned with the County comprehensive, sequential approval а Superintendent/County Board standards and consistent with the state's curriculum framework for history-social science. The curriculum shall be designed to develop students' core knowledge in history and social science and their skills in chronological and spatial thinking, research, and historical interpretation. History-social science instruction shall also include an explicit focus on developing students' literacy in reading, writing, speaking, listening, and other language skills.

The County Superintendent or designee shall adopt standards-aligned instructional materials for history-social science in accordance with applicable law, County Superintendent and County Board policy, and administrative regulation. In addition, teachers are encouraged to supplement the curriculum by using biographies, original documents, diaries, letters, legends, speeches, other narrative artifacts, and literature from and about the period being studied.

Personal testimony from persons who can provide first-hand accounts of significant historical events is encouraged and may be provided through oral histories, videos, or other multimedia formats. If oral history is used for instruction related to the role of Americans in World War II or the Vietnam War, such testimony shall exemplify the personal sacrifice and courage of the wide range of ordinary citizens who were called upon to participate in the war, provide views and comments concerning reasons for participating in the war, and provide commentary on the aftermath of the war in Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union. (Education Code 51221.3, 51221.4)

The County Superintendent or designee shall provide a standards-based professional development program designed to increase teachers' knowledge of adopted instructional materials and instructional strategies for teaching history-social science.

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Instruction COURSES OF STUDY

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that a well-aligned sequence of courses fosters academic growth and provides for the best possible use of instructional time. The County Superintendent/County Board course of study shall provide students with opportunities to attain the skills, knowledge, and abilities they need to be successful academically, professionally, and personally.

The County Superintendent or designee shall establish processes for ensuring the articulation of courses across grade levels within the County Superintendent-operated schools. As necessary, the County Superintendent or designee shall work with representatives of appropriate area districts and postsecondary institutions to ensure articulation of courses with other institutions to which the County Superintendent/County Board students may matriculate. The sequence of courses shall be designed to ensure that each course provides adequate preparation for the next course in the sequence, only utilizes prerequisites that are essential to success in a given program or course, avoids significant duplication of content, and allows for reinforcement and progression in the subject matter.

The County Superintendent shall not provide any course separately on the basis of sex, sexual orientation, gender, ethnic group identification, race, ancestry, national origin, religion, color, or mental or physical disability or require or refuse participation by any of its students on any such basis. (5 CCR 4940)

Elementary Grades

As applicable, the County Superintendent and County Board shall adopt a course of study for elementary grades that sufficiently prepares students for the secondary course of study.

Secondary Grades

The County Superintendent/County Board shall offer all otherwise qualified students in grades 7-12 a course of study that prepares them, upon graduation from high school, to meet the requirements and prerequisites for admission to California public colleges and universities and to attain entry-level employment skills in business or industry. (Education Code 51228)

In addition, the course of study for students in grades 9-12 shall include instruction in skills and knowledge for adult life, career technical training, and a timely opportunity for all otherwise qualified students to enroll, within four years, in each course necessary to fulfill the requirements and prerequisites for admission to California public colleges and universities prior to graduation. (Education Code 51224, 51228)

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop a process by which courses that meet California college admission criteria (referred to as "a-g" course requirements) are submitted to the University of California for review and certification. The County Superintendent or designee shall maintain an accurate list of all current high school courses that have been so certified,

shall ensure that the list is provided annually to all students in grades 9-12 and their parents/guardians, and shall make updated lists readily available. (Education Code 51229, 66204)

Instruction CONTROVERSIAL ISSUES

County Board recognize that the County The County Superintendent and Superintendent/County Board educational program may sometimes include instruction related to controversial issues that may arouse strong reactions based on personal values and beliefs, political philosophy, culture, religion, or other influences. Instruction concerning such topics shall be relevant to the adopted course of study and curricular goals and should be designed to develop students' critical thinking skills, ability to discriminate between fact and opinion, respect for others, and understanding and tolerance of diverse points of view.

The County Superintendent expects administrators and teachers to exercise professional judgment when deciding whether or not a particular issue is suitable for study or discussion. They shall consult with the County Superintendent or designee as necessary to determine the appropriateness of the subject matter, guest speakers, and/or related instructional materials or resources.

When providing instruction related to a controversial issue, the following guidelines shall apply:

- 1. The topic shall be suitable to the age and maturity of the students.
- 2. Instruction shall be presented in a balanced manner, addressing all sides of the issue without bias or prejudice and without promoting any particular point of view.
- 3. In the classroom, teachers act on behalf of the County Superintendent and are expected to follow the adopted curriculum. In leading or guiding class discussions about issues that may be controversial, a teacher may not advocate his/her personal opinion or viewpoint. When necessary, the County Superintendent or designee may instruct teachers to refrain from sharing personal views in the classroom on controversial topics.
- 4. Students shall be assured of their right to form and express an opinion without jeopardizing their grades or being subject to discrimination, retaliation, or discipline, provided the viewpoint does not constitute harassment, threats, intimidation, or bullying or is otherwise unlawful.
- 5. Students shall be informed of conduct expected during such instruction and the importance of being courteous and respectful of the opinions of others.
- 6. Adequate factual information shall be provided to help students objectively analyze and evaluate the issue and draw their own conclusions.
- 7. The instruction shall not reflect adversely upon persons because of their race, ethnicity, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, disability, religion, or any other basis prohibited by law.
- 8. The subject matter of the instruction shall not otherwise be prohibited by state or federal

law.

When a guest speaker is invited to make a presentation related to a controversial issue, the County Superintendent or designee shall notify him/her of this policy and the expectations and goals regarding the instruction. If the guest speaker is presenting only one point of view on an issue, the teacher shall be responsible for ensuring that students also receive information on opposing viewpoints.

When required by law, such as in regards to comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention education, parents/guardians shall be notified prior to instruction that they may request in writing that their child be excused from the instruction. Students whose parents/guardians decline such instruction may be offered an alternative activity of similar educational value.

A student or parent/guardian with concerns regarding instruction about controversial issues may communicate directly with the teacher or lead site administrator and/or use appropriate County Superintendent complaint procedures.

Instruction EXTRACURRICULAR AND COCURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that extracurricular and cocurricular activities enrich the educational and social development of students and enhance students' feelings of connectedness with the schools. The County Superintendent shall encourage and support student participation in extracurricular and cocurricular activities without compromising the integrity and purpose of the educational program.

Prerequisites for student participation in extracurricular and cocurricular activities shall be limited to those that have been demonstrated to be essential to the success of the activity. No extracurricular or cocurricular program or activity shall be provided or conducted separately on the basis of any actual or perceived characteristic listed as a prohibited category of discrimination in state or federal law, nor shall any student's participation in an extracurricular or cocurricular or those bases. (5 CCR 4925)

Any complaint alleging unlawful discrimination in the County Superintendent/County Board extracurricular or cocurricular programs or activities shall be filed in accordance with SP/BP/AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

Unless specifically authorized by law, no student shall be charged a fee for his/her participation in educational activities, including extracurricular and cocurricular activities and materials or equipment related to such activities. (Education Code 49010, 49011)

Eligibility Requirements

To be eligible to participate in extracurricular and cocurricular activities, students in grades 7-12 must demonstrate satisfactory educational progress in the previous grading period, including, but not limited to: (Education Code 35160.5)

- 1. Maintenance of a minimum of 2.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale in all enrolled classes.
- 2. Maintenance of minimum progress toward meeting high school graduation requirements.

The County Superintendent or designee may grant ineligible students a probationary period not to exceed one semester. Students granted probationary eligibility must meet the required standards by the end of the probationary period in order to remain eligible for participation. (Education Code 35160.5)

Any decision regarding the eligibility of a homeless student, foster youth, or child of an active duty military family for extracurricular or cocurricular activities shall be made by the County Superintendent or designee in accordance with Education Code 48850 and 49701.

The County Superintendent or designee may revoke a student's eligibility for participation in extracurricular and cocurricular activities when the student's poor citizenship is serious enough

to warrant loss of this privilege.

Student Conduct at Extracurricular/Cocurricular Events

When attending or participating in extracurricular and cocurricular activities on or off campus, students are subject to County Superintendent and County Board policies and regulations relating to student conduct. Students who violate such policies and regulations may be subject to discipline including, but not limited to, suspension, expulsion, transfer to alternative programs, or denial of participation in extracurricular or cocurricular activities in accordance with policy and administrative regulation.

Annual Policy Review

The County Superintendent and County Board shall annually review this policy and implementing regulations. (Education Code 35160.5)

Instruction STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS AND EQUAL ACCESS

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that student groups or clubs reinforce the instructional program, give students experience in civics and government, and provide social and recreational activities. Student groups also serve to honor outstanding student achievement and enhance school spirit and students' sense of belonging. Prior to meeting on school grounds, all student groups shall be authorized by the lead site administrator or designee in accordance with applicable policy and administrative regulation.

The County Superintendent and County Board encourage students to pursue interests and clubs which may not directly relate to the curriculum and, to that end, have created a limited open forum.

All student-initiated groups shall be given equal access to meet on school premises during noninstructional time without regard to their religious, political, philosophical, or other speech content. The County Superintendent and County Board shall ensure that: (20 USC 4071, 4072)

- 1. The meeting shall be voluntary and student-initiated.
- 2. There shall be no sponsorship of the meeting by the school or staff. The term sponsorship means that school staff are promoting, leading, or participating in a meeting. The assignment of a teacher, administrator, or other school employee to a meeting for custodial purposes shall not constitute sponsorship of the meeting.
- 3. Employees of the school shall be present at religious meetings only in a nonparticipatory capacity.
- 4. The meeting shall not materially and substantially interfere with the orderly conduct of educational activities within the school.
- 5. Nonschool persons shall not direct, conduct, control, or regularly attend activities of student groups.

All student clubs or groups shall have equal access to the school media to announce meetings, including the public address system, the school newspaper, bulletin boards, and school web site. However, the lead site administrator or designee may issue a disclaimer that such activities are not school-sponsored.

All noncurriculum-related student groups shall be given equal access to meeting space, school equipment, and supplies.

No school shall deny equal access or a fair opportunity to meet, or otherwise discriminate against, any group officially affiliated with the Boy Scouts of America, or with any other youth group listed as a patriotic society in Title 36 of the United States Code, for reasons based on the

membership or leadership criteria or oath of allegiance to God and country. (20 USC 7905)

Instruction ASSEMBLIES AND SPECIAL EVENTS

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that assemblies and special events should promote a positive school climate and be related to the educational program. Assemblies may provide information that supplements the curriculum or may showcase student achievement in academics, athletics, music, art, drama, or other extracurricular or cocurricular activities.

The lead site administrator shall ensure that speakers and community resources featured in school assemblies and special events are carefully selected and represent a balanced viewpoint. Prospective speakers shall agree to present material of educational relevance that is appropriate to the maturity of the audience, with no statements that are obscene, vulgar, or that incite violence.

The lead site administrator shall schedule assemblies and special events so as to maximize the effectiveness of instructional time and to satisfy the requirements of law and negotiated agreements.

During the assembly, students shall show respect to all performers and speakers. Students who disrupt the program shall lose the privilege of attending the assembly and may be subject to disciplinary action.

Instruction HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

The County Superintendent and County Board desire that students enrolled in schools established by the County Board or County Superintendent, and operated by the County Superintendent are prepared to obtain a high school diploma so that they can take advantage of opportunities for postsecondary education and employment.

Course Requirements

To obtain a high school diploma, students shall complete 220 course credits and at least the following courses in grades 9-12, with each course being one year and ten credits, unless otherwise specified:

- 1. Four courses in English. (Education Code 51225.3)
- 2. Two courses in mathematics. (Education Code 51225.3)

At least one mathematics course, or a combination of the two mathematics courses, shall meet or exceed state academic content standards for Algebra I or Mathematics I. Completion of such coursework prior to grade 9 shall satisfy the Algebra I or Mathematics I requirement, but shall not exempt a student from the requirement to complete two mathematics courses in grades 9-12. (Education Code 51224.5)

- 3. Two courses in science, including biological and physical sciences. (Education Code 51225.3)
- 4. Three courses in social studies, including United States history and geography; world history, culture, and geography; a one-semester course in American government and civics; and a one-semester course in economics. (Education Code 51225.3)
- 5. One course in visual or performing arts; foreign language, including American Sign Language; or career technical education (CTE). To be counted towards meeting graduation requirements, a CTE course shall be aligned to the CTE model curriculum standards and framework adopted by the State Board of Education. (Education Code 51225.3)
- 6. Two courses in physical education, unless the student has been otherwise exempted pursuant to other sections of the Education Code. (Education Code 51225.3)

Because the prescribed course of study may not accommodate the needs of some students, the Board shall provide alternative means for the completion of prescribed courses in accordance with law.

Exemptions from County Superintendent/County Board Graduation Requirements

Students of County Superintendent/County Board schools are required to complete graduation course requirements specified above, including the requirements imposed by Education Code 51225.3 and those adopted by the County Superintendent and County Board. However, a foster youth, homeless student, former juvenile court school student, child of a military family, or migrant student who transfers into or between County Superintendent/County Board schools any time after completing the second year of high school, or a newly arrived immigrant student who is in the third or fourth year of high school and is participating in a newcomer program, shall be exempted from any graduation requirements that are in addition to statewide course requirements. This exemption shall not apply if the County Superintendent or designee makes a finding that the student is reasonably able to complete the requirements in time to graduate by the end of the fourth year of high school. Within 30 days of the transfer or of the commencement of participation in a newcomer program, as applicable, the County Superintendent or designee shall notify any eligible student of the availability of the exemption and whether the student gualifies for it. (Education Code 51225.1)

Retroactive Diplomas

Any student who completed grade 12 in the 2003-04 through 2014-15 school year and met all applicable graduation requirements other than the passage of the high school exit examination shall be granted a high school diploma. (Education Code 51413)

In addition, high school diplomas may be retroactively granted to: (Education Code 48204.4, 51430, 51440)

1. Persons who departed California against their will while in grade 12 and did not receive a diploma because the departure interrupted their education, provided that they were in good academic standing at the time of the departure.

Persons may be considered to have departed California against their will if they were in custody of a government agency and were transferred to another state, were subject to a lawful order from a court or government agency that authorized their removal from California, were subject to a lawful order and were permitted to depart California before being removed from California pursuant to the lawful order, were removed or were permitted to depart voluntarily pursuant to the federal Immigration and Nationality Act, or departed due to other circumstances determined to be consistent with the purposes of Education Code 48204.4.

In determining whether to award a diploma under these circumstances, the County Superintendent or designee shall consider any coursework that may have been completed outside of the United States or through online or virtual courses.

2. Former students who were interned by order of the federal government during World War II or who are honorably discharged veterans of World War II, the Korean War, or the Vietnam War, provided that they were enrolled in a County Superintendent/County Board school immediately preceding the internment or military service and did not receive a diploma because their education was interrupted due to the internment or

military service in those wars.

Deceased former students who satisfy these conditions may be granted a retroactive diploma to be received by their next of kin.

3. Veterans who entered the military service of the United States while in grade 12 and who had satisfactorily completed the first half of the work required for grade 12 in a County Superintendent/County Board school.

Instruction ALTERNATIVE CREDITS TOWARD GRADUATION

In order to meet individual student needs and encourage all students to complete their high school education, the County Superintendent and County Board desire to provide flexibility in the completion of prescribed courses in accordance with law.

With the active involvement of parents/guardians, administrators, teachers, and students, the County Superintendent and County Board shall adopt alternative means for students to complete the prescribed course of study required for high school graduation. These alternative means shall be made available to students, parents/guardians, and the public. (Education Code 51225.3)

Students may fulfill any course requirement for graduation through the following:

1. Practical demonstration of skills and competencies. (Education Code 51225.3)

Opportunities to demonstrate skills and competencies shall include, but not be limited to, challenging a course through successful completion of a County Superintendent-developed examination which covers course objectives. The County Superintendent shall not use results from the General Educational Development test or other state or national tests for this purpose.

- 2. Supervised work experience or other outside school experience in accordance with Education Code 51760.3 and 5 CCR 1635. (Education Code 51225.3)
- 3. Career technical education classes offered in high school. (Education Code 51225.3)
- 4. Courses offered by regional occupational centers or programs. (Education Code 51225.3)
- 5. Interdisciplinary study. (Education Code 51225.3)
- 6. Independent study. (Education Code 51225.3)
- 7. Credit earned at a postsecondary institution. (Education Code 48800, 51225.3)
- 8. Private instruction in accordance with 5 CCR 1631.
- 9. Correspondence instruction from a California university or college accredited for teacher training in accordance with 5 CCR 1633. (Education Code 51740-51741)
- 10. Military service and training in accordance with 5 CCR 1634. (Education Code 51440)
- 11. To satisfy driver education and training requirement, a program approved by the Department of Motor Vehicles which offers driver education and behind-the-wheel

instruction through a driving school or licensed independent driving instructor in accordance with Vehicle Code 12814.6.

12. For credit toward physical education requirement, participation in interscholastic athletic programs carried on wholly or partially after regular school hours. (Education Code 51242)

A student shall be eligible to satisfy graduation requirements in this manner only if the interscholastic program entails a comparable amount of time and physical activity.

13. For credit toward foreign language requirement, foreign language studies successfully completed in a private school in accordance with 5 CCR 1632. (Education Code 51243)

Upon receiving advance, written application by the student or his/her parent/guardian, the County Superintendent or designee shall determine whether completion of the proposed alternative means would satisfy course requirements for graduation and what documentation shall be required, if any, to verify the student's successful completion. The County Superintendent or designee shall make the final determination as to whether the student's completion of an alternative means is sufficient to satisfy graduation requirements.

As appropriate, the County Superintendent or designee shall determine the grade to be assigned to students for the completion of any of the above alternative means. When a grade is assigned by a private school, postsecondary institution, or other educational institution for completion of coursework, that same grade shall be awarded by the County Superintendent provided that the County Superintendent or designee has determined the alternative course to be substantially equivalent to a County Superintendent course.

Instruction CERTIFICATE OF PROFICIENCY/HIGH SCHOOL EQUIVALENCY

The County Superintendent and County Board desire that every student have the opportunity to earn a high school diploma through successful completion of class work and examination. However, when a student is unable to do so, the County Superintendent and County Board encourage completion of an alternative program that allows him/her to obtain an equivalent certificate.

Eligible persons may obtain a certificate of proficiency or a high school equivalency certificate in accordance with law, County Superintendent/County Board policy, and administrative regulation.

The County Superintendent or designee shall make information available to interested persons regarding the eligibility and examination requirements of each program.

Instruction RECIPROCITY OF ACADEMIC CREDIT

To determine whether students transferring into County Superintendent/County Board schools have met the County Superintendent/County Board course requirements, the County Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures to evaluate the comparability of courses and/or students' understanding of course content. Such procedures shall include methods for determining the number of years of school attendance, the specific courses completed by the student and the value of credits earned.

The County Superintendent shall accept for credit full or partial coursework satisfactorily completed by students while attending a public school, a juvenile court school or nonpublic nonsectarian school or agency. (Education Code 48645.5)

Pending evaluation of the transferring student's academic performance, the student shall be placed at the grade level reached prior to enrollment in the County Superintendent/County Board school. Within 30 days of enrollment, the County Superintendent or designee shall complete the evaluation and determine the student's appropriate grade placement.

Instruction DIFFERENTIAL GRADUATION AND COMPETENCY STANDARDS FOR STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that students with disabilities are entitled to a course of study that provides them with a free appropriate public education (FAPE) and that modifications to the County Superintendent's regular course may be needed on an individualized basis to provide FAPE. In accordance with law, each student's individualized education program (IEP) team shall determine the appropriate goals, as well as any appropriate individual accommodations necessary for measuring the academic achievement and functional performance of the student on state and local assessments.

Certificate of Educational Achievement or Completion

Instead of a high school diploma, a student with disabilities may be awarded a certificate or document of educational achievement or completion if the student has met one of the following requirements: (Education Code 56390)

- 1. Satisfactorily completed a prescribed alternative course of study approved by the County Superintendent/County Board or the district with jurisdiction over the student as identified in his/her IEP.
- 2. Satisfactorily met his/her IEP goals and objectives during high school as determined by the IEP team.
- 3. Satisfactorily attended high school, participated in the instruction as prescribed in his/her IEP, and met the objectives of the statement of transition services.

A student with disabilities who meets any of the criteria specified above shall be eligible to participate in any graduation ceremony and any school activity related to graduation in which a graduating student of similar age without disabilities would be eligible to participate. (Education Code 56391)

Instruction Homework/Makeup Work

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that meaningful homework assignments can be a valuable extension of student learning time and assist students in developing good study habits. Homework shall be assigned when necessary to support classroom lessons, enable students to complete unfinished assignments, or review and apply academic content for better understanding.

The County Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with school administrators and teachers to develop and regularly review guidelines for the assignment of homework and the related responsibilities of students, staff, and parents/guardians.

Homework assignments shall be reasonable in length and appropriate to the grade level and course. The County Superintendent and County Board expect that the number, frequency, and degree of difficulty of homework assignments will increase with the grade level and the maturity of students. Teachers shall assign homework only as necessary to fulfill academic goals and reinforce current instruction.

As needed, teachers may receive training in designing relevant homework assignments that reinforce classroom learning objectives.

Although on-time completion of homework is important to maintain academic progress, the County Superintendent and County Board recognize that students learn at different rates. Students shall receive credit for work that is completed late in order to encourage their continued learning.

Age-appropriate instruction may be given to help students allocate their time wisely, meet their deadlines, learn to work independently, and develop good personal study habits.

At the beginning of the school year, teachers shall communicate homework expectations to students and their parents/guardians. Homework guidelines may also be included in student and/or parent/guardian handbooks. These communications may include the manner in which homework relates to achievement of academic standards and course content, the impact of homework assignments on students' grades, any school resources and programs that are available to provide homework support, and ways in which parents/guardians may appropriately assist their children.

Although it is the student's responsibility to undertake assignments independently, parents/guardians may serve as a resource and are encouraged to ensure that their child's homework assignments are completed. When a student repeatedly fails to complete homework, the teacher shall notify the student's parents/guardians as soon as possible so that corrective action can be taken prior to the release of any final grades or report cards.

To further support students' homework efforts, the County Superintendent or designee may establish and maintain electronic forums, provide access to school library media centers and

technological resources, and/or provide before-school and after-school programs where students can receive homework assistance from teachers, volunteers, and/or student tutors. The County Superintendent or designee may design class and transportation schedules that will enable students to make use of homework support services.

Teachers shall review all completed homework to assess the student's understanding of academic content and shall provide timely feedback to the student.

Makeup Work

Students who are absent from school shall be given the opportunity to complete all assignments and tests that can be reasonably provided. As determined by the teacher, the assignments and tests shall be equivalent to, but not necessarily identical to, the assignments and tests missed during the absence. Students shall receive full credit for work satisfactorily completed within a reasonable period of time.

The County Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians that no student may have a grade reduced or lose academic credit for any excused absence when missed assignments and tests are satisfactorily completed within a reasonable period of time. Such notification shall include the full text of Education Code 48205. (Education Code 48980)

Suspended Students

When a parent/guardian of a student who has been suspended for two or more school days requests homework that the student would otherwise have been assigned, the student's teacher shall provide such homework. If a homework assignment is requested and is turned in to the teacher by the student either upon the student's return from suspension or within the timeframe originally prescribed by the teacher, whichever is later, and is not graded before the end of the academic term, the homework assignment shall not be included in the calculation of the student's overall grade in the class. (Education Code 48913.5)

The teacher of any class from which a student is suspended may require the student to complete any assignments and tests missed during the suspension. (Education Code 48913)

Instruction CHALLENGING COURSES BY EXAMINATION

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that there is a need to allow high school students to challenge a given course by examination for grade and credit in order to accelerate progress towards graduation and to achieve more flexibility in the selection of electives. This opportunity will permit a student to enroll in courses best suited to his/her educational objectives.

The examination shall be comprehensive and cover all course objectives. Successful completion of the examination shall be at a level which indicates mastery of the content and/or reasonable chance for success in the next higher course.

Instruction INDIVIDUALIZED EDUCATION PROGRAM

The County Superintendent and County Board desire to provide full educational opportunities to all students with disabilities. Students with disabilities shall receive a free appropriate public education (FAPE) and, to the maximum extent possible, shall be educated in the least restrictive environment with nondisabled students.

For each student with disabilities, an individualized education program (IEP) shall be developed which identifies the special education instruction and related services to be provided to the student. The County Superintendent or designee shall develop administrative regulations regarding the membership of the IEP team, the team's responsibility to develop and regularly review the IEP, the contents of the IEP, and the development, review, and revision processes.

Instruction PROCEDURAL SAFEGUARDS AND COMPLAINTS FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize its obligation to provide a free appropriate public education (FAPE) to students with disabilities and to uphold the rights of parents/guardians to be involved in educational decisions regarding their child. Parents/guardians of students with disabilities shall receive written notice of their rights under the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.

Whenever there is a dispute between the County Superintendent and the parent/guardian of a student with disabilities regarding the identification, assessment, or educational placement of the student or the provision of FAPE to the student, the County Superintendent or designee shall encourage the early, informal resolution of the dispute at the school level to the extent possible. The County Superintendent or parent/guardian may also request mediation and/or a due process hearing in accordance with law, policy, and administrative regulation.

The County Superintendent or designee shall represent the County Superintendent in any due process hearing conducted with regard to County Superintendent students.

Any complaint alleging the County Superintendent's noncompliance with federal or state laws or regulations related to the provision of a free appropriate public education to students with disabilities shall be filed in accordance with Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations sections 3200-3205.

SELECTION AND EVALUATION OF INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS

The County Superintendent and County Board desire that instructional materials, as a whole, present a broad spectrum of knowledge and viewpoints, reflect society's diversity, and enhance the use of multiple teaching strategies and technologies. The County Superintendent/County Board shall adopt instructional materials based on a determination that such materials are an effective learning resource to help students achieve grade-level competency and that the materials meet criteria specified in law. Textbooks, technology-based materials, and other educational materials shall be aligned with academic content standards and the County Superintendent/County Board curriculum to ensure that they effectively support the adopted courses of study.

The County Superintendent and County Board shall select instructional materials for use in grades K-8 that have been approved by the State Board of Education (SBE) or have otherwise been determined to be aligned with the state academic content standards adopted pursuant to Education Code 60605 or the Common Core State Standards adopted pursuant to Education Code 60605.8. (Education Code 60200, 60210)

The County Superintendent and County Board shall adopt instructional materials for grades 9-12 upon determining that the materials meet the criteria specified in law and administrative regulation. (Education Code 60400)

Review Process

The County Superintendent or designee shall establish a process by which instructional materials shall be reviewed for recommendation for adoption for use. Toward that end, County Superintendent or designee may establish an instructional materials review committee to evaluate and recommend instructional materials.

The review process shall involve teachers in a substantial manner and shall encourage the participation of parents/guardians and community members. (Education Code 60002)

In addition, the instructional materials review committee may include administrators, other staff who have subject-matter expertise, and students as appropriate.

If the County Superintendent chooses to use instructional materials for grades K-8 that have not been adopted by the SBE, the County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that a majority of the participants in the County Superintendent's review process are classroom teachers who are assigned to the subject area or grade level of the materials. (Education Code 60210)

Individuals who participate in the selection or review of instructional materials shall not have a conflict of interest, as defined in administrative regulation, in the materials being reviewed.

The committee shall review instructional materials using criteria provided in law and administrative regulation, and shall provide the County Superintendent with documentation

supporting its recommendations.

All recommended instructional materials shall be available for public inspection at the County Superintendent's office.

The County Superintendent may pilot instructional materials, using a representative sample of classrooms for a specified period of time during a school year, in order to determine how well the materials support the County Superintendent's curricular goals and academic standards. Feedback from teachers piloting the materials shall be made available to the County Superintendent before the materials are adopted.

Public Hearing on Sufficiency of Instructional Materials

The County Board shall annually conduct one or more public hearings on the sufficiency of the County Superintendent/County Board textbooks and other instructional materials. (Education Code 60119)

The hearing shall be held on or before the end of the eighth week from the first day students attend school for that year. (Education Code 60119)

The County Superintendent and County Board encourage participation by parents/guardians, teachers, interested community members, and bargaining unit leaders at the hearing. Ten days prior to the hearing, the County Superintendent or designee shall post a notice in three public places within the County Superintendent's jurisdiction containing the time, place, and purpose of the hearing. The hearing shall not take place during or immediately following school hours. (Education Code 60119)

At the hearing(s), the County Superintendent and County Board shall determine, through a resolution, whether each student in each school, including each English learner, has sufficient textbooks or instructional materials which are aligned to the state content standards adopted pursuant to Education Code 60605 or the Common Core State Standards adopted pursuant to Education Code 60605.8 and which are consistent with the content and cycles of the state's curriculum frameworks. Sufficiency of instructional materials shall be determined in each of the following subjects: (Education Code 60119)

- 1. Mathematics;
- 2. Science;
- 3. History-social science;
- 4. English language arts, including the English language development component of an adopted program;
- 5. World/foreign language; and

6. Health

The County Superintendent and County Board shall also determine the availability of science laboratory equipment, as applicable to science laboratory courses offered in grades 9-12. (Education Code 60119)

In making these determinations, the County Superintendent and County Board shall consider whether each student has sufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. However, this does not require that each student have two sets of materials. The materials may be in a digital format as long as each student, at a minimum, has and can access the same materials in the class and to take home as all other students in the same class or course and has the ability to use and access them at home. However, the materials shall not be considered sufficient if they are photocopied sheets from only a portion of a textbook or instructional materials copied to address a shortage. (Education Code 60119)

If the County Superintendent and County Board determine that there are insufficient textbooks or instructional materials, it shall provide information to classroom teachers and to the public setting forth, for each school in which an insufficiency exists, the percentage of students who lack sufficient standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials in each subject area and the reasons that each student does not have sufficient textbooks or instructional materials. The County Superintendent and County Board shall take any action, except an action that would require reimbursement by the Commission of State Mandates, to ensure that each student has sufficient materials within two months of the beginning of the school year in which the determination is made. (Education Code 60119)

The degree to which every student has sufficient access to standards-aligned instructional materials shall be included in the County Superintendent's local control and accountability plan. (Education Code 52060)

Complaints

Complaints concerning instructional materials shall be handled in accordance with law, County Superintendent/Board Board policy, and administrative regulation.

Instruction SUPPLEMENTARY INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS

The County Superintendent and County Board encourage the use of supplementary instructional materials to enrich the curriculum and enhance student learning. Such materials shall be aligned with County Superintendent and County Board goals, curriculum objectives, and academic standards and shall supplement and not supplant the use of County Superintendent and County Board-adopted basic instructional materials that serve as the primary learning resources.

Supplementary instructional materials include, but are not limited to, instructional materials that are designed to serve one or more of the following purposes: (Education Code 60010)

- 1. To provide more complete coverage of one or more subjects included in a given course.
- 2. To meet the various learning ability levels of students in a given age group or grade level.
- 3. To meet the diverse educational needs of students with a language disability in a given age group or grade level.
- 4. To meet the diverse educational needs of students reflective of a condition of cultural pluralism.
- 5. To use current, relevant technology that further engages interactive learning in the classroom and beyond.

Supplementary instructional materials may be selected by the County Superintendent or designee, school administrators, or teachers, as applicable, and obtained through donations to the County Superintendent and/or available funding sources designated for these purposes.

As appropriate, supplementary instructional materials shall meet the criteria developed for the selection and evaluation of basic instructional materials as described in County Superintendent Administrative Regulation 6161.1 - Selection and Evaluation of Instructional Materials. Supplementary instructional materials shall be directly related to the course of study in which they are being used and shall be appropriate for the age and maturity level of the students.

The use or reproduction of supplementary instructional materials shall be in accordance with federal copyright law.

Supplementary Materials Aligned with Common Core Standards

To prepare students to achieve the Common Core Standards in English language arts and mathematics and the English language development standards, as applicable, the County Superintendent or designee may select supplementary instructional materials from the lists of materials determined by the State Board of Education (SBE) to be aligned with those standards.

The County Superintendent or designee may approve supplementary instructional materials that are not on the lists approved by the SBE but which are aligned with the Common Core Standards provided that the materials comply with the evaluation criteria established by the SBE and Education Code 60050, 60060-60062, and 60226. The County Superintendent or designee shall select content review experts who possess the qualifications specified in law to review and recommend such supplementary materials. The majority of the content review experts shall be teachers who are credentialed and/or authorized in the subject area they are reviewing and the remainder shall include appropriate persons from postsecondary educational institutions, school and County Superintendent curriculum administrators, and other persons who are knowledgeable in the subject area. (Education Code 60605.86-60605.88)

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Instruction DAMAGED OR LOST INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS

The County Superintendent and the County Board recognize that instructional materials are an expensive resource and that each student is entitled to sufficient instructional materials in accordance with law. Instructional materials provided for use by students remain the property of the County Superintendent. Students are responsible for returning borrowed materials in good condition, with no more wear and tear than usually results from normal use.

When materials are lost or so damaged that they are no longer usable, the student shall be immediately issued a replacement material. However, students or parents/guardians shall be responsible for reparation equal to the current replacement cost of the materials. When materials are damaged but still usable, the County Superintendent or designee shall determine an appropriate charge.

If it can be demonstrated to the County Superintendent or designee's satisfaction that the student has taken all reasonable precautions to safeguard instructional materials issued to him/her, the County Superintendent or designee may excuse the student or parent/guardian from payment of reparation.

If reparation is not excused and not paid by the student or parent/guardian, the County Superintendent may withhold the student's grades, diploma and transcripts in accordance with law, County Superintendent/County Board policy, and administrative regulation.

Instruction STUDENT ASSESSMENT

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that student assessments are an important instructional and accountability tool. To obtain the most accurate evaluation of student performance, the County Superintendent shall use a variety of measures, including County Superintendent, state, and/or national assessments.

Assessment data shall be used to help determine individual students' progress, mastery of academic standards, appropriate placement in County Superintendent/County Board programs, and/or eligibility for graduation. In addition, summary data on student assessment results shall be used to identify and review student achievement goals in the County Superintendent's local control and accountability plan, evaluate County Superintendent/County Board educational programs in order to identify needed improvements, and, as appropriate, evaluate staff performance.

In selecting or developing any assessment, the County Superintendent or designee shall examine evidence of its reliability, its validity for the intended purpose and for various student populations, and the extent to which it aligns with the material that is being taught.

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that assessments are administered in accordance with law and test publisher's directions, and that test administration procedures are fair and equitable for all students.

As appropriate, assessment results shall be disaggregated by student subgroup, classroom, grade level, and/or school site to allow for critical analysis of student needs.

The County Superintendent or designee shall provide professional development as needed to assist administrators and teachers in interpreting and using assessment data to improve student performance and the instructional program.

When County Superintendent and school-level results of student assessments are published by the state, the County Superintendent or designee may provide supplementary information to assist parents/guardians and the community in understanding test results.

Interim and Formative Assessments

State interim and formative assessments may be used in combination with other sources of information to gain timely feedback about student progress in an effort to continually adjust instruction to improve learning. Results from interim and formative assessments shall not be used for any high-stakes purpose, including, but not limited to, teacher or other school staff evaluation, accountability, student grade promotion or retention, graduation, course or class placement, identification for gifted or talented education, reclassification of English learners, or identification as an individual with exceptional needs. (Education Code 60642.6, 60642.7)

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that teachers who administer interim and

formative assessments have access to all functions and information designed for teacher use related to such assessments and student performance on the assessments. (Education Code 60642.6)

Individual Record of Accomplishment

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each student, by the end of grade 12, has an individual record of accomplishment that includes the following: (Education Code 60607)

- 1. The results of the state achievement tests required and administered as part of the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress, or any predecessor assessments, pursuant to Education Code 60640-60649.
- 2. The results of any end-of-course examinations taken.
- 3. The results of any vocational education certification examinations taken.

No individual record of accomplishment shall be released to any person, other than the student's parent/guardian or a teacher, counselor, or administrator directly involved with the student, without the written consent of the student's parent/guardian, or the student if he/she is an adult or emancipated minor. The student or his/her parent/guardian may authorize the release of the record of accomplishment to a postsecondary educational institution for the purposes of credit, placement, or admission. (Education Code 60607)

Instruction STATE ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT TESTS

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that state achievement test results provide an indication of student progress in achieving state academic standards and may be used to promote high-quality teaching and learning. The County Superintendent or designee shall administer mandatory student assessments within the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) as required by law and in accordance with County Superintendent and County Board policy and administrative regulation.

The County Superintendent and County Board strongly encourage all students at the applicable grade levels to participate in the state assessments in order to maximize the usefulness of the data and enable the County Superintendent/County Board to meet participation levels required for state and federal accountability systems. The County Superintendent or designee shall notify students and parents/guardians about the importance of these assessments and shall develop strategies to encourage student participation. Students shall be exempted from participation only in accordance with law and administrative regulation.

The County Superintendent and County Board shall annually examine state assessment results by school, grade level, and student subgroup as one measure of progress in attaining student achievement goals and shall revise the local control and accountability plan and other plans as necessary to improve student achievement for underperforming student groups.

Instruction TEST INTEGRITY/TEST PREPARATION

The County Superintendent and County Board desire to protect the integrity of student assessments in order to obtain accurate and reliable student achievement data and to ensure accountability to the community and state. Staff and students shall maintain a high level of integrity in the completion and handling of student assessments.

In administering standardized tests, staff shall not engage in any acts that could result in the invalidation of test results, such as:

- 1. Providing inappropriate test preparation;
- 2. Modifying test administration procedures, except as allowed by law;
- 3. Providing inappropriate assistance to students during test administration;
- 4. Changing or filling in answers on student answer sheets;
- 5. Providing inaccurate data on student header sheets;
- 6. Discouraging or excluding certain students from taking the test; or
- 7. Engaging in any other practice to artificially raise student scores without actually improving underlying student achievement.

Appropriate Test Preparation

The County Superintendent or designee, lead site administrators, and teachers shall not implement any program for the sole purpose of test preparation of students for the statewide assessment system or a particular test used in the statewide assessment system. (Education Code 60611)

The primary preparation for assessments shall be high-quality instruction in the content specified in state and County Superintendent/County Board academic standards. In addition, staff may prepare students for assessments by teaching general test-taking strategies and familiarizing them with item types or the computer-based testing environment used in state assessments.

Investigation and Consequences of Testing Irregularities

Reports of cheating on assessments shall be submitted to the County Superintendent or designee. The County Superintendent or designee shall immediately investigate with due diligence any reports of inappropriate test preparation or other testing irregularities.

Students found to have cheated on assessments shall be subject to disciplinary procedures in accordance with County Superintendent/County Board policy and administrative regulations.

A staff member found to have committed testing irregularities shall be subject to discipline in accordance with law, applicable collective bargaining agreements, County Superintendent/County Board policy, and administrative regulations.

If the County Superintendent or designee is made aware of a testing irregularity on state assessments, County Superintendent or designee shall report the irregularity to the California Department of Education.

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that County Superintendent staff and students may use a variety of copyrighted materials in the educational program and other County Superintendent operations. When such materials have not been purchased for the intended use, the County Superintendent and County Board expect staff and students to respect the protections afforded by federal law to the copyright owners of those materials and respect any limitations by the copyright holder to the license of such materials.

Any literary, musical, dramatic, choreographic, pictorial, graphic, sculptural, audiovisual or motion picture, sound, architectural, or other original work shall be assumed to be a copyrighted work, regardless of whether the work appears in print, audio, video, electronic, or other fixed and tangible form.

Before reproducing a copyrighted material for instructional or other County Superintendent purposes, a staff member shall determine if the material is in the public domain or if the intended use of the material meets the criteria for fair use or another exception pursuant to 17 USC 107-122. If the material is not in the public domain or no recognized exception applies, the staff member shall seek permission of the copyright holder before using the material.

The County Superintendent or designee shall inform staff that inclusion of an attribution citing the author and source of a copyrighted material does not absolve the staff member from the responsibility to either obtain permission or satisfy criteria for fair use or another exception.

If a staff member is uncertain as to whether the intended use of the material meets the criteria for fair use or another exception, he/she shall take the safest course and seek permission from the copyright holder to use the material or, if it is impracticable to obtain permission, shall contact the County Superintendent or designee for clarification and assistance.

Students shall not copy or distribute copyrighted works to others. Staff members shall take reasonable precautions to prevent copying or the use of unauthorized copies on school equipment.

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that staff and students receive information and training about copyright laws and the penalties for violating such laws.

The County Superintendent and County Board desire that school libraries be stocked with up-to-date books, reference materials, and electronic resources that promote literacy, support academic standards, and prepare students to become lifelong learners.

School libraries shall be open for use by students and teachers during the school day. Any library open to serve students outside the school day, such as evenings and/or Saturdays shall be under the supervision of a certificated employee. (Education Code 18103)

Staffing

The County Superintendent may employ one or more teacher librarians who possess appropriate credentials issued by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing. (Education Code 18120, 44868; 5 CCR 80024.6, 80053)

The County Superintendent or designee may assign teacher librarians to perform the following duties in accordance with the authorizations of their credential: (5 CCR 80053, 80053.1)

- 1. Instruct students in accessing, evaluating, using, and integrating information and resources in the library program and/or provide departmentalized instruction in information literacy, digital literacy, and digital citizenship;
- 2. Plan and coordinate school library programs with instructional programs through collaboration with teachers;
- 3. Select materials for school and County Superintendent libraries;
- 4. Develop and deliver staff development programs for school library services;
- 5. Coordinate or supervise library programs;
- 6. Plan and conduct a course of instruction for students who assist in the operation of school libraries;
- 7. Supervise classified personnel assigned school library duties; and
- 8. Develop procedures for and management of libraries.

Selection and Evaluation of School Library Materials

Library materials shall include print and electronic resources that align with the curriculum and

are accessible to students with varying cognitive or language needs.

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures for the selection and evaluation of library materials.

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop rules and procedures to ensure that when animals are brought to school, the health, safety, and welfare of students, staff, and the animals are protected. However, the County Superintendent/County Board assumes no liability for the safety of animals allowed on County Superintendent/County Board property.

Instruction STUDENT USE OF TECHNOLOGY

The County Superintendent and County Board intend that technological resources provided by the County Superintendent be used in a safe and responsible manner in support of the instructional program and for the advancement of student learning. All students using these resources shall receive instruction in their proper and appropriate use.

Teachers, administrators, and/or library media specialists are expected to review the technological resources and online sites that will be used in the classroom or assigned to students in order to ensure that they are appropriate for the intended purpose and the age of the students.

The County Superintendent or designee shall notify students and parents/guardians about authorized uses of County Superintendent technology, user obligations and responsibilities, and consequences for unauthorized use and/or unlawful activities in accordance with this policy and the County Superintendent's Acceptable Use Agreement.

County Superintendent technology includes, but is not limited to, computers, the County Superintendent's computer network including servers and wireless computer networking technology (wi-fi), the Internet, email, USB drives, wireless access points (routers), tablet devices, smartphones and smart devices, telephones, cellular telephones, personal digital assistants, pagers, MP3 players, wearable technology, any wireless communication device including emergency radios, and/or future technological innovations, whether accessed on or off site or through County Superintendent-owned or personally owned equipment or devices.

Before a student is authorized to use County Superintendent technology, the student and his/her parent/guardian shall sign and return the Acceptable Use Agreement. In that agreement, the parent/guardian shall agree not to hold the County Superintendent, County Board, County Superintendent and County Board agents, and any County Superintendent staff responsible for the failure of any technology protection measures or user mistakes or negligence and shall agree to indemnify and hold harmless the County Superintendent, County Board, County Superintendent and County Board agents, and County Superintendent, County Board, County Superintendent and County Board agents, and County Superintendent staff for any damages or costs incurred.

The County Superintendent reserves the right to monitor student use of technology within the jurisdiction of the County Superintendent without advance notice or consent. Students shall be informed that their use of County Superintendent technology, including, but not limited to, computer files, email, text messages, instant messaging, and other electronic communications, is not private and may be accessed by the County Superintendent for the purpose of ensuring proper use. Students have no reasonable expectation of privacy in use of the County Superintendent technology. Students' personally owned devices shall not be searched without consent except in cases where there is a reasonable suspicion, based on specific and objective facts, that the search will uncover evidence of a violation of law, County Superintendent/County Board policy, or school rules.

Whenever a student is found to have violated County Superintendent/County Board policy or the County Superintendent's Acceptable Use Agreement, the lead site administrator or designee may cancel or limit a student's user privileges or increase supervision of the student's use of the County Superintendent's equipment and other technological resources, as appropriate. Inappropriate use also may result in disciplinary action and/or legal action in accordance with law, County Superintendent/County Board policy, and school rules.

The County Superintendent or designee, with input from students and appropriate staff, shall regularly review and update procedures to enhance the safety and security of students using County Superintendent technology and to help ensure that the County Superintendent adapts to changing technologies and circumstances.

Internet Safety

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all County Superintendent computers with Internet access have a technology protection measure that protects against access to visual depictions that are obscene, child pornography, or harmful to minors and that the operation of such measures is enforced. (20 USC 7131; 47 USC 254; 47 CFR 54.520)

To reinforce these measures, the County Superintendent or designee shall implement rules and procedures designed to restrict students' access to harmful or inappropriate matter on the Internet and to ensure that students do not engage in unauthorized or unlawful online activities.

Harmful matter includes matter, taken as a whole, which to the average person, applying contemporary statewide standards, appeals to the prurient interest and is matter which depicts or describes, in a patently offensive way, sexual conduct and which lacks serious literary, artistic, political, or scientific value for minors. (Penal Code 313)

The County Superintendent's Acceptable Use Agreement shall establish expectations for appropriate student conduct when using the Internet or other forms of electronic communication, including, but not limited to, prohibitions against:

- 1. Accessing, posting, submitting, publishing, or displaying harmful or inappropriate matter that is threatening, obscene, disruptive, or sexually explicit, or that could be construed as harassment or disparagement of others based on their race/ethnicity, national origin, sex, gender, sexual orientation, age, disability, religion, or political beliefs.
- 2. Intentionally uploading, downloading, or creating computer viruses and/or maliciously attempting to harm or destroy County Superintendent equipment or materials or manipulate the data of any other user, including so-called "hacking."
- 3. Distributing personal identification information, including the name, address, telephone number, Social Security number, or other personally identifiable information, of another student, staff member, or other person with the intent to threaten, intimidate, harass, or ridicule that person.

The County Superintendent or designee shall provide age-appropriate instruction regarding safe and appropriate behavior on social networking sites, chat rooms, and other Internet services. Such instruction shall include, but not be limited to, the dangers of posting one's own personal identification information online, misrepresentation by online predators, how to report inappropriate or offensive content or threats, behaviors that constitute cyberbullying, and how to respond when subjected to cyberbullying.

Instruction GUIDANCE/COUNSELING SERVICES

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that a structured, coherent and comprehensive counseling program promotes academic achievement and serves the diverse needs of all students of County Superintendent/County Board schools. Counseling staff shall be available to provide students with individualized reviews of their educational progress toward academic and/or career and vocational goals and, as appropriate, may discuss social, personal, or other issues that may impact student learning.

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all persons employed to provide school counseling, school psychology, and/or school social work services shall possess the appropriate credential from the Commission on Teacher Credentialing authorizing their employment in such positions. Responsibilities of each position shall be clearly defined in a job description.

Responsibilities of school counselors include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Engaging with, advocating for, and providing support for all students with respect to learning and achievement.
- 2. Planning, implementing, and evaluating programs to promote the academic, career, personal, and social development of all students, including students from low-income families, foster youth, homeless youth, undocumented youth, and students at all levels of academic, social, and emotional abilities.
- 3. Using multiple sources of information to monitor and improve student behavior and achievement.
- 4. Collaborating and coordinating with school and community resources.
- 5. Promoting and maintaining a safe learning environment for all students by providing restorative justice practices, positive behavior interventions, and support services.
- 6. Intervening to ameliorate school-related problems, including issues related to chronic absences.
- 7. Using research-based strategies to reduce stigma, conflict, and student-to-student mistreatment and bullying.
- 8. Improving school climate and student well-being.
- 9. Enhancing students' social and emotional competence, character, health, civic engagement, cultural legacy, and commitment to lifelong learning and the pursuit of high-quality educational programs.
- 10. Providing counseling interventions and support services for students classified as

English learners, eligible for free or reduced-priced meals, or foster youth, including enhancing equity and access to the education system and community services.

11. Engaging in continued development as a professional school counselor.

Educational Counseling for Students in Grades 7-12

Beginning in grade 7, parents/guardians shall receive a general notice at least once before career counseling and course selection so that they may participate in the counseling sessions and decisions. (Education Code 221.5)

The educational counseling program shall include academic counseling in the following areas: (Education Code 49600)

- 1. Development and implementation, with parent/guardian involvement, of the student's immediate and long-range educational plans.
- 2. Optimizing progress towards achievement of proficiency standards.
- 3. Completion of the required curriculum in accordance with the student's needs, abilities, interests, and aptitudes.
- 4. Academic planning for access and success in higher education programs, including advisement on courses needed for admission to public colleges and universities, standardized admissions tests, and financial aid.
- 5. Career and vocational counseling, in which students are assisted in doing all of the following:
 - a. Planning for the future, including, but not limited to, identifying personal interests, skills, and abilities, career planning, course selection, and career transition.
 - b. Becoming aware of personal preferences and interests that influence educational and occupational exploration, career choice, and career success.
 - c. Developing realistic perceptions of work, the changing work environment, and the effect of work on lifestyle.
 - d. Understanding the relationship between academic achievement and career success, and the importance of maximizing career options.
 - e. Understanding the value of participating in career technical education and work-based learning activities and programs, including, but not limited to, service learning, regional occupational centers and programs, partnership programs, job shadowing, and mentoring experiences.
 - f. Understanding the need to develop essential employable skills and work habits.

g. Understanding the variety of four-year colleges and universities and community college vocational and technical preparation programs, as well as admission criteria and enrollment procedures.

The County Superintendent's educational counseling program also may include, but not be limited to, identification of students who are at risk of not graduating with the rest of their class, development of a list of coursework and experience necessary to assist students to satisfy the curricular requirements for college admission and successfully transition to postsecondary education or employment, and counseling regarding available options for a student to continue his/her education if he/she fails to meet graduation requirements.

The County Superintendent or designee shall establish and maintain a program of guidance, placement, and follow-up for all high school students subject to compulsory continuation education. (Education Code 48431)

No counselor shall unlawfully discriminate against any student. Guidance counseling regarding school programs and career, vocational, or higher education opportunities shall not be differentiated on the basis of any protected category specified in SP/BP 0410 - Nondiscrimination in County Superintendent and County Board Programs and Activities.

In addition, counselors shall affirmatively explore with students the possibility of careers, or courses leading to careers, that are nontraditional for that student's sex. (Education Code 221.5)

For assessing or counseling students, the County Superintendent shall not use testing or other materials that permit or require impermissible or unlawful differential treatment of students. (5 CCR 4931)

Colleges and prospective employers, including military recruiters, shall have the same access to students for recruiting purposes. (Education Code 49603; 10 USC 503; 20 USC 7908)

Personal or Mental Health Counseling

A school counselor, school psychologist, or school social worker may provide individualized personal, mental health, or family counseling to students in accordance with the specialization(s) authorized by his/her credential. Such services may include, but are not limited to, support related to the student's social and emotional development, behavior, substance abuse, mental health assessment, depression, or mental illness. As appropriate, students and their parents/guardians shall be informed about community agencies, organizations, or health care providers that offer qualified professional assistance.

Written parent/guardian consent shall be obtained before mental health counseling or treatment services are provided to a student, except when the student is authorized to consent to the service pursuant to Family Code 6920-6929, Health and Safety Code 124260, or other applicable law.

Any information of a personal nature disclosed to a school counselor by a student age 12 years or older or by his/her parent/guardian is confidential and shall not become part of the student

record without the written consent of the person who disclosed the confidential information. The information shall not be revealed, released, discussed, or referred to except under the limited circumstances specified in Education Code 49602. (Education Code 49602)

A counselor shall consult with the County Superintendent or designee and, as appropriate, with the County Superintendent's legal counsel whenever unsure of how to respond to a student's personal problem or when questions arise regarding the possible release of confidential information regarding a student.

Crisis Counseling

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize the need for a prompt and effective response when students are confronted with a traumatic incident. School counselors shall assist in the development of the comprehensive school safety plan, emergency and disaster preparedness plan, and other prevention and intervention practices designed to assist students and parents/guardians before, during, and after a crisis.

In addition, the County Superintendent or designee shall identify crisis counseling resources to train County Superintendent staff in effective threat assessment, appropriate response techniques, and/or methods to directly help students cope with a crisis if it occurs.

Early identification and intervention plans shall be developed to help identify those students who may be at risk for violence so that support may be provided before they engage in violent or disruptive behavior.

Teacher-Based Advisory Program

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that a supportive, ongoing relationship with a caring adult can provide a student with valuable advice, enhance student-teacher relationships, and build the student's feelings of connectedness with the school. The County Superintendent authorizes the development of a teacher-based advisory program in which teachers advise students in such areas as academic planning, character development, conflict resolution, and self-esteem. Any teacher participating in this program shall be under the supervision of a credentialed school counselor as appropriate, receive related information and training, and be subject to this County Superintendent/County Board policy and law, including requirements pertaining to student confidentiality and nondiscrimination.

Instruction IDENTIFICATION AND EVALUATION OF INDIVIDUALS FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize the need to actively seek out and evaluate students from birth to age 21 who have disabilities in order to provide them with appropriate educational opportunities in accordance with state and federal law.

The County Superintendent or designee shall establish a comprehensive system that includes procedures for the identification, referral, and regular and triennial assessment of individuals eligible for special education, as well as procedures for the planning, implementation, and review of the education and related services provided to such individuals. (Education Code 56301)

The County Superintendent's identification procedures shall include methods for utilizing referrals from parents/guardians, teachers, appropriate professionals, and others, and shall be coordinated with school site procedures for referral of students whose needs cannot be met with modifications to the regular instructional program. (Education Code 56302)

The County Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians, in writing, of their rights related to identification, referral, assessment, instructional planning, implementation, and review, including the right to consent to any assessment concerning their child. In addition, the County Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians of procedures for initiating a referral for assessment to identify individuals who need special education services. (Education Code 56301)

Instruction STUDENT SUCCESS TEAMS

The County Superintendent and County Board encourage the collaboration of parents/guardians, teachers, resource personnel, administrators, and students in evaluating the strengths and needs of students having academic, attendance, or behavioral difficulties and in identifying strategies and programs that may assist the students. The County Superintendent or designee shall establish student success teams (SST) as needed to address individual student needs.

The County Superintendent or designee shall establish a process for initiating referrals of students to the student success team.

Each student success team shall develop intervention strategies to assist the student. Such strategies may include changes in program placement or instructional methods, recommendation of supplemental educational services, parent involvement strategies, behavioral interventions, discipline, referrals to other agencies or resources, and/or other appropriate interventions.

The student success team shall monitor the student's progress, evaluate the extent to which the recommended strategies have been implemented, and develop additional interventions as needed.

Instruction IDENTIFICATION AND EDUCATION UNDER SECTION 504

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that all children, including children with disabilities, should have the opportunity to learn in a safe and nurturing environment. The County Superintendent or designee shall work to identify children with disabilities.

The County Superintendent or designee shall provide qualified students with disabilities with a free appropriate public education (FAPE) as defined under Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Such students shall receive regular or special education and related aids and services designed to meet their individual educational needs as adequately as the needs of students without disabilities are met. (34 CFR 104.33)

In addition, qualified students with disabilities shall be provided an equal opportunity to participate in programs and activities that are integral components of the County Superintendent's basic education program, including, but not limited to, extracurricular athletics, interscholastic sports, and/or other nonacademic activities. (34 CFR 104.37)

The County Superintendent's local control and accountability plan shall include goals and specific actions to improve student achievement and other outcomes of students with disabilities. At least annually, the County Superintendent or designee shall assess the County Superintendent's progress in attaining the goals established for students with disabilities. (Education Code 52052, 52060)

In providing services to students with disabilities under Section 504, the County Superintendent or designee shall ensure County Superintendent compliance with law, including providing the students and their parents/guardians with applicable procedural safeguards and required notifications. Any dispute as to the identification, evaluation, or placement of any student with a disability shall be resolved in accordance with the processes specified in administrative regulation.

Instruction TITLE I PROGRAMS

The County Superintendent and County Board desire to provide a high-quality education that enables all students to meet challenging state academic standards. In schools with a large number or percentage of economically disadvantaged families, the County Superintendent shall use Title I funds to provide services that strengthen the academic program and provide support to students at risk of failing to achieve academic standards.

Title I funds shall be used to supplement, not supplant, funds available from state and local sources for the education of students participating in Title I programs. (20 USC 6314, 6321)

Descriptions of how the County Superintendent will address the required components of the Title I local educational agency plan, as specified in 20 USC 6312, shall be included within the County Superintendent's local control and accountability plan (LCAP), the LCAP Federal Addendum, or another document. School-level strategies shall be aligned with the County Superintendent's plan and be tailored to the specific needs of the students at the school.

In addition, the County Superintendent and each school receiving Title I funds shall develop a written parent/guardian and family engagement policy in accordance with 20 USC 6318.

Comparability of Services

In schools receiving Title I funds, state and local funds shall be used to provide services that, taken as a whole, are at least comparable to services in schools that are not receiving Title I funds or, if all County Superintendent/County Board schools are receiving Title I funds, that are substantially comparable in each school. Comparability may be determined on a school-by-school basis or by grade span. (20 USC 6321)

To demonstrate comparability of services among County Superintendent/County Board schools, the County Superintendent shall:

- 1. Adopt and implement a salary schedule.
- 2. Ensure equivalence in teachers, administrators, and other staff, as measured by either or both of the following:
 - a. The ratio of students to instructional staff at each Title I school within a grade span, which shall not exceed 110 percent of the average ratio for all non-Title I County Superintendent schools within that grade span
 - b. Salary expenditures for instructional staff at each Title I school, which shall be no less than 90 percent of the average salary expenditure across non-Title I County Superintendent schools.
- 3. Ensure equivalence in the provision of curriculum materials and instructional supplies, by

determining whether the per-student expenditure of state and local funds for curriculum materials and instructional supplies in Title I schools is between 90 and 110 percent of the County Superintendent-wide average

4. Determine whether the amount of state and local funds allocated per student for each grade span is between 90 and 110 percent of the per student average for each grade span in non-Title I schools

In determining comparability, the County Superintendent shall not include staff salary differentials for years of employment. The County Superintendent also may exclude unpredictable changes in student enrollment or personnel assignments that occur after the beginning of the school year, state and local funds expended for language instruction educational programs, state and local funds expended for the excess costs of providing services to students with disabilities, and supplemental state or local funds expended in any school attendance area or school for programs that specifically meet the intent and purposes of Title I. (20 USC 6321)

The County Superintendent or designee shall annually assess comparability in accordance with the above criteria and maintain records documenting the County Superintendent's compliance. If any instances of noncomparability are identified, the County Superintendent or designee shall promptly implement adjustments as needed to ensure comparability.

Program Evaluation

The County Superintendent and County Board shall regularly monitor the progress of economically disadvantaged and low-achieving students in Title I schools. During the annual evaluation progress toward achieving each goal identified in the LCAP or other planning document addressing 20 USC 6312, the County Superintendent and County Board shall review disaggregated data on academic achievement, school attendance, and other outcomes for such students and shall ensure that strategies are revised as necessary to support continuous improvement.

Instruction CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT IN COLLEGE CLASSES

The County Superintendent and County Board desires to provide opportunities for eligible students to enroll concurrently in courses offered at postsecondary institutions in order to foster individual student achievement, increase opportunities for students to complete college preparatory course requirements and/or participate in career technical education (CTE), and prepare students for a smooth transition into college by providing exposure to the collegiate environment.

When it is determined that the postsecondary course in which the student intends to enroll is substantially equivalent to a course provided by the County Superintendent, the student may receive credit toward high school graduation requirements in addition to credit received from the college.

Approval of Concurrent Enrollment

The County Superintendent or designee may approve a limited number of students of any age or grade level to apply for part-time or full-time concurrent enrollment in a community college or four-year college when it is determined to be in the student's best interest and the student is adequately prepared for such coursework.

Upon recommendation of the lead site-administrator and with parent/guardian consent, the County Superintendent may authorize a student to attend a community college during any session or term as a special part-time or full-time student and to undertake one or more courses of instruction offered at the community college level. (Education Code 48800)

Within the enrollment limits and exceptions allowed by law, the lead site administrator may recommend a student for community college summer session if that student demonstrates adequate preparation in the discipline to be studied and exhausts all opportunities to enroll in an equivalent course, if any, at the school of attendance. (Education Code 48800)

A student's parent/guardian, regardless of the student's age or grade level, may petition the County Superintendent to authorize special full-time attendance at a community college on the ground that the student would benefit from advanced scholastic or career technical work that would be available. (Education Code 48800.5)

If the County Superintendent denies a request for special part-time or full-time enrollment at a community college for a student who is identified as highly gifted and talented, the County Superintendent shall issue a written recommendation and the reasons for the denial within 60 days after the request has been submitted. (Education Code 48800, 48800.5)

The County Superintendent may authorize a student who is pursuing a high school diploma or a high school equivalency certificate through an adult education program, upon recommendation of the administrator of the student's adult school, to attend a community college during any session or term as a special part-time student. (Education Code 52620)

Program Evaluation

The County Superintendent or designee shall report to the County Board regarding the number and demographics of students participating in the concurrent enrollment option, their success in completing college preparatory courses ("a-g" courses) and postsecondary courses, and any impact on their achievement in County Superintendent/County Board courses and graduation rates.

Instruction EDUCATION OF CHILDREN OF MILITARY FAMILIES

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that children of military families face challenges to their academic success caused by the frequent moves or deployments of their parents/guardians in fulfillment of military service. The County Superintendent shall provide such students with academic resources, services, and opportunities for extracurricular and enrichment activities that are available to all students.

The County Superintendent or designee may waive County Superintendent and County Board policies or rules when necessary to facilitate the enrollment, placement, advancement, eligibility for extracurricular activities, or on-time graduation of children of military families, in accordance with the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children as ratified in Education Code 49700-49704.

The County Superintendent or designee may provide information and/or training to administrators, other appropriate staff, and military families regarding the provisions of the Interstate Compact and the educational rights of children of military families.

The County Superintendent or designee may collaborate with parents/guardians, school liaison officers from military installations, and/or other agencies within and outside the state to facilitate the transition of children of military families into and out of the County Superintendent/County Board schools.

The County Superintendent or designee may annually report on the educational outcomes of children of military families. Such reports may include, but are not limited to, school attendance, student achievement test results, promotion and retention rates by grade levels, and graduation rates.

Instruction EDUCATION FOR ENGLISH LEARNERS

The County Superintendent and County Board intend to provide English learners with challenging curriculum and instruction that maximize the attainment of high levels of proficiency in English, advance multilingual capabilities, and facilitate student achievement in the regular course of study.

English learners may be provided differentiated English language development instruction which is targeted to their English proficiency level. Such instruction shall be based on sound instructional theory, be aligned with state content standards, emphasize inquiry-based learning and critical thinking skills, and be integrated across all subject areas.

No middle or high school student who is an English learner shall be denied enrollment in any of the following: (Education Code 60811.8)

1. Courses in the core curriculum areas of reading/language arts, mathematics, science, and history-social science, courses required to meet state and local high school graduation requirements, or courses required for middle school grade promotion

However, an English learner may be denied participation in any such course if the student has been enrolled in a school in the United States for less than 12 months or is enrolled in a program designed to develop the basic English skills of newly arrived immigrant students, and the course of study provided to the student is designed to remedy academic deficits incurred during participation and to enable the student to attain parity of participation in the standard instructional program within a reasonable length of time after the student enters the school system.

- 2. A full course load of courses specified in item #1 above
- 3. Other courses that meet the "a-g" course requirements for college admission or are advanced courses such as honors or Advanced Placement courses, on the sole basis of the student's classification as an English learner

The County Superintendent shall identify in its local control and accountability plan (LCAP) goals and specific actions and services to enhance student engagement, academic achievement, and other outcomes for English learners.

The County Superintendent or designee shall encourage parent/guardian and community involvement in the development and evaluation of programs for English learners. The County Superintendent or designee may also provide an English development literacy training program for parents/guardians and community members so that they may better support students' English language development.

Staff Qualifications and Training

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all staff employed to teach English learners possess the appropriate authorization from the Commission on Teacher Credentialing.

The County Superintendent shall provide effective professional development to teachers (including teachers in classroom settings that are not the settings of language instruction educational programs), administrators, and other school or community-based organization personnel to improve the instruction and assessment of English learners and enhance staff's ability to understand and use curricula, assessment, and instructional strategies for English learners. Such professional development shall be of sufficient intensity and duration to produce a positive and lasting impact on teachers' performance in the classroom. (20 USC 6825)

Staff development may also address the sociocultural needs of English learners and provide opportunities for teachers to engage in supportive, collaborative learning communities.

Identification and Assessment

The County Superintendent or designee shall maintain procedures for the early identification of English learners and an assessment of their proficiency using the state's English Language Proficiency Assessments for California (ELPAC). To oversee test administration, the County Superintendent or designee shall annually designate a County Superintendent ELPAC coordinator and a site coordinator for each test site in accordance with 5 CCR 11518.40-11518.45.

Once identified as an English learner, a student shall be annually assessed for language proficiency until the student is reclassified based on criteria specified in the accompanying administrative regulation.

In addition, English learners' academic achievement in English language arts, mathematics, science, and any additional subject required by law shall be assessed using the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress. As necessary, the test shall be administered with testing variations in accordance with 5 CCR 854.1-854.3. English learners who are in their first 12 months of attending a school in the United States shall be exempted from taking the English language arts assessment to the extent allowed by federal law. (Education Code 60603, 60640; 5 CCR 854.1-854.3)

Formative assessments may be utilized to analyze student performance and appropriately adapt teaching methodologies and instructions.

Language Acquisition Programs

The County Superintendent shall offer research-based language acquisition programs that are designed to ensure English acquisition as rapidly and as effectively as possible and that provide instruction to students on the state-adopted academic content standards, including the English language development standards. (Education Code 306; 5 CCR 11300)

At a minimum, the County Superintendent shall offer a structured English immersion program

which includes designated and integrated English language development. In the structured English immersion program, nearly all of the classroom instruction shall be provided in English, but with the curriculum and presentation designed for students who are learning English. (Education Code 305-306; 5 CCR 11309)

For the purpose of determining the amount of instruction to be conducted in English in the structured English immersion program, "nearly all" means that all classroom instruction shall be conducted in English except for clarification, explanation, and support as needed.

In addition, language acquisition programs offered by the County Superintendent may include, but are not limited to, the following: (Education Code 305-306)

- 1. A dual-language immersion program that provides integrated language learning and academic instruction for native speakers of English and native speakers of another language, with the goals of high academic achievement, first and second language proficiency, and cross-cultural understanding.
- 2. A transitional or developmental program for English learners that provides literacy and academic instruction in English and a student's native language and that enables an English learner to achieve English proficiency and academic mastery of subject matter content and higher order thinking skills, including critical thinking, in order to meet state academic content standards.

Reclassification

When an English learner is determined based on state and County Superintendent reclassification criteria to have acquired a reasonable level of English proficiency pursuant to Education Code 313 and 52164.6, or upon request by the student's parent/guardian, the student shall be transferred from a language acquisition program into an English language mainstream classroom.

Program Evaluation

To evaluate the effectiveness of the County Superintendent's educational program for English learners, the County Superintendent or designee shall report to the County Board, at least annually, regarding:

- 1. Progress of English learners towards proficiency in English;
- 2. The number and percentage of English learners reclassified as fluent English proficient;
- 3. The number and percentage of English learners who are or are at risk of being classified as long-term English learners in accordance with Education Code 313.1;
- 4. The achievement of English learners on standards-based tests in core curricular areas;

- 5. For any language acquisition program that includes instruction in a language other than English, student achievement in the non-English language in accordance with 5 CCR 11309;
- 6. Progress toward any other goals for English learners identified in the County Superintendent's LCAP;
- 7. A comparison of current data with data from at least the previous year in regard to items #1-6 above; and
- 8. A comparison of data between the different language acquisition programs offered by the County Superintendent.

The County Superintendent or designee may also provide the County Board with regular reports from any County Superintendent or schoolwide English learner advisory committees.

The County Superintendent and County Board may provide a comprehensive career technical education (CTE) program in the secondary grades which integrates core academic instruction with technical and occupational instruction in order to increase student achievement, graduation rates, and readiness for postsecondary education and employment. The County Superintendent/County Board CTE program shall be designed to help students develop the academic, career, and technical skills needed to succeed in a knowledge- and skills-based economy.

CTE opportunities may be offered through linked learning programs, partnership academies, apprenticeship programs or orientation to apprenticeships, regional occupational centers or programs (ROC/Ps), charter schools, small learning communities, magnet programs, or other programs that expose students to career options while preparing them for future careers in a given industry or interest area.

The County Superintendent or designee shall explore available funding sources that may be used to support CTE programs. The County Board shall review and approve all plans and applications for the use of state, and/or federal funds supporting CTE.

The County Board shall adopt standards for CTE which meet or exceed the state's model content standards and describe the essential knowledge and skills that students enrolled in these courses are expected to master. The course curriculum shall be aligned with County Superintendent/County Board-adopted standards and the state's curriculum framework.

At least every three years, the County Superintendent and County Board shall compare the County Superintendent/County Board curriculum, course content, and course sequence of CTE with the model state curriculum standards. (Education Code 52376)

The County Superintendent or designee shall systematically review the County Superintendent/County Board CTE courses to determine the degree to which each course may offer an alternative means for completing and receiving credit for specific portions of the course of study prescribed for high school graduation. The County Superintendent and County Board shall ensure that these classes are equivalent in content and rigor to the courses prescribed for graduation. (Education Code 52376)

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop partnerships with local businesses and industries to ensure that course sequences, career technical and integrated curriculum, classroom instruction and projects, and assessments have real-world relevance and reflect labor market needs and priorities. He/she shall also work to develop connections with businesses, postsecondary institutions, community organizations, and/or other employers to provide students with actual or simulated work-based learning opportunities.

The County Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with postsecondary institutions to ensure that the County Superintendent/County Board program is articulated with postsecondary

programs in order to provide a sequential course of study. Articulation opportunities may include dual or concurrent enrollment in community college courses.

The County Superintendent and County Board shall appoint a CTE advisory committee to develop recommendations on the CTE program and to serve as a liaison between County Superintendent/County Board and potential employers. The committee shall consist of one or more representatives of the general public knowledgeable about the disadvantaged, students, teachers, business representative, industry representative, school administrator, and representative of the field office of the California Employment Development Department. (Education Code 8070)

Prior to the beginning of each school year, the County Superintendent or designee shall advise students, parents/guardians, employees, and the general public that all CTE opportunities are offered without regard to any actual or perceived characteristic protected from discrimination by law. The notification shall be disseminated in languages other than English as needed and shall state that the County Superintendent will take steps to ensure that the lack of English language skills will not be a barrier to admission and participation in the CTE program. (20 USC 2354; 34 CFR 100 Appendix B, 104.8, 106.9)

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that teachers of CTE courses possess the qualifications and credentials necessary to teach their assigned courses. He/she shall also provide teachers and administrators with professional development designed to enhance their knowledge of standards-aligned CTE and shall provide opportunities for CTE teachers to collaborate with teachers of academic courses in the development and implementation of integrated curriculum models.

The County Superintendent or designee shall provide counselors and other guidance personnel with professional development that includes, but is not limited to, information about current workforce needs and trends, requirements of the CTE program, work-based learning opportunities, and postsecondary education and employment options following high school.

The County Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the County Board achievement data on participating students, including, but not limited to, the percentage of participating students who successfully complete CTE programs, their performance on state and County Superintendent academic achievement tests, and graduation rate. Data shall be disaggregated by program and various student subgroups. Based on such data, the County Superintendent and County Board shall determine the need for program improvements and update the goals in the local control and accountability plan as necessary.

Instruction REGIONAL OCCUPATIONAL CENTER/PROGRAM

The County Superintendent and County Board desire to provide opportunities for students of County Superintendent/County Board schools to receive specialized training and career technical skills through a regional occupational center or program (ROC/P) that prepares them for employment, advanced training, or postsecondary education.

The County Superintendent or designee shall refer eligible students to an ROC/P that has been established by the County Superintendent of Schools and is under the governance of the County Board of Education. (Education Code 52301, 52310.5)

The County Superintendent and County Board or designee shall ensure that students of County Superintendent/County Board schools receive a high-quality career technical program. The County Superintendent or designee shall identify appropriate means to provide input into ROC/P program development, budget adoption, program evaluation, and other matters.

Student Eligibility and Participation

To enroll in the ROC/P on a part-time or full-time basis, a County Superintendent/County Board high school or adult student must have his/her admittance approved by the ROC/P based on a determination that he/she will benefit from the program. To be eligible, a student must be at least 16 years of age, unless he/she meets one of the conditions specified in Education Code 52314. (Education Code 52314, 52314.5, 52315)

Adult students may have access to ROC/P classes offered on high school campuses during the school day.

A student who is attending an ROC/P may be exempted from the County Superintendent/County Board physical education requirement in accordance with law, County Superintendent/County Board policy, and administrative regulation. (Education Code 48410, 52316)

Credits earned from courses completed in an ROC/P may be applied toward fulfillment of high school graduation course requirements. (Education Code 51225.3, 52310)

Student Services

The County Superintendent may provide or arrange for transportation to the ROC/P in accordance with law, County Superintendent/County Board policy, and administrative regulation.

The County Superintendent academic counseling program shall be designed to increase students' awareness of available educational options aligned with their career goals, including, as appropriate, career technical programs offered through the ROC/P.

Program Evaluation

The County Board shall annually hold a public hearing to review and assess the participation of students in grades 11-12 in the ROC/P and the annual plan to increase participation of students in this program, unless it is determined that there are no additional students who would benefit from this participation. (Education Code 52304.1)

The County Board also shall review student achievement data for participating students.

Instruction Supplemental Instruction

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that high-quality supplemental instruction can motivate and support students to attain grade-level academic standards, overcome academic deficiencies, and/or acquire critical skills. The County Superintendent and County Board shall offer programs of direct, systematic, and intensive supplemental instruction to meet student needs. Supplemental instruction shall be offered in accordance with law and may be used to assist the County Superintendent in meeting goals for student achievement.

Supplemental instruction may be offered during and outside the regular school day, including during the summer, before school, after school, on Saturday, and/or during intersessions. When supplemental instruction is offered during the regular school day, it shall not supplant the student's instruction in the core curriculum areas or physical education.

As appropriate, supplemental instruction may be provided through a classroom setting, individual or small group instruction, technology-based instruction, and/or an arrangement with a community or other external service provider.

When determined to be necessary by the lead site administrator or designee and when written parent/guardian consent is obtained for the student's participation, a student may be required to participate in supplemental instruction outside the regular school day.

Supplemental instruction shall be offered to students who are recommended for retention, or are identified as being at risk for retention, at their current grade level. (Education Code 48070.5)

In addition, supplemental instruction may be offered to:

- 1. Students who demonstrate academic deficiencies that may jeopardize their attainment of academic standards; and/or
- 2. High school students who need support to successfully complete courses required for graduation.

Instruction EVALUATION OF THE INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAM

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that they are accountable to students, parents/guardians, and the community for the effectiveness of the County Superintendent/County Board educational program in meeting goals for student learning. The County Superintendent or designee shall conduct a continual evaluation of the curriculum and the instructional program in order to identify strategies for improving student achievement.

The County Superintendent or designee shall provide the County Board and the community with regular reports on student achievement. The reports shall include data for each school/program and for each numerically significant student subgroup, as defined in Education Code 52052, including, but not limited to, school and subgroup performance on statewide achievement indicators and progress toward goals specified in the County Superintendent's local control and accountability plan (LCAP).

In addition, the County Superintendent or designee shall conduct an evaluation of any new instructional program implemented in County Superintendent/County Board programs and shall regularly assess progress toward increasing student achievement in all subject areas taught in the County Superintendent/County Board schools and programs. The findings of such evaluations and assessments shall be reported to the County Board.

Annual Evaluation of Consolidated Application Programs

The County Superintendent or designee shall annually determine whether the categorical programs funded through the state's consolidated application are effective in meeting the needs of the students they are intended to serve. As a basis for this evaluation, the County Superintendent shall adopt the specific, measurable criteria that shall be used at each school and at the County program level. These criteria may include, but are not necessarily limited to, the progress of all students participating in the program and of each numerically significant subgroup toward goals contained in the County Superintendent's LCAP, the school's single plan for student achievement, and/or other applicable program or school plans.

Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) Accreditation

The County Superintendent believes that accreditation by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) can foster excellence and ongoing academic improvement in the County Superintendent's schools. The results of the accreditation process also may demonstrate to parents/guardians and the community that the schools are meeting their goals and objectives and the WASC criteria for school effectiveness through a viable instructional program.

The County Superintendent or designee shall undertake procedures whereby schools may achieve and maintain full WASC accreditation status. The schools shall conduct a self-study in accordance with WASC requirements, cooperate with the WASC committee during a site visit, and develop and review action plans to increase the effectiveness of the instructional program for students. The County Superintendent or designee shall regularly report to the County Board on the status of County Superintendent schools and any WASC recommendations for school

improvement.

Not later than 60 days after receiving the results of an inspection of a school by WASC or any other accrediting agency, the County Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians in writing of the inspection results and/or shall post the information on the County Superintendent's web site. (Education Code 35178.4)

If any County Superintendent/County Board school loses its accreditation status, the County Board shall give official notice at a regularly scheduled County Board meeting. The County Superintendent or designee shall provide written notification to each parent/guardian of a student in the school that the school has lost its accreditation status, including the potential consequences of the loss of accreditation status. This notice shall also be posted on the County Superintendent's web site. (Education Code 35178.4)

Instruction ADULT EDUCATION

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that education is a lifelong process and that it is important for individuals to continuously develop new skills. Eligible adults shall be offered opportunities to enroll in programs and courses that develop academic and workforce skills and, as appropriate, lead to completion of requirements for high school graduation.

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop and oversee the County Superintendent/County Board adult education program. The County Board shall approve all courses to be offered in this program.

The Superintendent and County Board desire to provide a comprehensive, research-based curriculum that motivates every student to succeed. FCOE's educational program shall provide students with opportunities to attain the skills, knowledge, and abilities they need to be successful in school and develop to their full potential.

Strategies for improving the educational program shall take into consideration the needs of individual students and subpopulations of students. Students who are failing or at risk of failing to meet academic standards shall be provided with alternative programs and/or supplemental assistance designed to raise achievement.

Inasmuch as parents/guardians are critical partners in their children's education, parents/guardians shall be provided with opportunities to be meaningfully involved both in support of their children's education program at school and with learning at home.

The Superintendent and Board shall:

- 1. Establish standards of student achievement for core subjects at each grade level that are aligned with FCOE's vision for student learning, the specific needs and strengths of the students, the expectations of parents/guardians and the community, and available resources.
- 2. Establish graduation requirements.
- 3. Ensure that a process is in place, involving teachers, administrators, students, and parents/guardians, for the development and review of FCOE's curriculum.
- 4. Adopt FCOE's curriculum and courses of study to be offered.
- 5. Adopt textbooks and other instructional materials.
- 6. Support the professional staff's implementation of the curriculum by providing consistent policy direction, allocating resources based on educational program priorities, ensuring that collective bargaining agreements do not constrain FCOE's ability to achieve curricular goals, recognizing staff accomplishments, and including reasonable annual goals related to student learning.
- 7. Provide a continuing program of professional development to keep instructional staff and administrators updated about current issues and research pertaining to curriculum, instructional strategies, and student assessment.

- 8. Review and evaluate the educational program on the basis of state and federal accountability measures, disaggregated student achievement data, and other indicators and ensure that evaluation results are used to improve programs, curriculum, and/or instructional practices as necessary to enhance student achievement.
- 9. Communicate clear information about FCOE instructional goals, programs, and progress in student achievement to the community and media.

The Superintendent or designee shall:

- 1. Review research related to curriculum issues.
- 2. Select and/or develop curricula for recommendation to the Board in accordance with FCOE's curriculum development and review process.
- 3. Ensure the articulation of the curriculum between grade levels and with postsecondary education and the workplace.
- 4. Determine the general methods of instruction to be used.
- 5. Assign instructors and schedule classes for all curricular offerings.
- 6. Recommend instructional materials to the Board and direct the purchase of approved materials and equipment.
- 7. Evaluate student achievement as demonstrated through testing and other types of appraisal, and recommend necessary changes in curriculum, programs, and instruction as indicated by student performance data.

Comparability in Instruction

FCOE shall provide comparable educational opportunities for all students. Instruction in the core curriculum shall be in no way diminished when students receive supplementary services funded by special governmental programs. Services funded by any categorical program shall supplement, not supplant, FCOE-provided core curriculum and any services which may be provided by other categorical programs.

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SUPERINTENDENT/BOARD POLICY 6011

CLASSIFICATION: Instruction

SUBJECT: Academic Standards

The Superintendent and County Board shall adopt high academic standards for student achievement which challenge all students to reach their full potential and which clarify what students are expected to know and be able to do at each grade level and in each area of study.

In developing these recommended standards, the Superintendent or designee shall use a process that involves teachers, administrators, students, parents/guardians, and community members. He/she shall ensure the alignment of the standards with Fresno County Office of Education's ("FCOE") vision and goals and ensure the proper articulation of standards between grade levels.

FCOE standards for English/language arts, English language development, mathematics, science, health education, history-social science, physical education, visual and performing arts, world languages, career technical education, and preschool education shall meet or exceed statewide model content standards adopted by the State Board of Education or the State Superintendent of Public Instruction as applicable.

Teachers and administrators shall receive professional development to ensure their understanding of the standards and to discuss effective instructional methods in preparing students to meet the standards.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually communicate the applicable standards to students and their parents/guardians to inform them of the expectations for student learning at their grade level. Staff shall continually assess students' progress toward meeting the standards, report each student's progress to the student and his/her parents/guardians, and offer remedial assistance in accordance with FCOE policy and administrative regulation.

FCOE standards shall also provide a basis for evaluating the instructional program, making decisions about curriculum and assessment in accordance with Education Code 44662.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that FCOE standards are regularly reviewed and updated as necessary. At a minimum, FCOE standards shall be reviewed whenever applicable statewide standards are revised and whenever data on student achievement demonstrate that students are not adequately achieving the standards in a particular grade level or subject area.

The Superintendent and County Board recognize that parents/guardians are their children's first and most influential teachers and that sustained parent involvement in the education of their children contributes greatly to student achievement and a positive school environment. The Superintendent or designee shall work with staff and parents/guardians to develop meaningful opportunities at all grade levels for parents/guardians to be involved in Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE") activities; advisory, decision-making, and advocacy roles; and activities to support learning at home.

Parents/guardians shall be notified of their rights to be informed about and to participate in their children's education and of the opportunities available to them to do so.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly evaluate and report on the effectiveness of FCOE's parent involvement efforts, including, but not limited to, input from parents/guardians and school staff on the adequacy of parent involvement opportunities and barriers that may inhibit parent/guardian participation.

Title I Schools

Each year the Superintendent or designee shall identify specific objectives of FCOE's parent involvement program for schools that receive Title I funding. He/she shall ensure that parents/guardians are consulted and participate in the planning, design, implementation, and evaluation of the parent involvement program. (Education Code 11503)

For each school, the Superintendent and County Board shall adopt a calendar that meets the requirements of law as well as the needs of the community, students, and the work year as negotiated with Fresno County Office of Education's ("FCOE") employee organization(s). As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the proposed calendar is aligned with assessment and accountability schedules in order to support FCOE's goals for student achievement.

Each school calendar shall show the beginning and ending school dates, legal and local holidays, staff development days, orientation days, minimum days, vacation periods, and other pertinent dates.

FCOE shall offer 180 days of instruction per school year, unless FCOE and employee organization(s) have negotiated to reduce the days of instruction in any school year through 2012-13 pursuant to the authorization in Education Code 42605.

Staff development days shall not be counted as instructional days.

Notification of the schedule of minimum days shall be sent to all parents/guardians at the beginning of the school year. If any minimum days are added to the schedule, the Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians of the affected students as soon as possible and at least one month before the scheduled minimum day. (Education Code 48980)

If a school will be used as a polling place on an election day, the County Board shall determine whether to continue school in session, designate the day for staff training and development, or close the school to students and non-classified staff. (Elections Code 12283)

SUBJECT: Response to Instruction and Intervention

The Superintendent and County Board desire to provide a high-quality, data-driven educational program to meet the learning and behavioral needs of each student and to help reduce disparities in achievement among subgroups of students. Students who are not making academic progress pursuant to Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE") measures of performance shall receive intensive instruction and intervention supports designed to meet their individual learning needs.

The Superintendent or designee shall convene a team of certificated personnel, other FCOE staff, and parents/guardians, as appropriate, to assist in designing FCOE's Response to Instruction and Intervention (RtI2) system, based on an examination of indicators of schoolwide student achievement.

FCOE's RtI2 system shall include instructional strategies and interventions with demonstrated effectiveness and shall be aligned with FCOE curriculum and assessments.

FCOE's RtI2 system shall include research-based, standards-based, culturally relevant instruction for students in the general education program; universal screening and continuous classroom monitoring to determine students' needs and to identify those students who are not making progress; criteria for determining the types and levels of interventions to be provided; and subsequent monitoring of student progress to determine the effectiveness of the intervention and to make changes as needed.

When data from the RtI2 system indicate that a student may have a specific learning disability, the student may be referred for evaluation for special education or other services.

FCOE shall provide staff development to teachers regarding the use of assessments, data analysis, and research-based instructional practices and strategies. In addition, FCOE's RtI2 system shall emphasize a collaborative approach of professional learning communities among teachers within and across grade spans.

Staff shall ensure that parents/guardians are involved at all stages of the instructional and intervention process. Parents/guardians shall be kept informed of their child's progress and provided information regarding the services that will be provided, the strategies being used to increase the student's rate of learning, and information about the performance data that will be collected.

SUBJECT: Curriculum Development and Evaluation

The Superintendent and County Board desire to provide a research-based, sequential curriculum which promotes high levels of student achievement and emphasizes the development of basic skills, problem solving, and decision making. Upon recommendation of the Superintendent or designee, the County Board shall adopt a written curriculum which describes, for each subject area and grade level, the content objectives which are to be taught in all Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE") schools.

FCOE's curriculum shall be aligned with FCOE's vision and goals for student learning, Superintendent/Board policies, academic content standards, state curriculum frameworks, state and FCOE assessments, graduation requirements, school and improvement plans, and, when necessary, related legal requirements.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a process for curriculum development, selection, and/or adaptation which utilizes the professional expertise of teachers, principals, and administrators representing various grade levels, disciplines, special programs, and categories of students as appropriate. The process also may provide opportunities for input from students, parents/guardians, representatives of local businesses and postsecondary institutions, and other community members.

The selection and evaluation of instructional materials shall be coordinated with the curriculum development and evaluation process.

When presenting a recommended curriculum for adoption, the Superintendent or designee shall provide research, data, or other evidence demonstrating the proven effectiveness of the proposed curriculum. He/she also shall present information about the resources that would be necessary to successfully implement the curriculum and describe any modifications or supplementary services that would be needed to make the curriculum accessible to all students.

The Superintendent and County Board shall establish a review cycle for regularly evaluating FCOE's curriculum in order to ensure continued alignment with state and local goals for student achievement. At a minimum, these reviews shall be conducted whenever the State Board of Education adopts new or revised content standards or the curriculum framework for a particular subject or when new law requires a change or addition to the curriculum.

In addition, the Superintendent and County Board may require a review of the curriculum in one or more subject areas as needed in response to student assessment results; feedback from teachers, administrators, or parent/guardians; new research on program effectiveness; or changing student needs.

SUBJECT: Recognition of Religious Beliefs and Customs

The Superintendent and County Board recognize that an American education would be incomplete without an understanding of the role of religion in society. As appropriate for a particular course, teachers may objectively discuss the influences of various religions, using religious works and symbols to illustrate their relationship with culture, literature, or the arts. The Superintendent and County Board expect that such instruction will identify principles common to all religions and foster respect for the diversity of religions and customs in the world.

In order to respect each student's individual right to freedom of religious practice, religious indoctrination is clearly forbidden in the public schools. Instruction about religion shall not promote or denigrate the beliefs or customs of any particular religion or sect, nor should a preference be shown for one religious viewpoint over another. Staff members shall be highly sensitive to their obligation not to interfere with the religious development of any student in whatever tradition the student embraces.

Staff shall not endorse, encourage or solicit religious or anti-religious expression or activities among students during class time. As part of their official duties, staff shall not lead students in prayer or other religious activities. However, staff shall not prohibit or discourage any student from praying or otherwise expressing his/her religious belief as long as this does not disrupt the classroom.

Students may express their beliefs about religion in their homework, artwork and other class work if the expression is germane to the assignment. Such work shall be judged by ordinary academic standards.

While teaching about religious holidays is a permissible part of the educational program, celebrating religious holidays is not allowed in the public schools. School-sponsored programs shall not be, nor have the effect of being, religiously oriented or a religious celebration. School and classroom decorations may express seasonal themes that are not religious in nature.

Music, art, literature, or drama programs having religious themes are permitted as part of the curriculum for school-sponsored activities and programs if presented in an objective manner and as a traditional part of the cultural and religious heritage. The use of religious symbols that are part of a religious holiday is permitted as a teaching aid or resource provided that such symbols are displayed as an example of cultural and religious heritage of the holiday and are temporary in nature.

SUBJECT: Sexual Health and HIV/AIDS Prevention Instruction

The Superintendent and County Board recognize that the purpose of sexual health and HIV/AIDS prevention instruction is to provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary to protect them from unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases and to encourage students to develop healthy attitudes concerning adolescent growth and development, body image, gender roles, sexual orientation, dating, marriage, and family. FCOE therefore desires to provide a well-planned sequence of instruction on comprehensive sexual health and HIV/AIDS prevention.

FCOE's curriculum shall be aligned with the state's content standards, based on medically accurate and factual information, and designed to teach students to make healthy choices and reduce high-risk behaviors. FCOE's program shall comply with the requirements of law, Superintendent and County Board policy and administrative regulation and shall respect the rights of parents/guardians to supervise their children's education on these subjects and to impart values regarding human sexuality to their children.

A parent/guardian may request in writing that his/her child be excused from participating in HIV/AIDS prevention or sexual health education. Students so excused by their parents/guardians shall be given an alternative educational activity. (Education Code 51240, 51939)

A student shall not be subject to disciplinary action, academic penalty, or other sanction if the student's parent/guardian declines to permit the student to receive the instruction. (Education Code 51939)

FCOE may administer to students in grades 7-12 an anonymous, voluntary survey regarding sexual behaviors upon providing written parent/guardian notification and allowing parents/guardians to request in writing that the survey not be administered (i.e. "passive consent"). Parents/guardians of students below grade 7 must give permission (i.e. "active consent") before the research instrument is administered to their child. FCOE shall adopt a policy regarding FCOE's arrangements to protect student privacy when such a survey is administered.

The Superintendent and County Board recognize that citizen involvement in civic and political institutions is essential to a democratic government and desire to provide a comprehensive civic education program to help students acquire the knowledge, skills, and principles essential for informed, responsible citizenship.

The County Board shall approve, upon the recommendation of the Superintendent or designee, academic standards and curriculum in civics and government that are aligned with state academic standards and curriculum frameworks.

The Superintendent or designee shall determine specific courses within the K-12 curriculum in which civic education and government may be explicitly and systematically taught. He/she also shall encourage the integration of civic education into other subjects as appropriate.

Fresno County Office of Education's ("FCOE") civic education program shall provide students with an understanding of the rights and responsibilities of citizens in American democracy and the workings of federal, state, and local governments. As appropriate, instruction should include an examination of fundamental American documents, including, but not limited to, the Declaration of Independence, the United States Constitution, the Federalist Papers, and other significant writings and speeches.

To develop a sense of political effectiveness, instruction should develop students' understanding of the importance of civic participation in a democratic society. Service learning, extracurricular and cocurricular activities, class and school elections, and observation of local government processes may be used to reinforce classroom instruction by linking civic knowledge to practical experience and encouraging civic involvement.

Instruction also should promote a student's understanding of shared democratic principles and values, such as personal responsibility, justice, equality, respect for others, civic-mindedness, and patriotism, and enable students to make their own commitment to these civic values.

Constitution/Citizenship Day

Each year on or near September 17, in commemoration of Constitution and Citizenship Day, FCOE shall hold an educational program for students in grades K-12 pertaining to the United States Constitution which shall include exercises and instruction in the purpose, meaning, and importance of the Constitution, including the Bill of Rights. (Education Code 37221; P.L. 108-447, Sec. 111)

SUBJECT: Environmental Education

The Superintendent and County Board recognize that schools play a crucial role in educating students about the importance of the environment and in preparing them to be stewards of natural resources. The Superintendent and County Board believe that students should value the environment, respect all life forms, understand the basic ecological principles which support the planet, and live an ecologically responsible life-style.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop an environmental education program that is aligned with state academic standards and curriculum frameworks. The Superintendent or designee shall determine how Fresno County Office of Education's ("FCOE") environmental education program will be integrated into FCOE's science curriculum and other subjects and courses in which the concepts may be explicitly and systematically taught, and how to make the program accessible by county public schools.

The goal of FCOE's environmental education program shall be to provide students with an understanding of the interactions and interdependence of human societies and natural systems, people's dependence and influence on natural systems, the ways that natural systems change and how people can benefit and influence that change, the fact that there are no boundaries to prevent matter from flowing between systems, and the fact that decisions affecting resources and natural systems are complex and involve many factors.

FCOE's program shall emphasize a coordination of instructional resources with active student participation in onsite resource conservation and management programs and the promotion of service learning partnerships.

SUBJECT: Visual and Performing Arts Education

The Superintendent and County Board believe that visual and performing arts are essential to a well-rounded educational program and should be an integral part of the course of study offered to students at all grade levels. Fresno County Office of Education's ("FCOE") arts education program shall provide opportunities for appreciation, creation, and performance of the arts.

The Superintendent and County Board shall adopt academic standards for dance, music, theatre, and visual arts that describe the skills, knowledge, and abilities that students shall be expected to possess at each grade level. FCOE's standards shall meet or exceed state content standards for each of these disciplines.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop a sequential curriculum for dance, music, theatre, and visual arts which is consistent with the state curriculum framework and includes the following strands:

- Artistic perception: processing, analyzing, and responding to sensory information through 1. the use of language and skills unique to each arts discipline.
- Creative expression: composing, arranging, and performing a work and using a variety of 2. means to communicate meaning and intent in one's own original works.
- Historical and cultural context: understanding the historical contributions and cultural 3. dimensions of an arts discipline.
- Aesthetic valuing: analyzing and critically assessing works of dance, music, theatre, and 4. visual arts.
- Connections, relations, and applications: connecting, comparing, and applying what is 5. learned in one arts discipline to learning in the other arts, other subject areas, and careers.

The Board shall adopt standards-based instructional materials for visual and performing arts in accordance with applicable law, Superintendent/Board policy, and administrative regulation. In addition, the Superintendent and Board encourage teachers to incorporate a variety of media and technologies into lessons, presentations, and explorations in each of the arts disciplines.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide a standards-based professional development program designed to increase teachers' knowledge of and ability to teach the arts and to implement adopted instructional materials.

If fiscal resources are available, the Superintendent or designee shall encourage, as a supplement to teacher instruction, the integration of community arts resources into the educational program. Such resources may include opportunities for students to attend musical and theatrical

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performances, observe the works of accomplished artists, and work directly with artists-in-residence and volunteers. In addition, the Superintendent or designee may collaborate with community organizations to share resources and seek grant opportunities.

Arts and Music Block Grants

Any state funding received through arts and music block grants shall be used only for hiring additional staff, purchasing new materials, books, supplies, and equipment, and/or implementing or increasing staff development opportunities as needed to support standards-aligned arts and music instruction. (SB 77, Item 6110-265-0001, Statutes of 2007)

The Superintendent and Board shall distribute block grant funds to FCOE schools on the basis of an equal amount per student or the minimum school site allocation specified in the state budget, whichever is greatest. (SB 77, Item 6110-265-0001, Statutes of 2007)

However, the Superintendent and Board may allocate block grant funds for FCOE expenditures that support program purposes on behalf of all FCOE schools. If the Superintendent and Board elect to do so, a resolution shall be adopted at a public meeting which specifies how the funds will be allocated among schools and for FCOE-wide purposes and the reasons for those allocations. Prior to the public meeting, the Superintendent and Board shall inform school site councils, schoolwide advisory groups, or school support groups, as applicable, of the content of the proposed resolution and of the time and location where the resolution is proposed to be adopted. SUBJECT: Physical Education and Activity

PAGE: 1 of 4

The Superintendent and County Board recognize the positive benefits of physical activity on student health and academic achievement. Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE") shall provide all students the opportunity to be physically active on a regular basis through high-quality physical education instruction and may provide additional opportunities for physical activity throughout the school day. FCOE's physical education and activity programs shall support FCOE's coordinated student wellness program and encourage students' lifelong fitness.

FCOE's physical education program shall provide a developmentally appropriate sequence of instruction aligned with the state's model content standards and curriculum framework. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that FCOE's program provides students with equal opportunities for instruction and participation regardless of gender in accordance with law.

The overall course of study for grades 9-12 shall include the effects of physical activity upon dynamic health, the mechanics of body movement, aquatics, gymnastics and tumbling, individual and dual sports, rhythms and dance, team sports, and combatives. (Education Code 33352; 5 CCR 10060)

The Board shall approve the courses in grades 9-12 for which physical education credit may be granted.

Students with disabilities shall be provided instruction in physical education in accordance with their individualized education program or Section 504 accommodation plan.

During air pollution episodes, extreme weather, or other inclement conditions, physical education staff shall make appropriate adjustments to the program or shall seek alternative indoor space to enable students to participate in active physical education.

Staffing

Physical education instruction shall be delivered by appropriately credentialed teachers who may be assisted by instructional aides, paraprofessionals, and/or volunteers.

Physical Fitness Testing

The Superintendent or designee shall annually administer the physical fitness test designated by the State Board of Education to students in grades 5, 7, and 9. (Education Code 60800; 5 CCR 1041)

Temporary Exemptions

The Superintendent or designee may grant a temporary exemption from physical education under either of the following conditions: (Education Code 51241)

1. The student is ill or injured and a modified program to meet his/her needs cannot be provided.

2. The student is enrolled for one-half time or less.

Two-Year Exemptions

With the student's consent, the Superintendent or designee may exempt a student from physical education courses for any two years during grades 10-12 provided that the student has satisfactorily met at least five of the six standards of the state's physical fitness test in grade 9. (Education Code 51241)

Upon request by students and/or their parents/guardians, the Superintendent or designee may administer the physical fitness test to students in grades 10-12 who need to pass the test in order to qualify for a two-year exemption from physical education courses.

Permanent Exemptions

The Superintendent or designee may grant a permanent exemption from physical education to an individual student under any of the following conditions: (Education Code 51241)

- 1. The student is age 16 years or older and has been enrolled in grade 10 for one or more academic years.
- 2. The student is enrolled as a postgraduate student.
- 3. The student is enrolled in a juvenile home, ranch, camp, or forestry camp school with scheduled recreation and exercise.

Other Exemptions

The Superintendent or designee may grant an exemption from physical education under the following special circumstances:

- 1. The student in grades 10-12 is excused for up to 24 clock hours in order to participate in automobile driver training. (Education Code 51222)
- 2. The student in grades 10-12 attends a regional occupational center or program and attendance in physical education courses results in hardship because of the travel time involved. (Education Code 52316)
- 3. The student is in high school and is engaged in a regular school-sponsored interscholastic athletic program carried on wholly or partially after regular school hours. (Education Code 51242)

Additional Opportunities for Physical Activity

The Superintendent or designee may develop strategies to supplement physical education instruction with additional opportunities for students to be physically active before, during, and after the school day.

Program Evaluation

The staff shall annually report to the Superintendent the results of the state physical fitness testing for each school and applicable grade level, the number of instructional minutes offered in physical education for each grade level, the number of two-year and permanent exemptions granted pursuant to Education Code 51241, and any other data agreed upon by the Board and the Superintendent or designee to evaluate program quality and the effectiveness of FCOE's program in meeting goals for physical activity.

SUBJECT: Comprehensive Health Education

The Superintendent and County Board believe that health education should foster the knowledge, skills, and attitudes that students need in order to lead healthy lives and avoid high-risk behaviors. Fresno County Office of Education's ("FCOE") health education program shall be part of a coordinated school health system which supports the well-being of students and is linked to FCOE and community services and resources.

Goals for FCOE's health education program shall be designed to promote student wellness and shall include, but not be limited to, goals for nutrition education and physical activity.

FCOE shall provide a planned, sequential, research-based, and developmentally appropriate health education curriculum for students in grades K-12 which is aligned with the state's content standards and curriculum framework. The Superintendent or designee shall determine the grade levels and subject areas in which health-related topics will be addressed, in accordance with law, Superintendent/Board policy, and administrative regulation.

As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall involve school administrators, teachers, school nurses, health professionals representing various fields of health care, parents/guardians, community-based organizations, and other community members in the development, implementation, and evaluation of FCOE's health education program. Health and safety professionals may be invited to provide related instruction in the classroom, school assemblies, and other instructional settings.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide professional development as needed to ensure that health education teachers are knowledgeable about academic content standards and effective instructional methodologies.

SUBJECT: Reading/Language Arts Instruction

PAGE: 1 of 3

The Superintendent and County Board recognize that reading and other language arts constitute the basic foundation for learning in other areas of study. Students should develop an appreciation for literature and for reading as a means to acquire knowledge. They also should develop oral and written language skills that enable them to effectively communicate with others.

The Superintendent and Board desire to offer a comprehensive, balanced reading/language arts program that ensures all students have the skills necessary to read fluently and for meaning. The program shall integrate reading, writing, speaking, and listening activities in order to build effective communication skills.

For each grade level, the Superintendent and Board shall adopt academic standards in reading, speaking, and writing, including spelling and grammar that meet or exceed state standards. Fresno County Office of Education's ("FCOE") program also shall be aligned with the state framework for reading/language arts instruction.

Teachers are encouraged to use a variety of instructional strategies to accommodate the needs of beginning readers and the varying abilities of more advanced readers.

The Superintendent or designee may provide professional development opportunities that are designed to provide instructional staff with knowledge about how students develop language skills, the ability to analyze students' developing literacy, and the ability to draw from a variety of instructional strategies and materials.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that FCOE's reading/language arts program offers sufficient access to textbooks and other instructional materials of varying levels of difficulty, including fiction and nonfiction works, so that students are continually reading at an appropriate level. In addition, technology should be available to support all areas of literacy.

Staff shall regularly provide the Superintendent and Board with data from state and FCOE reading assessments and program evaluations to enable the Superintendent and Board to monitor program effectiveness.

Grades K-3

The goal of FCOE's early literacy program shall be to ensure that students are able to read fluently and at grade level by the end of third grade. To reach this goal, the Superintendent or designee shall design a balanced and comprehensive reading/language arts program with the following components:

1. Explicit skill development for beginning readers that includes phonemic awareness, phonics and decoding skills, and sufficient practice and repetition of these skills.

- 2. A strong literature, language, and comprehension program that includes a balance of oral and written language.
- 3. Ongoing diagnosis of students' skills.
- 4. An early intervention program that provides assistance to students at risk of reading failure.

Grades 4-12

The Superintendent and Board recognize that reading/language arts instruction is an integral component of the curriculum at all grade levels. Continuous progress in fluency and comprehension shall be the goal of reading/language arts instruction in grades 4-12.

The program in these grades shall promote reading for subject matter comprehension, developing understanding of progressively more advanced reading material, analyzing and discussing a variety of reading materials, increasing the frequency of reading, developing more complex writing skills with attention to composition and vocabulary, and developing other communications skills.

When students in these grades do not have fully developed reading/language arts skills, the Superintendent or designee shall make resources available to assist them in reaching a reading level sufficient to meet the demands of grade-level material. Staff at all grade levels and in every subject shall take responsibility for supporting and expanding students' literacy skills.

Supplementary Reading Instruction for Grades K-4

When state funding is available, the Superintendent or designee may offer students in grades K-4 increased instructional opportunities before or after school and/or outside the regular school session to assist those students who are experiencing difficulty learning to read and to increase the reading skills and reading enjoyment of all students.

SUBJECT: Mathematics Instruction

The Superintendent and County Board desire to offer a rigorous mathematics program that provides a strong foundation in basic mathematical skills and prepares students to apply mathematics in real life. The Superintendent or designee shall develop grade-level curricula that offer a balanced instructional program, including but not limited to:

- 1. Basic mathematical skills: quantification, basic facts, sorting and classification, and computational skills including addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, fractions, decimals, squares and square roots.
- 2. Conceptual understanding: knowledge and application of facts and definitions, identification of principles, understanding of relationships among mathematical concepts, recognition and application of signs, symbols and terms.
- 3. Problem solving: use of mathematical concepts, skills, tools and reasoning strategies to formulate and solve problems in a variety of situations.

The mathematics program shall develop such knowledge and skills in the subject areas of numbers, measurement, geometry, functions, statistics and probability, logic, algebra and discrete mathematics. Students should know, understand and demonstrate concepts through their application to classroom and real-life situations.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all students have many opportunities to take the full range of mathematics course options.

The Superintendent and Board shall establish specific content and performance standards in mathematical skills, concepts and problem-solving ability for each grade level. Students at risk of failing to meet performance standards shall receive additional assistance and intervention.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that certificated staff has opportunities to participate in professional development activities designed to increase their knowledge and skills in effective mathematics teaching practices.

Students shall have access to sufficient instructional materials, including manipulatives and technology, to support a balanced mathematics program.

The Superintendent and County Board believe that science education should focus on giving students an understanding of key scientific concepts and a capacity for scientific ways of thinking. Students should become familiar with the natural world and the interrelation of science, mathematics, and technology. As part of their science instruction, students should learn how to apply scientific knowledge and ways of thinking for individual and social purposes.

As a matter of principle, science teachers are professionally bound to limit their teaching to content that meets the criteria of scientific fact, hypothesis, and theory as these terms are used in natural sciences. A scientific fact is an understanding based on confirmable observations and is subject to test and rejection. A scientific hypothesis is an attempt to frame a question as a testable proposition. A scientific theory organizes and explains a range of natural phenomena on the basis of facts and hypotheses. Scientific theories are constantly subject to testing, modification and refutation as new evidence and new ideas emerge.

Philosophical and religious theories are based, at least in part, on faith, and are not subject to scientific test and refutation. Such beliefs shall not be discussed in science classes, but may be addressed in the social science and language arts curricula.

SUBJECT: History/Social Science Instruction

The Superintendent and County Board believe that the study of history and other social sciences is essential to prepare students to engage in responsible citizenship, comprehend complex global interrelationships, and understand the vital connections among the past, present, and future. Fresno County Office of Education's ("FCOE") history-social science education program shall be designed to develop students' knowledge of historical events within a chronological and geographic context and shall include, at appropriate grade levels, instruction in American and world history, geography, economics, political science, anthropology, psychology, and sociology.

The Superintendent and Board shall adopt academic standards for history-social science which meet or exceed state content standards and describe the knowledge and skills that students shall be expected to achieve at each grade level.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop a comprehensive, sequential curriculum that is aligned with FCOE standards and is consistent with the state's curriculum framework. At each grade level, the curriculum shall integrate age-appropriate instruction designed to develop student achievement in the following areas:

- 1. Knowledge and cultural understanding, including historical, ethical, cultural, geographic, economic, and sociopolitical literacy.
- 2. Democratic understanding and civic values, including an understanding of national identity; constitutional heritage; and an individual's civic values, rights, and responsibilities.
- 3. Skills attainment and social participation, including basic study skills, critical thinking skills, and participation skills that are essential for effective citizenship.

FCOE's history-social science curriculum shall include a multicultural education component which is designed to teach students to respect and appreciate cultural diversity and different points of view while also developing their understanding of commonalities and collective experiences. The curriculum shall reflect the experiences of men and women and of various cultural, ethnic, racial, religious, and social groups and their contributions to the history, life, and culture of the local community, California, the United States, and other nations.

The Superintendent and County Board shall adopt standards-aligned instructional materials for history-social science in accordance with applicable law, Superintendent/Board policy, and administrative regulation. In addition, teachers are encouraged to supplement the curriculum through the use of biographies, original documents, diaries, letters, legends, speeches, other narrative artifacts, and literature from and about the period being studied.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide a standards-based professional development program designed to increase teachers' knowledge of adopted instructional materials and instructional strategies for teaching history-social science.

Staff shall regularly evaluate and report to the Superintendent and County Board regarding the implementation and effectiveness of the history-social science curriculum at each grade level, including, but not limited to, the extent to which the program is aligned with state standards, test results from the Standardized Testing and Reporting Program at applicable grade levels, and feedback from students, parents/guardians, and staff regarding the program.

SUBJECT: Courses of Study

The Superintendent and County Board recognize that a well-articulated sequence of courses fosters academic progress and provides for the best possible use of instructional time. Fresno County Office of Education's ("FCOE") course of study shall provide students with opportunities to attain the skills, knowledge, and abilities they need to be successful in school, college, and/or the workplace.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish processes for ensuring the articulation of courses across grade levels within FCOE and, as necessary, shall work with representatives of appropriate area districts to ensure articulation of courses between elementary and secondary schools.

Elementary Grades

The Superintendent and County Board shall adopt a course of study for elementary grades that sufficiently prepares students for the secondary school course of study.

Secondary Grades

FCOE shall offer all otherwise qualified students in secondary grades a course of study that, upon graduation from high school, prepares them to meet the requirements and prerequisites for admission to California public colleges and universities and/or attain entry-level employment skills in business or industry. (Education Code 51228)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all otherwise qualified students have a timely opportunity, within the four years before graduation, to enroll in each course necessary to fulfill the requirements and prerequisites for admission to California public colleges and universities prior to graduation from high school. (Education Code 51228)

In addition, the course of study for high school students shall include instruction in skills and knowledge for adult life and career technical training. (Education Code 51224)

The Superintendent or designee shall develop a process by which courses are submitted to the University of California (UC) for review and certification in order to meet university admission criteria. He/she shall maintain an accurate list of all current FCOE high school courses that have been so certified and shall ensure that the list is provided annually to each student in grades 9-12 and that updated lists are made readily available. (Education Code 66204)

At the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall provide written notice to parents/guardians of students in grades 9-12 that, to the extent possible, shall not exceed one page in length and that includes all of the following: (Education Code 51229)

1. A brief explanation of the college admission requirements.

- 2. A list of the current UC and California State University (CSU) web sites that help students and their families learn about college admission requirements and that list high school courses that have been certified by UC as satisfying the requirements for admission to UC and CSU.
- 3. A brief description of what career technical education is, as defined by the California Department of Education (CDE).
- 4. The Internet address for the portion of the web site of the CDE where students can learn more about career technical education.

SUBJECT: Controversial Issues

The Superintendent and County Board believe that students should have opportunities to discuss controversial issues which have political, social, or economic significance and which the students are mature enough to investigate and address. The study of a controversial issue should help students learn how to gather and organize pertinent facts, discriminate between fact and fiction, draw intelligent conclusions, and respect the opinions of others.

The Superintendent expects teachers to exercise caution and discretion when deciding whether or not a particular issue is suitable for study or discussion in any particular class. Teachers should not spend class time on any topic which they feel is not suitable for the class or related to the established course of study.

The Superintendent also expects teachers to ensure that all sides of a controversial issue are impartially presented, with adequate and appropriate factual information. Without promoting any partisan point of view, the teacher should help students separate fact from opinion and warn them against drawing conclusions from insufficient data. The teacher shall not suppress any student's view on the issue as long as its expression is not malicious or abusive toward others.

Teachers sponsoring guest speakers shall either ask them not to use their position or influence on students to forward their own religious, political, economic or social views or shall take active steps to neutralize whatever bias has been presented.

SUBJECT: Extracurricular and Cocurricular Activities

The Fresno County Superintendent of Schools ("Superintendent") and Fresno County Board of Education ("Board") recognize that extracurricular and cocurricular activities enrich the educational and social development of students and enhance students' feelings of connectedness with the schools. The Board and Superintendent shall encourage and support student participation in extracurricular and cocurricular activities without compromising the integrity and purpose of the educational program.

No extracurricular or cocurricular program or activity shall be provided or conducted separately on the basis of any actual or perceived characteristic listed as a prohibited category of discrimination in state or federal law, nor shall any student's participation in an extracurricular or cocurricular activity be required or refused on those bases. Prerequisites for student participation in extracurricular and cocurricular activities shall be limited to those that have been demonstrated to be essential to the success of the activity. (5 CCR 4925)

Any complaint alleging unlawful discrimination in Fresno County Office of Education's ("FCOE") extracurricular or cocurricular programs or activities shall be filed in accordance with BP/AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

Unless specifically authorized by law, no fee shall be charged to students for participation in extracurricular and cocurricular activities related to the educational program, including materials or equipment related to the activity.

Eligibility Requirements

To be eligible to participate in extracurricular and cocurricular activities, students in grades 7-12 must demonstrate satisfactory educational progress in the previous grading period, including, but not limited to: (Education Code 35160.5)

- 1. Maintenance of a minimum of 2.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale in all enrolled classes; and
- 2. Maintenance of minimum progress toward meeting high school graduation requirements.

The Superintendent or designee may grant ineligible students a probationary period not to exceed one semester. Students granted probationary eligibility must meet the required standards by the end of the probationary period in order to remain eligible for participation. (Education Code 35160.5)

Any decision regarding the eligibility of any child in foster care or a child of an active duty military family for extracurricular or cocurricular activities shall be made by the Superintendent or designee in accordance with Education Code 48850 and 49701.

The Superintendent or designee may revoke a student's eligibility for participation in extracurricular and cocurricular activities when the student's poor citizenship is serious enough to warrant loss of this privilege.

Student Conduct at Extracurricular/Cocurricular Events

When attending or participating in extracurricular and cocurricular activities on or off campus, FCOE students are subject to FCOE policies and regulations relating to student conduct. Students who violate FCOE policies and regulations may be subject to discipline including, but not limited to, suspension, expulsion, transfer to alternative programs, return to district of residence, or denial of participation in extracurricular or cocurricular activities in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation. When appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall notify local law enforcement.

Annual Policy Review

The Board and Superintendent shall annually review this policy and implementing regulations.

SUBJECT: Student Organizations and Equal Access

The Superintendent and County Board believe that student groups or clubs reinforce the instructional program, give students experience in civics and government, and provide social and recreational activities. Student groups also serve to honor outstanding student achievement and enhance school spirit and students' sense of belonging. Prior to meeting on school grounds, all student groups shall be authorized by the principal or designee in accordance with Superintendent/Board policy and administrative regulation.

The Superintendent and Board encourage students to pursue interests and clubs which may not directly relate to FCOE's curriculum and, to that end, has created a limited open forum.

All student-initiated groups shall be given equal access to meet on school premises during noninstructional time without regard to their religious, political, philosophical, or other speech content. The Superintendent and Board shall ensure that: (20 USC 4071, 4072)

- 1. The meeting shall be voluntary and student-initiated.
- 2. There shall be no sponsorship of the meeting by the school or staff. The term sponsorship means that school staff are promoting, leading, or participating in a meeting. The assignment of a teacher, administrator, or other school employee to a meeting for custodial purposes shall not constitute sponsorship of the meeting.
- 3. Employees of the school shall be present at religious meetings only in a nonparticipatory capacity.
- 4. The meeting shall not materially and substantially interfere with the orderly conduct of educational activities within the school.
- 5. Nonschool persons shall not direct, conduct, control, or regularly attend activities of student groups.

All student clubs or groups shall have equal access to the school media to announce meetings, including the public address system, the school newspaper, bulletin boards, and school web site. However, the principal or designee may issue a disclaimer that such activities are not school-sponsored.

All noncurriculum-related student groups shall be given equal access to meeting space, school equipment, and supplies.

SUBJECT: Assemblies and Special Events

The Superintendent and County Board believe that assemblies and special events should promote a positive school climate and be related to Fresno County Office of Education's ("FCOE") educational program. Assemblies may provide information that supplements FCOE's curriculum or may showcase student achievement in academics, athletics, music, art, drama, or other extracurricular or cocurricular activities.

The principal shall ensure that speakers and community resources featured in school assemblies and special events are carefully selected and represent a balanced viewpoint. Prospective speakers shall agree to present material of educational relevance that is appropriate to the maturity of the audience, with no statements that are obscene, vulgar, or that incite violence.

The principal shall schedule assemblies and special events so as to maximize the effectiveness of instructional time and to satisfy the requirements of law and negotiated agreements.

During the assembly, students shall show respect to all performers and speakers. Students who disrupt the program shall lose the privilege of attending the assembly and may be subject to disciplinary action.

Instruction HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

The Fresno County Superintendent of Schools ("County Superintendent") and Fresno County Board of Education ("County Board") desire that students enrolled in schools established by the County Board or the County Superintendent, and operated by the County Superintendent are prepared to obtain a high school diploma which expands their opportunities for post-secondary employment and education.

Course Requirements

To obtain a high school diploma, students shall complete 220 course credits and at least the following courses in grades 9-12, with each course being one year and ten credits, unless otherwise specified:

- 1. Four courses in English (Education Code 51225.3).
- 2. Two courses in mathematics (Education Code 51225.3).

At least one mathematics course, or a combination of the two mathematics courses, shall meet or exceed state academic content standards for Algebra I or Mathematics I. (Education Code 51224.5.) Completion of such coursework prior to grade 9 shall satisfy the Algebra I or Mathematics I requirement, but shall not exempt a student from the requirement to complete mathematics courses in grades 9-12. (Education Code 51224.5.)

- 3. Two courses in science, including biological and physical sciences. (Education Code 51225.3.)
- 4. Three courses in social studies, including United States history and geography; world history, culture, and geography; a one-semester course in American government and civics; and a one-semester course in economics. (Education Code 51225.3.)
- One course in visual or performing arts, foreign language, American Sign Language, or career-technical education ("CTE"). To be counted toward meeting graduation requirements, a CTE course shall be aligned to the CTE model curriculum standards and framework adopted by the State Board of Education. - 6. Two courses in physical education, unless the student has been otherwise exempted pursuant to other sections of the Education Code. (Education Code 51225.3.)

Because the prescribed course of study may not accommodate the needs of some students, the Board shall provide alternative means for the completion of prescribed courses in accordance with law.

The County Superintendent or designee shall exempt or waive specific course requirements for foster youth, homeless students, current and former juvenile court school students, and children of military families in accordance with Education Code 51225.1, 48645.5, and 49701.

Retroactive Diplomas

Until July 31, 2018, any student who completed grade 12 in the 2003-04 school year or a subsequent school year and has met all applicable graduation requirements other than the passage of the high school exit examination shall be granted a high school diploma. (Education Code 60851.6.)

The County Superintendent may retroactively grant a high school diploma to a former student who was interned by order of the federal government during World War II or who is an honorably discharged veteran of World War II, the Korean War, or the Vietnam War, provided that he/she was enrolled in a Fresno County Office of Education school immediately preceding the internment or military service and he/she did not receive a diploma because his/her education was interrupted due to the internment or military service. (Education Code 51430.)

The County Superintendent also may retroactively grant a diploma to a deceased former student who satisfies the above conditions. The diploma shall be received by the deceased student's next of kin. (Education Code 51430.)

In addition, the County Superintendent may grant a diploma to a veteran who entered the military service of the United States while he/she was a student in grade 12 and who had completed the first half of the work required for grade 12. (Education Code 51440.)

SUBJECT: Alternative Credits Toward Graduation

In order to meet individual student needs and encourage all students to complete their high school education, the county superintendent and the county board desire to provide flexibility in the completion of prescribed courses in accordance with law.

With the active involvement of parents/guardians, administrators, teachers, and students, the county superintendent and county board shall adopt alternative means for students to complete the prescribed course of study required for high school graduation. These alternative means shall be made available to students, parents/guardians, and the public. (Education Code 51225.3)

Students may fulfill any course requirement for graduation through the following:

1. Practical demonstration of skills and competencies (Education Code 51225.3)

Opportunities to demonstrate skills and competencies shall include, but not be limited to, challenging a course through successful completion of a Fresno County Office of Education-developed examination which covers course objectives. The Fresno County Office of Education shall not use results from the General Educational Development test or other state or national tests for this purpose.

- 2. Supervised work experience or other outside school experience in accordance with Education Code 51760.3 and 5 CCR 1635. (Education Code 51225.3)
- 3. Career technical education classes offered in high school. (Education Code 51225.3)
- 4. Courses offered by regional occupational centers or programs. (Education Code 51225.3)
- 5. Interdisciplinary study. (Education Code 51225.3)
- 6. Independent study. (Education Code 51225.3)
- 7. Private instruction in accordance with 5 CCR 1631.
- 8. Credit earned at a post secondary institute and correspondence instruction from a California university or college accredited for teacher training in accordance with 5 CCR 1633. (Education Code 48800, 512235, 51740-51741)
- 9. Military service and training in accordance with 5 CCR 1634. (Education Code 51440)
- 10. To satisfy the Fresno County Office of Education's driver education and training requirement, a program approved by the Department of Motor Vehicles which offers driver education and behind-the-wheel instruction through a driving school or licensed independent

driving instructor in accordance with Vehicle Code 12814.6.

- 11. For credit toward the Fresno County Office of Education's physical education requirement, participation in Fresno County Office of Education interscholastic athletic programs carried on wholly or partially after regular school hours. (Education Code 51242) A student shall be eligible to satisfy graduation requirements in this manner only if the interscholastic program entails a comparable amount of time and physical activity.
- 12. For credit toward the Fresno County Office of Education's foreign language requirement, foreign language studies successfully completed in a private school in accordance with 5 CCR 1632. (Education Code 51243)

Upon receiving advance, written application by the student or his/her parent/guardian, the county superintendent or designee shall determine whether completion of the proposed alternative means would satisfy course requirements for graduation and what documentation shall be required, if any, to verify the student's successful completion. The county superintendent or designee shall make the final determination as to whether the student's completion of an alternative means is sufficient to satisfy the Fresno County Office of Education's graduation requirements.

As appropriate, the county superintendent or designee shall determine the grade to be assigned to students for the completion of any of the above alternative means. When a grade is assigned by a private school, or other educational institution for completion of coursework, that same grade shall be awarded by the Fresno County Office of Education provided that the Superintendent or designee has determined the alternative course to be substantially equivalent to a Fresno County Office of Education course.

The county superintendent and the county board desire that every student have the opportunity to earn a high school diploma through successful completion of class work and examination. However, when a student is unable to do so, the county superintendent and the county board encourage completion of an alternative program that allows him/her to obtain an equivalent certificate.

Eligible persons may obtain a certificate of proficiency or a high school equivalency certificate in accordance with law, Superintendent/Board policy and administrative regulation.

The county superintendent or designee shall make information available to interested persons regarding the eligibility and examination requirements of each program.

To determine whether a student transferring into a Fresno County Office of Education school has met Fresno County Office of Education course requirements, the county superintendent or designee shall establish procedures to evaluate the comparability of courses and/or student's understanding of course content. Such procedures shall include methods for determining the number of years of school attendance, the specific courses completed by the student, and the value of credits earned.

The Fresno County Office of Education shall accept for credit full or partial coursework satisfactorily completed by students while attending a public school, a juvenile court school, or nonpublic nonsectarian school or agency. (Education Code 48645.5)

Pending evaluation of the transferring student's academic performance, the student shall be placed at the grade level reached prior to enrollment. Within 30 days of enrollment, the county superintendent or designee shall complete the evaluation and determine the student's appropriate grade placement.

SUBJECT: Differential Graduation and Competency Standards for Students with Disabilities PAGE: 1 of 2

The county superintendent and the county board recognize that students with disabilities are entitled to a course of study that provides them with a free appropriate public education (FAPE) and that modifications to the Fresno County Office of Education's regular course may be needed on an individualized basis to provide FAPE. In accordance with law, each student's individualized education program (IEP) team shall determine the appropriate goals, as well as any appropriate individual accommodations necessary for measuring the academic achievement and functional performance of the student on state and districtwide assessments.

Certificate of Educational Achievement or Completion

Instead of a high school diploma, a student with disabilities may be awarded a certificate or document of educational achievement or completion if the student has met one of the following requirements: (Education Code 56390)

- 1. Satisfactorily completed a prescribed alternative course of study approved by the county board or the district with jurisdiction over the student as identified in his/her IEP.
- 2. Satisfactorily met his/her IEP goals and objectives during high school as determined by the IEP team.
- 3. Satisfactorily attended high school, participated in the instruction as prescribed in his/her IEP, and met the objectives of the statement of transition services.

A student with disabilities who meets any of the criteria specified above shall be eligible to participate in any graduation ceremony and any school activity related to graduation in which a graduating student of similar age without disabilities would be eligible to participate. (Education Code 56391)

SUBJECT: Homework/Makeup Work

The Superintendent and County Board recognize that homework contributes toward building responsibility, self-discipline, and life-long learning habits, and that time spent on homework directly influences a student's ability to meet academic standards. The Superintendent and Board expect students, parents/guardians, and staff to view homework as a routine and important part of students' daily lives.

Although it is the student's responsibility to do most homework assignments independently, the Board expects teachers at all grade levels to use parents/guardians as a contributing resource. When students repeatedly fail to do their homework, parents/guardians shall be notified and asked to contact the teacher.

To further support students' homework efforts, the Superintendent or designee may establish and maintain telephone help lines and/or after-school centers where students can receive encouragement and clarification about homework assignments from teachers, volunteers, and/or more advanced students who are performing community service.

Makeup Work

Students who miss school work because of an excused absence shall be given the opportunity to complete all assignments and tests that can be reasonably provided. As determined by the teacher, the assignments and tests shall be reasonably equivalent to, but not necessarily identical to, the assignments and tests missed during the absence. Students shall receive full credit for work satisfactorily completed within a reasonable period of time. (Education Code 48205)

Students who miss school work because of unexcused absences may be given the opportunity to make up missed work for full or reduced credit. Teachers shall assign such makeup work as necessary to ensure academic progress, not as a punitive measure.

SUBJECT: Challenging Courses by Examination

The Superintendent and County Board recognize that there is a need to allow high school students to challenge a given course by examination for grade and credit in order to accelerate progress towards graduation and to achieve more flexibility in the selection of electives. The examination shall be comprehensive and cover all course objectives. Successful completion of the examination shall be at a level which indicates mastery of the content and/or reasonable chance for success in the next higher course.

SUBJECT: Selection and Evaluation of Instructional Materials

The Fresno County Superintendent of Schools ("Superintendent") and Fresno County Board of Education ("Board") desire that Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE") instructional materials, as a whole, present a broad spectrum of knowledge and viewpoints, reflect society's diversity, and enhance the use of multiple teaching strategies and technologies. The Superintendent and Board shall adopt instructional materials based on a determination that such materials are an effective learning resource to help students achieve grade-level competency and that the materials meet criteria specified in law. Textbooks, technology-based materials, and other educational materials shall be aligned with academic content standards and FCOE's curriculum to ensure that they effectively support FCOE's adopted courses of study.

The Superintendent and Board shall select instructional materials for use in grades K-8 that have been approved by the State Board of Education ("SBE") or have otherwise been determined to be aligned with the state academic content standards adopted pursuant to Education Code 60605 or the Common Core Standards adopted pursuant to Education Code 60605.8. (Education Code 60200, 60210)

The Superintendent and Board shall adopt instructional materials for grades 9-12 upon determining that the materials meet the criteria specified in law and administrative regulation. (Education Code 60400)

FCOE's priority in the selection of instructional materials is to ensure that all students are provided with standards-aligned instructional materials in the core curriculum areas of English/language arts, mathematics, science, and history-social science.

Review Process

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a process by which instructional materials shall be reviewed for recommendation. Toward that end, he/she may establish an instructional materials review committee to evaluate and recommend instructional materials.

The review process shall involve teachers in a substantial manner and shall encourage the participation of parents/guardians and community members. (Education Code 60002)

In addition, the instructional materials review committee may include administrators, other staff who have subject-matter expertise, and students as appropriate.

If FCOE chooses to use instructional materials for grades K-8 that have not been adopted by the SBE, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that a majority of the participants in the review process are classroom teachers who are assigned to the subject area or grade level of the materials. (Education Code 60210)

Individuals who participate in the selection or review of instructional materials shall not have a conflict of interest, as defined in administrative regulation, in the materials being reviewed.

The committee shall review instructional materials using criteria provided in law and administrative regulation, and shall provide the Superintendent and Board with documentation supporting its recommendations.

All recommended instructional materials shall be available for public inspection at FCOE's Van Ness site.

FCOE may pilot instructional materials, using a representative sample of classrooms for a specified period of time during a school year, in order to determine how well the materials support curricular goals and academic standards. Feedback from teachers piloting the materials shall be made available to the Superintendent and Board before the materials are adopted.

Public Hearing on Sufficiency of Instructional Materials

The Board shall annually conduct one or more public hearings on the sufficiency of FCOE's textbooks and other instructional materials. (Education Code 60119)

The hearing shall be held on or before the end of the eighth week from the first day students attend school for that year. (Education Code 60119)

The Superintendent and Board encourage participation by parents/guardians, teachers, interested community members, and bargaining unit leaders at the hearing. Ten days prior to the hearing, the Superintendent or designee shall post a notice in three public places within FCOE's jurisdiction containing the time, place, and purpose of the hearing. The hearing shall not take place during or immediately following school hours. (Education Code 60119)

At the hearing, the Superintendent and Board shall determine, through a resolution, whether each student in each school, including each English learner, has sufficient textbooks or instructional materials which are aligned to the state content standards adopted pursuant to Education Code 60605 or the Common Core Standards adopted pursuant to Education Code 60605.8 and which are consistent with the content and cycles of the state's curriculum frameworks. Sufficiency of instructional materials shall be determined in each of the following subjects: (Education Code 60119)

- 1. Mathematics;
- 2, Science;
- 3. History-social science;
- 4. English language arts, including the English language development component of an adopted program;
- 5. Foreign language; and

6. Health.

The Superintendent and Board shall also determine the availability of science laboratory equipment, as applicable to science laboratory courses offered in grades 9-12. (Education Code 60119)

In making these determinations, the Superintendent and Board shall consider whether each student has sufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. However, this does not require that each student have two sets of materials. The materials may be in a digital format as long as each student, at a minimum, has and can access the same materials in the class and to take home as all other students in the same class or course and has the ability to use and access them at home. However, the materials shall not be considered sufficient if they are photocopied sheets from only a portion of a textbook or instructional materials copied to address a shortage. (Education Code 60119)

The Superintendent and Board shall also make a determination that all students who are enrolled in the same course have "identical" standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials from the same adoption cycle, as defined in Education Code 1240.3 and 60119. (Education Code 1240.3, 42605)

However, FCOE may purchase the newest adopted instructional materials for students in FCOE schools ranked in deciles 1-3 of the base Academic Performance Index in any one of the past three school years without necessarily purchasing these materials for use in other programs or schools. (Education Code 1240.3)

If the Superintendent and Board determine that there are insufficient textbooks or instructional materials, they shall provide information to classroom teachers and to the public setting forth, for each school in which an insufficiency exists, the percentage of students who lack sufficient standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials in each subject area and the reasons that each student does not have sufficient textbooks or instructional materials. They shall take any action, except an action that would require reimbursement by the Commission of State Mandates, to ensure that each student has sufficient materials within two months of the beginning of the school year in which the determination is made. (Education Code 60119)

Complaints

Complaints concerning instructional materials shall be handled in accordance with law, Superintendent/Board policy, and administrative regulation.

SUBJECT: Supplementary Instructional Materials

The Fresno County Superintendent of Schools ("Superintendent") and the Fresno County Board of Education ("Board") encourage the use of supplementary instructional materials to enrich the curriculum and enhance student learning. Such materials shall be aligned with Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE") goals, curriculum objectives, and academic standards and shall supplement and not supplant the use of Board-adopted basic instructional materials that serve as the primary learning resources.

Supplementary instructional materials include, but are not limited to, instructional materials that are designed to serve one or more of the following purposes: (Education Code 60010)

- 1. To provide more complete coverage of one or more subjects included in a given course.
- 2. To meet the various learning ability levels of students in a given age group or grade level.
- 3. To meet the diverse educational needs of students with a language disability in a given age group or grade level.
- 4. To meet the diverse educational needs of students reflective of a condition of cultural pluralism.
- 5. To use current, relevant technology that further engages interactive learning in the classroom and beyond.

Supplementary instructional materials may be selected by the Superintendent or designee, school administrators, or teachers, as applicable, and obtained through donations to FCOE and/or available funding sources designated for these purposes.

As appropriate, supplementary instructional materials shall meet the criteria developed for the selection and evaluation of basic instructional materials as described in AR 6161.1 - Selection and Evaluation of Instructional Materials. Supplementary instructional materials shall be directly related to the course of study in which they are being used and shall be appropriate for the age and maturity level of the students.

The use or reproduction of supplementary instructional materials shall be in accordance with federal copyright law.

Supplementary Materials Aligned with Common Core Standards

To prepare students to achieve the Common Core Standards in English language arts and mathematics and the English language development standards, as applicable, the Superintendent

and Board may select supplementary instructional materials from the lists of materials determined by the State Board of Education ("SBE") to be aligned with those standards. (Education Code 60605.86-60605.88)

The Superintendent and Board may approve supplementary instructional materials that are not on the lists approved by the SBE but which are aligned with the Common Core Standards provided that the materials comply with the evaluation criteria established by the SBE and Education Code 60050, 60060-60062, and 60226. The Superintendent and Board shall select content review experts who possess the qualifications specified in law to review and recommend such supplementary materials. The majority of the content review experts shall be teachers who are credentialed and/or authorized in the subject area they are reviewing and the remainder shall include appropriate persons from postsecondary educational institutions, school and FCOE curriculum administrators, and other persons who are knowledgeable in the subject area. (Education Code 60605.86-60605.88)

The Superintendent and County Board recognize that instructional materials are an expensive resource and that each student is entitled to sufficient instructional materials in accordance with law. Instructional materials provided for use by students remain the property of Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE"). Students are responsible for returning borrowed materials in good condition, with no more wear and tear than usually results from normal use.

When materials are lost or so damaged that they are no longer usable, the student shall be immediately issued a replacement material. However, students or parents/guardians shall be responsible for reparation equal to the current replacement cost of the materials. When materials are damaged but still usable, the Superintendent or designee shall determine an appropriate charge.

If it can be demonstrated to the Superintendent or designee's satisfaction that the student has taken all reasonable precautions to safeguard instructional materials issued to him/her, the Superintendent or designee may excuse the student or parent/guardian from payment of reparation.

If reparation is not excused and not paid by the student or parent/guardian, FCOE may withhold the student's grades, diploma, and transcripts in accordance with law, policy, and administrative regulation.

SUBJECT: Student Assessment

The Superintendent and County Board recognize that student assessments are an important instructional and accountability tool. Assessment data shall be used to help determine individual student's progress, mastery of academic standards, appropriate placement in Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE") programs, and/or eligibility for graduation. In addition, program effectiveness and staff evaluations shall, as appropriate, be based in part on indicators of student achievement.

To obtain the most accurate evaluation of student performance, FCOE shall use a variety of measures, including FCOE, state, and/or national assessments. As appropriate, assessment results shall be disaggregated by student subgroup, classroom, grade level, or school site to allow for critical analysis of student needs.

In selecting or developing a FCOE assessment, the Superintendent or designee shall examine evidence of its reliability, its validity for the intended purpose and for various student populations, and the extent to which it corresponds to the material that is being taught.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that assessments are administered in accordance with law and the test publisher's directions and that test administration procedures are fair and equitable for all students.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide professional development to assist teachers and paraprofessionals in interpreting and using assessment data to improve student performance and the instructional program.

When results of student assessments are published by the state, the Superintendent or designee may provide supplementary information to assist parents/guardians and the local community in interpreting test results and evaluating school performance.

Individual Record of Accomplishment

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each student, by the end of grade 12, has an individual record of accomplishment that includes the following: (Education Code 60607)

- 1. The results of the achievement test administered under the Standardized Testing and Reporting Program pursuant to Education Code 60640-60649.
- 2. The results of any end-of-course examinations taken.
- 3. The results of any vocational education certification examinations taken.

No individual record of accomplishment shall be released to any person, other than the student's parent/guardian or a teacher, counselor, or administrator directly involved with the student, without the written consent of the student's parent/guardian, or the student if he/she is an adult or emancipated minor. The student or his/her parent/guardian may authorize the release of the record of accomplishment to a postsecondary educational institution for the purposes of credit, placement, or admission. SUBJECT: Standardized Testing and Reporting Program

The Superintendent and County Board desire to use the results of the achievement tests to evaluate the performance of students in achieving state academic standards and in comparison to the performance of students across the state. The Superintendent or designee shall administer mandatory student assessments within the state Standardized Testing and Reporting ("STAR") Program as required by law and in accordance with Superintendent and County Board policy and administrative regulation.

The Superintendent and County Board strongly encourage all students at the applicable grade levels to participate in the STAR assessments in order to maximize the usefulness of the data and enable the Fresno County Office of Education to meet participation levels required for state and federal accountability systems. The Superintendent or designee shall notify students and parents/guardians about the importance of these assessments and shall develop strategies to encourage student participation. Students shall be exempted from participation only in accordance with law and administrative regulation.

The Superintendent and County Board shall annually examine STAR results by school, grade level, and student subgroup in each school's ranking on the statewide Academic Performance Index. If the STAR performance level of the school is below established expectations, the Superintendent may conduct an assessment of the reasons for the performance results and may adopt a performance improvement plan in accordance with Education Code 52056.

SUBJECT: Test Integrity/Test Preparation

The Superintendent and County Board desire to protect the integrity of student assessment processes in order to obtain an accurate assessment of student achievement in Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE") programs and maintain accountability to the community and state. Students and staff are expected to maintain a high level of integrity in the completion and handling of student assessments.

Test Integrity

In the administration of standardized tests, staff shall not:

- 1. Provide inappropriate test preparation;
- 2. Modify test administration procedures, except as allowed by law;
- 3. Provide inappropriate assistance to students during test administration;
- 4. Change or fill in answers on student answer sheets;
- 5. Provide inaccurate data on student header sheets;
- 6. Discourage or exclude certain students from taking the test; or
- 7. Engage in any other practice to artificially raise student scores without actually improving underlying student achievement.

Preparation for State Tests

Staff may prepare students for assessments by providing instruction in the content specified in state and the FCOE academic standards and teaching general test-taking strategies that are designed to improve their performance on tests included in the Standardized Testing and Reporting program, the California High School Exit Examination, or the California English Language Development Test. Such strategies may include, but not be limited to, using time efficiently, understanding directions, placing answers correctly on answer sheets, checking answers, problem-solving tactics, and exposing students to various test formats.

The Superintendent or designee, program administrators, and teachers shall not implement any program of specific preparation for the statewide student assessment program or a particular test used within that program. (Education Code 60611)

Practice tests provided by the publisher of the state achievement test may be used for the limited purpose of familiarizing students with the use of scanable test booklets or answer sheets and the format of test items. No alternate or parallel form of the test shall be administered or used. (5 CCR 854)

Staff shall not use released test questions to develop practice tests that mimic or parallel state tests, or for teaching or drilling students only on the released items.

Investigation and Consequences of Testing Irregularities

Reports of student cheating on assessments shall be submitted to the program administrator or designee for investigation. Students found to have cheated on assessments shall be subject to disciplinary procedures in accordance with Superintendent/Board policy and administrative regulations.

A staff member found to have committed testing irregularities shall be subject to discipline in accordance with law, where applicable, collective bargaining agreements, Superintendent/Board policy, and administrative regulations.

The Superintendent or designee shall immediately investigate with due diligence any reports of inappropriate test preparation or other testing irregularities.

If the Superintendent or designee is made aware of a testing irregularity on state assessments, he/she shall report the irregularity to the California Department of Education.

SUBJECT: Use of Copyrighted Materials

The Superintendent and County Board recognize the importance of ensuring that Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE") complies with federal law regarding copyrights. FCOE staff and students are expected to maintain the highest ethical standards in using copyrighted materials.

When selecting appropriate supplementary instructional materials, it is each staff member's responsibility to adhere to the provisions of federal copyright law, Superintendent/Board policy, and administrative regulation. FCOE shall not be responsible for any violation of copyright laws by its staff or students. If a staff member is uncertain as to whether reproducing or using copyrighted material complies with the law, he/she shall contact the Superintendent or designee for clarification and assistance. At no time shall it be necessary for a FCOE employee to violate copyright laws in order to perform his/her duties.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that FCOE observes all publisher licensing agreements between vendors and FCOE, including monitoring the number of users permitted by an agreement. Unless the applicable licensing agreement authorizes multiple users of a single program, FCOE shall not make multiple copies of a computer program or software. Staff members shall take reasonable precautions to prevent copying or the use of unauthorized copies on FCOE equipment.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that staff and students receive information and training about copyright laws and the penalties for violating such laws.

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The Superintendent and County Board recognize that school library media centers support the educational program by providing access to a variety of informational resources. Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE") desires to provide library media centers with up-to-date books, reference materials, and electronic information resources necessary to promote literacy, support students in achieving academic standards, and encourage students to become lifelong learners.

School libraries shall be open for use by students and teachers during the school day. (Education Code 18103) Any school library open outside the school day, such as evenings and/or Saturdays, shall be under the supervision of a certificated employee. (Education Code 18103)

FCOE libraries may provide: (5 CCR 16040)

- 1. Library instruction to students that enables them to become proficient users of library resources.
- 2. Information to teachers and administrators concerning sources and availability of instructional materials that will aid in the development of school curriculum, and, in cooperation with classroom teachers, the development of instructional units and activities using library resources.
- 3. Assistance to teachers and students in the evaluation, selection, production, and uses of instructional materials.
- 4. A collection of materials and resources that support the curriculum and are appropriate for user needs.
- 5. Assistance to teachers, administrators, and other school staff members in becoming knowledgeable about appropriate uses of library media services, materials, and equipment.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures for the selection and evaluation of library materials.

Library Plans

Whenever FCOE receives state funding for school and library improvement pursuant to Education Code 41570-41573, the school site council shall develop a single plan for student achievement which incorporates a plan for school libraries. (Education Code 41572)

In developing the plan, the Superintendent or designee is encouraged to consult with school library media teachers, classroom teachers, administrators, parents/guardians, and students as appropriate in the development of the plan.

The FCOE library plan shall describe FCOE's vision and goals for its libraries and action steps including how funds will be distributed to sites. As appropriate, the plan may also address staffing, facilities, selection and evaluation of materials, prioritization of needs, and other related matters.

SUBJECT: Student Use of Technology

The Superintendent and County Board intend that technological resources provided by Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE") be used in a safe, responsible, and proper manner in support of the instructional program and for the advancement of student learning.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify students and parents/guardians about authorized uses of FCOE computers, user obligations and responsibilities, and consequences for unauthorized use and/or unlawful activities in accordance with FCOE regulations and FCOE's Acceptable Use Agreement.

Before a student is authorized to use FCOE's technological resources, the student and his/her parent/guardian shall sign and return the Acceptable Use Agreement specifying user obligations and responsibilities. In that agreement, the student and his/her parent/guardian shall agree not to hold FCOE or any FCOE staff responsible for the failure of any technology protection measures, violations of copyright restrictions, or user mistakes or negligence. They shall also agree to indemnify and hold harmless FCOE and FCOE personnel for any damages or costs incurred.

The Superintendent or designee, with input from students and appropriate staff, shall regularly review and update this policy, the accompanying administrative regulation, and other relevant procedures to enhance the safety and security of students using FCOE's technological resources and to help ensure that FCOE adapts to changing technologies and circumstances.

Use of FCOE Computers for Online Services/Internet Access

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all FCOE computers with Internet access have a technology protection measure that blocks or filters Internet access to visual depictions that are obscene, child pornography, or harmful to minors and that the operation of such measures is enforced. (20 USC 6777, 47 USC 254)

To reinforce these measures, the Superintendent or designee shall implement rules and procedures designed to restrict students' access to harmful or inappropriate matter on the Internet and to ensure that students do not engage in unauthorized or unlawful online activities. Staff shall supervise students while they are using online services and may have teacher aides, student aides, and volunteers assist in this supervision.

The Superintendent or designee also shall establish regulations to address the safety and security of students and student information when using email and other forms of direct electronic communication.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide age-appropriate instruction regarding safe and appropriate behavior on social networking sites and other Internet services. Such instruction shall include, but not be limited to, the dangers of posting personal information online,

misrepresentation by online predators, how to report inappropriate or offensive content or threats, behaviors that constitute cyberbullying, and how to respond when subjected to cyberbullying.

Student use of FCOE computers to access social networking sites is prohibited. To the extent possible, the Superintendent or designee shall block access to such sites on FCOE computers with Internet access.

SUBJECT: Guidance/Counseling Services

The Superintendent and County Board recognize that a comprehensive counseling program can help promote academic achievement and serve the diverse needs of all students. Counseling staff shall be available to meet with students to discuss academic, social, or personal difficulties, as well as other issues that may impact student learning.

Academic and Career Counseling

Fresno County Office of Education's ("FCOE") academic counseling program shall help students establish immediate and long-range educational plans, achieve academic standards, prepare for the high school exit examination, and complete the required curriculum in accordance with their individual needs, abilities, and interests. Insofar as possible, parents/guardians shall be included when making educational plans.

Counseling staff shall help all students plan for the future and become aware of their career potential. Academic planning for higher education shall include information about courses needed for admission to colleges and universities, standardized admission tests, financial aid, and scholarships.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish and maintain a program of guidance, placement, and follow-up for all FCOE students subject to compulsory continuation education. (Education Code 48431)

Colleges and prospective employers, including military recruiters, shall have the same access to students for recruiting purposes. (20 USC 7908; 10 USC 503; Education Code 49603)

Supplemental School Counseling Program for Students in Grades 7-12

The Board-adopted supplemental school counseling program for students in grades 7-12 shall be delivered by personnel who hold a valid pupil personnel services credential. FCOE's program shall provide for: (Education Code 52378)

- 1. An individualized review of academic and deportment records.
- 2. An individualized review of the career goals of students, and the available academic and career technical education opportunities and community and workplace experiences available to students to support their goals.
- 3. An opportunity for a counselor to meet with students and, if practicable the parent/guardian, to discuss available educational and career technical options.
- 4. Specialized counseling services for students identified as at risk.

Personal Counseling

Counseling staff shall identify and work with students whose personal problems may prevent them from reaching their potential. As appropriate, students shall be informed about agencies that offer qualified professional assistance with substance abuse, physical or emotional problems, or other personal problems.

Counselors shall respect student confidentiality as appropriate and shall consult with the Superintendent or designee or with the district's legal counsel whenever unsure of how to respond to a student's personal problem. Parent/guardian consultation and consent shall be obtained as appropriate.

Crisis Counseling

The Board recognizes the need for a prompt and effective response when students are confronted with a traumatic incident. School counselors shall assist in the development of the comprehensive school safety plan, emergency and disaster preparedness plan, and other prevention and intervention practices designed to assist students before and after a crisis.

In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall identify crisis counseling resources to train FCOE staff in appropriate response techniques and/or to directly help students cope with such crises if they occur.

Early identification and intervention plans shall be developed to help identify those students who may be at risk for violence so that support may be provided before they engage in violent or disruptive behavior.

INSTRUCTION

Identification Of Individuals With Exceptional Needs

The County Superintendent and the County Board recognizes that each individual is unique, and that while for most pupils the conventional school program is appropriate, a substantial number of pupils have exceptional needs which should be served.

The County Board and the County Superintendent, as RLA administrator, will therefore require the districts to develop and implement regulations and procedures which will serve to seek out all individuals with exceptional needs residing in the County and who are eligible for "free appropriate public education."

The County is also required to develop a plan for the assessment and evaluation of the exceptional needs of each individual identified in the search. The assessment plan shall be a description in ordinary language of the procedures, tests, records, or reports proposed for use in the assessment of the individual.

The Superintendent or County Board encourage the collaboration of parents/guardians, teachers, resource personnel, administrators and students in evaluating the strengths and needs of students having academic, attendance, or behavioral difficulties, and in identifying strategies and programs that may assist the students. The Superintendent or designee shall establish student success teams as needed to address individual student's needs.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a process for initiating referrals of students to the student success team.

Each student success team shall develop intervention strategies to assist the student. Such strategies may include changes in program placement or instructional methods, recommendation of supplemental educational services, parent involvement strategies, behavioral interventions, discipline, referrals to other agencies or resources, and/or other appropriate interventions.

The student success team shall monitor the student's progress, evaluate the extent to which the recommended strategies have been implemented, and develop additional interventions as needed.

SUBJECT: Identification and Education under Section 504

The Superintendent and County Board recognize the need to identify and evaluate children with disabilities in order to provide them with the services required by law.

The Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE") shall provide a free appropriate public education to students who attend FCOE schools and who are classified as disabled under Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Such students shall receive regular or special education and related aids and services designed to meet their individual educational needs as adequately as the needs of nondisabled students are met. (34 CFR 104.33)

SUBJECT: Title I Programs

In order to improve the academic achievement of students from economically disadvantaged families, the Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE") shall use federal Title I funds to provide supplementary services that reinforce the core curriculum and assist students in attaining proficiency on state academic standards and assessments.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide technical assistance and support to any school participating in the Title I program, including consultation in the development and implementation of school plans and activities. (20 USC 6312)

FCOE and each school receiving Title I funds shall develop a written parent involvement policy in accordance with 20 USC 6318.

Local Educational Agency Plan

The Superintendent or designee shall consult with teachers, principals, administrators, other appropriate school personnel, and parents/guardians of participating students in the development, periodic review, and, as necessary, the revision of a local educational agency ("LEA") plan. The plan and any revisions shall be submitted to the County Board for approval. (20 USC 6312)

The plan shall address the components specified in 20 USC 6312, which describe the assessments, strategies, and services FCOE will use to help low-achieving students meet challenging academic standards.

The initial plan shall be submitted to the California Department of Education (CDE) and approved by the State Board of Education. Subsequent revisions of the plan shall be kept on file with the Deputy Superintendent of Educational Services.

Comparability of Services

State and local funds used in schools receiving Title I funds shall provide services that, taken as a whole, are at least comparable to services in schools that are not receiving Title I funds or, if all FCOE schools are receiving Title I funds, that are substantially comparable in each school. Comparability may be determined on a school-by-school basis or by grade span. (20 USC 6321)

To demonstrate comparability of services among FCOE schools:

- 1. The Superintendent shall adopt and implement an FCOE salary schedule.
- 2. The ratio of students to teachers, administrators, and other staff at each Title I school shall not exceed 110 percent of the average ratio across non-Title I schools.

- 3. Salary expenditures at each Title I school shall be no less than 90 percent of the average salary expenditure across non-Title I schools.
- 4. All FCOE schools shall be provided with the same level of base funding per student for curriculum and instructional materials.
- 5. The Superintendent or designee shall maintain records of the quantity and quality of instructional materials and equipment at each school.

In determining comparability, FCOE shall not include staff salary differentials for years of employment. FCOE also may exclude unpredictable changes in student enrollment or personnel assignments that occur after the beginning of the school year, state and local funds expended for language instruction educational programs, state and local funds expended for the excess costs of providing services to disabled students, and supplemental state or local funds expended in any school attendance area or school for programs that specifically meet the intent and purposes of Title I. (20 USC 6321)

At the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall measure comparability in accordance with the above criteria and maintain records documenting FCOE's compliance. If any instances of noncomparability are identified, the Superintendent or designee shall promptly implement adjustments as needed to ensure comparability.

Program Evaluation

FCOE shall use state assessment results and other available measures or indicators to annually determine whether each participating school is making adequate yearly progress toward ensuring that all students meet the state's proficient level of achievement on state assessments. (20 USC 6316)

SUBJECT: Concurrent Enrollment in College Courses

The Superintendent and County Board desire to provide opportunities for eligible students to enroll concurrently in courses offered at postsecondary institutions in order to foster individual student achievement, increase opportunities for students to complete college preparatory course requirements or career technical education preparation, and prepare students for a smooth transition into college by providing exposure to the collegiate environment.

When it is determined that the postsecondary course in which the student intends to enroll is substantially equivalent to a course provided by Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE"), the student may receive credit toward high school graduation requirements in addition to credit received from the college.

Approval of Concurrent Enrollment

The Superintendent or designee may approve a limited number of students of any age or grade level to apply for part-time or full-time concurrent enrollment in a community college or four-year college when it is determined to be in the student's best interest and the student is adequately prepared for such coursework.

Upon recommendation of the site administrator and with parent/guardian consent, the Superintendent may authorize a student to apply for attendance at a community college during any session or term as a special part-time or full-time student and to undertake one or more courses of instruction offered at the community college level. (Education Code 48800)

Within the enrollment limits and exceptions allowed by law, the site administrator may recommend a student for community college summer session if that student demonstrates adequate preparation in the discipline to be studied and exhausts all opportunities to enroll in an equivalent course, if any, at his/her school of attendance. (Education Code 48800)

Any student's parent/guardian may petition the Superintendent to authorize full-time attendance at a community college if he/she believes the student would benefit from advanced scholastic or career technical work that would be available. (Education Code 48800.5)

If the Superintendent or designee denies a request for special part-time or full-time enrollment at a community college for a student who is identified as highly gifted and talented as defined in Education Code 52201, the Superintendent shall issue his/her written recommendation and the reasons for the denial within 60 days. The written recommendation and denial shall be issued no later than 30 days after the request has been submitted. (Education Code 48800, 48800.5)

Program Evaluation

The Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board regarding the number of FCOE students participating in the concurrent enrollment option, their success in completing in postsecondary courses, and any impact on their achievement in FCOE courses.

SUBJECT: Education of Children of Military Families

The Superintendent and County Board recognize the challenges to the academic success of children of military families caused by the frequent moves or deployments of their parents/guardians in fulfillment of military service. In accordance with law, the Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE") shall provide such students with academic resources, services, and opportunities for extracurricular and enrichment activities that are available to all FCOE students.

In making decisions about children of military families, including decisions regarding their enrollment, placement, eligibility for extracurricular activities, or waiver of any graduation requirement, the Superintendent or designee shall be flexible to the extent permitted by law and FCOE policy.

The Superintendent or designee shall work with parents/guardians and shall collaborate with local, state, and other agencies within and outside the state to facilitate the transition of children of military families into and out of FCOE programs.

SUBJECT: Education for English Language Learners

The Fresno County Superintendent of Schools ("Superintendent") and Fresno County Board of Education ("Board") intend to provide English learners with challenging curriculum and instruction that develop proficiency in English as rapidly and effectively as possible while facilitating student achievement in the Fresno County Office of Education's ("FCOE") regular course of study.

English learners shall be provided English language development instruction targeted to their English proficiency level and aligned with state content standards. FCOE's program shall be based on sound instructional theory and adequately supported in order to assist students in accessing the full educational program.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all staff employed to teach English learners possess the appropriate authorization from the Commission on Teacher Credentialing.

The Superintendent or designee shall encourage parent and community involvement in the development, implementation, and evaluation of English language development programs. In addition, to support students' English language development, the Superintendent or designee may provide an adult literacy training program for parents/guardians and community members that leads to English fluency.

Identification and Assessment

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain procedures which provide for the accurate identification of English learners and an assessment of their proficiency and needs in the areas of listening, speaking, reading, and writing in English.

Once identified as an English learner, a student shall be annually assessed for language proficiency until he/she is reclassified based on criteria specified in administrative regulation.

Placement of English Learners

Students who are English learners shall be educated through "sheltered English immersion" or "structured English immersion," as defined in law and administrative regulation, during a temporary transition period not normally intended to exceed one year. Nearly all of the classroom instruction in FCOE's structured English immersion program shall be in English, but with the curriculum and presentation designed for students who are learning the language. (Education Code 305-306)

For purposes of determining the amount of instruction conducted in English in the structured English immersion classroom, "nearly all" shall be defined as follows:

When an English learner has acquired a reasonable level of English proficiency as measured by any of the state-designated assessments approved by the California Department of Education, any FCOE assessments, and/or other criteria adopted by the Board, he/she shall be transferred from a structured English immersion classroom to an English language mainstream classroom in which the instruction is "overwhelmingly" in English. (Education Code 305-306; 5 CCR 11301)

An English learner has acquired a "reasonable level of English proficiency" when he/she has achieved an overall early intermediate level on the California English language mainstream classroom. (5 CCR 11301)

At any time during the school year, the parent/guardian of an English learner may have his/her child moved into an English language mainstream program. (5 CCR 11301)

Parental Exception Waivers

When allowed by law, the parent/guardian of an English learner may submit a request that his/her child be exempted from placement in a structured English immersion program and instead be placed in a class where he/she is taught English and other subjects through bilingual education techniques or other generally recognized educational methodologies permitted by law. (Education Code 310-311)

Each waiver request shall be considered on its individual merits with deference given to parental preference for student placement.

A waiver request shall be granted in accordance with law unless the site administrator and educational staff have determined that an alternative program would not be better suited to the student's overall educational development. (5 CCR 11309)

Program Evaluation

To evaluate the effectiveness of FCOE's educational program for English learners, the Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board, at least annually, regarding the progress of English learners towards proficiency in English, the number and percentage of English learners reclassified as fluent English proficient, the number and percentage of English learners who are or are at risk of being classified as long-term English learners, the achievement of English learners on standards-based tests in core curricular areas, and a comparison of current data with data from at least the previous year. The Superintendent or designee also shall provide the Board with regular reports from any FCOE English learner advisory committees.

The Superintendent and County Board desire to provide a comprehensive career technical education ("CTE") program in grades 7-12 which integrates core academic instruction with technical and occupational instruction in order to increase student achievement, graduation rates, and readiness for postsecondary education and employment. The Fresno County Office of Education's ("FCOE") CTE program shall be designed to help students develop the academic, career, and technical skills needed to succeed in a knowledge- and skills-based economy. The program shall include a rigorous academic component and provide students with a strong experience and understanding of all aspects of an industry.

The County Board shall review and approve all plans and applications for the use of state and/or federal funds supporting CTE.

The County Board shall adopt standards for CTE which meet or exceed the state's model content standards and describe the essential knowledge and skills that students enrolled in these courses are expected to master. The course curriculum shall be aligned with FCOE-adopted standards and the state's curriculum framework.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop partnerships with local businesses and industries to ensure that classroom instruction has real-world relevance and reflects labor market needs and priorities. He/she also shall work to develop connections with employers to provide students with work-based learning opportunities.

The Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with postsecondary institutions to ensure that FCOE's program is articulated with postsecondary programs in order to provide a sequential course of study.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that teachers of CTE courses possess the qualifications and credentials necessary to teach their assigned courses. He/she also shall provide teachers and administrators with professional development designed to enhance their knowledge of standards-aligned CTE and ways to integrate technical and occupational instruction with academic instruction.

FCOE shall provide services to support students in the CTE program, including comprehensive career guidance and academic counseling. The Superintendent or designee shall provide counselors with professional development that includes, but is not limited to, information about current workforce needs and trends, requirements of FCOE's CTE program, work experience opportunities, postsecondary education, and employment options following high school.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly assess FCOE's needs for facilities, technologies, and equipment to increase students' access to FCOE's CTE program.

Nondiscrimination

FCOE's program shall provide equal access to and shall not unlawfully discriminate against students who are members of special populations. Special populations include, but are not limited to, students with disabilities; students from economically disadvantaged families, including foster youth; students preparing for nontraditional fields; single parents and single pregnant females; displaced homemakers; and students with limited English proficiency. (20 USC 2302, 2354, 2373)

Prior to the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall advise students, parents/guardians, employees, and the general public that all CTE opportunities are offered without regard to race, color, national origin, sex, or disability. (34 CFR 104.8, 106.9)

The above notification shall be disseminated in languages other than English as needed and shall state that FCOE will take steps to ensure that the lack of English language skills will not be a barrier to admission and participation in FCOE's CTE program. (20 USC 2354)

Advisory Committee

The County Board shall appoint a CTE advisory committee to develop recommendations on FCOE's CTE program and to serve as a liaison between FCOE and potential employers. The committee shall consist of one or more representatives of the general public knowledgeable about the disadvantaged, students, teachers, business, industry, school administration, and the field office of the California Department of Employment Development. (Education Code 8070)

This committee may be expanded to include parents/guardians, representatives of labor organizations, representatives of special populations, and other interested individuals in order to involve them in the development, implementation, and evaluation of CTE programs funded through the federal Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act.

Program Evaluation

The County Board shall monitor and evaluate the achievement of students participating in FCOE's CTE program. The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the County Board on program enrollment and completion rates, including enrollment and completion of programs in nontraditional fields as defined in 20 USC 2302; student academic assessment results; attainment of career and technical skill proficiencies; attainment of a high school diploma or equivalent; graduation rates; and subsequent placement in postsecondary education or advanced training, military service, or employment.

At least every three years, the County Board shall compare FCOE's curriculum, course content, and course sequence of CTE with the model state curriculum standards. (Education Code 52376)

The Superintendent or designee shall systematically review FCOE's CTE classes to determine the degree to which each class may offer an alternative means for completing and receiving credit for specific portions of the course of study prescribed by FCOE for high school graduation. The

County Board shall ensure that these classes are equivalent in content and rigor to the courses prescribed for graduation. (Education Code 52376)

SUBJECT: Regional Occupational Center/Program

The Superintendent and County Board desire to provide opportunities for Fresno County Office of Education ("FCOE") students to receive specialized training and career technical skills through a regional occupational center or program ("ROC/P") that prepares them for employment, advanced training, or postsecondary education.

Participation in County-Operated ROC/P

FCOE shall refer eligible students to the ROC/P that has been established by the County Superintendent of Schools and is under the governance of the County Board of Education. (Education Code 52301, 52310.5)

The Board shall adopt and regularly review the mission, goals, budget, curriculum, and policies of the ROC/P to ensure that the program is focused on student learning and meets all applicable state and federal laws, regulations, and standards.

An employer advisory board shall perform the duties specified in Education Code 52302.2. The employer advisory board shall be composed of representatives of trade organizations and businesses or government agencies that hire a significant number of employees each year and require the skills and knowledge that are taught in the course sequence(s) in that occupational area, as well as at least one representative from a school district career technical educational advisory committee. (Education Code 52302.2)

Student Eligibility and Participation

To enroll in the ROC/P on a part-time or full-time basis, a district high school or adult student must have his/her admittance approved by the ROC/P based on a determination that he/she will benefit from the program. To be eligible, a student must be at least 16 years of age, unless he/she meets one of the conditions specified in Education Code 52314. (Education Code 52314, 52314.5, 52315)

Adult students may have access to ROC/P classes offered on high school campuses during the school day.

A student who is attending an ROC/P may be exempted from FCOE's physical education requirement in accordance with law, Superintendent/Board policy, and administrative regulation. (Education Code 48410, 52316)

Credits earned from courses completed in an ROC/P may be applied toward fulfillment of high school graduation course requirements. (Education Code 51225.3, 52310)

Student Services

FCOE may provide or arrange for transportation to the ROC/P in accordance with law, Superintendent/Board policy, and administrative regulation.

FCOE's academic counseling program shall be designed to increase students' awareness of available educational options aligned with their career goals, including, as appropriate, career technical programs offered through the ROC/P.

Program Evaluation

The County Board shall annually hold a public hearing to review and assess the participation of students in grades 11-12 in the ROC/P and the annual plan to increase participation of students in this program, unless it is determined that there are no additional students who would benefit from this participation. (Education Code 52304.1)

The County Board also shall review student achievement data for participating students.

The Superintendent and County Board recognize that high-quality supplemental instructional programs can motivate and support students to attain grade-level academic standards, overcome academic deficiencies, and/or acquire critical skills.

Required Supplemental Programs

Fresno County Office of Education shall offer direct, systematic, and intensive supplemental instruction for:

- 1. Students in grades 2-9 who have been retained or recommended for retention pursuant to Education Code 48070.5. (Education Code 37252.2)
- 2. Students in grades 7-12 who do not demonstrate "sufficient progress" toward passing the state exit examination required for high school graduation in order to help them pass the exam. (Education Code 37252, 60851)

"Sufficient progress" shall be determined based on a student's results on the state Standardized Testing and Reporting assessments and the minimum levels of proficiency recommended by the State Board of Education.

In addition, students who do not possess sufficient English language skills to be assessed shall be considered students who do not demonstrate sufficient progress towards passing the exit exam and shall receive supplemental instruction designed to help them succeed on the exit exam. (Education Code 37252)

- 3. Students who have not passed one or both parts of the exit exam by the end of grade 12, for up to two consecutive school years after the completion of grade 12 or until they have passed both parts of the exit exam, whichever comes first. (Education Code 37254)
- 4. Eligible students from low-income families whenever the school receiving federal Title I funds has been identified by the California Department of Education for program improvement for two or more years. (20 USC 6316)

SUBJECT: Evaluation of the Instructional Program

The Superintendent and County Board recognize that it is accountable to students, parents/guardians, and the community for the effectiveness of Fresno County Office of Education's ("FCOE") educational program in meeting goals for student learning. The Superintendent or designee shall conduct a continual evaluation of the curriculum and the instructional program in order to improve student achievement.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide the Board and the community with regular reports on student progress toward established standards of expected achievement at each grade level in each area of study. In addition, he/she shall evaluate and report data for each school and for every numerically significant subgroup of the student population, including, but not limited to, school and subgroup performance on statewide achievement indicators.

Based on these reports, the Board shall take appropriate actions to maintain the effectiveness of programs and to improve the quality of education that FCOE students receive.

Categorical Program Monitoring

The Superintendent or designee shall cooperate with the California Department of Education ("CDE") in the categorical program monitoring process to ensure that FCOE categorical programs comply with federal and state laws and regulations. The Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board regarding the results of this monitoring process.

On an ongoing basis, the Superintendent or designee shall conduct a self-evaluation which may utilize tools developed by FCOE or the CDE to ensure compliance of categorical programs with legal requirements.

Evaluation of Consolidated Categorical Programs

The Superintendent or designee and the Board shall annually determine whether FCOE's categorical programs funded through the state's consolidated application are supportive of the core curriculum and are effective in meeting the needs of the students they are intended to serve. As a basis for this evaluation, the Superintendent or designee shall recommend for Board approval the specific, measurable criteria that shall be used at each FCOE school. These criteria shall include, but not necessarily be limited to, progress toward goals contained in the school's single plan for student achievement and progress of the total student population and each numerically significant subgroup toward growth targets on the statewide Academic Performance Index.

Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) Accreditation

The Superintendent and Board believe that accreditation by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges ("WASC") can foster excellence and ongoing academic improvement in FCOE's

schools. The results of the accreditation process also may demonstrate to parents/guardians and the community that the schools are meeting their goals and objectives and the WASC criteria for school effectiveness through a viable instructional program.

The Superintendent or designee shall undertake procedures whereby FCOE schools may achieve and maintain full WASC accreditation status. The schools shall conduct a self-study in accordance with WASC requirements, cooperate with the WASC committee during a site visit, and develop and review action plans to increase the effectiveness of the instructional program for students. The Superintendent or designee shall regularly report to the Board on the status of FCOE schools and any WASC recommendations for school improvement.

The results of any inspection of a school by WASC, or any other the accrediting agency, shall be published not later than 60 days after the results are made available to FCOE. Publication shall be by notifying each parent/guardian in writing and/or by posting the information on FCOE's web site, as determined by the Superintendent or designee. (Education Code 35178.4)

If any FCOE school loses its accreditation status, the Board shall give official notice at a regularly scheduled Board meeting. The Superintendent or designee shall provide written notification to each parent/guardian of a student in the school that the school has lost its accreditation status, including the potential consequences of the loss of accreditation status. This notice shall also be posted on FCOE's web site. (Education Code 35178.4)

The Fresno County Superintendent of School's (FCSS) Charter School Petition Review Committee (Charter Committee) has reviewed Crescent View West Public Charter, Inc.'s (CVW) request for a Material Revision to their current charter petition. The purpose of this Committee Report is to provide a detailed discussion of the Charter Committee's review, concerns, and findings related to the Material Revision.

I. BACKGROUND

Lead petitioner Shellie Hanes, Area Superintendent, is applying to the Fresno County Board of Education (FCBE) on behalf of CVW for a Material Revision of its current charter petition (2016-2021). The Material Revision, submitted to the FCBE on August 5, 2020, covers the period from October 15, 2020 through June 30, 2021. The Material Revision proposes to change the location of services in Mendota from the Mendota Branch of the Fresno County Public Library located at 1246 Belmont Ave, Mendota, CA to the AMOR (Alliance for Medical Outreach & Relief) Wellness Center located at 115 Belmont Ave, Mendota, CA, approximately one half mile from the current library location.

Each member of the FCBE has received a copy of the proposed petition reflecting the Material Revision, and a public hearing was conducted on September 17, 2020. A site visit was conducted August 19, 2020 by Senior Director of Facilities and Operations Jeff Becker and Director of Charter Schools Dr. Jeffrey Hunt as a part of the Charter Committee review.

II. MATERIAL REVISION CRITERIA

The Charter Committee reviewed the CVW Material Revision In accordance with Education Code (EC) sections 47605, 47607, and the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between FCBE and CVW for the charter term of July 1, 2016-June 30, 2021.

Education Code section 47607(a) through (b) states:

(a) (1) A charter may be granted pursuant to Sections 47605, 47605.5, 47605.6, and 47606 for a period not to exceed five years.

(2) A chartering authority may grant one or more subsequent renewals pursuant to subdivisions (b) and (c) and Section 47607.2. Notwithstanding subdivisions (b) and (c) and Section 47607.2, a chartering authority may deny renewal pursuant to subdivision (e).

(3) A charter school that, concurrently with its renewal, proposes to expand operations to one or more additional sites or grade levels shall request a material revision to its charter. A material revision of the provisions of a charter petition may be made only with the approval of the chartering authority. A material revision of a charter is governed by the standards and criteria described in Section 47605.

(4) The findings of paragraphs (7) and (8) of subdivision (c) of Section 47605 shall not be used to deny a renewal of an existing charter school, but may be used to deny a proposed expansion constituting a material revision. For a material revision, analysis under paragraphs (7) and (8) of subdivision (c) of Section 47605 shall be limited to consideration only of the impact of the proposed material revision.

(5) The chartering authority may inspect or observe any part of the charter school at any time.

(b) Renewals and material revisions of charters are governed by the standards and criteria described in Section 47605, and shall include, but not be limited to, a reasonably comprehensive description of any new requirement of charter schools enacted into law after the charter was originally granted or last renewed.

Education Code section 47605 establishes the criteria for reviewing a charter petition. According to EC section 47605(a)(4):

After receiving approval of its petition, a charter school that proposes to expand operations to one or more additional sites or grade levels shall request a material revision to its charter and shall notify the chartering authority of those additional locations or grade levels. The chartering authority shall consider whether to approve those additional locations or grade levels at an open, public meeting. If the additional locations or grade levels are approved pursuant to the standards and criteria described in subdivision (c), they shall be a material revision to the charter school's charter.

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Article 5 of the MOU between FCBE and CVW describes the process for considering Material Revisions.

- 5.1.1 MATERIAL REVISION DEFINED. A "Material Revision" is any change to the Charter and/or MOU that is any of the following:
 - 5.1.1.1 Any change to any terms and conditions set forth on the Cover (MOU Document A), General Terms and Conditions (MOU Document C), and/or the Charter Petition (MOU Document D).
 - 5.1.1.2 Any change to Charter School's legal status, for example and not as a limitation, merger into another nonprofit public benefit corporation; change from a nonprofit public benefit corporation to a for-profit corporation or non-incorporated entity; or becoming an affiliate, division, or parent corporation of another corporation or entity.
 - 5.1.1.3 Material change in Charter School's articles of incorporation (for example and not as a limitation, increase or decrease in the number of members on, or change of compensation for members of the Charter School Board) if Charter School, as marked on the Cover, is a nonprofit public benefit corporation.
 - 5.1.1.4 Material change to Charter School's mission statement (see Section 6.1 below).
 - 5.1.1.5 Elimination of any grade level that Charter School is required to serve pursuant to the Charter or expansion to serve any grade level that is not in the Charter.
 - 5.1.1.6 Addition of any new Charter School Site, or elimination of any Charter School Site listed on the Cover or in an amendment.
 - 5.1.1.7 Change in Charter School's admissions requirements or enrollment preferences or procedures from those set forth in the Charter.
 - 5.1.1.8 Material change that is substantive in nature to Charter School's educational program in terms of content or methodology (for example and not as a limitation, change from a non-classroom to a classroom-based methodology), including where such change is required by Applicable Law.
 - 5.1.1.9 Change to Charter School's instructional status that results in more than 20 percent of the California-required instructional minutes being designated as nonclassroom-based from classroom-based or vice versa.
 - 5.1.1.10 Change of the Operator if Charter School, as stated on the Cover, is operated by Operator.
 - 5.1.1.11 Change to Operator's legal status (if Charter School, as marked on the Cover, is operated by Operator), for example and not as a limitation, merger into another nonprofit public benefit corporation; change from a nonprofit public benefit corporation to a for-profit corporation or non-incorporated entity; or becoming an affiliate, division, or parent corporation of another corporation or entity.

- 5.1.2 REQUEST FOR MATERIAL REVISION.
 - 5.1.2.1 GENERALLY. Charter School may submit to Authorizer, and Authorizer will consider, any proposed Material Revision to the Charter and/or MOU in accordance with Authorizer's policies and procedures, if any, that are in effect at the time that Charter School submits the proposed Material Revision. Unless stated otherwise in Authorizer's policies and procedures, Charter School shall submit any proposed Material Revision at least 90 days before the date on which Charter School intends the Material Revision to take effect. The proposed Material Revision shall be in writing and state, at a minimum, the following: (A) a description of the proposed Material Revision; (B) the date on which Charter School anticipates the proposed Material Revision to take effect; and (C) the name and contact information of the person at Charter School with whom Authorizer is to communicate regarding the proposed Material Revision.
 - 5.1.2.2 ADDITION OF CHARTER SCHOOL SITE. In addition to the requirements in Section 5.1.2.1 above, in any request for a Material Revision to add a new Charter School Site, Charter School shall allow Authorizer to inspect the new facility as part of Authorizer's consideration of such request.
- 5.1.3 AMENDMENT REFLECTING MATERIAL REVISION.
 - 5.1.3.1 GENERALLY. Except as provided otherwise in this Article 5 in which case such provision shall apply, any Material Revision shall be set forth in an amendment, which must be approved and executed by the Parties. Any amendment to the Charter that requires County Superintendent to perform any services or assume any obligations must be signed by County Superintendent to be binding on County Superintendent.
 - 5.1.3.2 ADDITION OF CHARTER SCHOOL SITE. In addition to the requirements in Section 5.1.3.1 above, the following shall apply to any amendment for a Material Revision to add a new Charter School Site:
 - 5.1.3.2(A) The amendment shall state the full street address of the new Charter School Site.
 - 5.1.3.2(B) At least 30 days before Charter School's first day of occupancy of the new Charter School Site, Charter School shall submit to Authorizer a certificate of occupancy or other documentation issued by the appropriate governmental agency(ies) authorizing Charter School to use the new Charter School Site for the purposes intended by Charter School.
 - 5.1.3.2(C) Charter School shall submit evidence to Authorizer that the new Charter School Site complies with the provisions of Sections 7.2.1 and 7.2.2.
 - 5.1.3.3 ELIMINATION OF CHARTER SCHOOL SITE. In addition to the requirements in Section 5.1.3.1 above, any amendment for a Material Revision to eliminate a Charter School Site shall state the full street address of the Charter School Site that is being eliminated.

Article 7, Section 2 of the MOU between FCBE and CVW provides general requirements of appropriate charter school sites.

SECTION 7.2 CHARTER SCHOOL SITE(S).

- 7.2.1 GENERAL REQUIREMENTS. Each Charter School Site that Charter School operates shall comply with the following requirements:
 - 7.2.1.1 Health, safety and fire code requirements applicable to California charter schools.
 - 7.2.1.2 Federal and California laws applicable to charter school facilities.
 - 7.2.1.3 Requirements under the ADA.
 - 7.2.1.4 California and local regulations governing the operation of charter school facilities.
 - 7.2.1.5 One of the following unless a Charter School Site is exclusively owned or controlled by an entity (e.g., federal government) that is not subject to the California Building Standards Code; (A) the California Building Standards Code (Part 2, commencing with Section 101 of Title 24 of the CCR) as adopted and enforced by the local building enforcement agency with jurisdiction over the area in which Charter School is located; or (B) the Field Act, EC 17280 et seq. and 17365 et seq.
 - 7.2.1.6 Location in an area properly zoned for operation of a school and has been cleared for pupil occupancy by local authorities with jurisdiction of the Charter School Site.
 - 7.2.1.7 Local approvals, including but not limited to, applicable fire marshal clearance, certificate of occupancy or other documentation authorizing Charter School to use the facility for the purposes intended by Charter School, signed building permit inspections, and any approved zoning variances.
- 7.2.2 NUMBER OF CHARTER SCHOOL SITES. Charter School shall only operate at the Charter School Sites set forth on the Cover.
- 7.2.3 LOCATION. Charter School shall provide its primary educational services, including the delivery of instruction, only at the Charter School Sites listed on the Cover or subsequently added through an amendment. Charter School shall operate the Charter School Site(s) in compliance with the geographical boundary requirements set forth in Education Code sections 47605 and 47605.1
- 7.2.4 SIZE AND CONDITION. Each Charter School Site shall be of sufficient size to house the portion of Charter School's pupil enrollment for that Charter School Site and be conducive to provide educational programs for such pupils.
- 7.2.5 ADDITION AND ELIMINATION. Elimination of a Charter School Site or addition of any new Charter School Site constitutes a Material Revision, and Charter School shall comply with Section 5.1 relating to a Material Revision. A relocation from an existing Charter School Site to a new Charter School Site shall be treated as an

elimination of the existing Charter School Site and the addition of the new Charter School Site.

III. CHARTER PETITION REVIEW COMMITTEE ANALYSIS:

The Charter Committee evaluated the request for the Material Revision against EC 47607, 47605, and Articles 5 and 7 of the MOU between FCBE and CVW. The Charter Committee also considered testimony at the public hearing September 17, 2020 in which Area Superintendent Shellie Hanes and Principal Rafael Aguilar presented on CVW's behalf. Additionally, a business owner shared his experiences with CVW students in Mendota.

CVW provided a proposed updated charter petition reflecting the Material Revision, required legal updates, and program updates to reflect their current educational program, processes, and procedures. CVW also submitted supporting documents to satisfy the requirements of Article 7 of the MOU as it relates to facilities.

The proposed facility site visit on August 19, 2020 was led by Mr. Ralph Aguilar, principal of the Mendota CVW location. The guided tour included a discussion of the benefits of the new location to CVW students including but not limited to: a computer lab, child-care, physical and mental healthcare, small group instruction, and other community resources that will be located in the AMOR complex.

The Charter Committee met Monday, September 21, 2020 to discuss the review of the Material Revision.

IV. CHARTER COMMITTEE FINDINGS

CVW has submitted necessary documentation to satisfy the Charter Committee's facility requirements outlined in MOU Article 7. CVW has made the required legal updates and relevant program updates to the petition.

Upon review of the Material Revision, the Committee recommends that the FCBE **approve** the Material Revision.

The purpose of this Committee Report is to provide a detailed discussion of the Charter Committee's review, concerns, and findings related to the Renewal Petition.

I. BACKGROUND:

Lead petitioner Shellie Hanes, Area Superintendent, is applying to the Fresno County Board of Education (FCBE) on behalf of CVW for a renewal of its charter school petition. The Renewal Petition, submitted to the FCBE on August 5, 2020, covers the period from July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2026.

CVW was originally chartered by the FCBE in 2010, and began serving students under FCBE authorization during the 2010-2011 school year. The FCBE renewed CVW's charter for a five-year term in 2011 (2011-2016) and again in 2015 (2016-2021). Site visits were conducted as a part of the petition review on August 19, 2020 (Mendota), September 16, 2020 (Virtual), and September 17, 2020 (Manchester, Clovis, and Sunnyside). Each member of the FCBE has received a copy of the Renewal Petition, and a public hearing was conducted on September 17, 2020.

CVW offers high school diploma programs, job training, and flexible, personalized education for students whose needs generally fall outside the scope of the traditional high school system.

II. CHARTER RENEWAL CRITERIA:

In accordance with Education Code (EC) section 47607, which establishes the criteria for granting charter renewals, the Charter Committee reviewed the CVW Renewal Petition. The Renewal Petition was reviewed against the requirements of EC sections 47605 and 47607.

Committee Report regarding Crescent View West Public Charter, Inc. Renewal Charter Petition September 30, 2020 Page 2 of 24

Education Code section 47607(a) through (e) states:

(a) (1) A charter may be granted pursuant to Sections 47605, 47605.5, 47605.6, and 47606 for a period not to exceed five years.

(2) A chartering authority may grant one or more subsequent renewals pursuant to subdivisions (b) and (c) and Section 47607.2. Notwithstanding subdivisions (b) and (c) and Section 47607.2, a chartering authority may deny renewal pursuant to subdivision (e).

(3) A charter school that, concurrently with its renewal, proposes to expand operations to one or more additional sites or grade levels shall request a material revision to its charter. A material revision of the provisions of a charter petition may be made only with the approval of the chartering authority. A material revision of a charter is governed by the standards and criteria described in Section 47605.

(4) The findings of paragraphs (7) and (8) of subdivision (c) of Section 47605 shall not be used to deny a renewal of an existing charter school, but may be used to deny a proposed expansion constituting a material revision. For a material revision, analysis under paragraphs (7) and (8) of subdivision (c) of Section 47605 shall be limited to consideration only of the impact of the proposed material revision.

(5) The chartering authority may inspect or observe any part of the charter school at any time.

(b) Renewals and material revisions of charters are governed by the standards and criteria described in Section 47605, and shall include, but not be limited to, a reasonably comprehensive description of any new requirement of charter schools enacted into law after the charter was originally granted or last renewed.

(c) (1) As an additional criterion for determining whether to grant a charter renewal, the chartering authority shall consider the performance of the charter school on the state and local indicators included in the evaluation rubrics adopted pursuant to Section 52064.5.

(2) (A) The chartering authority shall not deny renewal for a charter school pursuant to this subdivision if either of the following apply for two consecutive years immediately preceding the renewal decision:

(i) The charter school has received the two highest performance levels schoolwide on all the state indicators included in the evaluation rubrics adopted pursuant to Section 52064.5 for which it receives performance levels.

(ii) For all measurements of academic performance, the charter school has received performance levels schoolwide that are the same or higher than the state average and, for a majority of subgroups performing statewide below the state average in each Committee Report regarding Crescent View West Public Charter, Inc. Renewal Charter Petition September 30, 2020 Page 3 of 24

> respective year, received performance levels that are higher than the state average.

(B) Notwithstanding subparagraph (A), if the two consecutive years immediately preceding the renewal decision include the 2019–20 school year, the chartering authority shall not deny renewal for a charter school if either of the following apply for two of the three years immediately preceding the renewal decision:

(i) The charter school has received the two highest performance levels schoolwide on all the state indicators included in the evaluation rubrics adopted pursuant to Section 52064.5 for which it receives performance levels.

(ii) For all measurements of academic performance, the charter school has received performance levels schoolwide that are the same or higher than the state average and, for a majority of subgroups performing statewide below the state average in each respective year, received performance levels that are higher than the state average.

(C) Notwithstanding subparagraphs (A) and (B), a charter school eligible for technical assistance pursuant to Section 47607.3 shall not qualify for renewal under this paragraph.

(D) A charter school that meets the criteria established by this paragraph and subdivision (a) of Section 47607.2 shall not qualify for treatment under this paragraph.

(E) The chartering authority that granted the charter may renew a charter pursuant to this paragraph for a period of between five and seven years.

(F) A charter that satisfies the criteria in subparagraph (A) or (B) shall only be required to update the petition to include a reasonably comprehensive description of any new requirement of charter schools enacted into law after the charter was originally granted or last renewed and as necessary to reflect the current program offered by the charter.

(3) For purposes of this section and Section 47607.2, "measurements of academic performance" means indicators included in the evaluation rubrics adopted pursuant to Section 52064.5 that are based on statewide assessments in the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress system, or any successor system, the English Language Proficiency Assessments for California, or any successor system, and the college and career readiness indicator.

(4) For purposes of this section and Section 47607.2, "subgroup" means numerically significant pupil subgroups as defined in paragraph (1) of subdivision (a) of Section 52052.

(5) To qualify for renewal under clause (i) of subparagraph (A) or (B) of paragraph (2), subparagraph (A) of paragraph (1) or (2) of subdivision (a) of Section 47607.2, or paragraph (3) of subdivision (a) of Section 47607.2, the charter school shall have schoolwide performance levels on at least two measurements of academic performance per year in each of the two consecutive years immediately preceding the renewal decision. To qualify for renewal under clause (ii) of subparagraph (A) or (B) of paragraph (2), subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) or (2) of subdivision (a) of Section 47607.2, or paragraph (B) of subdivision (a) of Section 47607.2, the charter school shall have performance levels on at least two measurements of academic performance for at least two subgroups. A charter school without sufficient performance levels to meet these criteria shall be considered under subdivision (b) of Section 47607.2.

(6) For purposes of this section and Section 47607.2, if the dashboard indicators are not yet available for the most recently completed academic year before renewal, the chartering authority shall consider verifiable data provided by the charter school related to the dashboard indicators, such as data from the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress, or any successor system, for the most recent academic year.

(7) Paragraph (2) and subdivisions (a) and (b) of Section 47607.2 shall not apply to a charter school that is eligible for alternate methods for calculating the state and local indicators pursuant to subdivision (d) of Section 52064.5. In determining whether to grant a charter renewal for such a charter school, the chartering authority shall consider, in addition to the charter school's performance on the state and local indicators included in the evaluation rubrics adopted pursuant to subdivision (c) of Section 52064.5, the charter school's performance on alternative metrics applicable to the charter school based on the pupil population served. The chartering authority shall meet with the charter school during the first year of the charter school's term to mutually agree to discuss alternative metrics to be considered pursuant to this paragraph and shall notify the charter school of the alternative metrics to be used within 30 days of this meeting. The chartering authority may deny a charter renewal pursuant to this paragraph only upon making written findings, setting forth specific facts to support the findings that the closure of the charter school is in the best interest of pupils.

(d) (1) At the conclusion of the year immediately preceding the final year of the charter school's term, the charter school authorizer may request, and the department shall provide, the following aggregate data reflecting pupil enrollment patterns at the charter school:

(A) The cumulative enrollment for each school year of the charter school's term. For purposes of this chapter, cumulative enrollment is defined as the total number of pupils, disaggregated by race, ethnicity, and pupil subgroups, who enrolled in school at any time during the school year.

(B) For each school year of the charter school's term, the percentage of pupils enrolled at any point between the beginning of the school year and census day who were not enrolled at the conclusion of that year, and the average results on the statewide assessments in the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress system, or any successor system, for any such pupils who were enrolled in the charter school the prior school year.

(C) For each school year of the charter school's term, the percentage of pupils enrolled the prior school year who were not enrolled as of census day for the school year, except for pupils who completed the grade that is the highest grade served by the charter school, and the average results on the statewide assessments in the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress system, or any successor system, for any such pupils.

(2) When determining whether to grant a charter renewal, the chartering authority shall review data provided pursuant to paragraph (1), any data that may be provided to chartering authorities by the department, and any substantiated complaints that the charter school has not complied with subparagraph (J) of paragraph (5) of subdivision (c) of Section 47605 or with subparagraph (J) of paragraph (5) of subdivision (b) of Section 47605.6.

(3) As part of its determination of whether to grant a charter renewal based on the criterion established pursuant to subdivision (c) and subdivisions (a) and (b) of Section 47607.2, the chartering authority may make a finding that the charter school is not serving all pupils who wish to attend and, upon making such a finding, specifically identify the evidence supporting the finding.

(e) Notwithstanding subdivision (c) and subdivisions (a) and (b) of Section 47607.2, the chartering authority may deny renewal of a charter school upon a finding that the school is demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition due to substantial fiscal or governance factors, or is not serving all pupils who wish to attend, as documented pursuant to subdivision (d). The chartering authority may deny renewal of a charter school under this subdivision only after it has provided at least 30 days' notice to the charter school of the alleged violation and provided the charter school with a reasonable opportunity to cure the violation, including a corrective action plan proposed by the charter school. The chartering authority may deny renewal only by making either of the following findings:

(1) The corrective action proposed by the charter school has been unsuccessful.

(2) The violations are sufficiently severe and pervasive as to render a corrective action plan unviable.

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Education Code section 47605 establishes the criteria for reviewing a charter petition. According to EC section 47605:

(b) No later than 60 days after receiving a petition, in accordance with subdivision (a), the governing board of the school district shall hold a public hearing on the provisions of the charter, at which time the governing board of the school district shall consider the level of support for the petition by teachers employed by the school district, other employees of the school district, and parents. Following review of the petition and the public hearing, the governing board of the school district shall either grant or deny the charter within 90 days of receipt of the petition, provided, however, that the date may be extended by an additional 30 days if both parties agree to the extension. A petition is deemed received by the governing board of the school district for purposes of commencing the timelines described in this subdivision on the day the petitioner submits a petition to the district office, along with a signed certification that the petitioner deems the petition to be complete. The aoverning board of the school district shall publish all staff recommendations, including the recommended findings and, if applicable, the certification from the county superintendent of schools prepared pursuant to paragraph (8) of subdivision (c), regarding the petition at least 15 days before the public hearing at which the governing board of the school district will either grant or deny the charter. At the public hearing at which the governing board of the school district will either grant or deny the charter, petitioners shall have equivalent time and procedures to present evidence and testimony to respond to the staff recommendations and findings.

(c) In reviewing petitions for the establishment of charter schools pursuant to this section, the chartering authority shall be guided by the intent of the Legislature that charter schools are and should become an integral part of the California educational system and that the establishment of charter schools should be encouraged. The governing board of the school district shall grant a charter for the operation of a school under this part if it is satisfied that granting the charter is consistent with sound educational practice and with the interests of the community in which the school is proposing to locate. The governing board of the school district shall consider the academic needs of the pupils the school proposes to serve. The governing board of the school district shall not deny a petition for the establishment of a charter school unless it makes written factual findings, specific to the particular petition, setting forth specific facts to support one or more of the following findings:

(1) The charter school presents an unsound educational program for the pupils to be enrolled in the charter school.

(2) The petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition.

(3) The petition does not contain the number of signatures required by subdivision (a).

(4) The petition does not contain an affirmation of each of the conditions described in subdivision (e).

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(5) The petition does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of all of the following:

(A) (i) The educational program of the charter school, designed, among other things, to identify those whom the charter school is attempting to educate, what it means to be an "educated person" in the 21st century, and how learning best occurs. The goals identified in that program shall include the objective of enabling pupils to become selfmotivated, competent, and lifelong learners.

(ii) The annual goals for the charter school for all pupils and for each subgroup of pupils identified pursuant to Section 52052, to be achieved in the state priorities, as described in subdivision (d) of Section 52060, that apply for the grade levels served, and specific annual actions to achieve those goals. A charter petition may identify additional school priorities, the goals for the school priorities, and the specific annual actions to achieve those goals.

(iii) If the proposed charter school will serve high school pupils, the manner in which the charter school will inform parents about the transferability of courses to other public high schools and the eligibility of courses to meet college entrance requirements. Courses offered by the charter school that are accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges may be considered transferable and courses approved by the University of California or the California State University as creditable under the "A to G" admissions criteria may be considered to meet college entrance requirements.

(B) The measurable pupil outcomes identified for use by the charter school. "Pupil outcomes," for purposes of this part, means the extent to which all pupils of the charter school demonstrate that they have attained the skills, knowledge, and attitudes specified as goals in the charter school's educational program. Pupil outcomes shall include outcomes that address increases in pupil academic achievement both schoolwide and for all pupil subgroups served by the charter school, as that term is defined in subdivision (a) of Section 52052. The pupil outcomes shall align with the state priorities, as described in subdivision (d) of Section 52060, that apply for the grade levels served by the charter school.

(C) The method by which pupil progress in meeting those pupil outcomes is to be measured. To the extent practicable, the method for measuring pupil outcomes for state priorities shall be consistent with the way information is reported on a school accountability report card.

(D) The governance structure of the charter school, including, but not limited to, the process to be followed by the charter school to ensure parental involvement.

(E) The qualifications to be met by individuals to be employed by the charter school.

(F) The procedures that the charter school will follow to ensure the health and safety of pupils and staff. These procedures shall require all of the following:

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(i) That each employee of the charter school furnish the charter school with a criminal record summary as described in Section 44237.
(ii) The development of a school safety plan, which shall include the safety topics listed in subparagraphs (A) to (J), inclusive, of paragraph (2) of subdivision (a) of Section 32282.

(iii) That the school safety plan be reviewed and updated by March 1 of every year by the charter school.

(G) The means by which the charter school will achieve a balance of racial and ethnic pupils, special education pupils, and English learner pupils, including redesignated fluent English proficient pupils, as defined by the evaluation rubrics in Section 52064.5, that is reflective of the general population residing within the territorial jurisdiction of the school district to which the charter petition is submitted. Upon renewal, for a charter school not deemed to be a local educational agency for purposes of special education pursuant to Section 47641, the chartering authority may consider the effect of school placements made by the chartering authority in providing a free and appropriate public education as required by the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (Public Law 101-476), on the balance of pupils with disabilities at the charter school.

(H) Admission policies and procedures, consistent with subdivision (e).
 (I) The manner in which annual, independent financial audits shall be conducted, which shall employ generally accepted accounting principles, and the manner in which audit exceptions and deficiencies shall be resolved to the satisfaction of the chartering authority.

(J) The procedures by which pupils can be suspended or expelled from the charter school for disciplinary reasons or otherwise involuntarily removed from the charter school for any reason. These procedures, at a minimum, shall include an explanation of how the charter school will comply with federal and state constitutional procedural and substantive due process requirements that is consistent with all of the following:

(i) For suspensions of fewer than 10 days, provide oral or written notice of the charges against the pupil and, if the pupil denies the charges, an explanation of the evidence that supports the charges and an opportunity for the pupil to present the pupil's side of the story.
(ii) For suspensions of 10 days or more and all other expulsions for disciplinary reasons, both of the following:

(I) Provide timely, written notice of the charges against the pupil and an explanation of the pupil's basic rights.

(II) Provide a hearing adjudicated by a neutral officer within a reasonable number of days at which the pupil has a fair opportunity to present testimony, evidence, and witnesses and confront and cross-examine adverse witnesses, and at which the pupil has the right to bring legal counsel or an advocate.

(iii) Contain a clear statement that no pupil shall be involuntarily removed by the charter school for any reason unless the parent or guardian of the pupil has been provided written notice of intent to

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> remove the pupil no less than five schooldays before the effective date of the action. The written notice shall be in the native language of the pupil or the pupil's parent or guardian or, if the pupil is a foster child or youth or a homeless child or youth, the pupil's educational rights holder, and shall inform the pupil, the pupil's parent or guardian, or the pupil's educational rights holder of the right to initiate the procedures specified in clause (ii) before the effective date of the action. If the pupil's parent, guardian, or educational rights holder initiates the procedures specified in clause (ii), the pupil shall remain enrolled and shall not be removed until the charter school issues a final decision. For purposes of this clause, "involuntarily removed" includes disenrolled, dismissed, transferred, or terminated, but does not include suspensions specified in clauses (i) and (ii).

(K) The manner by which staff members of the charter schools will be covered by the State Teachers' Retirement System, the Public Employees' Retirement System, or federal social security.

(L) The public school attendance alternatives for pupils residing within the school district who choose not to attend charter schools.

(M) The rights of an employee of the school district upon leaving the employment of the school district to work in a charter school, and of any rights of return to the school district after employment at a charter school.
(N) The procedures to be followed by the charter school and the chartering authority to resolve disputes relating to provisions of the charter.

(O) The procedures to be used if the charter school closes. The procedures shall ensure a final audit of the charter school to determine the disposition of all assets and liabilities of the charter school, including plans for disposing of any net assets and for the maintenance and transfer of pupil records.

(6) The petition does not contain a declaration of whether or not the charter school shall be deemed the exclusive public employer of the employees of the charter school for purposes of Chapter 10.7 (commencing with Section 3540) of Division 4 of Title 1 of the Government Code.

(7) The charter school is demonstrably unlikely to serve the interests of the entire community in which the school is proposing to locate. Analysis of this finding shall include consideration of the fiscal impact of the proposed charter school. A written factual finding under this paragraph shall detail specific facts and circumstances that analyze and consider the following factors:

(A) The extent to which the proposed charter school would substantially undermine existing services, academic offerings, or programmatic offerings.

(B) Whether the proposed charter school would duplicate a program currently offered within the school district and the existing program has sufficient capacity for the pupils proposed to be served within reasonable proximity to where the charter school intends to locate.

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(8) The school district is not positioned to absorb the fiscal impact of the proposed charter school. A school district satisfies this paragraph if it has a qualified interim certification pursuant to Section 1240 and the county superintendent of schools, in consultation with the County Office Fiscal Crisis and Management Assistance Team, certifies that approving the charter school would result in the school district having a negative interim certification pursuant to Section 1240, has a negative interim certification pursuant to Section 1240, or is under state receivership. Charter schools proposed in a school district satisfying one of these conditions shall be subject to a rebuttable presumption of denial.

Dashboard Alternative School Status

As CVW is a Dashboard Alternative School Status charter school, the renewal process is governed by EC 47607(c)(7).

(7) Paragraph (2) and subdivisions (a) and (b) of Section 47607.2 shall not apply to a charter school that is eligible for alternate methods for calculating the state and local indicators pursuant to subdivision (d) of Section 52064.5. In determining whether to grant a charter renewal for such a charter school, the chartering authority shall consider, in addition to the charter school's performance on the state and local indicators included in the evaluation rubrics adopted pursuant to subdivision (c) of Section 52064.5, the charter school's performance on alternative metrics applicable to the charter school based on the pupil population served. The chartering authority shall meet with the charter school during the first year of the charter school's term to mutually agree to discuss alternative metrics to be considered pursuant to this paragraph and shall notify the charter school of the alternative metrics to be used within 30 days of this meeting. The chartering authority may deny a charter renewal pursuant to this paragraph only upon making written findings, setting forth specific facts to support the findings that the closure of the charter school is in the best interest of pupils.

In addition to the petition review and in accordance with Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations (CCR) section 11966.4(b)(1), consideration regarding past performance of the school's academics, finances, and operation has been used to evaluate the likelihood of the future success of CVW as well as CVW's future plans for improvement. Information regarding CVW's past performance has been collected through statutory data submission and through the regular interaction that has occurred between CVW and FCSS through the current and prior charter terms. Throughout each charter term, FCSS's Educational Services, Business Services, Human Resources, Legal Services, and Support Services have been involved in the annual site visits (EC section 47604.32(b)) and ongoing oversight and support provided to CVW.

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Site visits were conducted as a part of the petition review on August 19, 2020 (Mendota), September 16, 2020 (Virtual), and September 17, 2020 (Manchester, Clovis, Sunnyside).

III. CHARTER PETITION REVIEW COMMITTEE ANALYSIS: A summary of the Charter Committee's analysis related to the criteria listed above is provided in the following table. The page numbers where supporting information can be found in the Renewal Petition documents are provided for each criterion. Charter Committee comments are provided where needed for clarity.



The graduation rate of DASS public schools reported on the California Accountability Dashboard is calculated by dividing the number of Grade 12 students who complete their high school diploma by the number of Grade 12 students enrolled. The CDE implemented this calculation for DASS schools during the 2017-2018 school year as DASS schools did not receive a dashboard in 2016. This calculation differs from the 4-Year Cohort graduation rate calculated on CDE's DataQuest portal.

V. CHARTER PETITION REVIEW COMMITTEE FINDINGS

The Charter Committee performed an extensive review of the CVW petition and supporting documents, audit reports, the California Accountability Dashboard, and CDE's DataQuest reporting system. A Public Hearing before the FCBE on the provisions of the CVW charter petition renewal was conducted on Thursday, September 17, 2020. Subsequent to the testimony in the public hearing, the committee scheduled an additional conversation with CVW on Monday, September 21, 2020 to review the concerns raised by Clare Crawford of *In the Public Interest*.

Additional documents reviewed include a CVW staff roster (FCSS Attachment 'A'), CVW updated budget projections (FCSS Attachment 'B'), the Evaluation of Reasonableness of Education and Administrative Services Fees between CVW and LLA (FCSS Attachment 'C'), the response from CVW to FCSS in reply to Ms. Crawford's public hearing testimony (Attachment 'D') and CVW's Learning and Continuity Plan. Based on the provisions of EC 47607(e), Governance and Fiscal considerations can only be grounds to deny a charter renewal if there is prior notice and an opportunity to cure the governance or fiscal concern, which has not occurred in this case. Further analysis and intervention, if deemed necessary, may occur at any time during a charter's term.

The Charter Committee has determined that the Renewal Petition meets the Education Code and California Code of Regulations requirements for charter renewal and recommends that the Fresno County Board of Education <u>approve</u> Crescent View West Public Charter, Inc.'s Petition renewal for a five-year period.

Re: <u>Evaluation of Reasonableness of Education and Administrative Services</u> <u>Fees</u>.

Dear Directors:

As you know, Crescent View West Public Charter School ("CVW") currently contracts for educational services from Scholastic Educational Resources ("SER") and for administrative services from Sequoia Administrative Resources ("SAR"). In exchange for the administrative services provided by SAR, CVW pays 5% of its revenue collected from most sources. In exchange for the educational services provided by SER, CVW pays 10% of its revenue collected from most sources.

Since late 2015 and continuing to the present, we have monitored the fees charged to charter schools by educational and administrative services providers throughout the country in order to provide assurances that the fees paid to SAR and SER are consistent with or less than those charged by similar providers in the marketplace.

As a threshold matter, it's useful to bear in mind why many charter schools use outside vendors for educational and administrative services. When multiple separate schools operate within a network, the costs of each school employing its own full-time administrative employees (for *e.g.*, accounts receivable, accounts payable, human resources, facilities management, etc.) can be prohibitively inefficient. By using an outside vendor, the schools are essentially sharing these administrative costs. Moreover, the vendor is able to coordinate the purchasing of supplies, employee benefits and other aspects of required infrastructure in "bulk" reducing the costs for each individual school. With respect to educational services, the same economies of scale are achieved (bulk curriculum purchase, for. *e.g.*) while at the same time ensuring educational consistency in quality and delivery across the network. This can also lead to better services for lower costs, all of which inures to the financial benefit of the schools.

In order to generate a reliable analysis and conclusion, we have reviewed a tremendous amount of data, nearly 3000 pages of information, informing us of the fees charged by other providers, the terms of the contracts between the providers and their charter school clients and the scopes of services provided.

It is important to acknowledge that the comparisons are never, by their nature, exact. For example, the language describing the types of services provided varies from agreement to agreement. However, the nature of the industry is such that various conclusions can be reached about the differences in scopes of services and related pricing from vendor to vendor that are sufficient for us to render an opinion to CVW that the fees paid to SAR and SER are reasonable and in line with the broader marketplace.

The information reviewed by us includes, without limitation, the following:

- Educational and administrative agreements available from public records including agreements submitted to charter boards for approval in those jurisdictions where board meetings and the materials discussed thereat are open to the public.
- SB740 funding determination filings. As you know, independent study programs in California receive funding under a rather unique regime of regulations and processes. These include regular submissions of financial forms stating how the schools spend their funds in order to meet certain criteria to qualify for ongoing funding. These forms include disclosures of relationships with services providers and the fees paid for the services. These financial submissions are available for public review.
- Charter schools in California from time to time find themselves subject to audit. On some occasions these audits are performed by California's Fiscal Crisis Management & Assistance Team ("FCMAT"). Upon completion of audits, FCMAT publishes its audit reports which become publicly available and which sometimes contain information regarding the fees paid by the audited schools for educational and administrative services.
- Finally, we have, for 30 years, worked with charter schools and charter management companies and have regularly assisted them in the negotiation and drafting of services agreements. We, therefore, have substantial anecdotal information regarding the fees charged by educational and administrative services providers and the scopes of services provided.

Attached hereto as Attachment "A" is a summary of the services provided by SAR and SER to CVW. We used this summary to provide a baseline of the scopes of SAR and SER services for comparisons with other educational and administrative services providers.

The following is a historical summary of the market analyses performed for schools within the Learn4Life Network including schools operated by Crescent View Wests Public Charter, Inc., the parent corporation of CVW.

<u>2015</u>

- Reviewed 37 SB 740 Funding Determination filings.
- Reviewed multiple charter management organization and back office service provider websites and agreements.

January 2017

- Added reviews of services agreements for four (4) large charter management organizations.
- Reviewed scopes of services provided and fees charged by 8 County Offices of Education providing administrative services to schools.

December 2017

• Further supplementation of analysis by reviewing similar information but added more micro-assessment of the sizes of the charter schools using such services to better refine our understanding of actual costs for services.

January 2020

- Updated review to include analysis of scopes of serves and fees charged nationally and locally by charter management organizations and educational management organizations.
- Identified with greater precision California independent study charter schools using vendors for administrative and educational services.
- Updated analysis to take into account the nature of the Learn4Life educational

model and the necessary educational and administrative support for its unique programming. For example, to address the needs to Learn4Life's at-risk student population a variety of educational programming and related administrative support is needed in the eras of trauma, community support partnerships, intervention support, and job training. While very few other vendors in the marketplace provide support and services in these areas to the charter schools they serve, SAR and SER do so, while charging comparable or lower fees than those charged by other vendors whose services are more limited in scope and are not as effectively tailored to the Learn4Life educational model.

- Updated analysis based upon information available from:
 - \circ 18 schools using outside vendors for administrative and educational services.
 - o 4 County Offices of Education providing back-office services.
 - 4 public school districts providing back-offices services.
 - Review of recent FCMAT audit reports containing discussions of the audited schools' uses of outside vendors for administrative and educational services.
 - Other more recent publicly available information and adjusted analysis to incorporate reputation and longevity of vendors to ensure robust and reliable comparability.

Attached hereto is a comparative summary of the most comparable vendors, a listing of the key services provided by each and the fees charged. As you can see, not only is the combined fee of SAR and SER consistent with fees charged by the other listed providers but, also, the services provided by SAR and SER are more comprehensive.

We look forward to discussing the foregoing and any questions the board members may have at the upcoming board meeting.

ATTACHMENT "A"

SAR Administrative Support Services – 5%

Administrative services that will maximize the performance and operational efficiency of Charter School

1. General Administrative Services.

As described below and also include offsite services, web-based systems to provide support and services and also provide an annual reports indicating the services **SAR** has provided to **Charter School**

2. Public Relations and IP.

SAR shall provide public relations services to advance the shared mission, use of Learn4Life marks or other L4L intellectual property, consultation with the **Charter School**, **SAR** shall act as **Charter School's** representative on all matters relating to public relations and public information, including, without limitation, preparing press releases on topics relating to the shared mission of **SAR** and **CharterSchool**.

3. <u>Financial Services (Accounting, Bookkeeping, Payroll, Procurement, and other Financial</u> <u>Functions).</u>

The Charter School shall retain sole control over decision-making, expenditures, tax reporting and all other financial matters as it is not the intent of this Agreement that such responsibility be delegated to SAR. SAR shall provide the financial services listed below to Charter School;

- Preparation and submission of financial reports including all required State financial reporting including but not limited to annual audited financial reports, annual budgets, 1st and 2nd Interims, unaudited actual reportings, P1 and P2 reportings, non-classroom based funding determinations when applicable, annual LCAP spending reporting and monthly financial statements to Charter School;
- Coordination and processing of payments of Charter School's expenditures;
- Advice and monitoring regarding management of cash balances to cover **Charter School's** payroll and payments to vendors;
- Coordination of and payment of Charter School's Board stipends as described in Section 5 below;
- Coordination and processing of **Charter School's** payroll and tax reporting and other filings in accordance with the specific directives, procedures and guidelines as designated and updated from time to time by **Charter School** personnel;
- Coordination of and other assistance with the annual independent audit of **Charter School's** financial statements. The cost of the audit will be the sole expense of **Charter School**;
- Assistance with Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) financial reviews, when applicable;

- Coordination and management of all equipment leasing;
- Advice and monitoring regarding spending and general administration of grant funding in compliance with specific terms and conditions of said grants and participation in any audits related thereto; and
- Advice and recommendations regarding acquisition and management of external financing as needed.

4. Facilities.

SAR shall assist **Charter School** with the following tasks and in locating, identifying and acquiring (through lease or purchase) learning centers and other required space for **Charter School**, including without limitation, coordination of construction and planning associated with the development or redevelopment of learning centers and other facilities:

SAR will coordinate with all city or local ordinances for the health and safety of **Charter School** staff and students; and

SAR will assist in meeting the state and local safety standards during initial acquisition and will provide assistance to **Charter School's** safety and security of each **Charter School** facility. **SAR** will assist in the negotiation of all new and renewal facility leases.

5. Board Facilitation.

SAR shall assist with the scheduling of and documentation of meetings of the **Board**, including, at the direction of **Charter School**, the preparation of meeting agendas and minutes. At the request of **Charter School**, **SAR** will coordinate annual **Board** member training to include training in **Charter School** protocols, best practices and legal updates. All training will be for the purpose of supporting **Charter School**'s educational mission and other related official school business.

6. Strategic Planning and Implementation.

SAR will assist **Charter School** in the development of key long term goals for **Charter School** in meeting its academic, funding, reporting, accountability, growth requirements and in analyzing the political and legislative educational climate. **SAR** will assist in setting priorities, focusing resources, strengthening operations, insuring that employees at all levels are working toward common goals, establishing consensuses around intended results, and assessing and adjusting the organizational direction in response to its changing environment.

7. Charter School Policies.

SAR may make reasonable recommendations to **Charter School** concerning its calendar, policies, rules, regulations, procedures, personnel, and budget, as appropriate and consistent with the shared mission of the **Parties** as set forth in the above recitals. For the avoidance of doubt, **Charter School** retains sole and complete control over the foregoing policies.

8. Human Capital.

- **SAR** shall assist in recruiting, screening and recommending certificated and non- certificated individuals for employment by **Charter School**;
- **SAR** shall also provide pre-employment screening services, verify, check and monitor credentials for certificated staff;

- **SAR** shall coordinate and administer health, life and retirement benefits for **Charter School** employees, including certificated and non-certificated staff. **Charter School** shall be solely responsible for the costs of these benefits;
- SAR will develop and provide new hire employee orientation, training; onboarding (at the time
 of hiring) and off-boarding (upon termination). SAR will also provide all required State and
 federal mandated training to applicable Charter School employees. SAR and Charter School
 shall comply with all applicable federal and State laws, concerning employee welfare, safety and
 health;
- **SAR** will administer and track leave of absence benefits and monitor employee work related injuries;
- SAR will support Charter School with its Authorizer's annual oversightvisit.
- SAR shall assist Charter School in securing and maintaining insurance policies selected by Charter School which shall be in the amounts that are no less than the minimum levels required by Charter School, applicable law or both. Liability, casualty, and property insurance for any facility leased directly and/or managed by Charter School and any capital equipment or furniture leased directly and/or managed by Charter School, as well as Directors and Officer's Insurance in the amount required by Charter School or the Authorizer. All premiums and costs will be the responsibility of Charter School.

9. Files and Records.

At the request of **Charter School**, **SAR** shall maintain temporary custody (for the joint benefit of **Charter School** and **SAR** of all files and records relating to the Services. In addition, at the request of **Charter School** and in order to ensure that such files and records are maintained in a secure environment, **SAR** may maintain temporary custody of **Charter School's** personnel files. **SAR** acknowledges that all records, data, communications, and other property of **Charter School**, shall remain the property of **Charter School** and **SAR** agrees to return any such material to **Charter School** immediately upon request or the termination of this **Agreement**.

10. Operations Support

SAR will provide assistance to **Charter School** as requested by **Charter School** relating to operational services including without limitation: human capital, facilities, financial matters, and (as appropriate) legal representation. It shall be the responsibility of **Charter School** to recommend to **SAR** any actions deemed necessary or advisable with respect to operations support. All decisions and directives regarding same shall be the responsibility of the **Charter School**.

11. <u>Reporting Requirements to the Board.</u>

SAR shall, upon request, provide to the **Board an annual "year-end report**" regarding its activities undertaken pursuant to this agreement and shall otherwise report to the **Board** more frequently upon request by the **Board**.

SER Educational Program: 10%

SER will provide services to **Charter School** as necessary to assist **Charter School** with the development and implementation of **Charter School**'s educational model **SER**'s services will assist **Charter School** in effectuating any necessary changes in the educational program, recognizing that the essential principles of **Charter School**'s educational program is its flexibility, adaptability and capacity to change in the interests of continuous improvement of efficiency, provided that such changes shall be consistent with the Mission and Purpose of **Charter School**.

A. Professional Development:

SER will provide resources for use by **Charter School** staff to enhance their effectiveness to meet and exceed the educational standard established by the State of California or otherwise required by **Charter School**.

B. Testing and Assessments:

SER will assist **Charter School** in the administration of all **State** required testing and other **State** mandated assessments, including a series of assessments designed to gauge the Student's mastery of core concepts and readiness for the State of California's standardize test or other **State** mandated testing.

C. Student Records Support:

SER will provide assistance to **Charter School** regarding maintenance of **Charter School**'s **Student Records** including digitization of permanent records in accordance with state, local and federal requirements.

D. Technology:

SER will provide a comprehensive Computer Technology and IT infrastructure solution to **Charter School** learning centers, office space and employees which shall include procuring, imaging, delivering, repairing, replacing, warehousing and collection of such Computer Technology, as well as other related comprehensive logistical support services including providing support services to local IT technicians and overseeing school level technicians and other related support positions. In addition to the Service Fee (defined hereinafter), **Charter School** shall pay to **SER** all technology costs.

E. Services to Special Needs Students:

SER will assist **Charter School** in the development of Special Education, English Language Learner, School Counseling, Student Retention Support, and Student Mentor Protocols. All service provider costs will be the sole responsibility of **Charter School**; and will provide consultative support to the operations of Student Services. **SER** will develop and oversee the academic counseling student support and other related services to the **Charter School** students.

F. Instructional Materials:

SER shall assist in developing curriculum and coordinate the purchase of the curriculum and instructional materials to be used by **Charter School** in order to offer rigorous and relevant curricula for the purpose of allowing students to progress as quickly as their capabilities will allow. Materials shall be designed in a language and format that are readily accessible, and students will be allowed to complete course work at their own pace, as the program will be formulated based on an initial assessment of the student's skill

levels in reading, math and other core courses. **Charter School** will be responsible for all curriculum and instructional material costs. **SER** shall retain all ownership and copyrights to any curricular material created by **SER** for the use by **Charter School**.

G. Marketing/Branding/Student Outreach:

SER will provide **Charter School** the design of all branded materials, including promo items, website design, collateral, wearables, print assets including tri-fold brochures, rack cards, newsletters, event fliers, graduation programs, and more. **SER** will establish brand and communication strategies across all channels and promote the brand. **SER** will maintain the **Charter School** public website that will contain any information required by **Charter School** and applicable state law. **SER** will review and provide a report of all social media properties, which may include Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and LinkedIn and provide refinements to increase traffic. **SER** will coordinate and manage all third party vendors on behalf of **Charter School**. **Charter School** will be solely responsible for those third party vendor costs. **SER** shall provide a "call-center" to assist in parent student enrollment inquiries and to facilitate parent/student appointments at resource centers.

H. Community Partnerships:

SER shall coordinate **Charter School's** community relationships, including with local non-profits, governmental agencies, local businesses and higher education institutions.

I. Learning Center Furnishings:

SER will procure and oversee the installation of all necessary furnishing and equipment for each **Charter School** facility. **Charter School** will be solely responsible for the cost of furniture and equipment.

J. Student Information:

SER will serve as the liaison between **Charter School** and the student information system provider as well as various curricular, instructional and data warehousing/reporting software and resources; perform quality data tracking, including but not limited to student data such as attendance, performance, etc.; and, shall coordinate and manage school data as the technology system is developed and maintained. **SER** shall prepare and submit all required State reporting regarding student enrollment, demographics, etc. **SER** will provide periodic reports on student performance, and assessments of whether educational goals and measurements are being achieved.

K. Athletics Program Development:

SER will assist in developing, implementing and administering an athletics program to the **Charter School** to assist in student retention and engagement and provide additional opportunities for student involvement, interaction and personal growth.

L. Operations:

SER will provide support to **Charter School** in all educational operational areas including without limitation: special education, community relationships, instructional materials, marketing/branding, professional development and technology.

M. School Calendar:

SER will develop the annual multi-track school calendar to be used by **Charter School**.

Addendum Services (SER) – No additional cost

SER shall not charge any fees for the services provided herein absent further written agreement of the Parties, it being the Parties' intent, at the present time, that said services shall be provided as part of the fees paid by School to SER under the existing ESA.

School shall select an Offered Program by submitting a program order, SER shall engage the Offered Program Providers on School's behalf. SER shall be responsible for administration of enrollment of School's students in Offered Programs, facilitate and process payments to Offered Program Providers on behalf of School, process any and all documentation necessary for and related to participation of School's students in Offered Programs and any educational credits associated therewith, supervise Offered Program Providers to ensure quality control and compliance, and all other services incidental to facilitation of School's participation in and delivery of Offered Programs to School's students.

<u>Offered Programs</u>. Upon request, SER shall provide to School the following experiential learning programs (the "Offered Programs"):

- Domestic and/or international student travel;
- Organic farming Sustainable living programs;
- Ranch programs;
- College tours, historic city tours (e.g., Washington D.C.) or service learning trips; and
- Other experiential learning programming to be developed which may include, without limitation, seminars, workshops, outdoor activities, and other on or offsite programs.

Dear Dr. Hunt,

Crescent View West Public Charter School (Crescent View West) is appreciative of the support of the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools (FCSS) and Fresno County Board of Education (FCBE) over the last 10 years. Crescent View West remains fully committed to its continuing accountability and transparency as it pursues its mission to serve opportunity youth in Fresno County.

As promised during our call on Monday, September 21, 2020, below and enclosed are Crescent View West's responses to the requests for information directed to Crescent View West.

1. Detailed fee schedule from LLAC explaining what services are provided, what each service costs to Crescent View West, and what the fee is based on.

CVW Response: Please refer to Attachment A.

2. The precise amount of the PPP, how it was spent, and how state funding for the same timeframe was spent.

CVW Response: Crescent View West received \$2,276,562 in PPP loan funds from the Small Business Administration in response to the Coronavirus and the resulting impacts on the school's funding.

As required by the Small Business Administration guidelines, Crescent View West is using the PPP loan funds for Crescent View West staff salaries and benefits within a 24-week period starting in May 14, 2020. Crescent View West sought PPP loans as it continued to operate and serve students throughout the COVID-19 pandemic to protect the employment of its teachers, counselors, and tutors, and to keep its at-risk students engaged and prevent



them from falling backwards into the dropout cycle. Because of the PPP funds, Crescent View West has been able to retain all of its employees during the pandemic.

Because the PPP funds were earmarked to pay the salaries and benefits for Crescent View West, the school was able to use state LCFF funding that would have otherwise paid for the salaries and benefits to enhance student outreach, close the digital and learning gap by purchasing Chromebooks for students who would have otherwise been unable to connect, help those students who lack an internet connection, increase cleaning efforts to limit contamination, and to defray many other additional expenses that arose from the school site shutdown and transition to distance learning. Additionally, Crescent View West is working to help students obtain Coronavirus testing at no-charge and has purchased Wi-Fi hot spots for students in need. Therefore, LCFF state funds and PPP loan funds do not overlap as PPP funds were allocated to pay for payroll, and state funds were redirected to support remote learning and close the connectivity gap.

Senate Bill 98 forced Crescent View West to cut off its ADA reporting as of 2/29/2020, resulting in a reduction in ADA of 56.56 for FY19-20. Because of the current ADA funding cap under Senate Bill 820, Crescent View West's ADA has also been reduced by 56.56 for this year (FY20-21). The ADA reductions in both years will have a negative financial impact on Crescent View West of approximately \$1.4M. Also, Crescent View West was denied eligibility for full Learning Loss Mitigation Funding under Senate Bill 98, except the proportion of statewide LCFF entitlement, simply because Crescent View West is a non-classroom-based (NCB) charter school. As such, Crescent View West did not receive any special education funding under the CARES Act Coronavirus Relief (CR) Fund or Governor's Emergency Education Relief (GEER) funds, nor the CR proportion of statewide Supplemental and Concentration funding, which would have totaled nearly \$2M had the school been deemed eligible.

Additionally, the PPP loans will help to mitigate state budget shortfalls and LCFF funding deferrals starting with June 2020, and February through June of 2021, potential deferrals in 2022, and current and future uncertainties. Please note Crescent View West does not qualify for government loans such as TRANS loans with 0% interest for which public district schools qualify, and as noted above, Crescent View West is only eligible to receive the LCFF portion of the Learning Loss Mitigation Funds as a NCB charter school.

Crescent View West's cash flow projections include deferrals of state apportionments in fiscal years 2021-22 and 2022-23 (see Attachment B). This assumption is based on information shared during FCMAT meetings about the high probability of having deferrals in future years as the economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic to the state, including reduction to state income, ending of federal emergency funding, and time to recover, will impact state payment of school funds. As a result, Crescent View West is taking a conservative approach in its cash flow projections to ensure the school's financial health during this period.



In anticipation of funding deferrals for upcoming fiscal years 2021-22 and 2022-23, Crescent View West will monitor cash flows on a weekly basis to plan all expenditures and necessary borrowing to meet cash needs. Crescent View West will secure additional funds to address any deficiencies resulting from expected and unexpected deferrals through a line of credit with Hanmi Bank and short-term borrowing from Lifelong Learning Administration Corporation, and will continue assessing the market for the lowest interest rate borrowing.

3. What staff members for Crescent View West are shared staff with other schools? Does this include any teachers? If so, what contracts or written agreements exist to ensure administrators, teachers and other shared staff are allocated appropriately?

CVW Response: The process for allocating compensation and benefits for shared staff follows a procedure that starts with the Area Superintendent informing the Human Resources Department of shared staff.

Upon request of the Area Superintendent or their designee, a Personnel Action Form (PAF) is submitted to the Human Resources Department to record any transactions related to new hire employment, terminations, changes in employment status, changes to compensation of an individual employee, etc. The PAF is used each time there is an action that should be recorded in the individual's personnel file or that requires payroll action. According to Human Resources Department procedure, allocation of staff compensation may be allocated across multiple locations as long as they all fall under the employee's primary charter, i.e., Site A - 50%, Site B – 25%, Site C – 25%.

If the allocation of employee compensation requires a partial allocation outside of the employee's primary charter, the Area Superintendent directs the Finance Department to allocate the compensation during period-end closing based upon the anticipated allocation of the employee's time devoted to each charter. At the conclusion of the fiscal year, a "true-up" process is undertaken to ensure that the final allocations are consistent with actual time devoted by the employee to the charters.

4. Bylaws, board minutes, audits and budgets for LLAC

CVW Response: LLAC is a third party vendor providing services to Crescent View West pursuant to services contracts. Accordingly, Crescent View West does not have access to the requested documents.

5. What is LLAC's role in hiring, training, and evaluating administrators and teachers?

CVW Response: LLAC assists Crescent View West with a dedicated professional team of recruiters who utilize fully integrated software solutions to build talent pools, nurture



candidate/new hire/employee relationships, and support the complete employee life cycle. LLAC services include assistance in recruiting, screening of new employees, preemployment screening services, verify, check and monitor credentials for certificated staff, coordinate new hire orientation, collaborate with charter school leader of new teacher training and onboarding, and staff evaluation procedures. The Crescent View West Area Superintendent and school leadership maintain full responsibility for the hiring, training and evaluation of school staff.

6. Are any services provided competitively bid and, if so, who manages the process and makes final decisions?

CVW Response: Contracts are competitively bid. Crescent View West's board-approved accounting manual requires the school to obtain three quotes for any purchase of \$25,000 or more. When quotes are received, they are evaluated based on price, functionality, warranty, repair and maintenance issues, reliability, and other factors. The CFO or designee reviews the bids and forwards their recommendations to the CEO or designee for final review and decision. For example, Crescent View West's 2020-2021 networking cable vendor contract and network equipment vendor contracts were competitively bid. Construction work (i.e., learning center improvements) are also competitively bid. For school purchases, Crescent View West uses a procurement system that it believes more efficiently identifies qualified vendors and optimal pricing. Across the country, group purchasing organizations (GPO) are used to leverage bulk purchasing strategies while vetting vendors on behalf of the participating organizations. Crescent View West's purchases are administered through the GPO, CHAMPS Group Purchasing (CHAMPS). In addition to fully vetting the vendors, CHAMPS engages a competitive bidding process and negotiates significant discounts achieved in part by leveraging purchases through 14,000 participating organizations. Through this system, Crescent View West's purchases are made in a manner that achieves the same or better results than what would otherwise be a narrower and substantially more time consuming and expensive procurement process.

7. Listing of teachers with specific class roster, and whether any teachers are teaching for more than one Learn 4 Life school.

CVW Response: Teachers employed by Crescent View West may hold secondary parttime employment with district(s) or other charter schools so long as doing so does not interfere with their primary obligations to Crescent View West. Please refer to Attachment C for the school's current teacher list.



8. Information about significant contracts. For example, Crescent View West contracted with Choice Educational Services for \$115,000 in the year ending in June of 2017, and \$165,000 in the year ending in June 2018 according to organizational 990s. What service does this entity provide, and can Crescent View West provide contracts with this vendor?

CVW Response: In 2016-2017, Crescent View West paid Choice Educational Services (CES) \$2,500 for professional development courses (\$2,500) and for a nutrition program for the school's students (\$112,500).

In 2017-2018, Crescent View West paid CES for a nutrition program for the school's students (\$112,500), professional development courses (\$2,500), and for a "Quarterbacks for Life" program (\$50,000). The Quarterbacks for Life program is a nationally acclaimed student success and leadership program available through the Beating the Odds Foundation. The program teaches students how to apply what they learn in school to create and sustain a caring school community and to achieve success in life, school and career.

9. Is the contract with LLAC competitively bid? If not, what criteria is used for the school to determine who to contract with for curriculum and support services and whether the contract with LLAC continues to be in the best interest of the local school?

CVW Response: No, the contract is not competitively bid. However, regular evaluations are made to ensure that the fees paid for LLAC services and the scope of services provided for such fees are consistent with or better than the market generally. Provided herewith in Attachment A is a report prepared by independent legal counsel summarizing a years-long process of conducting and updating studies of educational and administrative services providers' fees and scopes of services to charter schools in the marketplace.

10. Is it in the best interest of the local school to continue to allow EAC to be the sole statutory member of Crescent View West, given they have appointed board members that serve on multiple other Learn 4 Life boards?

CVW Response: Yes. EAC plays the important role of ensuring that all of the charters of which it is the sole member are governed by board members who believe in the Learn4Life mission and share a common dedication to serving at-risk and opportunity youth through the Learn4Life personalized education model. Students in the Learn4Life network are highly migratory often moving from one Learn4Life school to another due to socio-economic challenges. Ensuring operational consistency among the charter ensures that these students do not relinquish educational progress due to their moves.

BACKGROUND:	Proposition 4 of 1979 added Article XIII B to the State Constitution. It was authored by Paul Gann, co-author of Proposition 13 of 1978, as part of the "taxpayers' revolt" movement. Popularly known as the Gann Amendment or Gann Limit, it limits the growth in appropriations that may be made by the State of California and local governments, cities, counties, special districts, school districts, and county offices of education. This initiative did not require cuts in government spending, but rather limited the growth in government spending to be no faster than the growth in population and inflation.
	School agencies are required to perform annual Gann Limit calculations and bring them to their governing boards for public disclosure and adoption. In addition, the State of California utilizes these calculations to determine their own Gann Limit comparison. (The difference between our Gann Limit and appropriations subject to the Limit, plus all state aid for categorical programs, counts toward the State's Gann Limit.)
	The attached schedule represents the calculations of the appropriations limits for the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools for both the previous and current year. The prior year's Gann limit was increased for inflation (based on per capita income changes) and population (based on ADA). The schedule compares the calculated limit for 2019-20 to the actual appropriations (local taxes) that count toward the limit. The Office of the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools does not exceed its appropriation limit.

- The employer certifies that the appointment is necessary to fill a critically needed position before 180 days have passed.
- The appointment has been approved by the governing body of the employer in a public meeting.

The District finds the appointment of retiree, Vicente Ortega, is necessary to fill the critically needed position of School Bus Driver II for the District. Due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic the District has a need for qualified school bus drivers. The employment for the retiree shall be limited to 960 hours per fiscal year.

The District finds the appointment of retiree, Richard Thaxton, is necessary to fill the critically needed position of School Bus Driver II for the District. Due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic the District has a need for qualified school bus drivers. The employment for the retiree shall be limited to 960 hours per fiscal year.

Students PARENT RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that parents/guardians of students of County Superintendent/County Board schools have certain rights as well as responsibilities related to the education of their children.

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that the education of the students County Superintendent/County Board schools is a shared responsibility. The County Superintendent or designee shall work with parents/guardians, including parents/guardians of English learners, to determine appropriate roles and responsibilities of parents/guardians, school staff and students for continuing the intellectual, physical, emotional and social development and well-being of students at each school site, including the means by which the schools and parents/guardians can help students achieve academic and other standards of the school.

Within this framework, the school's primary responsibility shall be to provide a high-quality curriculum and instructional program in a supportive and effective learning environment that enables all students to meet the academic expectations of the school.

Parents/guardians shall have the opportunity to work with schools in a mutually supportive and respectful partnership and to help their children succeed in school. (Education Code 51100)

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that County Superintendent staff understand the rights of parents/guardians afforded by law and County Superintendent and County Board policy and follow acceptable practices that respect those rights.

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that parents/guardians receive notification regarding their rights in accordance with law.

The County Superintendent or designee shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that all parents/guardians who speak a language other than English are properly notified in English, and in their home language of the rights and opportunities available to them pursuant to Education Code 48985. (Education Code 51101.1)

Students NONCUSTODIAL PARENTS

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize the right of parents/guardians to be involved in the education of their children and desires to balance that right with the County Superintendent's need to ensure the safety of students while at school.

The parent/guardian who enrolls a child in a County Superintendent-operated school shall be presumed to be the child's custodial parent/guardian and shall be held responsible for the child's welfare.

School officials shall presume that both parents/guardians have equal rights regarding their child, including, but not limited to, picking the student up after school or otherwise removing the student from school, accessing student records, participating in school activities, or visiting the school. When a court order restricts access to the child or to his/her student information, a parent/guardian shall provide a copy of the certified court order to the lead site administrator or designee upon enrollment or upon a change in circumstances.

In the event of an attempted violation of a court order that restricts access to a student, the lead site administrator or designee shall contact the custodial parent and local law enforcement officials and shall make the student available only after one or both of these parties consent.

Students STUDENT AND FAMILY PRIVACY RIGHTS

The County Superintendent and County Board respect the rights of County Superintendent-operated school students and their parents/guardians with regard to the privacy of their personal beliefs and the confidentiality of their personal information.

The County Superintendent or designee may collect, disclose, or use students' personal information for the exclusive purpose of developing, evaluating, or providing educational products or services for or to students or educational institutions, such as the following:

- 1. College or other postsecondary education recruitment or military recruitment.
- 2. Book clubs, magazines, and programs providing access to low-cost literary products.
- 3. Curriculum and instructional materials used by elementary and secondary schools.
- 4. Tests and assessments to provide cognitive, evaluative, diagnostic, clinical, aptitude, or achievement information about students (or to generate other statistically useful data for the purpose of securing such tests and assessments) and the subsequent analysis and public release of the aggregate data from such tests and assessments.
- 5. The sale by students of products or services to raise funds for school-related or education-related activities.
- 6. Student recognition programs.
- (20 USC 1232h(c)(4)(A))

The County Superintendent or designee may collect, disclose, or use a student's individually identifiable information, including his/her name, parent/guardian's name, home or other physical address, or telephone number for the purpose of marketing or selling that information or providing the information to others for that purpose.

However, the County Superintendent shall not use surveys to collect social security numbers or the last four digits of social security numbers, or information or documents regarding citizenship or immigration status, of students or their families. (Education Code 234.7, 49076.7)

The County Superintendent or designee shall consult with parents/guardians regarding the development of regulations pertaining to other uses of personal information, which shall, at a minimum, address the following: (20 USC 1232h)

1. Arrangements for protecting student privacy when collecting, disclosing, or using students' individually identifiable information for any purpose.

- 2. Arrangements to protect student privacy in the administration of surveys that may request information about the personal beliefs and practices of students and their families.
- 3. The rights of parents/guardians to inspect the following, and any applicable procedures for granting reasonable access to the following in a reasonable period of time:
 - a. Survey instruments requesting information about their personal beliefs and practices or those of their children.
 - b. Instructional materials used as part of their children's educational curriculum.
 - c. Instruments used in the collection of personal information for the purpose of marketing or sale.
- 4. Any nonemergency physical examinations or screenings that the school may administer.

The County Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians of the adoption or continued use of the County Superintendent and County Board policy pertaining to the rights specified in items #1-4 above. (20 USC 1232h)

Student STUDENT WELLNESS

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize the link between student health and learning and desires to provide a comprehensive program promoting healthy eating and physical activity for students of County Superintendent/County Board schools. The County Superintendent or designee shall build a coordinated school health system that supports and reinforces health literacy through health education, physical education and activity, health services, nutrition services, psychological and behavioral counseling services, health promotion for staff, a safe and healthy school environment, and parent/guardian and community involvement.

To encourage consistent health messages between the home and school environment, the County Superintendent or designee may disseminate health information and/or student wellness policy to parents/guardians through newsletters, handouts, parent/guardian meetings, web sites, and other communications. Outreach to parents/guardians shall emphasize the relationship between student health and academic performance.

The County Superintendent or designee shall permit parents/guardians, students, food service employees, physical education teachers, school health professionals, Board members, school administrators, and members of the public to participate in the development, implementation, and periodic review and update of the student wellness policy.

Goals for Nutrition, Physical Activity, and Other Wellness Activities

The County Superintendent shall adopt goals for nutrition promotion and education, physical activity, and other school-based activities that promote student wellness.

County Superintendent/County Board nutrition education and physical education programs shall be based on research, consistent with the expectations established in the state's curriculum frameworks and content standards, and designed to build the skills and knowledge that all students need to maintain a healthy lifestyle.

Nutrition education shall be provided as part of the health education program and, as appropriate, shall be integrated into other academic subjects in the regular educational program. Nutrition education also may be offered through before- and after-school programs and summer learning programs.

All students shall be provided opportunities to be physically active on a regular basis. Opportunities for moderate to vigorous physical activity shall be provided through physical education and recess and may also be provided through school athletic programs, extracurricular programs, before- and after-school programs, summer learning programs, programs encouraging students to walk or bicycle to and from school, in-class physical activity breaks, and other structured and unstructured activities.

The County Superintendent or designee shall encourage staff to serve as positive role models for healthy eating and physical fitness. He/she shall promote work-site wellness and may provide opportunities for regular physical activity among employees. Professional development may include instructional strategies that assess health knowledge and skills and promote healthy behaviors.

Nutritional Guidelines for Foods Available at School

For all foods available on each campus during the school day, the County Superintendent shall adopt nutrition guidelines which are consistent with 42 USC 1758, 1766, 1773 and 1779, and which support the objectives of promoting student health and reducing childhood obesity.

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that foods and beverages available to students at County Superintendent/County Board schools should support the health curriculum and promote optimal health. Nutrition standards adopted by the County Superintendent for foods and beverages provided to students, including foods and beverages provided through the food service program, student stores, vending machines, or other venues, shall meet or exceed state and federal nutritional standards.

To reinforce the nutrition education program, the County Superintendent prohibits the marketing and advertising of foods and beverages that do not meet nutrition standards for the sale of foods and beverages in County Superintendent/County Board facilities during the school day.

In order to maximize the ability to provide nutritious meals and snacks, the County Superintendent shall participate in available federal school nutrition programs, including the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs and after-school snack programs, to the extent possible. When approved by the California Department of Education, the County Superintendent may sponsor a summer meal program.

The County Superintendent shall provide access to free, potable water during meal times in the food service area in accordance with Education Code 38086 and 42 USC 1758, and shall encourage students' consumption of water by educating them about the health benefits of water and serving water in an appealing manner.

Program Implementation and Evaluation

The County Superintendent designates the Deputy Superintendent, Educational Services to ensure that each school site complies with this policy. The Deputy Superintendent can be reached at (559) 265-3090.

The Deputy Superintendent, Educational Services, shall assess the implementation and effectiveness of this policy at least once every three years.

The assessment shall include the extent to which County Superintendent/County Board schools are in compliance with this policy, the extent to which this policy compares to model wellness

policies available from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and a description of the progress made in attaining the goals of the wellness policy.

The Deputy Superintendent, Educational Services shall invite feedback on County Superintendent program wellness activities from food service personnel, school administrators, the wellness council, parents/guardians, students, teachers, before- and after-school program staff, and/or other appropriate persons.

The Deputy Superintendent, Educational Services, shall inform and update the public, including parents/guardians, students, and others in the community, about the contents and implementation of this policy. He/she shall periodically measure and make available to the public an assessment of the extent to which County Superintendent/County Board schools and programs are in compliance with this policy, the extent to which this policy compares to model wellness policies available from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and a description of the progress made in attaining the goals of the wellness policy.

Posting Requirements

Each school site shall post a summary or complete copies of the County Superintendent/County Board policies and regulations on nutrition and physical activity in public view within all school cafeterias or in other central eating areas. (Education Code 49432)

Students ADMISSION

The County Superintendent and County Board encourage the enrollment and appropriate placement of all school-aged children in school. The County Superintendent or designee shall inform parents/guardians of children seeking admission to a County Superintendent-operated school at any grade level about admission requirements and shall assist them with enrollment procedures.

The County Superintendent or designee shall maintain procedures which provide for the verification of all entrance requirements specified in law and in County Superintendent/County Board policies and administrative regulations.

The County Superintendent's enrollment application shall include information about the health care options and enrollment assistance available to families with students contemplating enrollment in County Superintendent-operated schools. The County Superintendent shall not discriminate against any child for not having health care coverage and shall not use any information relating to a child's health care coverage or interest in learning about health care coverage in any manner that would harm the child or the child's family. (Education Code 49452.9)

The County Superintendent shall not inquire into or request documentation of a student's social security number or the last four digits of the social security number or the citizenship or immigration status of the student or his/her family members. (Education Code 234.7, 49076.7)

However, such information may be collected when required by state or federal law or to comply with requirements for special state or federal programs. In any such situation, the information shall be collected separately from the school enrollment process and the County Superintendent or designee shall explain the limited purpose for which the information is collected. Enrollment in a County Superintendent-operated school shall not be denied on the basis of any such information of the student or his/her parents/guardians obtained by the County Superintendent, or the student's or parent/guardian's refusal to provide such information to the County Superintendent.

The County Superintendent or designee shall immediately enroll a homeless student, foster youth, student who has had contact with the juvenile justice system, or a child of a military family regardless of outstanding fees or fines owed to the student's last school, lack of clothing normally required by the school, such as school uniforms, or his/her inability to produce previous academic, medical, or other records normally required for enrollment. Students ABSENCES AND EXCUSES

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that regular attendance plays an important role in student achievement. The County Superintendent shall work with parents/guardians and students to ensure their compliance with all state attendance laws and may use appropriate legal means to correct problems of chronic absence or truancy.

Absence from school shall be excused only for health reasons, family emergencies, and justifiable personal reasons, as permitted by law, County Superintendent policy, and administrative regulation. (Education Code 48205)

Student absence for religious instruction or participation in religious exercises away from school property may be considered excused subject to law and administrative regulation. (Education Code 46014)

Inasmuch as school attendance and class participation are integral to students' learning experiences, parents/guardians and students shall be encouraged to schedule medical and other appointments during non-school hours.

Students shall not be absent from school without their parents/guardians' knowledge or consent, except in cases of medical emergency or, as authorized pursuant to Education Code 46010.1, for a confidential medical appointment.

The County Superintendent shall approve reasonable methods that may be used to verify student absences due to illness or quarantine. (5 CCR 421)

Students CHRONIC ABSENCE AND TRUANCY

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that absenteeism, whatever the cause, may be an early warning sign of poor academic achievement and may put students at risk of dropping out of school. The County Superintendent and County Board desire to ensure that all students attend school in accordance with the state's compulsory education law and take full advantage of educational opportunities provided by the County Superintendent.

The County Superintendent or designee shall establish a system to accurately track student attendance in order to identify individual students who are chronic absentees and truants, as defined in law and administrative regulation, and to identify patterns of absence. The County Superintendent or designee shall provide the County Board with data on school attendance, chronic absence, and truancy rates for each school operated by the County Superintendent, and disaggregated for each numerically significant student subgroup as defined in Education Code 52052. Such data shall be used in the development of annual goals and specific actions for student attendance and engagement to be included in the County Superintendent's local control and accountability plan(s) and other applicable plans.

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies that focus on prevention of attendance problems, which may include, but are not limited to, efforts to provide a safe and positive school environment, relevant and engaging learning experiences, school activities that help develop students' feelings of connectedness with the school, school-based health services, and incentives and rewards to recognize students who achieve excellent attendance or demonstrate significant improvement in attendance. The County Superintendent or designee also shall develop strategies that enable early outreach to students as soon as they show signs of poor attendance.

The County Superintendent or designee shall consult with students, parents/guardians, school staff, and community agencies, as appropriate, to identify factors contributing to chronic absence and truancy.

Interventions for students with serious attendance problems shall be designed to meet the specific needs of the student and may include, but are not limited to, health care referrals, transportation assistance, counseling for mental or emotional difficulties, academic supports, efforts to address school or community safety concerns, discussions with the student and parent/guardian about their attitudes regarding schooling, or other strategies to remove identified barriers to school attendance. The County Superintendent or designee may collaborate with child welfare services, law enforcement, courts, public health care agencies, other government agencies, community-based organizations, and/or medical, mental health, and oral health care providers, to make alternative educational programs and support services available for students and families.

Students who are identified as truant shall be subject to the interventions specified in law and administrative regulation.

A student's truancy, tardiness, or other absence from school shall not be the basis for his/her suspension or expulsion. Alternative strategies and positive reinforcement for attendance shall be used whenever possible.

The County Superintendent or designee shall periodically analyze information regarding the County Superintendent's progress in improving student attendance rates for all students and for each numerically significant student population. Such information shall be used to evaluate the effectiveness of strategies implemented to reduce chronic absence and truancy and to make changes as needed. As appropriate, the County Superintendent or designee shall engage school staff in program evaluation and improvement and in the determination of how to best allocate available community resources.

Students WORK PERMITS

The County Superintendent recognizes that part-time employment can provide students with income as well as job experience that can help them develop appropriate workplace skills and attitudes. Upon obtaining an offer of employment, students who are minors shall obtain work permits from the County Superintendent or designee in accordance with law, regardless of whether the employment will occur when school is in session and/or not in session.

In determining whether to grant or continue a work permit, the County Superintendent or designee shall consider whether employment is likely to significantly interfere with the student's schoolwork. Students granted work permits must demonstrate and maintain a 2.0 grade point average and satisfactory school attendance. On a case-by-case basis, the County Superintendent or designee may approve a maximum work hour limit that is lower than the limit specified in law and administrative regulation.

Students with work permits may be exempted from attendance in a full-time day school provided they attend part-time classes. (Education Code 48230)

Work permits shall be limited to part-time employment as defined by law, except when the County Superintendent or designee determines that circumstances warrant the granting of a permit for full-time employment.

Any student authorized to work full time when school is in session shall be enrolled in part-time continuation classes. A student age 14 or 15 who receives a permit to work full time shall also be enrolled in a work experience education program. (Education Code 49130, 49131, 49135)

Students GRADES/EVALUATION OF STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that grades serve a valuable instructional purpose by helping students and parents/guardians understand performance expectations and identifying the student's areas of strength and those areas needing improvement. Parents/guardians and students have the right to receive course grades that represent an accurate evaluation of the student's academic performance.

The County Superintendent or designee shall establish a uniform grading system that shall be applied to all students in that course and grade level. Teachers shall inform students and parents/guardians how academic performance will be evaluated in the classroom.

A teacher shall base a student's grades solely on the quality of the student's academic work and his/her mastery of course content based on County Superintendent standards. Students shall have the opportunity to demonstrate this mastery through a variety of methods, including, but not limited to, tests, projects, portfolios, and/or class discussion as appropriate. Other elements that are not a direct measure of knowledge and understanding of course content, such as attendance, effort, student conduct, and work habits, shall not be factored into the academic grade but may be reported separately.

Whenever a student misses an assignment or assessment due to either an excused or unexcused absence, he/she shall be given full credit for subsequent satisfactory completion of the assignment or assessment.

At all grade levels, report cards may include reports of student progress on specific academic standards applicable to the course and grade level.

When reporting student performance to parents/guardians, teachers may add narrative descriptions, observational notes, and/or samples of classroom work in order to better describe student progress in specific skills and subcategories of achievement.

A report card for a student with a disability may contain information about his/her disability, including whether that student received special education or related services, provided that the report card informs parents/guardians about their child's progress or level of achievement in specific classes, course content, or curriculum. However, transcripts that may be used to inform postsecondary institutions or prospective employers of the student's academic achievements shall not contain information disclosing the student's disability.

A grade assigned by the teacher shall not be changed by the County Superintendent or County Board except as provided by law, County Superintendent/County Board policy, or administrative regulation. (Education Code 49066)

The County Superintendent or designee shall determine the methodology to be used in calculating students' grade point average (GPA), including the courses to be included within the GPA and whether extra grade weighting shall be applied to Advanced Placement, International

Baccalaureate, honors, and/or concurrent postsecondary courses.

Students PROMOTION/ACCELERATION/RETENTION

The County Superintendent and County Board expect students to progress through each grade level within one school year. Toward this end, instruction shall be designed to accommodate the variety of ways that students learn and provide strategies for addressing academic deficiencies as needed.

Students shall progress through the grade levels by demonstrating growth in learning and meeting grade-level standards of expected student achievement.

When high academic achievement is evident, the teacher may recommend a student for acceleration to a higher grade level. The student's maturity level shall be taken into consideration in making a determination to accelerate a student. (Education Code 48070)

Teachers shall identify students who should be retained or who are at risk of being retained at their current grade level as early as possible in the school year and as early in their school careers as practicable. Students shall specifically be assessed at the following grade levels: (Education Code 48070.5)

- 1. Between grades 2 and 3
- 2. Between grades 3 and 4
- 3. Between grades 4 and 5
- 4. Between the end of the intermediate grades and the beginning of the middle school grades
- 5. Between the end of the middle school grades and the beginning of the high school grades

Students shall be identified for retention on the basis of failure to meet minimum levels of proficiency, as indicated by the results of state assessments administered pursuant to Education Code 60640-60649 and the minimum levels of proficiency recommended by the State Board of Education pursuant to Education Code 60648.

Students between grades 2 and 3 and grades 3 and 4 shall be identified primarily on the basis of their level of proficiency in reading. Proficiency in reading, English language arts, and mathematics shall be the basis for identifying students between grades 4 and 5, between intermediate and middle school grades, and between middle school grades and high school grades. (Education Code 48070.5)

If a student does not have a single regular classroom teacher, the County Superintendent or designee shall specify the teacher(s) responsible for the decision to promote or retain the student. (Education Code 48070.5)

The teacher's decision to promote or retain a student may be appealed in accordance with County Superintendent Administrative Regulation 5123 - Promotion/Acceleration/Retention.

When any student in grades 2-9 is recommended for retention or is identified as being at risk for retention, the County Superintendent or designee shall offer an appropriate program of remedial instruction to assist the student in meeting grade-level expectations. (Education Code 48070.5)

Students STUDENT RECORDS

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize the importance of keeping accurate, comprehensive student records as required by law. The County Superintendent or designee shall establish administrative regulations governing the identification, collection, retention, and security of student records. These regulations shall ensure the rights of authorized persons to have timely access to student records while maintaining the confidentiality of student records consistent with state and federal law.

The County Superintendent or designee shall designate a certificated employee to serve as custodian of records with responsibility for student records at the County Superintendent's Cabinet level. At each school, the lead site administrator or a certificated employee shall be designated as custodian of records for students enrolled at that school. The custodian of records shall be responsible for implementing the policy and administrative regulation regarding student records. (5 CCR 431)

All appropriate personnel shall receive training regarding County Superintendent and County Board policies and procedures for gathering and handling sensitive student information.

The County Superintendent shall not collect or solicit social security numbers or the last four digits of social security numbers of students or their parents/guardians, unless otherwise required to do so by state or federal law. (Education Code 49076.7)

No information or documents regarding the citizenship or immigration status of students or their family members shall be collected, except as required by state or federal law or as required to administer a state or federally supported educational program. The County Superintendent or designee shall not disclose student records to a person, agency, or organization for immigration enforcement purposes without parental consent, a court order, or a judicial subpoena. If a County Superintendent employee receives such a request, he/she shall immediately report the request to the County Superintendent. (Education Code 234.7)

The County Superintendent or designee shall not compile a list, registry, or database based on students' national origin, ethnicity, or religious belief, practice, or affiliation, nor shall he/she disclose student information to federal government authorities for the purpose of compiling such a list, registry, or database for purposes of immigration enforcement. Such information may only be compiled or exchanged with other local, state, or federal agencies if the information is aggregated and is not personally identifiable. (Government Code 8310.3)

Contract for Digital Storage, Management, and Retrieval of Student Records

The County Superintendent or designee may enter into a contract with a third party for the digital storage, management, and retrieval of student records and/or to authorize a third party provider of digital software to access, store, and use student records, provided that the contract meets the requirements of Education Code 49073.1 and other applicable state and federal laws.

Students RELEASE OF DIRECTORY INFORMATION

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize the importance of maintaining the confidentiality of directory information and therefore authorize the release of such information only in accordance with law, policy, and administrative regulation.

The County Superintendent or designee may release student directory information to representatives of the news media or nonprofit organizations in accordance with County Superintendent and County Board policy and administrative regulation.

The County Superintendent or designee may limit or deny the release of specific categories of directory information to any public or private nonprofit organization based on his/her determination of the best interests of students. (Education Code 49073)

Colleges and prospective employers, including military recruiters, shall have access to directory information. Military recruiters shall have access to a student's name, address, and telephone number, unless the parent/guardian has specified that the information not be released in accordance with law and administrative regulation. (20 USC 7908; 10 USC 503; Education Code 49603)

Under no circumstances shall directory information be disclosed to a private profit-making entity, except for representatives of the news media and prospective employers, in accordance with County Superintendent and County Board policy. Private schools and colleges may be given the names and addresses of 12th-grade students and students who are no longer enrolled provided that they use this information only for purposes directly related to the institution's academic or professional goals. (Education Code 49073)

Students CONDUCT

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that all students have the right to be educated in a safe and positive learning environment free from disruptions. Students shall be expected to exhibit appropriate conduct that does not infringe upon the rights of others or interfere with the school program while on school grounds, going to or coming from school, at school activities, or using County Superintendent transportation.

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each school develops standards of conduct and discipline consistent with County Superintendent and County Board policies and administrative regulations. Students and parents/guardians shall be notified of school, and County Superintendent and County Board rules related to conduct.

Prohibited student conduct includes, but is not limited to:

- 1. Conduct that endangers students, staff, or others, including, but not limited to, physical violence, possession of a firearm or other weapon, and terrorist threats
- 2. Discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying of students or staff, including sexual harassment, hate-motivated behavior, cyberbullying, hazing or initiation activity, extortion, or any other verbal, written, or physical conduct that causes or threatens to cause violence, bodily harm, or substantial disruption to the school program
- 3. Conduct that disrupts the orderly classroom or school environment
- 4. Willful defiance of staff's authority
- 5. Damage to or theft of property belonging to students, staff, or the County Superintendent or County Board
- 6. Obscene acts or use of profane, vulgar, or abusive language
- 7. Possession, use, or being under the influence of tobacco, alcohol, or other prohibited substances
- Possession or use of a laser pointer, unless for a valid instructional or other school-related purpose with prior permission of the lead site administrator or designee (Penal Code 417.27)
- Use of a cell phone, smart watch, pager, or other mobile communication device during instructional time or in an unauthorized manner in violation of County Superintendent or County Board policy
- 10. Plagiarism or dishonesty on school work or tests

- 11. Wearing of any attire that violates school, or County Superintendent or County Board dress codes, including gang-related apparel
- 12. Tardiness or unexcused absence from school
- 13. Failure to remain on school premises in accordance with school rules

Employees are expected to enforce standards of conduct and, when they observe or receive a report of a violation of these standards, to appropriately intervene or seek assistance. As necessary, the employee shall refer the matter to a supervisor or the lead site administrator or designee.

When a school employee suspects that a search of a student or a student's belongings will turn up evidence of the student's violation of the law or school rules, such a search shall be conducted in accordance with applicable written policy.

When a student uses any prohibited device, or uses a permitted device in an unauthorized manner, a County Superintendent employee may confiscate the device. The employee shall store the device securely until it is returned to the student or turned over to the lead site administrator or designee, as appropriate.

Students who violate school, or County Superintendent or County Board rules and regulations may be subject to discipline. The County Superintendent or designee shall notify local law enforcement as appropriate.

Students also may be subject to discipline, in accordance with law, County Superintendent and County Board policy, or administrative regulation, for any off-campus conduct during nonschool hours which poses a threat or danger to the safety of students, staff, or County Superintendent or County Board property, or substantially disrupts school activities.

Students BUS CONDUCT

In order to help ensure the safety and well-being of students, bus drivers, and others, the County Superintendent and County Board expect students to exhibit appropriate and orderly conduct at all times when using school transportation, including while preparing to ride, riding, or leaving the bus.

The County Superintendent or designee shall establish regulations related to student conduct on buses, bus driver authority, and the suspension of riding privileges. He/she shall make these rules available to parents/guardians, students, and other interested parties. (5 CCR 14103)

Students found to be in violation of the County Superintendent's bus conduct rules shall be subject to discipline in accordance with County Superintendent and County Board policy and administrative regulation.

The County Superintendent or designee may deny a student the privilege of using school transportation upon the student's continued disorderly conduct or his/her persistent refusal to submit to the authority of the driver. (5 CCR 14103)

Bus Surveillance Systems

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that the use of surveillance systems on school buses may help to deter misconduct and improve discipline, ensure the safety of students and bus drivers, and prevent vandalism. Therefore, surveillance systems may be installed and used on school buses, or the County Superintendent may secure the use of buses with such systems, to monitor student behavior while traveling to and from school and school activities. Any video recorded may be used in student disciplinary proceedings or referred to local law enforcement, as appropriate.

Students BULLYING

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize the harmful effects of bullying on student well-being, student learning, and school attendance, and desire to provide a safe school environment that protects students from physical and emotional harm. No individual or group shall, through physical, written, verbal, visual, or other means, harass, sexually harass, threaten, intimidate, cyberbully, cause bodily injury to, or commit hate violence against any student or school personnel, or retaliate against them for filing a complaint or participating in the complaint resolution process.

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies for addressing bullying in County Superintendent/County Board schools with the involvement of students, parents/guardians, and staff. As appropriate, the County Superintendent or designee may also collaborate with social services, mental health services, law enforcement, courts, and other agencies and community organizations in the development and implementation of effective strategies to promote safety in schools and the community.

Such strategies shall be incorporated into the comprehensive safety plan and, to the extent possible, into the local control and accountability plan and other applicable school plans.

Any complaint of bullying shall be investigated and, if determined to be discriminatory, resolved in accordance with law and the County Superintendent's uniform complaint procedures specified in AR 1312.3. If, during the investigation, it is determined that a complaint is about nondiscriminatory bullying, the County Superintendent or designee shall inform the complainant and shall take all necessary actions to resolve the complaint.

Any employee who permits or engages in bullying or retaliation related to bullying shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

Students STUDENT DISTURBANCES

The County Superintendent desires to provide orderly campuses that create a positive school environment and are conducive to learning. When students initiate or are involved in a campus disturbance that has the potential to threaten the safety of students or staff, if no other method of de-escalation is successful or is likely to be successful, the County Superintendent or designee may request law enforcement assistance.

The County Superintendent or designee and the lead site administrator or other site supervisor of each school shall establish a school disturbance response plan that is intended to curb disruptions which may lead to riots, violence, or vandalism at school or at school-sponsored events. In developing each school's plan, the County Superintendent or designee shall consult with community-based organizations and local law enforcement authorities to create guidelines for law enforcement support and intervention.

Staff are encouraged to be alert to conditions at school that may lead to a disturbance, such as racial or cultural conflict, student protests, or gang intimidation and confrontations. Staff who believe that a disturbance is imminent, or who see a disturbance occurring, shall immediately contact the lead site administrator or other site supervisor and invoke the school disturbance response plan.

Students who participate in a campus disturbance shall be subject to disciplinary action in accordance with County Superintendent/County Board policy and administrative regulations.

Students VANDALISM AND GRAFFITI

The County Superintendent and County Board desire to enhance student learning by striving to provide an environment where students and staff can feel safe and secure and can take pride in their school. To that end, the County Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies for preventing graffiti and vandalism on school grounds, including collaborating with community-based organizations, local law enforcement and city and county officials, as appropriate, to help develop a coordinated response to graffiti and vandalism in the community.

Students and staff are encouraged to report any graffiti or vandalism to the lead site administrator or designee for investigation. The lead site administrator or designee shall determine whether the incident necessitates an investigation pursuant to the County Superintendent policies/procedures.

As appropriate, the lead site administrator or designee may contact local law enforcement in instances when the graffiti is repetitive, identifies particular targets or groups, identifies the perpetrator, and/or contains incitements to violence, threats, or intimidation. Photographs or other evidence of the vandalism or graffiti shall be preserved as necessary for investigation by County Superintendent or law enforcement and as evidence in any County Superintendent disciplinary proceedings.

The lead site administrator or designee shall ensure that graffiti on school grounds is removed and covered as soon as possible, and if practicable before the beginning of the school day.

A student who commits an act of vandalism or graffiti on school grounds shall be subject to disciplinary action in accordance with County Superintendent/County Board policy and administrative regulation. If reparation for damages is not made, the County Superintendent also may withhold the student's grades, diploma, and/or transcripts in accordance with law.

Students ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUGS

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that the use of alcohol or other drugs adversely affects a student's ability to achieve academic success, is physically and emotionally harmful, and has serious social and legal consequences. The County Superintendent or designee shall develop comprehensive programs and activities to foster safe, healthy, and drug-free environments that support academic achievement.

The County Superintendent's alcohol and drug prevention and intervention programs shall be coordinated with other school and community-based services and programs and shall promote the involvement of parents/guardians. The County Superintendent or designee may collaborate with community-based organizations, health providers, law enforcement agencies, local child welfare agencies, postsecondary institutions, businesses, and other public and private entities in program planning, implementation, and evaluation.

Prevention and intervention programs and activities may include, but are not limited to: (20 USC 7118)

- 1. Evidence-based drug and violence prevention activities and programs that educate students against the use of alcohol, tobacco, cannabis, smokeless tobacco products, and electronic cigarettes
- 2. Professional development and training for school staff, specialized instructional support personnel, and interested community members on drug prevention, education, early identification, intervention mentoring, recovery support services, and, where appropriate, rehabilitation referral
- 3. School-based mental health services, including early identification of drug use and referrals to counseling services, and/or partnerships with public or private health care entities that have gualified mental and behavioral health professionals
- 4. Programs and activities that provide mentoring and school counseling to all students, including students who are at risk of drug use and abuse

Instruction

The County Superintendent or designee shall provide science-based preventative instruction which has been proven effective in helping students avoid the use of alcohol and other drugs.

All instruction and related materials shall consistently state that unlawful use of alcohol or other drugs is prohibited. Instruction shall not include any message on responsible use of drugs or alcohol when such use is illegal. (Health and Safety Code 11999.2)

The County Superintendent or designee shall offer staff development activities for staff who implement the comprehensive drug and alcohol prevention and intervention program.

Intervention, Referral, and Student Assistance Programs

The County Superintendent or designee shall inform school staff, students, and parents/guardians about early warning signs which may indicate alcohol and other drug use and about appropriate agencies offering intervention programs, counseling, referral, and other student assistance programs.

The County Superintendent strongly encourages any student who is using alcohol or drugs to discuss the matter with his/her parent/guardian or with any staff member. Students who disclose their use of alcohol or other drugs when seeking help from an intervention or recovery program shall not be disciplined for such use.

Enforcement/Discipline

Students shall not possess, use, or sell alcohol or other drugs and related paraphernalia on school grounds or at school-sponsored activities.

The County Superintendent or designee shall clearly communicate to all students, staff, and parents/guardians the policies, regulations, and school rules related to the use of alcohol and other drugs.

Any student found to be selling a controlled substance listed in Health and Safety Code 11053-11058 shall be subject to discipline in accordance with County Superintendent/County Board policy. A student found to have committed another drug or alcohol offense, including possession or intoxication, may be referred to appropriate behavioral interventions or student assistance programs, and may be subject to discipline on a case-by-case basis in accordance with County Superintendent/County Board policy.

Program Evaluation

The County Superintendent shall implement performance measures that will be used to periodically monitor and determine the effectiveness of County Superintendent programs in reducing drug and alcohol use. (20 USC 7116)

Students WEAPONS AND DANGEROUS INSTRUMENTS

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that students and staff have the right to a safe and secure campus, free from physical and psychological harm, and desire to protect them from the dangers presented by firearms and other weapons.

Possession of Weapons

The County Superintendent and County Board prohibit any student from possessing weapons, imitation firearms, or other dangerous instruments, as defined in law and administrative regulation, in County Superintendent/County Board school buildings, on such school grounds or buses, at school-related or school-sponsored activities away from such schools, or while going to or coming from such schools.

Under the power granted to the County Superintendent and County Board to protect the safety of students, staff, and others on County Board-owned property and to maintain order and discipline in the County Superintendent-operated schools, any County Superintendent employee is authorized to confiscate any prohibited weapon, imitation firearm, or dangerous instrument from any student on such school grounds.

Unless he/she has obtained prior written permission as specified below, a student possessing or threatening others with any weapon, dangerous instrument, or imitation firearm shall be subject to suspension and/or expulsion in accordance with law, County Superintendent/County Board policy, and administrative regulations.

The lead site administrator or designee shall notify law enforcement authorities when any student possesses a firearm, explosive, or other prohibited weapon or dangerous instrument without permission, sells or furnishes a firearm, or commits any act of assault with a firearm or other weapon. (Education Code 48902; Penal Code 245, 626.9, 626.10; 20 USC 7961)

Possession of Pepper Spray

To prevent potential misuse that may harm students or staff, students are prohibited from carrying tear gas or tear gas weapons such as pepper spray on campus or at school activities.

Reporting of Dangerous Objects

The County Superintendent and County Board encourage students to promptly report the presence of weapons, injurious objects, or other suspicious activity to school authorities. The identity of a student who reports such activity shall remain confidential to the extent permitted by law.

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies designed to facilitate student reporting of the presence of injurious objects on school grounds, such as tip hotlines, electronic transmissions, or other methods that preserve the student's anonymity. Incident reports and

records shall not identify the student who reported the possession. The County Superintendent or designee also shall inform staff, students, and parents/guardians that students who report the presence of injurious objects on school campuses are to be protected and their identity shielded.

Students DRESS AND GROOMING

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that appropriate dress and grooming contribute to a productive learning environment. They expect students to wear clothing that is suitable for the school activities in which they participate. Students shall not wear clothing that presents a health or safety hazard or causes a substantial disruption to the educational program.

County Superintendent and school rules pertaining to student attire shall be included in student handbooks, may be posted in school offices and classrooms, and may be periodically reviewed with all students as necessary.

Students shall not be prohibited from dressing in a manner consistent with their gender identity or gender expression or with their religious or cultural observance.

In addition, the dress code shall not discriminate against students based on hair texture and protective hairstyles, including, but not limited to, braids, locks, and twists. (Education Code 212.1)

Each site administrator or designee is authorized to enforce this policy and shall inform any student who does not reasonably conform to the dress code. The dress code shall not be enforced in a manner that discriminates against a particular viewpoint or results in a disproportionate application of the dress code based on students' gender, sexual orientation, race, ethnicity, household income, or body type or size.

School administrators, teachers, and other staff shall be notified of appropriate and equitable enforcement of the dress code.

When practical, students shall not be directed to correct a dress code violation during instructional time or in front of other students.

Repeated violations or refusal to comply with the dress code may result in disciplinary action.

Gang-Related Apparel

Site administrators, staff, and parents/guardians at a school may establish a reasonable dress code that prohibits students from wearing gang-related apparel when there is evidence of a gang presence that disrupts or threatens to disrupt the school's activities. Such a proposed dress code shall be presented to the County Superintendent who shall approve the plan upon determining that it is necessary to protect the health and safety of the school environment. The dress code policy may be included in the school's comprehensive safety plan.

When determining specific items of clothing that may be defined as gang apparel, the school shall ensure that the determination is free from bias based on race, ethnicity, national origin, immigration status, or other protected characteristics.

Students HEALTH CARE AND EMERGENCIES

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize the importance of taking appropriate action whenever an emergency threatens the safety, health, or welfare of a student at school or during school-sponsored activities.

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures to ensure that first aid and/or medical attention are provided as quickly as possible when accidents and injuries to students occur and that parents/guardians are notified as appropriate.

The County Superintendent or designee shall ask parents/guardians to provide emergency contact information in order to facilitate communication in the event of an accident or illness.

Program staff shall appropriately report and document student accidents.

"Do Not Resuscitate" Orders

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that staff members should not be placed in the position of determining whether or not to follow any parental or medical "do not resuscitate" orders. Staff shall not accept or follow any such orders except under the specific written direction of the County Superintendent or designee. The County Superintendent or designee may only direct a staff member to follow a "do not resuscitate" order if he/she has received a written parent/guardian authorization, with an authorized health care provider statement, and an order of an appropriate court.

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that parents/guardians who have submitted a "do not resuscitate" order are informed of this policy.

Automated External Defibrillators

The County Superintendent has placed automated external defibrillators (AEDs) at designated school sites and other County Superintendent facilities for use by County Superintendent employees in an emergency.

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop guidelines for employees regarding these devices and shall ensure that employees receive information that describes sudden cardiac arrest, the program's emergency response plan, and the proper use of an AED. The guidelines shall also specify the placement, security, and maintenance of the AED.

The authorization of AEDs in County Superintendent schools and facilities shall not be deemed to create a guarantee that an AED will be present or will be used in the case of an emergency, or that a trained employee will be present and/or able to use an AED in an emergency, or that the AED will operate properly.

Students ADMINISTERING MEDICATION AND MONITORING HEALTH CONDITIONS

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that regular school attendance is critical to student learning and that students who need to take medication prescribed or ordered for them by their authorized health care providers should be able to participate in the educational program.

Any medication prescribed for a student with a disability who is qualified to receive services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act or Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 shall be administered in accordance with the student's individualized education program or Section 504 services plan, as applicable.

For the administration of medication to other students during school or school-related activities, the County Superintendent or designee shall develop protocols which shall include options for allowing parents/guardians to administer medication to their child at school, designate other individuals to do so on their behalf, and, with the student's authorized health care provider's approval, request the County Superintendent's permission for the student to self-administer a medication or self-monitor and/or self-test for a medical condition. Such processes shall be implemented in a manner that preserves campus or program security, minimizes instructional interruptions, and promotes student safety and privacy.

The County Superintendent or designee shall make epinephrine auto-injectors available at each school for providing emergency medical aid to any person suffering, or reasonably believed to be suffering, from an anaphylactic reaction. (Education Code 49414)

The parent/guardian of a student who is a qualified patient pursuant to Health and Safety Code 11362.7-11362.85 may administer medicinal cannabis, excluding medicinal cannabis or cannabis products in a smokeable or vapeable form, to the student at a school or program site. County Superintendent personnel are not authorized to administer medicinal cannabis to a student. (Education Code 49414.1)

Before administering medicinal cannabis at a school or program site, the parent/guardian shall provide to the lead site administrator or designee a valid written medical recommendation for the student to be given medicinal cannabis, which shall be kept on file at the school or program's office. The parent/guardian shall sign in at the school or program site before administering the medication, and shall not administer the medication in a manner that disrupts the educational environment or exposes other students. After the parent/guardian administers the medication, the parent/guardian shall remove any remaining medicinal cannabis from the school or program site. (Education Code 49414.1)

The County Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with city and county emergency responders, including local public health administrators, to design procedures or measures for addressing an emergency such as a public disaster or epidemic.

Administration of Medication by School or Program Personnel

When authorized by law, medication prescribed to a student by an authorized health care provider may be administered by a school nurse or, when a school nurse or other medically licensed person is unavailable and the physician has authorized administration of medication by unlicensed personnel for a particular student, by other designated County Superintendent personnel with appropriate training. School nurses and other designated personnel shall administer medications to students in accordance with law, County Superintendent and County Board policy, administrative regulation, and, as applicable, the written statement provided by the student's parent/guardian and authorized health care provider.

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that personnel designated to administer any medication receive appropriate training and, as necessary, retraining from qualified medical personnel before any medication is administered. At a minimum, the training shall cover how and when such medication should be administered, the recognition of symptoms and treatment, emergency follow-up procedures, and the proper documentation and storage of medication. Such trained, unlicensed designated personnel shall be supervised by, and provided with immediate communication access to, a school nurse, physician, or other appropriate individual.

The County Superintendent or designee shall maintain documentation of the training and ongoing supervision, as well as annual written verification of competency of other designated personnel.

Students HEALTH EXAMINATIONS

The County Superintendent and County Board recognize that periodic health examinations of students may lead to early detection and treatment of conditions that impact learning. Health examinations also may help in determining whether special adaptations of the school program are necessary.

The County Superintendent or designee shall verify that students have complied with legal requirements for a comprehensive health screening, an oral health assessment, and immunizations at school entry. In addition, the County Superintendent and County Board shall administer tests for vision, hearing, and scoliosis as required by law.

All students who participate as cheerleaders, song leaders, or athletes in organized competitive sports shall first undergo a medical examination and submit documentation of medical clearance to the County Superintendent or designee. Upon sustaining an injury or serious illness, a student may be required to have another examination before participating further. This requirement does not apply to participants in occasional play day or field day activities.

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that staff employed to examine students exercise proper care of each student and that examination results are kept confidential. Records related to these examinations shall be maintained and released only in accordance with law.

Students IMMUNIZATIONS

To protect the health of all students and staff and to curtail the spread of infectious diseases, the County Superintendent and County Board shall cooperate with state and local public health agencies to encourage and facilitate immunization of all students in County Superintendent-operated schools against preventable diseases.

Each student enrolling for the first time in a County Superintendent-operated school, or child care and development program shall present an immunization record from any authorized private or public health care provider certifying that he/she has received all required immunizations in accordance with law. Students shall be excluded from school or exempted from immunization requirements only as allowed by law.

The County Superintendent or designee may arrange for an authorized health care provider to administer immunizations at school to any student whose parent/guardian has consented in writing. At the beginning of the school year, parents/guardians shall be notified of their right to provide consent for the administration of an immunization to their child at school. (Education Code 49403)

Students CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION AND REPORTING

Definitions

Child abuse or neglect includes the following: (Penal Code 11165.5, 11165.6)

- 1. A physical injury or death inflicted by other than accidental means on a child by another person
- 2. Sexual abuse of a child, including sexual assault or sexual exploitation, as defined in Penal Code 11165.1
- 3. Neglect of a child as defined in Penal Code 11165.2
- 4. Willful harming or injuring of a child or the endangering of the person or health of a child as defined in Penal Code 11165.3
- 5. Unlawful corporal punishment or injury as defined in Penal Code 11165.4

Child abuse or neglect does not include:

- 1. A mutual affray between minors (Penal Code 11165.6)
- 2. An injury caused by reasonable and necessary force used by a peace officer acting within the course and scope of his/her employment (Penal Code 11165.6)
- 3. An injury resulting from the exercise by a teacher, vice principal, principal, or other certificated employee of the same degree of physical control over a student that a parent/guardian would be privileged to exercise, not exceeding the amount of physical control reasonably necessary to maintain order, protect property, protect the health and safety of students, or maintain proper and appropriate conditions conducive to learning (Education Code 44807)
- 4. An injury caused by a school employee's use of force that is reasonable and necessary to quell a disturbance threatening physical injury to persons or damage to property, to protect himself/herself, or to obtain weapons or other dangerous objects within the control of a student (Education Code 49001)
- 5. Physical pain or discomfort caused by athletic competition or other such recreational activity voluntarily engaged in by a student (Education Code 49001)
- 6. Homelessness or classification as an unaccompanied minor (Penal Code 11165.15)

Mandated reporters include, but are not limited to, teachers; instructional aides; teacher's aides or assistants; classified employees; certificated pupil personnel employees; administrative officers or supervisors of child attendance; athletic coaches, administrators, and directors;

administrators and employees of a licensed child day care facility; Head Start teachers; County Superintendent police or security officers; licensed nurses or health care providers; and administrators, presenters, and counselors of a child abuse prevention program. (Penal Code 11165.7)

Reasonable suspicion means that it is objectively reasonable for a person to entertain a suspicion, based upon facts that could cause a reasonable person in a like position, drawing when appropriate on his/her training and experience, to suspect child abuse or neglect. However, reasonable suspicion does not require certainty that child abuse or neglect has occurred nor does it require a specific medical indication of child abuse or neglect. (Penal Code 11166)

Reportable Offenses

A mandated reporter shall make a report using the procedures provided below whenever, in his/her professional capacity or within the scope of his/her employment, he/she has knowledge of or observes a child whom the mandated reporter knows or reasonably suspects has been the victim of child abuse or neglect. (Penal Code 11166)

Any mandated reporter who has knowledge of or who reasonably suspects that a child is suffering serious emotional damage or is at a substantial risk of suffering serious emotional damage, based on evidence of severe anxiety, depression, withdrawal, or untoward aggressive behavior toward self or others, may make a report to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166.05, 11167)

Any County Superintendent employee who reasonably believes that he/she has observed the commission of a murder, rape, or lewd or lascivious act by use of force, violence, duress, menace, or fear of immediate and unlawful bodily injury against a victim who is a child under age 14 shall notify a peace officer. (Penal Code 152.3, 288)

Responsibility for Reporting

The reporting duties of mandated reporters are individual and cannot be delegated to another person. (Penal Code 11166)

When two or more mandated reporters jointly have knowledge of a known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect, the report may be made by a member of the team selected by mutual agreement and a single report may be made and signed by the selected member of the reporting team. Any member who has knowledge that the member designated to report has failed to do so shall thereafter make the report. (Penal Code 11166)

No supervisor or administrator shall impede or inhibit a mandated reporter from making a report. (Penal Code 11166)

Any person not identified as a mandated reporter who has knowledge of or observes a child whom he/she knows or reasonably suspects has been a victim of child abuse or neglect may report the known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect to the appropriate agency.

(Penal Code 11166)

Reporting Procedures

1. Initial Telephone Report

Immediately or as soon as practicable after knowing or observing suspected child abuse or neglect, a mandated reporter shall make an initial report by telephone to any police department (excluding a County Superintendent police/security department), sheriff's department, county probation department if designated by the county to receive such reports, or county welfare department. (Penal Code 11165.9, 11166)

When the initial telephone report is made, the mandated reporter shall note the name of the official contacted, the date and time contacted, and any instructions or advice received.

2. Written Report

Within 36 hours of knowing or observing the information concerning the incident, the mandated reporter shall then prepare and either send, fax, or electronically submit to the appropriate agency a written follow-up report, which includes a completed Department of Justice form (SS 8572). (Penal Code 11166, 11168)

The Department of Justice form may be obtained from the appropriate agency, such as the county probation or welfare department or the police or sheriff's department.

Reports of suspected child abuse or neglect shall include, if known: (Penal Code 11167)

- a. The name, business address, and telephone number of the person making the report and the capacity that makes the person a mandated reporter
- b. The child's name and address, present location, and, where applicable, school, grade, and class
- c. The names, addresses, and telephone numbers of the child's parents/guardians
- d. The name, address, telephone number, and other relevant personal information about the person who might have abused or neglected the child
- e. The information that gave rise to the reasonable suspicion of child abuse or neglect and the source(s) of that information

The mandated reporter shall make a report even if some of this information is not known or is uncertain to him/her. (Penal Code 11167)

The mandated reporter may give to an investigator from an agency investigating the case, including a licensing agency, any information relevant to an incident of child abuse or neglect or to a report made for serious emotional damage pursuant to Penal Code 11166.05. (Penal

Code 11167)

3. Internal Reporting

The mandated reporter shall not be required to disclose his/her identity to his/her supervisor, the lead site administrator, or the County Superintendent or designee. (Penal Code 11166)

However, employees reporting child abuse or neglect to an appropriate agency are encouraged, but not required, to notify their supervisor as soon as possible after the initial telephone report to the appropriate agency. When so notified, the supervisor shall inform the County Superintendent or designee.

The supervisor so notified shall provide the mandated reporter with any assistance necessary to ensure that reporting procedures are carried out in accordance with law, County Superintendent/County Board policy, and administrative regulation. At the mandated reporter's request, the supervisor may assist in completing and filing the necessary forms.

Reporting the information to an employer, supervisor, lead site administrator, school counselor, co-worker, or other person shall not be a substitute for making a mandated report to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166)

Training

Within the first six weeks of each school year, the County Superintendent or designee shall provide training on mandated reporting requirements to his/her employees and persons working on his/her behalf who are mandated reporters. Any school personnel hired during the school year shall receive such training within the first six weeks of employment. (Education Code 44691; Penal Code 11165.7)

The training shall include, but not necessarily be limited to, training in identification and reporting of child abuse and neglect. In addition, the training shall include information that failure to report an incident of known or reasonably suspected child abuse or neglect as required by law is a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment and/or a fine as specified. (Education Code 44691; Penal Code 11165.7)

The County Superintendent or designee shall obtain and retain proof of each mandated reporter's completion of the training. (Education Code 44691)

Victim Interviews by Social Services

Whenever the Department of Social Services or another government agency is investigating suspected child abuse or neglect that occurred within the child's home or out-of-home care facility, the student may be interviewed by an agency representative during school hours, on school premises. The County Superintendent or designee shall give the student the choice of being interviewed in private or in the presence of any adult school employee or volunteer aide selected by the student. (Penal Code 11174.3)

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A staff member or volunteer aide selected by a child may decline to be present at the interview. If the selected person accepts, the lead site administrator or designee shall inform him/her of the following requirements: (Penal Code 11174.3)

- 1. The purpose of the selected person's presence at the interview is to lend support to the child and enable him/her to be as comfortable as possible.
- 2. The selected person shall not participate in the interview.
- 3. The selected person shall not discuss the facts or circumstances of the case with the child.
- 4. The selected person is subject to the confidentiality requirements of the Child Abuse and Neglect Reporting Act, a violation of which is punishable as specified in Penal Code 11167.5.

If a staff member agrees to be present, the interview shall be held at a time during school hours when it does not involve an expense to the school. (Penal Code 11174.3)

Release of Child to Peace Officer

When a child is released to a peace officer and taken into custody as a victim of suspected child abuse or neglect, the County Superintendent or designee and/or lead site administrator shall not notify the parent/guardian, but rather shall provide the peace officer with the address and telephone number of the child's parent/guardian. (Education Code 48906)

Parent/Guardian Complaints

Upon request, the County Superintendent or designee shall provide parents/guardians with procedures for reporting suspected child abuse occurring at a school site to appropriate agencies. For parents/guardians whose primary language is not English, such procedures shall be in their primary language and, when communicating orally regarding those procedures, an interpreter shall be provided.

To file a complaint against a County Superintendent employee or other person suspected of child abuse or neglect at a school site, parents/guardians may file a report by telephone, in person, or in writing with any appropriate agency identified above under "Reporting Procedures." If a parent/guardian makes a complaint about an employee to any other employee, the employee receiving the information shall notify the parent/guardian of procedures for filing a complaint with the appropriate agency. The employee also is obligated pursuant to Penal Code 11166 to file a report himself/herself using the procedures described above for mandated reporters.

In addition, if the child is enrolled in special education, a separate complaint may be filed with the California Department of Education pursuant to 5 CCR 4650.

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Notifications

The County Superintendent or designee shall provide to all new employees who are mandated reporters a statement that informs them of their status as mandated reporters, their reporting obligations under Penal Code 11166, and their confidentiality rights under Penal Code 11167. The County Superintendent also shall provide these new employees with a copy of Penal Code 11165.7, 11166, and 11167. (Penal Code 11165.7, 11166.5)

Before beginning employment, any person who will be a mandated reporter by virtue of his/her position shall sign a statement indicating that he/she has knowledge of the reporting obligations under Penal Code 11166 and will comply with those provisions. The signed statement shall be retained by the County Superintendent or designee. (Penal Code 11166.5)

Employees who work with dependent adults shall be notified of legal responsibilities and reporting procedures pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code 15630-15637.

The County Superintendent or designee also shall notify all employees that:

- A mandated reporter who reports a known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect shall not be held civilly or criminally liable for making a report and this immunity shall apply even if the mandated reporter acquired the knowledge or reasonable suspicion of child abuse or neglect outside of his/her professional capacity or outside the scope of his/her employment. Any other person making a report shall not incur civil or criminal liability unless it can be proven that he/she knowingly made a false report or made a report with reckless disregard of the truth or falsity of the report. (Penal Code 11172)
- 2. If a mandated reporter fails to timely report an incident of known or reasonably suspected child abuse or neglect, he/she may be guilty of a crime punishable by a fine and/or imprisonment. (Penal Code 11166)
- 3. No employee shall be subject to any sanction by the County Superintendent for making a report unless it can be shown that he/she knowingly made a false report or made a report with reckless disregard of the truth or falsity of the report. (Penal Code 11166)

Students DISCIPLINE

The County Superintendent and County Board are committed to providing a safe, supportive, and positive school environment which is conducive to student learning and achievement and desires to prepare students for responsible citizenship by fostering self-discipline and personal responsibility. The County Superintendent and County Board believe that high expectations for student behavior, use of effective school and classroom management strategies, provision of appropriate intervention and support, and parent/guardian involvement can minimize the need for disciplinary measures that exclude students from instruction as a means for correcting student misbehavior.

The County Superintendent or designee shall develop effective, age-appropriate, program appropriate strategies for maintaining a positive school climate and correcting student misbehavior. The strategies shall focus on providing students with needed supports; communicating clear, appropriate, and consistent expectations and consequences for student conduct; and ensuring equity and continuous improvement in the implementation of discipline policies and practices. County Superintendent staff shall use positive interventions and alternative disciplinary measures whenever possible to correct student misconduct. Disciplinary measures that may result in loss of instructional time or cause students to be disengaged from school shall be imposed only when required or permitted by law or when other means of correction have failed. (Education Code 48900.5)

County Superintendent personnel and volunteers shall not allow any disciplinary action taken against a student to result in the denial or delay of a school meal. (Education Code 49557.5)

Seclusion and behavioral restraint are prohibited as a means of discipline and shall not be used to correct student behavior except as permitted pursuant to Education Code 49005.4. (Education Code 49005.2)

The administrative staff of school sites may develop disciplinary rules to meet the school's particular needs consistent with law, County Superintendent/County Board policy, and administrative regulations. The County Superintendent and County Board may review, at an open meeting, the approved site-level discipline rules for consistency with County Superintendent/County Board policy and state law. Site-level disciplinary rules shall be included in the County Superintendent/County Board comprehensive safety plan. (Education Code 32282, 35291.5)

At all times, the safety of students and staff and the maintenance of an orderly school environment shall be priorities in determining appropriate discipline. When misconduct occurs, staff shall attempt to identify the causes of the student's behavior and implement appropriate discipline. When choosing between different disciplinary strategies, staff shall consider the effect of each option on the student's health, well-being, and opportunity to learn.

When other means of correction have failed, students may be assigned to alternative programs, removed from school, or returned to their district of residence, in accordance with law, County Superintendent/County Board policy, and administrative regulation,

Staff shall enforce disciplinary rules fairly, consistently, and in accordance with the County Superintendent/County Board nondiscrimination policies.

The County Superintendent or designee shall provide professional development as necessary to assist staff in developing the skills needed to effectively and equitably implement the disciplinary strategies, including, but not limited to, knowledge of school and classroom management skills and their consistent application, effective accountability and positive intervention techniques, and the tools to establish cooperative relationships with parents/guardians.

Students

SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION/DUE PROCESS

The County Superintendent and County Board desire to provide students of County Superintendent/County Board schools access to educational opportunities in an orderly school environment that protects their safety and security, ensures their welfare and well-being, and promotes their learning and development. The County Superintendent or designee shall develop rules and regulations setting the standards of behavior expected of County Superintendent/County Board students and the disciplinary processes and procedures for addressing violations of those standards, including suspension, expulsion and return of students to their district(s) of residence.

The grounds for suspension and expulsion and the procedures for considering, recommending, and/or implementing suspension and expulsion shall be only those specified in law, in this policy, and in the applicable administrative regulation(s).

County Superintendent staff shall enforce the rules concerning suspension and expulsion of students fairly, consistently, equally, and in accordance with County Superintendent/County Board nondiscrimination policies.

Appropriate Use of Suspension Authority

Except as otherwise allowed under the law, suspension shall be used only when other means of correction have failed to bring about proper conduct. (Education Code 48900.5, 48900.6)

Students shall not be suspended or expelled for truancy, tardiness, or absenteeism from assigned school activities.

Authority to Expel

Except for single acts of a grave nature or offenses for which suspension or expulsion is required by law, suspension or expulsion shall be used only when means of correction have failed to bring about proper conduct or the student's presence causes a continuing danger to the student or others.

The grounds for suspension and expulsion and the procedures for considering, recommending, and/or implementing suspension and expulsion shall be those specified in law and administrative regulation.

Due Process

Students shall be afforded their due process rights under the law. The County Superintendent or designee shall comply with procedures for notices, hearings, and appeals as specified in law and administrative regulation. (Education Code 48911, 48915, 48915.5)

Expulsion Process and District of Residence

The County Superintendent or designee shall cooperate with the student's district of residence to address student behavior that involves expulsion violations committed while student was attending a County Superintendent/County Board school. Once the County Superintendent or designee refers a student back to the student's district of residence for expulsion violations, it is the district of residence's responsibility to ensure the student is afforded due process rights through the district of residence's expulsion process.

Maintenance and Monitoring of Outcome Data

At the end of each school year, the County Superintendent or designee shall complete a report regarding the use of suspension and/or expulsion in County Superintendent/County Board schools. The report shall include, but is not limited to, data and information which is required by law. Based on the data, the County Superintendent or designee shall address any identified disparities in the imposition of student discipline and shall determine whether and how the County Superintendent and County Board are meeting the goals for improving school climate as specified in the applicable local control and accountability plan.

Students STUDENT EXPULSION ORDER APPEALS

When expelled by the governing board of a school district that is within the jurisdiction of the Fresno County Board of Education ("County Board"), a student or the student's parent/guardian may appeal the expulsion to the County Board within 30 days of the district's action.

These rules of procedure are intended to serve as a guideline for all involved parties. The student and/or the parent or guardian who appeal an expulsion shall be referred to as "Appellant" and the expelling school board shall be referred to as "Respondent."

The following rules are to be liberally construed so as to allow the County Board a fair and impartial review of the proceedings conducted by the Respondent. However, these rules will remain within the scope of appropriate law.

The County Board shall hear and determine an appeal of an expulsion order issued against a student by a school district within the jurisdiction of the County Board.

Appellant must file an appeal of an expulsion to the County Board within 30 calendar days of the school district's action. The County Board lacks the jurisdiction to hear any appeal not filed within the 30 day period following the school district's decision.

Prehearing Procedure

Notice of Appeal of Expulsion and Request for Transcript and Hearing

The expelled student of a school in Fresno County and/or the parent or guardian of that student may appeal the expulsion by the school board to the County Board by filing with the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools Legal Services Department ("Legal Services Department") a completed "Notice of Appeal of Expulsion and Request for Transcript and Hearing" form.

The "Notice of Appeal of Expulsion and Request for Transcript and Hearing" form will be provided to the Appellant upon request to the Legal Services Department. The appeal becomes official on the day the Legal Services Department receives a complete, timely filed "Notice of Appeal of Expulsion and Request for Transcript and Hearing" form. Failure to timely file a complete form shall foreclose the Appellant's right to appeal, and the Respondent's decision shall be the final decision.

The "Notice of Appeal of Expulsion and Request for Transcript and Hearing" shall be in writing and shall include the following information:

- 1. Name of the Appellant;
- 2. Contact address and telephone number of the Appellant and/or parent/guardian;
- 3. Name of Respondent;
- 4. Date of Respondent's action to expel student;
- 5. Ground(s) on which appeal is based; and
- 6. f the Respondent's order to expel shall be attached.

At the same time that "Notice of Appeal of Expulsion and Request for Transcript and Hearing" is filed with the County Board, Appellant shall serve a copy of the "Notice of Appeal of Expulsion and Request for Transcript and Hearing" on the Respondent school district.

Confirmation of Timely Filed Notice of Expulsion Appeal

Upon a timely filing of the "Notice of Appeal of Expulsion and Request for Transcript and Hearing" with the County Board, the Legal Services Department shall within two (2) school days serve upon Appellant and Respondent, a "Notice of Filing of Expulsion Appeal" with a completed copy of the filed Notice of Appeal of Expulsion and Request for Transcript", a copy of the County Board's Policy No. 5144.3, and a copy of the relevant Education Code sections 48919 through 48925.

Appellant's Duty to Deliver Transcript and Hearing Documents to County Board

The Appellant shall submit to the County Board, a certified copy of the written transcripts and supporting documents of the proceedings before the school district. It shall be the responsibility of the Appellant to provide the Legal Services Department with the transcript of Respondent's hearing ten (10) days before the hearing date before the County Board.

Upon receipt of the expulsion records, the Legal Services Department will prepare and disperse copies of the appeal hearing file to appropriate persons. A copy of the appeal hearing file shall be available to the Appellant and Respondent on or before the expulsion appeal hearing.

Notice of Hearing

The County Board shall hold a hearing within twenty (20) school days of the filing of the appeal. (Education Code 48919)

No later than ten (10) days prior to the hearing, the Legal Services Department shall serve upon the Appellant and the Respondent, by certified mail, return receipt requested, a Notice of Hearing including details such as the date, time, and place of the hearing. The notice shall also contain a statement that the hearing shall be in closed session unless the County Board receives Appellant's request in writing at least five (5) days prior to the hearing, that the hearing be conducted in open session. If such request is made, the hearing shall be public unless another student's privacy rights would be violated. (Education Code 48920)

At least forty-eight (48) hours prior to the hearing, Appellant and Respondent shall each notify the Legal Services Department of the names of the persons known to them who intend to make presentations at the hearing. A written form will be sent to each party by the Legal Services Department.

Appellant and Respondent may each be accompanied by an attorney or representative advocate of choice, and the attorney or advocate shall be afforded an opportunity to speak on behalf of the client.

Either the Appellant or the Respondent may request a postponement of the hearing by submitting a written request, including the reason, to the County Superintendent or designee at least five (5) calendar days prior to the hearing. The request shall be acted upon by the County

Superintendent within two (2) days after determining whether the request is based upon a showing of good cause. Any request for postponement made less than five (5) calendar days prior to the hearing will be considered by the County Board at the hearing. The request will be granted only upon a finding that a compelling reason or an emergency exists.

Withdrawal of Expulsion Appeal

Appellant may withdraw the appeal for any reason, including the parties having reached a satisfactory agreement before the hearing. The Legal Services Department will provide a form that Appellant must sign to officially withdraw the expulsion appeal. If Appellant does not withdraw the appeal, the County Board will hear the case as scheduled whether parties are present or not. Appellant may request withdrawal of appeal at the hearing.

Conduct of Expulsion Hearing

Closed Session

Notwithstanding the provisions of Government Code 54953 and Education Code 35145, the County Board shall hear an appeal of an expulsion order in closed session, unless the Appellant requests in writing at least five (5) days prior to the hearing that the hearing be conducted at a public meeting. Whether the expulsion hearing is held in closed or public session, the County Board may meet in closed session to deliberate on the appeal. If the County Board admits one of the parties or their representative(s) to the closed session, the other party or their representative(s) shall also be allowed to attend the closed session. (Education Code 48920)

Record of Hearing

A record of the hearing shall be made and may be maintained by any means, including electronic recording, as long as a reasonably accurate and complete written transcription of the proceedings can be made. (Education Code 48919)

Scope of Review

The County Board shall determine the appeal based on the record of the hearing before the Respondent and other applicable documentation and/or regulations. No evidence other than that contained in the record of proceedings of the Respondent shall be heard except in a de novo proceeding, granted pursuant to Education Code 48923. (Education Code 48921)

A de novo proceeding involves an independent determination by the County Board, of all the issues previously considered by the school district's governing board.

The County Board's review shall be limited to: (Education Code 48922)

- 1. Whether the governing board acted without or in excess of its jurisdiction, which includes, but is not limited to:
 - a. Expulsion hearing is not commenced within the legal time periods;

- b. Expulsion order is not based on a violation of acts enumerated in Section 48900 et seq. of the Education Code; or
- c. Expulsion is based on acts not related to school activity or attendance.
- 2. Whether there was a fair hearing before the governing board.
- 3. Whether there was a prejudicial abuse of discretion in the hearing. Abuse of discretion is established if:
 - a. School officials did not meet the procedural requirements of Education Code 48900-48926;
 - b. The decision to expel the student is not supported by the findings prescribed by Education Code 48915; or
 - c. The findings are not supported by the evidence
- 4. Whether there is relevant and material evidence which, in the exercise of reasonable diligence, could not have been produced or which was improperly excluded at the hearing before the governing board.

The County Board may not reverse the decision of the Respondent to expel the Appellant based upon a finding of an abuse of discretion unless it also determines that the abuse of discretion was prejudicial. (Education Code 48932)

Final Order of the County Board

The County Board shall render its final decision within three (3) school days of the hearing unless the Appellant requests a postponement. (Education Code 48919) The County Board's decision shall be limited as follows: (Education Code 48923)

- 1. Where the County Board finds that relevant and material evidence exists which, in the exercise of reasonable diligence, could not have been produced, or which was improperly excluded at the hearing before the Respondent, the County Board may remand the matter to the Respondent for reconsideration or grant a hearing de novo.
- 2. Where the County Board determines that the Respondent's decision is not supported by findings required to be made by Education Code 48915, but evidence supporting such findings exists in the record of the proceedings, the County Board shall remand the matter to the Respondent for adoption and inclusion of the required findings.
- In all other cases, the County Board shall either affirm or reverse the decision of the Respondent. If the County Board reverses the Respondent's decision, the County Board may direct the Respondent to expunge all references to the expulsion action

from the Respondent and Appellant's records, and the expulsion shall be deemed not to have occurred.

The decision of the County Board shall be final and binding upon the Appellant and Respondent. The Appellant and Respondent shall be notified of the final order of the County Board, in writing, either by personal service or by certified mail. The order shall become final when rendered. (Education Code 48924)

Preservation of Record

A copy of the expulsion appeal records before the County Board will be kept with other County Board files. The minutes will state the names of those present at the hearing and the vote of each member.

The Legal Services Department will maintain expulsion appeal records until the Appellant's 21st birthday. At that time, the Legal Services Department may destroy these records with the exception of the County Board's decision. The written decision will be kept in such format as is permitted for the maintenance of permanent education records, e.g., hard copy, digital scan, microfiche.

Students SEARCH AND SEIZURE

The County Superintendent and County Board are fully committed to promoting a safe learning environment and, to the extent possible, eliminating the possession and use of weapons, illegal drugs, and other controlled substances by students on school premises and at school activities. As necessary to protect the health and welfare of students and staff, school officials may search students, their property, and/or County Superintendent property under their control and may seize illegal, unsafe, or otherwise prohibited items.

The County Superintendent and County Board urge that County Superintendent employees exercise discretion and good judgment. When conducting a search or seizure, employees shall act in accordance with law, policy, and administrative regulation.

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that staff who conduct student searches receive training regarding the requirements of the policy and administrative regulation and other legal issues, as appropriate.

Individual Searches

School officials may search any individual student, his/her property, or County Superintendent property under his/her control when there is a reasonable suspicion that the search will uncover evidence that he/she is violating the law, policy, administrative regulation, or other rules of the County Superintendent or County Board, or the school. Reasonable suspicion shall be based on specific and objective facts that the search will produce evidence related to the alleged violation. The types of student property that may be searched by school officials include, but are not limited to, lockers, desks, purses, backpacks, student vehicles parked on school property, cellular phones, or other electronic communication devices.

Any search of a student, his/her property, or County Superintendent property under his/her control shall be limited in scope and designed to produce evidence related to the alleged violation. Factors to be considered by school officials when determining the scope of the search shall include the danger to the health or safety of students or staff, such as the possession of weapons, drugs, or other dangerous instruments, and whether the item(s) to be searched by school officials are reasonably related to the contraband to be found. In addition, school officials shall consider the intrusiveness of the search in light of the student's age, gender, and the nature of the alleged violation.

Employees shall not conduct strip searches or body cavity searches of any student. (Education Code 49050)

Searches of individual students shall be conducted in the presence of at least two County Superintendent employees.

The lead site administrator or designee shall notify the parent/guardian of a student subjected to an individualized search as soon as possible after the search.

Searches of Multiple Student Lockers/Desks

All student lockers and desks are the property of the County Superintendent. The lead site administrator or designee may conduct a general inspection of school properties that are within the control of students, such as lockers and desks, on a regular, announced basis, with students standing by their assigned lockers or desks. Any items contained in a locker or desk shall be considered to be the property of the student to whom the locker or desk was assigned.

Use of Metal Detectors

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that the presence of weapons in the schools threatens the ability to provide the safe and orderly learning environment to which students and County Superintendent staff are entitled. The County Superintendent and County Board also believe that metal detector searches offer a reasonable means to keep weapons out of the schools and mitigate the fears of students and staff.

The County Superintendent or designee may use metal detectors at schools as necessary to help provide a safe learning environment. He/she shall establish a plan to ensure that metal detector searches are conducted in a uniform and consistent manner.

Students FREEDOM OF SPEECH/EXPRESSION

The County Superintendent and County Board believe that free inquiry and exchange of ideas are essential parts of a democratic education. The County Superintendent and County Board respect students' rights to express ideas and opinions, take stands on issues, and support causes, even when such speech is controversial or unpopular.

On-Campus Expression

Students shall have the right to exercise freedom of speech and of the press including, but not limited to, the use of bulletin boards; the distribution of printed materials or petitions; the wearing of buttons, badges, and other insignia; and the right of expression in official publications. (Education Code 48907)

Student expression on County Superintendent or school Internet web sites and online media shall generally be afforded the same protections as in print media.

Students' freedom of expression shall be limited only as allowed by Education Code 48907, 48950, and other applicable state and federal laws.

Students are prohibited from making any expressions or distributing or posting any materials that are obscene, libelous, or slanderous. Students also are prohibited from making any expressions that so incites students as to create a clear and present danger of the commission of unlawful acts on school premises, the violation of school rules, or substantial disruption of the school's orderly operation. (Education Code 48907)

The use of "fighting words" or epithets is prohibited in those instances where the speech is abusive and insulting, rather than a communication of ideas, and the speech is used in an abusive manner in a situation that presents an actual danger that it will cause a breach of the peace.

School officials shall not engage in prior restraint of material prepared for official school publications except insofar as the content of the material violates the law. (Education Code 48907)

The County Superintendent or designee shall not discipline any high school student solely on the basis of speech or other communication that would be constitutionally protected when engaged in outside of school, but may impose discipline for harassment, threats, or intimidation unless constitutionally protected. (Education Code 48950)

Off-Campus Expression

A student shall be subject to discipline for off-campus expression, including expression on off-campus Internet web sites, when such expression poses a threat to the safety of other

students, staff, or school property, or substantially disrupts the educational program. The County Superintendent or designee shall document the impact the expression had or could be expected to have on the school program.

Students NONDISCRIMINATION/HARASSMENT

This policy shall apply to all acts constituting unlawful discrimination or harassment related to school activity or to school attendance occurring within a County Superintendent-operated school or program, and to acts which occur off campus or outside of school-related or school-sponsored activities but which may have an impact or create a hostile environment at school.

The County Superintendent and County Board desire to provide a safe school environment that allows all students equal access to and opportunities in the County Superintendent's academic, extracurricular, and other educational support programs, services, and activities. The County Superintendent and County Board prohibit, at any County Superintendent-operated school, program or school activity, unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, and bullying, targeted at any student by anyone, based on the student's actual or perceived race, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, immigration status, ethnic group identification, ethnicity, age, religion, marital status, pregnancy, parental status, physical or mental disability, medical condition, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, or genetic information, or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics.

Unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, may result from physical, verbal, nonverbal, or written conduct based on any of the categories listed above. Unlawful discrimination also occurs when prohibited conduct is so severe, persistent, or pervasive that it affects a student's ability to participate in or benefit from an educational program or activity; creates an intimidating, threatening, hostile, or offensive educational environment; has the effect of substantially or unreasonably interfering with a student's academic performance; or otherwise adversely affects a student's educational opportunities.

Unlawful discrimination also includes disparate treatment of students based on one of the categories above with respect to the provision of opportunities to participate in school programs or activities or the provision or receipt of educational benefits or services.

The County Superintendent and County Board also prohibit any form of retaliation against any individual who reports or participates in the reporting of unlawful discrimination, files or participates in the filing of a complaint, or investigates or participates in the investigation of a complaint or report alleging unlawful discrimination. Retaliation complaints shall be investigated and resolved in the same manner as a discrimination complaint.

The County Superintendent or designee shall facilitate students' access to the educational program by publicizing the County Superintendent's nondiscrimination policy and related complaint procedures to students, parents/guardians, and employees. In addition, the County Superintendent or designee shall post the FCSS' policies prohibiting discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying and other required information on the County Superintendent's web site in a manner that is easily accessible to parents/guardians and students, in accordance with law and the accompanying administrative regulation.

The County Superintendent or designee shall provide training and/or information on the scope and use of the policy and complaint procedures and take other measures designed to increase the school community's understanding of the requirements of law related to discrimination. The County Superintendent or designee shall regularly review the implementation of the nondiscrimination policies and practices and, as necessary, shall take action to remove any identified barrier to student access to or participation in the County Superintendent's educational programs.

Regardless of whether a complainant complies with the writing, timeline, and/or other formal filing requirements, all complaints alleging unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, shall be investigated and prompt action taken to stop the discrimination, prevent recurrence, and address any continuing effect on students.

Students who engage in unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, retaliation, or bullying, in violation of law, County Superintendent and County Board policy, or administrative regulation shall be subject to appropriate consequence or discipline, which may include suspension or expulsion when the behavior is severe or pervasive as defined in Education Code 48900.4. Any employee who permits or engages in prohibited discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, retaliation, or bullying, shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

Record-Keeping

The County Superintendent or designee shall maintain a record of all reported cases of unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, to enable the County Superintendent to monitor, address, and prevent repetitive prohibited behavior in County Superintendent-operated schools and programs.

Students PARENTAL NOTIFICATIONS

The County Superintendent and County Board desire to promote effective communication between the school and the home and to keep parents/guardians informed regarding educational programs, school operations, and the legal rights of students and their parents/guardians. The County Superintendent or designee shall send parents/guardians and students all notifications required by law and any other notifications he/she believes will promote parental understanding and involvement.

Notice of the rights and responsibilities of parents/guardians as specified in Education Code 48980 shall be sent at the beginning of each academic year and may be provided by regular mail, in electronic form when so requested by the parent/guardian, or by any other method normally used by the County Superintendent for written communication with parents/guardians. (Education Code 48981)

No activity specified in Education Code 48980 shall be undertaken with respect to any particular student unless his/her parent/guardian has been informed of such action through the annual notification or other separate special notification. Such notice shall state the activity that will be undertaken and the approximate date on which the activity will occur. (Education Code 48983-48984)

The annual notification shall include a request that the parent/guardian sign the notice and return it to the school or, if the notice is provided in electronic format, that the parent/guardian submit a signed acknowledgment of receipt of the notice to the school. The parent/guardian's signature is an acknowledgment of receipt of the information but does not indicate that consent to participate in any particular program has been given or withheld. (Education Code 48982)

Whenever a student enrolls in a County Superintendent/County Board school during the school year, his/her parents/guardians shall be given all required parental notifications at that time.

Notifications shall be presented in an understandable and uniform format and, to the extent practicable, in a language that parents/guardians can understand.

Whenever 15 percent or more of the students enrolled in a County Superintendent/County Board school speak a single primary language other than English, as determined from the California Department of Education census data collected pursuant to Education Code 52164, all notices sent to the parent/guardian of any such student shall, in addition to being written in English, be written in the primary language, and may be responded to either in English or the primary language. (Education Code 48981, 48985)

Whenever an employee learns that a student's parent/guardian is unable to understand the printed notifications for any reason, he/she shall inform the lead site administrator or designee, who shall work with the parent/guardian to establish other appropriate means of communication.

Students SEXUAL HARASSMENT

The County Superintendent and County Board are committed to maintaining a safe school environment that is free from harassment and discrimination. The County Superintendent and County Board prohibit, at school, program or at school-sponsored or school-related activities, sexual harassment targeted at any student by anyone. The County Superintendent and County Board also prohibit retaliatory behavior or action against any person who reports, files a complaint or testifies about, or otherwise supports a complainant alleging sexual harassment.

The County Superintendent and County Board strongly encourage students who feel that they are being or have been sexually harassed on school or program grounds or at a school-sponsored or school-related activity by another student or an adult, or who have experienced off-campus sexual harassment that has a continuing effect on campus, to immediately contact their teacher, the lead site administrator, the County Superintendent's Title IX Coordinator, or any other available school or program employee. Any employee who receives a report or observes an incident of sexual harassment shall notify the Title IX Coordinator.

Once notified, the Title IX Coordinator shall ensure the complaint is addressed through Title IX complaint procedures or uniform complaint procedures, as applicable, and shall offer supportive measures to the complainant.

The County Superintendent or designee shall inform students and parents/guardians of the County Superintendent's sexual harassment policy by disseminating it through parent/guardian notifications, publishing it on the County Superintendent's web site, and including it in student and staff handbooks. All County Superintendent staff shall be trained regarding the policy.

Instruction/Information

The County Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all students receive age-appropriate information on sexual harassment. Such instruction and information shall include:

- 1. What acts and behavior constitute sexual harassment, including the fact that sexual harassment could occur between people of the same sex and could involve sexual violence
- 2. A clear message that students do not have to endure sexual harassment under any circumstance
- 3. Encouragement to report observed incidents of sexual harassment even when the alleged victim of the harassment has not complained
- 4. A clear message that student safety is the County Superintendent's primary concern, and that any separate rule violation involving an alleged victim or any other person reporting a sexual harassment incident will be addressed separately and will not affect

the manner in which the sexual harassment complaint will be received, investigated, or resolved

- 5. A clear message that, regardless of a complainant's noncompliance with the writing, timeline, or other formal filing requirements, every sexual harassment allegation that involves a student, whether as the complainant, respondent, or victim of the harassment, shall be investigated and action shall be taken to respond to harassment, prevent recurrence, and address any continuing effect on students
- 6. Information about the County Superintendent's procedures for investigating complaints and the person(s) to whom a report of sexual harassment should be made
- 7. Information about the rights of students and parents/guardians to file a civil or criminal complaint, as applicable, including the right to file a civil or criminal complaint while the County Superintendent's investigation of a sexual harassment complaint continues
- 8. A clear message that, when needed, the County Superintendent will implement supportive measures to ensure a safe school environment for a student who is the complainant or victim of sexual harassment and/or other students during an investigation

Disciplinary Actions

Upon completion of an investigation of a sexual harassment complaint, any student found to have engaged in sexual harassment or sexual violence in violation of this policy shall be subject to disciplinary action. For students in grades 4-12, disciplinary action may include suspension and/or expulsion, provided that, in imposing such discipline, the entire circumstances of the incident(s) shall be taken into account.

Upon investigation of a sexual harassment complaint, any employee found to have engaged in sexual harassment or sexual violence toward any student shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal, in accordance with law and the applicable collective bargaining agreement.

Record-Keeping

In accordance with law, the County Superintendent or designee shall maintain a record of all reported cases of sexual harassment to enable the County Superintendent to monitor, address, and prevent repetitive harassing behavior in County Superintendent-operated schools and programs.

Exemptions From Regular Attendance

Pupils may be exempted from compulsory full-time education in the schools of this county only under those specific circumstances which are described in the Education Code.

It is the desire of the County Board of Education and/or the County Superintendent of Schools that every person in this county who is subject to compulsory full-time education should attend the schools of his district if at all possible, and that no exemptions be made without verification of the facts in each case. Presentation of satisfactory evidence will be required for those students suffering from mental or physical conditions which prevent or make inadvisable their attendance at school. It is also the intention of the County Board of Education and/or the County Superintendent of Schools that pupils exempted from compulsory full-time education be provided with home instruction in cases where such instruction would be of benefit to the children and in accordance with law. In the case of students with disabilities, a free appropriate public education will be provided in accordance with federal and state laws and regulations.

Students With Aids

The county office recognizes its responsibility to protect the health of its students as well as to uphold their individual rights. It believes that the recommendations of leading public health authorities that the student with AIDS be admitted to school, based upon the individual circumstances, acknowledges this dual responsibility. It recognizes the importance of the academic interaction and socialization received by the students with AIDS in the school setting. When requested to do so by the student's parents, the county office will permit students with AIDS to attend classes, contingent upon an evaluation of the situation conducted in accordance with administrative regulations and with the written concurrence of the student's physician and the county public health department that such admittance poses no increased risk to the student with AIDS or to his/her classmates.

Without the written medical concurrence required above, the student with AIDS shall be excluded from admission.

The superintendent shall ensure that there will be no release of information, in violation of county office policy governing the confidentiality of student records, regarding students with AIDS. In all instances, confidential information shall not be released without parental consent.

Expulsion Appeal Process

Basis for Hearing

This Fresno County Board of Education policy is adopted to implement Education Code Section 48919 which reads in pertinent part:

"If a pupil is expelled from school, the pupil or the pupil's parent or guardian may, within 30 days following the decision to expel, file an appeal to the County Board of Education which shall hold a hearing thereon and render its decision. The County Board shall hold a hearing within 20 school days of the request and shall render a decision within three school days of the hearing, unless the pupil requests a postponement."

"The County Board of Education shall adopt rules and regulations establishing procedures for expulsion appeals...."

These rules of procedure are intended to serve as a guideline for all involved parties. The student and/or the parent or guardian who appeals an expulsion shall be referred to as "Appellant" when prosecuting the appeal. The expelling school board shall be referred to as "Respondent" when defending against the appeal. The County Board of Education shall be referred to as "County Board" in hearing the appeal and reaching its decision.

The following rules are to be liberally construed, except when they coincide with Education Code sections, to that the County Board will be able to hold a fair and impartial review of the proceedings conducted by the Respondent. However, these rules will remain within the scope of appropriate law.

Prehearing Procedure

A. Notice Of Appeal Of Expulsion And Request For Transcript and Hearing

The expelled pupil of a school in Fresno County and/or the parent or guardian of that pupil may appeal the expulsion by the school board to the Fresno County Board by filing with the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools (Attention: Legal Department) a written "Notice of Appeal of Expulsion and Request for Transcript and Hearing" form. This "Notice of Appeal" will be provided to the interested party (Appellant) upon request. The appeal becomes official on the day the Superintendent's Office receives the signed "Notice of Appeal" provided it is received within 30 days of the date of the school board's decision to expel pupil.

B. Notice Of Filing Of Expulsion Appeal and Order for Transcript

Upon the filing of the "Notice of Appeal of Expulsion and Request for Transcript and Hearing", the Legal Department shall within two (2) school days serve upon Appellant and Respondent, a "Notice of Filing of Expulsion Appeal and Order for Transcript". This "Notice of Filing" will set forth the procedures for Appellant's submission of transcript of Respondent's hearing to the County Board (c/o Legal Department). Along with the "Notice of Filing," will be a copy of E.C. Sections 48919 through 48925.

C. Notice of Hearing

Upon the filing of the "Notice of Appeal of Expulsion and Request for Transcript and Hearing," the Legal Department shall within (5) school days serve upon Appellant and Respondent a "Notice of Hearing." The hearing date before the County Board shall be set within 20 schooldays of the receipt of the "Notice of Appeal of Expulsion and Request for Transcript and Hearing."

D. Delivery of Records to the County Board

It shall be the responsibility of the Appellant to provide the County Board (Legal Department) with the transcript of Respondent's hearing nine (9) days before the hearing set before the County Board.

It shall be the responsibility of the Respondent to provide the County Board (Legal Department) with all supporting documents involving the expulsion including, but not limited to: school board's policies, rules, and/or regulations; correspondence/notices sent or received by the district; hearing records; documented evidence.

Upon the Legal Department's receipt of the expulsion records, it will have these records duplicated legibly and dispersed (in folders) to appropriate persons. Appellant and Respondent will each receive at least one copy of the expulsion records on or before the expulsion appeal hearing.

E. Notice to County Board of Names of Persons who will Make presentations at the Hearing

At least 48 hours prior to the hearing, Appellant and Respondent School Board shall each notify the Legal Department of the names of the persons known to them who intend to make presentations at the hearing. A written form will be sent each party by the Legal Department.

Appellant and Respondent may each be accompanied by an attorney of choice and such attorney shall be afforded an opportunity to speak on behalf of the client.

F. Continuance of Hearing (request before or at the initial hearing)

A request for a continuance may be made by Appellant or Respondent (or both). The written or oral request(s) shall be directed to the Legal Department.

Either party may, as of right, request one continuance. Upon receipt of said request, the hearing shall be reset for the next regular County Board meeting. The Legal Department shall inform the parties in writing of the new hearing date and time.

A stipulated continuance may be requested; however, in this situation each party will have exercised its right to one continuance. The hearing will be reset for the next regular County Board meeting. The Legal Department shall inform the parties in writing of the new hearing date and time.

Continuance of Hearing (second request after initial hearing date or at rescheduled hearing)

A second request (by the party that made the first request or parties) for continuance will be decided upon in a case by case basis. If the second request is made at the County Board meeting (the rescheduled hearing), the County Board may grant or deny the continuance. If the request is granted, the Legal Department will inform the parties in writing of the new hearing date and time.

G. Withdrawal of Expulsion Appeal

If the parties reach a satisfactory agreement before the hearing, the Appellant may withdraw the expulsion appeal. (However, Appellant may withdraw for any reason). The Legal Department will provide a form that Appellant must sign to officially withdraw the expulsion appeal. If Appellant does not withdraw the appeal, the County Board will hear the case as scheduled whether parties are present or not.

Suspension And Expulsion: Due Process (continued)

Appellant may request withdrawal of appeal at the hearing.

Hearing Before County Board:

The expulsion appeal hearing before the County Board is not a rehearing but a review of the school district's decision to expel. The review shall be limited to the following questions:

- (1) Whether the governing board of the school district acted without or in excess of its jurisdiction.
- (2) Whether there was a fair hearing before the governing board.
- (3) Whether there was prejudicial abuse of discretion in the school district's expulsion hearing.
- (4) Whether there is relevant and material evidence which, in the exercise of reasonable diligence, could not have been produced or which was improperly excluded at the expulsion hearing before the school district.

A proceeding without or in excess of jurisdiction includes, but is not limited to, a situation where an expulsion hearing is not commenced within the time periods prescribed in Article 1. (Section 48900 <u>et seq.</u>) of the California Education Code, a situation where an expulsion order is not based upon the acts enumerated in Section 48900 of the Education Code, or a situation involving acts not related to school activity or attendance.

An abuse of discretion is established in any of the following situations:

- (1) If school officials have not met the procedural requirements of the California Education Code.
- (2) If the decision to expel is not supported by the findings prescribed by Section 48915¹ of the Education Code.
- (3) If the findings are not supported by the evidence.

The County Board shall determine the appeal based upon the record of the hearing before the Respondent together with applicable documentation as submitted to the County Board.

The County Board shall not receive any evidence other than that contained in the record of the proceedings of the Respondent unless a de novo proceeding is granted.

Conduct of Hearing:

The President of the County Board shall preside over the hearing which shall be conducted in closed session unless the pupil or the pupil's parent or guardian shall, in writing at least five (5) days prior to the date of hearing, request that the hearing be a public meeting. If such request is served upon the County Board, the meeting shall be a public meeting. Each party shall be allowed ten (10) minutes for oral argument beginning with Appellant. During and after presentations, the County Board members may direct questions to any person who appeared before the County Board. The President will close the hearing and will request that all persons present leave the hearing room, except board members, recording secretary, and counsel to the County Board. The County Board will deliberate but if any member of the County Board wishes to ask additional questions of any person who appeared before the county Board the President may reopen the hearing and recall the parties. After questioning, the parties will again leave and deliberations will continue. After deliberations, the parties will be called in to the meeting room and a County Board member will make a motion on the matter.

¹ Probable Legislative intent is Section 48918 of the Education Code.

Suspension And Expulsion: Due Process (continued)

Decision:

A County Board member will make a motion to one of the following:

- (a) uphold/affirm the decision of the Respondent to expel Appellant,
- (b) reverse the decision of the Respondent to expel Appellant,
- (The County Board will direct Respondent to expunge pupil records and school districts records of any reference to the expulsion action and such expulsion shall be deemed not to have occurred.) (The County Board will direct Respondent to reimburse Appellant for the cost of the transcription of the hearing before the Respondent.)
- (c) remand the matter to the Respondent for reconsideration, or instead, grant a hearing de novo (new).

(The County Board may remand the matter if item (4) on page 4 applies or if item (1) on page 4 applies. If item (1) applies, the County board may order the pupil reinstated pending such reconsideration.)

 (d) postpone making a decision/continue the hearing (The County Board may continue the hearing at a later time; however, the decision must be made within three (3) days.)

The final decision shall be announced in public meeting.

Finality of the Order

The decision of the County Board shall be final and binding upon both parties. The parties shall each receive a copy of the final order by personal service or certified mail. The order shall become final when rendered.

Preservation of Record

A copy of the expulsion appeal records before the County board will be kept with other County board files (with the exception of the decision).

The minutes will state the names of those present at the hearing and the vote of each member.

The Legal Department will keep a (hard) copy of the expulsion appeal records until the pupil's 21st birthday. At that time, the Legal Department may destroy these records (with the exception of the decision). The written decision will be kept in some form, e.g., hard copy or microfiche.

Appellants are encouraged to keep their folder of the expulsion appeal documents.

Interdistrict Attendance Appeal

The person having legal custody may appeal, within 30 calendar days of the failure or refusal to issue a permit, or enter into an agreement allowing the attendance, to the County Board of Education having jurisdiction over the district of residence of the parent or legal guardian or person having legal custody.

The County board of Education shall, within 30 calendar days after the appeal is filed, determine whether the pupil should be permitted to attend in the district in which he desires to attend the applicable period of time.

Interdistrict Transfer Appeal

- A. The person having legal custody of a pupil shall have the right to appeal to the County Board of Education if an interdistrict attendance permit is denied or the districts fail or refuse to enter into an agreement to allow the interdistrict attendance.
 - 1. The County Board will determine whether the pupil shall be permitted to attend school in the district in which he or she desires.
 - 2. It is the wish of the County Board that interdistrict attendance appeal proceedings be completed in a prudent manner consistent with allowing the pupil and the school district(s) an opportunity to prepare and present appropriate information regarding their cases.

Overview and Definitions

- A. Interdistrict Transfer (hereafter IDT)
 - When the person having legal custody of a pupil requests that the pupil be permitted to attend school in a district other than the pupil's district of legal residence, the governing boards of the pupil's district of residence and preferred district of attendance can enter into an agreement to allow the pupil to attend the preferred district for not more than five years.
- B. District of Residence
 - 1. A pupil shall be deemed to have complied with the residency requirements for school attendance in a school district provided he or she is any of the following:
 - a) A pupil that resides with their parent/legal guardian in that district on a daily basis.
 - b) A pupil placed within that district in a regularly established licensed children's institution, licensed foster home or a family home.
 - c) A pupil whose residence is located within the boundaries of the desired school district and whose parent or legal guardian is relieved of responsibility, control and authority through emancipation.
 - d) A pupil who lives in the home of a caregiving adult that is located within the boundaries of that school district. Execution of an affidavit is necessary in this case.
 - e) A pupil residing in a state hospital located within the boundaries of that school district.
 - f) An elementary pupil, one or both of whose parents, or whose legal guardian, is employed within the boundaries of that school district.
- C. District of Attendance
 - 1. A district other than the district of residence, within which a pupil attends school.

Reasons for Requesting an Interdistrict Transfer

- A. Guidelines for requesting an IDT will depend upon individual local district policy. Reasons to request a transfer may include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - 1. When child care needs of the student are met by someone in another district.
 - a) Students who are granted interdistrict transfer agreements on the basis of child care shall be allowed to continue attending school in that district of choice through the twelfth grade, so long as the parent/guardian chooses.
 - When special mental or physical health needs, as certified by a physician, school psychologist or other appropriate school personnel, can be met in another district.
 - When the student has siblings attending school in a different district in order to avoid splitting the family's attendance.
 To complete a school year when parents/guardians have moved out of the district during
 - 4. To complete a school year when parents/guardians have moved out of the district during the school year

Interdistrict Transfer Appeal (continued)

- 5. To allow students to remain with a class pending graduating later that year from an elementary, junior or senior high school.
- 6. To let seniors attend the same school they attended as juniors, even if their families moved out of the district during the junior year.
- 7. When there is a valid interest in a particular educational program not offered in the district of residency. (NOTE: Program means more than one class, e.g., Agriculture, ROP, Auto Mechanics, GATE etc.).
- 8. To provide a major change in school environment for reasons of personal and social adjustment.
- 9. When the parent/guardian provides written evidence that the family will be moving to the receiving district in the immediate future and would like the student to start the year in that district.
- 10. When the student will be living out of the district for one year or less.
- 11. To meet special or unique transportation needs of a student.

Informal Solutions Prior to County Board Appeal

- A. The County Board believes it may be possible in some cases to arrive at solutions that would make an appeal necessary. Therefore, the designee of the county superintendent shall investigate to determine whether local remedies in the matter have been exhausted.
 - 1. These informal procedures are not considered a substitute for an appeal to the County Board. The parent or guardian is free to reject a proposed informal solution and proceed with their right to an appeal.

Procedures to Appeal to the County Board of Education

- A. If the parent/guardian wishes to appeal to the County Board of Education regarding an interdistrict transfer denial, the following steps are necessary:
 - Within 30 calendar days of the failure or refusal of a school district(s) to issue an IDT permit or to enter into an agreement to allow the interdistrict attendance, the parent/legal guardian shall contact the secretary of the Fresno County Board of Education and indicate their desire to appeal.
 - a) Failure to appeal within the required time is good cause for denial of an appeal.
 - The County Board secretary will provide the parent/guardian with a Fresno County Office of Education "Interdistrict Attendance Appeal" form.
 The parent/guardian will return the completed Interdistrict Attendance Appeal form as
 - 3. The parent/guardian will return the completed Interdistrict Attendance Appeal form as well as a completed copy of the IDT permit to the Board secretary by 12:00 noon on the Monday the week prior to the hearing.
 - a) The Board secretary will inform the parent/guardian of the due date in writing.
 - b) Failure to meet this deadline will result in forfeiture of the right of appeal.
- B. The district(s) involved in the appeal may also supply written arguments and documentation supporting their case.
 - 1. The copies of the written documentation from the parent/guardian and from the district(s) shall be provided to the county board for their review.
 - 2. The county superintendent's designee shall investigate the case and if a local remedy is not possible, the designee shall prepare a report for the County Board. The report shall include pertinent background information regarding the case.
- C. Students who are under consideration for expulsion or who have been expelled may not appeal interdistrict attendance denials while expulsion proceedings are pending, or during the term of the expulsion.

The County Board Appeal Hearing

A. The County Board shall, within thirty (30) calendar days after the filing of the appeal form, determine whether the pupil should be permitted to attend school in the district in which he/she desires to attend and the applicable period of time.

Interdistrict Transfer Appeal (continued)

- 1. In the event that compliance by the County Board within the time requirements for determining whether the pupil should be permitted to attend school in the district in which he/she desires to attend is deemed impractical, or for other good cause, the County Board may extend the time for up to an additional five school days. An extension may be imposed by the Board prior to the appeal or at the time of the appeal, or by the county superintendent of schools prior to the appeal.
- The county shall provide adequate notice in writing to all parties of the time, date and 2. location of the hearing.
- The County Board may grant a continuance upon showing of good cause. 3.
- 4 Failure of the parent/guardian to appear at the scheduled appeal without just cause may be deemed an abandonment of the appeal and the County Board may dismiss the matter.
- B. The hearing shall be conducted in open session at the regularly scheduled County Board meeting although the parent/guardian can request a closed session hearing if deemed appropriate by the Board.
 - 1. The pupil under consideration may be present at the hearing at the discretion of the parent/guardian. Evidence presented at the hearing shall be relevant to the matter.
 - 2.
 - 3. Inflammatory statements, accusations or questions will not be tolerated.
- The appeal hearing will be presided over by the president of the Fresno County Board of C. Education or his/her designee.
 - 1. Following appropriate introductions, the respective parties will be given approximately 5 minutes to make an oral presentation to the board. The parent/guardian will make the first presentation followed by the district(s).
 - 2. The Board members may direct questions to the respective parties at anytime during and after the presentations.
 - 3. At the conclusion of the presentations and questioning, the president will call for a vote of the Board members. The Board will render its decision in open session.
 - a) The Board shall base its decision upon the evidence and testimony presented and the accompanying documentation provided by the parent/guardian, the district(s) and the designee of the county superintendent.
 - Criteria which may be used by the County Board in arriving at a decision to b) grant the pupil's appeal request could include, but not be limited to the following:
 - (1) The district the of residence does not offer the education program desired by prrent and the proposed district of attendance offers such a program.
 - (2) A hardship will result if the pupil is required to attend the district of residence. A possible example is after school child care.
 - (3) Substantial danger to the pupil's health or safety will be removed or mitigated by granting the appeal.
 - c) When dealing with interdistrict attendance appeals, the County Board will also consider the potential implications for either of the districts involved. For example:
 - (1) What will be the effects on students in either district.
 - (2) If there room at the schools in the desired district.
 - d) The board's decision will generally result in one of the following actions:
 - (1) The Board shall grant the appeal upon a determination that the pupil should be permitted to attend school in the district in which he/she desires and the pupil shall be admitted without delay. In granting the appeal, the Board will stipulate the applicable period of time.
 - (2) The Board shall deny the appeal upon a determination that the pupil should not be permitted to attend school in the district in which he/she desires to attend.
 - The County Board will also have the authority to remand the matter back to the e) district(s) governing board(s) should evidence and testimony present new information not previously available.

Interdistrict Transfer Appeal (continued)

- (a) If the IDT request is again denied following reconsideration by the District(s) board(s), the parent/guardian will be entitled to an appeal hearing before the County Board regarding the new evidence.
- e) The decision by the County Board is final and binding to all parties.
 (1) There shall be no rehearing or reconsideration by the County Board once the final order of decision is rendered.
 - (2) The order of the final notice shall be delivered to all parties in writing.

Provisional Attendance

A. For a period not to exceed two school months, the governing board of a school district may provisionally admit to the schools of the district a pupil who resides in another district pending a decision of the two boards, or by the County Board of Education upon appeal, regarding the interdistrict attendance.

Interdistrict Attendance Involving Districts Located in Different Counties

A. If the interdistrict attendance involves school districts located in different counties, the County Board of Education having jurisdiction over the district denying the permit, or refusing or failing to enter into an agreement to allow for the issuance of a permit, shall have jurisdiction for purposes of an appeal. If both districts deny a permit, or refuse or fail to enter into an agreement to allow for the issuance of a permit, the County Board having jurisdiction over the district of residence shall have jurisdiction for purposes of an appeal and, upon granting a pupil's appeal, shall seek concurrence in the decision by the County Board of the other county which shall provide adequate opportunity for the district under its jurisdiction to be heard on the matter before making a decision. If the two county boards do not then concur, the pupil's appeal shall be denied.

Reporting To Parents

The County Superintendent and County Board believes that good communication between parent and teacher is important in the educational process.

With this in mind, the Superintendent requests teachers and administrators provide frequent and varied contacts between parents and teachers. All appropriate forms and methods of communication, such as parent-teacher conferences, student progress reports, mail, telephone, and school visitation by parents should be used.

Procedures and the specific methods to be used will be those recommended by the Special Education Local Plan Area for students with disabilities. It is particularly important that evaluations of students on an individualized education program be communicated quickly and fully to the parent or guardian.

Welfare

Students shall be under the supervision of the school authorities from the time they arrive on the school premises until they leave the school premises. When students are provided transportation to and from the school premises by the County, they shall be under the supervision of school authorities from the time they board the school bus until the time they leave the school bus. Students shall also be under the County's supervision at all sponsored functions such as athletic contests, class parties, filed trips (cf. 5142 - Safety).

Notification Of Parents

By law, the parent or guardian of its minor students shall be notified of the students' or parents' rights concerning the students' welfare.

SUBJECT: Asthma Management

The Superintendent and County Board desire to provide support systems for students with asthma in order to reduce school absences, help ensure that such students receive appropriate intervention if symptoms occur at school, and enable them to participate in the educational program and school activities to the extent possible.

The Superintendent or designee shall involve school nurses, other health professionals, school administrators, and health educators in the development of strategies to help provide a healthy and safe school environment for students with asthma. He/she may also involve school health councils or committees and other interested persons to ensure that Fresno County Office of Education's ("FCOE") strategies are coordinated with other school health programs and practices.

FCOE strategies shall include, but not be limited to, procedures for identifying and addressing individual student needs, providing effective professional development on asthma symptoms and staff responsibilities, and identifying and reducing environmental factors at school that may trigger and/or worsen asthma symptoms.

SUBJECT: Food Allergies/Special Dietary Needs

The Superintendent and County Board desire to prevent exposure of students to foods to which they are allergic and to provide for prompt and appropriate treatment in the event that a severe allergic reaction occurs at school.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop guidelines for the care of food-allergic students. Such guidelines shall include, but not be limited to, strategies for identifying students at risk for allergic reactions, avoidance measures and other means to manage allergies, education of staff regarding typical symptoms, and actions to be taken in the event of a severe allergic reaction.

Parents/guardians shall be responsible for notifying the Superintendent or designee, in writing, regarding any food allergies or other special dietary needs of their child in accordance with administrative regulation.

Students with serious dietary needs that qualify as a disability under Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act or the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act shall be provided reasonable accommodation or services, as appropriate, in accordance with his/her accommodation plan or individualized education program.

Students shall not be excluded from school activities based solely on their food allergy.

Married/Pregnant Students

Married students shall have the same educational opportunities as unmarried students.

The County Board and the County Superintendent's responsibility for the education of school-age students may include the pregnant teenager, married or unmarried. These girls shall be allowed to remain in school, and services for them shall be made a regular part of the school system. Any variation from their continuing in regular school classes shall be based upon their assessed needs. Pregnant girls may remain in their assigned school programs as long as their physical and emotional condition permits. The parents, spouses, and physicians should be consulted in developing the educational plan to fit her needs.

Vision And Hearing

The County Superintendent and the County Board establish that there shall be a vision and hearing screening conservation program. The purpose shall be:

- 1. to identify and ensure proper correction of eyes and hearing as early as possible;
- 2. to make appropriate adjustment in the school program;
- 3. to provide positive learning experiences in eye and ear health for all students.

The County Superintendent or his designee shall assure that the test is adequate in nature and is given only by qualified persons.

Safety

The County Superintendent and the County Board of Education are responsible for the proper attention being given to the safety of students.

The County Superintendent will develop and implement regulations which will produce as safe an educational environment as possible for the students as well as for the certificated and classified staff.

The County Superintendent holds students accountable for safe behavior on the playgrounds and during recess, and while they are on school premises and/or under supervision of county office personnel.

Principals, teachers, school bus drivers, or other school personnel are responsible for the conduct and safety of students enrolled in their schools from the time they come under school supervision until they leave school supervision, whether on school premises or not.

It is the responsibility of the principal or program manager to provide for adequate supervision of playgrounds and other school facilities at all times they are in use by students (except as provided elsewhere in board policy; cf. 1330). Special attention should be given to the prevention of accidents, and to the development of habits of good citizenship.

The principal or program manager should make full use of the cooperative services of local and county organizations which provide safety services, such as fire, law enforcement and civil defense agencies.

Civil And Legal Rights And Responsibilities

- 1. Every effort should be extended to include in the formulation of policy, consideration for the developing maturity of the student. Concomitant responsibilities flow from the exercise of rights and privileges. Among these are:
 - a. respect for oneself
 - b. respect for others and their rights
 - c. respect for individual dignity
 - d. respect for legally constituted authority and the legal responsibility of those in authority.
- All rules and regulations to maintain the process of education must be common knowledge. Orientation programs and free student handbooks should provide this information in clear and understandable language. Any changes should be widely publicized in print in both school and community media, and no regulations should be summarily drafted and enforced.
- 3. The parents, certificated staff, and student governments should work cooperatively within the limitations prescribed by law in the establishment of these regulations. The amending and appeal processes for the establishment and enforcement of these rules should be clearly defined and made available to all interested and affected parties.
- 4. Students must be free to establish and should be encouraged to participate in student governments that provide all students, through a representative system, a voice in school affairs. All registered students should be eligible to hold office.
- 5. Schools are for students and students should be involved in the educational process in their schools. Certificated staff members should solicit student and parent suggestions and ideas which meet the needs and interests of all students.
- Freedom of speech is guaranteed to all citizens, and students must be allowed to exercise their constitutionally protected rights of free speech, petition, and assembly as long as they do not interfere with the educational process.

Civil And Legal Rights And Responsibilities (continued)

- a. Materials presented to students should be relevant to the course and appropriate to the maturity level and intellectual ability of the students. Students should have the opportunity to investigate different views related to topics and materials introduced or presented. Teachers should, at all times, strive to promote tolerance for the views and opinions of others and for the rights of individuals to form and hold differing views and opinions. The teacher should further be responsible to permit the expression of the views and opinions of others and to encourage students to examine, evaluate, and synthesize all available information about such topics and materials.
- b. School newspapers, yearbooks, literary magazines, and other publications should be guaranteed the right of freedom of the press, subject to the existing laws of libel, obscenity and public safety. As learning experiences within the school, the staff should have qualified advisers and should seek the highest publication standards. Other non-school sponsored student publications should be subjected to locally determined procedures for distribution on school premises.
- The activities of students other than at school functions carried on entirely outside of normal hours and off school premises, should not be the responsibility of the school and no student should be penalized because of such outside activities.
- 8. Students should be allowed the use of school facilities for school-sponsored, extracurricular activities and should be encouraged to participate in these functions, including clubs, recreational events, and other such related activities. These activities must be scheduled in keeping with normal policy and provide for supervision according to school rules.
- 9. Students have a right to an education and to the equality of educational opportunity. Disciplinary measures that deprive him/her of this right should be utilized only in extreme cases. Disciplinary actions of administrators and teachers should be fair and consistent in all cases and resorted to on¹ when the student, by his/her conduct, reveals his/her inability to recognize the rights of others.
- 10. Schools should establish a clearly defined procedure for the consideration of student problems and the processing of student complaints.
