




## This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Crescent View South II expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Crescent View South II is \$18,964,269, of which \$16,606,314 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$1,466,548 is other state funds, \$0 is local funds, and \$891,407 is federal funds. Of the \$16,606,314 in LCFF Funds, \$4,556,075 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (foster youth, English learner, and low-income students).



California's 2021–22 Budget Act, the federal American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, and other state and federal relief acts have provided local educational agencies (LEAs) with a significant increase in funding to support students, teachers, staff, and their communities in recovering from the COVID-19 pandemic and to address the impacts of distance learning on students. The following is a one-time mid-year report to the local governing board or body and educational partners related to engagement on, and implementation of, these Acts.

Crescent View South II was able to engage its educational partners using Google Meet and Zoom. Parents were notified, in English and Spanish, of the meeting through our L4L Connect, email and texts. The meeting was held on December 1, 2021. During the meeting, parents were informed of the additional 15% increase in funding, resulting in \$592,514 more to be directed at supporting their students. It was explained that, because this funding was not initially included in the 2020-2021 LCAP, it was important to receive their consultation, into how the funds could be spent. Educator partners were also informed that the school received Title I funds in the amount of \$262,886. Their input was elicited during the meeting. Teachers and staff were also provided the opportunity to provide consultation on December 1, 2021.

The additional funds from the A-G Grant, Educator Effectiveness Block Grant and the Extended Learning Opportunities grant were shared with our educational partners on December 2, 2021. Some of the details shared with them at the meeting was the expected amount of additional funding and how these funds will be used to hire additional staff. Educational partners were appreciative of the information provided and willing to support our students and program.

Crescent View South II is a charter school serving an unduplicated population over 55%. We plan to use the additional 15% in concentration funding to support our unduplicated students with increasing functions in our LCAP, which can be found at <a href="https://cvsouth2.org/">https://cvsouth2.org/</a>. The additional funds will be used to specifically add more teachers and staff identified in our LCAP. LCAP Goal 1, Action 3 will be increased by \$53,640 to add one more Tutor position. Additionally, LCAP Goal 1, Action 2 will be increased by \$95,250 to add one more FTE Small Group Instruction Mathematics teacher. These increases to these actions equal the amount the additional funds in concentration allotment. These funds are principally directed at meeting the identified needs of our low-income, English learner, and foster youth students.

Crescent View South II is actively implementing its Local Control and Accountability Plan. The Mid-Year Report shared with our governing board shows specifically how funds are being expended for each goal and every action in the LCAP. This year, Crescent View South II hired 1 counselor and 2 tutors increasing staff to support In-Person Instruction and Services. Current open positions include a tutor aligned to LCAP Goal # 1 Action 3.

Crescent View South II implemented the Safe Return to School Plan on July 1, 2021. Fiscal resources are being implemented to support the plan, which includes professional development and additional intervention programs. The plan is updated as necessary to meet state and local requirements.

Our Educator Effectiveness Block Grant, the A-G Grant, and the Extended Learning Opportunities grant are aligned to our Local Control and Accountability Plan. The EEBG is linked with LCAP Goal #2 – Action #2 regarding professional development. For example, Crescent View South II will create a system, long-term plan to mentor and coach staff to meet the needs of our students. The EEBG is aligned with the LCAP Goal #2 Action #4 in supporting teachers in helping with the unique needs of our unduplicated students in meeting standards. The A-G Grant is aligned with the LCAP Goal #2 Action #4 in supporting teachers in helping teachers in helping with the unique needs of our unduplicated students in meeting standards. The A-G Grant is aligned with the LCAP Goal #1 – Actions #2 & #3 with extended learning opportunities, so that they can reach their goal of earning a diploma.

## Plan Summary [2022-23]

#### **General Information**

A description of the LEA, its schools, and its students in grades transitional kindergarten-12, as applicable to the LEA.

Crescent View South II is a Dashboard Alternative Status School, with an independent study program. Our current enrollment is 1,051 and we serve grades 9th-12th. We are in Fresno county serving urban and suburban students. We serve 11.9% English Learners, 86.2% low income, 1.1% foster youth, and 11.8% special education students. We are a charter school that serves a diverse student community with the mission of engaging students in learning, who are no longer enrolled in a traditional classroom program, or who prefer a personalized learning education in an alternative setting. Our goal is to successfully prepare students for work or college-readiness through our integrated and personalized program of job readiness coursework and standards-based curriculum. Some students need the flexibility of an independent study model to meet family obligations, such as work or child care needs. Many of our students reflect a diverse community with often low-income and English as a second language as a barrier to academic success. Some students may have been unsuccessful in the traditional school setting and simply seek an alternative choice in curriculum programs. The school offers alternative choices through sitebased learning, independent study, and distance learning to enable students to acquire the knowledge necessary to make a difference in their lives.

Students, families, staff and our community around CVSII have felt the negative impact of the global pandemic. They struggle with employment, housing and food insecurity continually. We are aware of their needs and provide trauma informed practices, as well as food and counseling. Our staff builds strong, professional relationships that serves the student well during the crisis.

The school provides a diverse, student-centered learning environment in which all students are held to high academic and behavioral standards. The school also emphasizes increased parental involvement, more one-on-one teacher and student interaction, student-driven participation in the learning process, technology access, varied learning environments, and choices in curriculum programs. Our personalized learning model is tailored to the needs and interests of each individual student. It is a combination of the best of home schooling and resource center based classes. Personalized learning is dedicated to developing personalized learning programs for each student. Its intent is to engage each student in the learning process in the most productive and meaningful way to optimize each student's learning potential and success. It allows the school to combine multiple assessment levels of student academic achievement through the regular recording of detailed learning records, compiling student work samples, and conducting annual state-mandated testing programs. The school offers this personalized learning option for students with the ultimate objective of enabling pupils to become self-motivated, competent and lifelong learners. We are a year-round credit recovery program and we have 13 Learning Periods (LP) as our method of structuring the academic year.

The 2021-22 School Year was the first year CVSII accepted Title 1 funds. In 2022-23 CVSII will move to a Schoolwide Title 1 Program and the Title 1 funds will be reflected in this LCAP as a means of meeting the School Plan for Student Achievement requirements. The Title 1 funds will be used to supplement the strategic plan represented in this plan to help our at-risk students meet state standards and graduate.

### **Reflections: Successes**

We believe that the reengagement strategies that we implemented, to help students and families during the crisis, also increased the student's average attendance rate by +5.57 points, up to 94.47%. Our teachers and retention support staff worked to address the serious concerns we had for students dropping out. Building relationships and staying connected to students decreased the dropout rate by 5.5%, to only 6.3%. Another important measure for us is our Success Rate, which is the percentage of students who graduate along with the percentage that are retained or return to their local school district. Our Success Rate increased +4.5 percentage points to 93.0% and our retention rate increased by +10.38 percentage points, up to 85.3%. Our dedicated staff and students successfully pulled together during the pandemic to remain engaged in the school program.

Graduation rates and credit completion rates increased over the last two years. With additional supports in place, such as tutoring, our students were able to earn on average +9% more credits during since the beginning of the previous year. Our English Language Learners earned +0.17% higher credit completion rate than the All Group. Students in the Low Income and Special Education groups earned -0.07% and -0.15 less in credit completion compared to the All Group. Additionally, our graduation rate slightly decreased by -1.1 percentage points, to 92.9%. Our English Language Learners graduated at +1.2% higher than the All student group. Special Education student group graduated at a -2.9% lesser rate and students in the low income +0.1 higher than the All group. This shows that our mission of meeting students' academic and social-emotional needs was effective.

We used a three year data set, from 2019-2022, starting with the CA Dashboard student group results and local data, in order to determine areas of success. The graduation rate for 2021 was 92.9%, which is slightly lower at -1.1 percentage points. Looking back at CA Dashboard results, we see that we experienced success on our Dashboard indicators, prior to the pandemic, and in analyzing student group data, then and now, we realize that there are a few areas to highlight. In 2019, we had a graduation rate that was blue, at 88.7% and in 2020, the graduation rate was 94%. Our ELA and Math indicators were yellow and our CCI was orange, which is fair for a Dashboard Alternative Status School, with an independent study program. Our suspension rate was blue and remains low. Our retention rate continues to be high, which is important, because we are credit recovery program.

We plan to increase our success by sustaining our system of continual improvement for student groups. We used student outcomes data from the latest DataQuest, CA Dashboard, CALPADs reports and local LCAP data tracking have clearly demonstrated that there are a three main areas that must be addressed as goals and actions for the new 2022-2023 LCAP. One critical focus of our program is to improve the performance of our disengaged students. We identify, early on, which students are not completing their school work and then assign them tutors to ensure that they helped support student learning. On average, credit completion improved by +9%. This is due to the collaborative teamwork between our teachers, tutors and counselors.

We also plan to sustain our success by implementing our school strategies and learning program to fidelity. The goals and actions articulated in our LCAP support our individualized learning model and adequate funding is provided to ensure that effective strategic supports such as tutors, student retention services and trauma informed trained teachers continue. We monitor the progress of our students through multiple measures around engagement and academic performance. LCAP data and other local data are discussed quarterly and often shared with our educational partners, including the school board.

Our school survey data shows that 100% of our students felt safe at school this year. This is about an 11% increase from previous years, we are glad that it is not drastically lower. Additionally, 91% felt connected to the school this year. This is very important to us, because student sense of safety impacts their learning and social-emotional well-being Teachers reported that 97% have a team member that they can count on, which demonstrates that they are connected to a meaningful buddy from work, during this crisis. We have worked to ensure that there is a team spirit that connects everyone.

#### **Reflections: Identified Need**

The CA Dashboard for 2020-21 and 2021-22 was suspended as a result of AB 98 and AB 130. However, results from 2019 and local metrics provided us a three year data set, which we used to inform our student group analysis. The first area of concern is that our CAASPP results show that English learners, low-income and foster youth students are scoring below the "All Group" in English Language Arts and mathematics. Even though the unduplicated groups improved from the prior year, it was not enough to close the gap in performance. We saw the similar achievement gaps during the pandemic, in key areas, such as ELA, mathematics, and credit completion, using the data we

tracked for the Learning Continuity Plan. The 2021 CAASPP results for our English language learners was 5 percentage points below the All student group in mathematics and 41 points below in ELA. Our low income students were below the All group by 1 percentage point in math and 3 points in ELA. There were not enough foster youth students to report results on last year. Students with disabilities were 3 percentage points below the All group in mathematics and 27 points below in ELA. We plan to share student performance data with our educational partners and used their feedback along, with our analysis, to help develop LCAP goals with actions directed at these areas of identified need.

The next area of concern is that the reclassification rate was 1%, which is below the state average of 8.6%. We plan to share this performance outcome with our educational partners and discuss how we might provide targeted assistance to our English Language learners. We work with our English Learner Advisory Committee and elicit their insight. We will determine the specific actions that address the specific requirements for reclassification like grades in ELD, NWEA scores, and ELPAC scores that might improve performance on the ELPAC. With the success we have seen in our tutoring program, we know they can help make a difference in the academic lives of our English Learners.

Closing the gaps in our graduation rate have been improving, although we are not yet satisfied. The All student group graduated at 92.9%, with our English Learner student group higher with +1.2 percentage points. Students in the low income group were just +0.1 percentage point higher than the All group. Our students with disabilities graduated at a 90.0% rate, which is -2.9 percentage points below the All student group. We plan to share this performance data with our educational partners and determine specific actions that will have a positive impact for our students.

Another area of concern is NWEA reading and mathematics scores decreased from last year to this year. Overall, our foster youth students decrease of -0.41 in math and -0.17 reading, so we know there is room to grow. The reading scores for our English language learners were - 0.22 in mathematics and maintained an average score of 3.86 in reading. We recognize how important it is for our EL's to experience targeted support and interventions as they progress in their educational program. The distance from the All student group for our low income students was -0.18 in mathematics and +0.19 in reading. However, our students with learning disabilities scored -0.44 lower in mathematics and -0.42 lower in reading. We plan to engage families and students in their individualized academic learning plan and support systems like tutoring and counseling, so that their educational performance is maximized at our school.

Our school survey data shows that 91% of our students felt connected this year. This is an important metric for us and we expect to be higher. Face to face interaction with a caring adult will help students feel connected. It is very important to us to ensure that we are doing everything possible to provide students with time and attention to support them during their time with us. Teachers reported that 99% are feeling safe and 99% feel connected to the school. We expect this metric to be higher as we continue to improve on our school connectedness.

Due to the nature of our credit recovery, independent study, Dashboard Alternative Status School program, certain data points are not included in the LCAP. Students do not take Advance Placement, or pass EAP in an amount greater than 11, and the CDE prohibits any potentially identifying student data. Chronic absenteeism is also not a match for our program, because the calculation is for seat-based programs, and not short term independent study programs that have high mobility. Furthermore, our dropout rate is calculated as our non-

completer rate, which includes any student who does not report to us that they have continued with another program, in order to complete their education.

### **LCAP Highlights**

The Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) provides funds for helping high needs students with social-emotional support, academic interventions, counseling and student engagement activities. Students have access to a robust tutoring program that supports their learning. Targeted academic interventions help close skill and knowledge gaps ensuring that students become competent graduates. The following LCAP Goals support our low income, English Language learners and foster youth:

Goal #1: Increase Academic Progress Goal #2: Students Will Gain Skills for College and Career Readiness Goal #3: Increase Student Retention Goal #4: Increase Educational Partner Engagement

Our first goal is a focus goal directed at helping our student groups improve their performance, especially our English Learners. Our second goal is a broad goal supporting student interest in a career tech or a higher education. The third goal is a maintenance of progress goal that meets the mission of our school program to retain students and help them graduate. The last LCAP goal is aimed at improving educational partner engagement, especially for our high needs students and their families.

## **Engaging Educational Partners**

A summary of the process used to engage educational partners and how this engagement was considered before finalizing the LCAP.

This year we received Title 1 funds and we are using the LCAP as our School Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA). We are adhering to federal guidelines for involving our educational partners in the needs assessment, parent compact, parent/family engagement policy and input into the direction of the use of federal funds.

This year CVSII was presented with several challenges due to the Pandemic. However, to meet and adhere to the LCAP requirement for Parent engagement CVSII used a variety of methods to solicit educational partner input. Conventional methods like making phone calls and sending flyers were utilized, other means of communication were online platforms such as emails, text, and L4L Connect. To get a good sense of all educational partner's views and how to continue improving our program CVSII reached out to the following groups: students, parents, guardians, teachers, principals, administrators, and community partners. Anyone associated with student learning was reached out to for input. Input from our local SELPA was also sought and shared with parents of student with special needs. CVSII scheduled schoolwide meetings throughout the school year and presented at various school events. This included but not limited to Parent Night, Back to School Night, Open House, ELAC/PAC and Parent/Teacher conferences.

CVSII used every engagement opportunity to inform educational partners of the school's progress and about the schools LCAP goals. At every meeting school leadership shared state and local assessments including up to date summative and formative assessments highlighting progress in student achievement and areas of improvement. Substantial discussions occurred at several of these meeting over what might impact student learning and affect the graduation rate. School leaders also shared the actions that were implemented to achieve the school goals. In addition, parents were given information on graduation requirements and college/career readiness by school counselors. They also discussed CTE Pathways, dual enrollment, and past/current student events and opportunities. English Language Learner staff shared the importance ELPAC testing, and placement process along with # of students being redesignated. Site leaders discussed enrollment, retention, and shared changes to the school budget under local control; parents were also asked for consultation about the school LCAP goals and actions and services. Input from parents were documented and shared with school staff to get a better sense of the needs of students and parents.

The School Survey was given in February, 2022 to all educational partners. These surveys were another means to gather input from individuals who were not able to provide feedback at one of our meetings and gather additional input.

From these meetings and surveys CVSII was able to evaluate the concerns and needs of the community helping us to adjust our program, increase student success and parent communication. Listed below are the details of the process: Comprehensive Needs Assessment meetings' target audience included district administrators and site administrators. Administrators reviewed data aligned with the metrics to determine if progress was being made in achieving desired outcomes. Various meetings were scheduled as data became available locally and through the state (e.g. Dashboard data). Data analysis included a broad overview of reviewing aggregate data to determine areas of progress and/or concern. Follow up meetings included a deeper dive into the data by reviewing student detailed reports.

We are adhering to federal guidelines for involving our educational partners in the needs assessment, parent compact, parent/family engagement policy and input into the direction of the use of federal funds.

In May, a draft of the LCAP was posted onto the school website for two weeks and made available for public comment. The public was provided the opportunity to call or email the principal and provide their input during this time. No input was received.

The Public Hearing was held on June 2nd, 2022, and our school board approved our Local Control and Accountability Plan on June 2nd, 2022. Copies of the LCAP were available online, prior to the meeting, along with the board agenda. Educational partners were given the opportunity to provide comment to the charter school board, prior to its approval. The Local Indicators were also presented at the same board meeting that the LCAP was approved. The Board adopted the budget at the same meeting of the LCAP Adoption.

SPECIAL EDUCATION SELPA SUPPORT: We have a good partnership with our SELPA administration and the following collaborative activities have had a positive impact:

The Fresno County Charter SELPA participates and provides guidance in the CDE's Special Education Monitoring Processes. The Fresno County Charter SELPA provide program and technical support by the Program Specialist and/or other SELPA team members. Dropout and Graduation data for special education students are reviewed in a collaborative process with the Fresno County Charter SELPA. Staff training related to special education students is provided by the Fresno County Charter SELPA as needed and requested.

A summary of the feedback provided by specific educational partners.

The following aspects of the LCAP will be continued because of educational partners support via verbal and written feedback:

- All goals and actions will be continued and monitored. Educational partners were supportive of maintaining the broad goals that captured specific actions intended to provide services to all students and actions intended to provide services to English Learners, foster youth, low-income students, and students with exceptional needs.
- There will be a continued focus on Goal #1: Increase Academic Performance.
- Parents would like to see an increase in dual enrollment courses.
- We will allocate more resources to address SEL components to gain college and career readiness.
- Increased SEL support and strategies for motivation.

We will continue to collaborate with educational partners throughout the school year to explore and monitor the progress of implemented actions.

A description of the aspects of the LCAP that were influenced by specific input from educational partners.

As a result of educational partners input, Crescent View South II will implement goals that align to our mission/vision and community needs. Specifically, Goal 1 Action 4 (Students will gain skills for college or career-readiness) and Goal 3 Action 1 (Increase Student Retention), which directly correlate to the needs and concerns raised by educational partners. Students, parents, and staff all communicated the importance of students gaining and demonstrating college and/or career skills as evidenced by engagement in college-level courses, participation in CTE coursework, the ability to navigate various technologies and platforms. In addition, our students, parents, and staff all communicate the need to eliminate barriers to students' retention in our program.

Specifically, the PAC/ELAC asked for increased resources to meet SEL needs, additional 1:1 extended academic supports, and transportation needs.

## **Goals and Actions**

### Goal

Goal #	Description
1	Increase Academic Progress: This is a focus goal for increasing academic progress for all students, especially our English Language learners, low- income and foster youth, who struggled during the previous year. In the next three years, we will have mitigated the negative impact learning loss had on our students, and we will see improvement in our NWEA, EL reclassification, credit completion and graduation rates.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

As a result of our analysis on key state and local data, we determined the need for a focus goal on academic performance for all our unduplicated students. This new goal specifically addresses low key metrics such as the English Learner reclassification rate, credit completion, and graduation for our student groups. We looked at our student group data, which reveal performance gaps between the "All Student Group," and the unduplicated students. Our students also take the NWEA MAP assessment, and we measure academic growth from year to year in this way. This year, performance gaps among student groups were also revealed, using that assessment. We understand the gaps that need to be closed for our students, and this focus goal was carefully designed to support their academic needs with targeted interventions and tutoring.

We sought the consultation of our educational partners, and involved them the LCAP process, which we believe promotes positive engagement, buy-in and trust. We know that additional tutoring, interventions, and counseling support will help address the learning loss over the next few years.

### Goal Analysis [2021-22]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year. A description of any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions.

Overall, we were able to implement the main components of the actions in the goal. Essential academic interventions were implemented for our students with the highest needs. They were supported by the intervention programs and tutoring. Tutors provided on-site and virtual support to our students in order to improve their credit completion efforts. Credit completion increased by +3% this year.

During the pandemic, we were challenged at times, with not being able to quickly fill staff vacancies and sustain a 100% highly qualified staff. Our leadership and staff adapted to mitigate the potential impact on our students. Currently there are 3 teacher vacancies, and we have 88% highly qualified teachers serving our students.

Although we implemented most of Action 5, Student Activities That Increase Learning Efforts, were not able to provide as many of the field trips this year, as we have in the past. Not having as many field trips we anticipated, was the only substantial difference this year. We were able to celebrate student learning by providing awards and recognition to help keep students motivated.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

There were material differences that occurred as a result of not being able to implement as many field trip as we anticipated and backfill positions adequately. However, this did not impact the Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services, because other strategies within the action were implemented, and which were principally directed towards our English Language learners, low income and foster youth students. Although we were not able to spend all of the planned expenditures in Action 1, students did receive additional academic interventions, such as tutoing, and expenditures where increased in Action 2 to provide the English learners the support they needed with Literacy and mathematics. In addition, our students were able to take part in a few experiential learning trips to Las Vegas, Shaver Lake and Rocky Mountains.

An explanation of how effective the specific actions were in making progress toward the goal.

Overall, the combined 6 actions of this goal have increased the academic progress of our students as measured by key metrics such as credit completion rate, teachers appropriately assigned and NWEA scores. As shown above, in the Measuring and Reporting Results chart, the graduation rate was maintained over 90% to be 92.9% in 2021. This is the results of a comprehensive and strategic approach to helping students complete their coursework and earn credits towards graduation. Our intervention programs and tutors were able to help us realize a 9% increase in our credit completion rate. We are constantly focused on helping our English learners and their NWEA scores and we monitor their progress. The improvement shown in EL reclassification, credit completion, and the graduation rate show that we met our goal for increasing academic progress.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, desired outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

There were three changes made to the metrics reported in this goal. First, we were reporting RIT scores for NWEA Reading results, and now were are reporting Lexile scores, because that aligns with how scores are reported at a national level. We did this in order to be more comparable with other schools using Lexile reading scores. Secondly, there was no calculation for the English Learner Performance Indicator, so we reported ELPAC Levels 1-4, in order to show that we are examining the data that is available for our English learners. We will report the ELPI when it becomes available on the CA Dashboard. This year we are using the LCAP to meet the federal requirements for the SPSA. An additional action was included to describe the Title 1 program and uses of those funds under this goal.

## Goal Analysis [2021-22]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions.

We were able to implement the actions in our career and college-readiness, through standards-based coursework, and supplemental learning activities for our English Learners, low income and foster youth students. Technology upgrades and support for students'

connectivity and programs continued to be a priority. Professional development was scaled back this year; however, we were able to build capacity in our teachers through professional learning activities such as Cognitive Coaching, Datadesign Data workshops, New Staff Training Modules and ELD workshops that focus on Engaging Student with Strategies that Work.

We were challenged, during the pandemic, with not being able to enroll more students in CTE courses, due to CDPH guidance. Currently, there are 6 students in a CTE pathway, with a 100% course complete rate. We have 531 students in professional skills courses this year. Overall, students had access to the college and career activities at our school and those who could take advantage of them did so. We implemented Action 2.2, Professional Development, were not able to provide as much technology as had in the past.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

There were material differences that occurred as a result of not being able to spend as much on technology, Action 3, as we anticipated. We were over spent in professioanl development for Action 2. However, overall, this did not impact the Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services, because other activities; such as participating in Datadesign Data workshops to improve data analysis and attending ELD workshops to increase strategies to engage students, within the action were implemented, and which were principally directed towards our English Language learners, low income and foster youth students.

An explanation of how effective the specific actions were in making progress toward the goal.

We effectively implemented our College and Career-Readiness goal, as measured by key metrics, such as participation in CTE and Professional Skills courses, a standards-based curriculum, and the California Assessment for Student Performance and Progress. Our English Learners, low-income, and foster youth students were able to engage in activities that focused on career-readiness and/or college readiness. Professional skills courses had an enrollment of 531 this year. 100% of our students had access to a broad range of courses. The results from last year's CAASPP test was 24.06% in ELA and 4.08% in Math. We were able to implement our college and career-ready, standards-based instructional program this year. Additionally, we ensured that students had access to technology and a high level of connectivity in order to support their learning efforts.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, desired outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

New this year is the required metric for measuring the percentage of seniors completing the A-G courses and a CTE pathway. This is a challenging combination of specific course completion for very high performing students. Last year only 1.61% of our seniors were able to be counted in this metric. We are using the most current data from the CDE's DataQuest.

## Goal Analysis [2021-22]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions.

Our goal for Increasing Student Retention was successfully implemented this year. Our English learners, low-income and foster youth were serviced by our student retention personnel which helped us maintain 85.3 percentage points which is above the 80% Desired Outcome. Our attendance is currently at 94.47%, which is higher than last year. This local data is currently not disaggregated, and we are hoping to improve our capacity to report by subgroups.

The pandemic forced us to redouble our efforts to re-engage students, which included directing funds towards feeding and transporting students to school if necessary. Although we expended nearly all funds for nutrition, we will adjust the amount of funding necessary to meet our students' nutritional and transportation needs. Our low income students were able to access food and transportation as needed. Although we implemented most of Action 3.2, we were not able to provide as many of the social-emotional activities this year, as we have in the past. We adapted by providing other engaging and meaningful student activities to support their needs, such as virtual and on campus welcome back, coping skills, controlling anxiety, seeking support and help outside of school. We also provided monthly social emotional presentations with various topics like dealing with frustration, time management, Suicide Awareness month in September and January, & Mental Health Awareness throughout the year. These activities helped student social-emotional needs.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

There were material differences that occurred as a result of not being able to implement transportation as anticipated. Also, some socialemotional support was not fully implemented and were not able to quickly backfill positions. However, this did not impact the Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services, because other activities planned. The school had Parent Teacher Conferences, scheduled intervention student/parent meetings and made home visits to provide meals and school work to needy students. This activities were within the action we implemented, and which were principally directed towards our English Language learners, low income and foster youth students. We were able to continue to provide bus tokens so students could take the city transit to and from school.

An explanation of how effective the specific actions were in making progress toward the goal.

Overall, we have increased the retention of our students as measured by key metrics, such as the success rate, retention rate and low dropout rate. As shown above, in the Measuring and Reporting Results chart, the success rate was maintained at 93 percentage points which is above the 80% Desired Outcome. This is the result of a comprehensive and strategic approach to helping students remain engaged in their education and help them overcome barriers to learning. Our efforts to re-engage students resulted in an increase in our retention rate to 85.3% this year. The dropout rate this year is 6.3%, which is an improvement from last year. Additionally, the attendance rate is above what it was last year, and is now at 94.47%. These metric show that we have improved retention and that the actions are effective in this goal.

## Goal Analysis [2021-22]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year. A description of any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions.

We were able to implement the actions in Goal #4, Increase Educational Partner Engagement. This was a challenge for us last year, but as a result of adapting additional methods of connecting and engaging our partners, we were able to sustain and improve on some of our actions. Parent conferences, orientations and school events were in-person this year and we continued to utilize the virtual meetings platforms to engage parents that way if they desired that option. PAC/ELAC meetings were also held this year and so far we have had 41 participants. We are continually trying to improve how we can engage the most amount of parents and give them input into the school. We increased our participation on our school survey, which helped provide insight into our LCAP goals and other school processes. Of the parents responding to the survey, 82% feel encouraged to participate.

We implemented most of Action 2.1, Community/Parent Liaison, and we were not able to provide as many of the activities, as we have in the past. We adapted by providing other engaging and meaningful engagement activities such as Back to School Night, Open House, Guest speakers and food/meal distributions. This is an important goal for us and our educational partners would like to keep this goal moving forward.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

There were material differences that occurred as a result of not being able to implement translation services and educational partner events as we anticipated. However, this did not impact the Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services, because other events. The school promoted the Hispanic and Black History Month, Cultural Celebrations and provided food for school events. Onsite events like College Night and Financial Aide workshops that support the action were implemented, and which were principally directed towards our English Language learners, low income and foster youth students. Although we were not able to spend all of the planned expenditures in Action 1 & 2 we were able to hired bilingual staff to assist with communicating with our non-English speaking Educational Partners. Bilingual staff and translators were available at all school functions, meetings and parent/teacher conferences ensuring important information was conveyed and received. In addition, to support the community the school distributed food boxes including Thanksgiving dinners, and our community liaison did outreach in the community to increase potential partnerships that support our students groups.

An explanation of how effective the specific actions were in making progress toward the goal.

Overall, we were successful with this goal, as measure by the school survey and participation results. We saw an increase in parents feeling encouraged to participate rise to 82% this year. We believe that our positive engagement efforts resulted in 100% of the students reporting that they feel safe this year and 99% of the teachers reporting that they feel connected. In order to address this condition of our low-income students, we will develop and implement a new attendance program that is designed to address some of the major causes of absenteeism, including lack of reliable transportation and food, as well as a school climate that does not emphasize the importance of attendance. Goal N, Actions X, Y, and Z provide additional transportation and nutritional resources as well as a districtwide educational campaign on the benefits of high attendance rates. (Contributing Action[s])

These actions are being provided on an LEA-wide basis and we expect/hope that all students with less than a 100 percent attendance rate will benefit. However, because of the significantly lower attendance rate of low-income students, and because the actions meet needs most associated with the chronic stresses and experiences of a socio-economically disadvantaged status, we expect that the attendance rate for our low-income students will increase significantly more than the average attendance rate of all other students. (Measurable Outcomes [Effective In])
